he city began its own applications of slurry last year. The procedure seals the asphali surface, which normally is recognized as beginning to crack, and prevent further damage by weather.

Applying the slurry seal has been
determined as the mostefficient, both in extending the life of the existing asphalt paving and cost per block of applica-
