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Baird Man Makes Citizens Arrest After Robbery Attempt Sunday

BAIRD — Two Newark, Del. men were arrested Sunday morning, west of Baird, for the attempted robbery and assault on a Baird man at the Exxon Station, located at I-20 and State Highway 283 in Baird. The two men, Leonard W. Steele, 23, and William A. DeLoach, 20, were charged and placed in Callahan County jail about mid-morning.

The station attendant, Buck Gilmore, who received a blow on the head, gave the following account of the attempted robbery. Two men, driving a U-Haul truck, drove into the driveway and asked if they might park their truck and spend the night.

One of the men then hit Gilmore on the back of the head with a crescent wrench. The men seemed surprised that the blow didn't knock the attendant out, and both ran from the station. Gilmore tried to catch the two, but returned to the unattended station and phone the Sheriff's office.

Later Sunday morning, Fred Goble, President of the First National Bank of Baird, entered the station for service, and Gilmore related his story to the customer. Mr. Goble continued his trip toward Abilene and near the outskirts of town, spotted two men fitting the description of the men given by Gilmore. He stopped in Clyde at a station and notified law officers.

Mr. Goble returned to Baird after making his trip to Abilene, and saw the two men again on I-20. He went to the station and related this information to Gilmore, who left the station and proceeded west and saw the two men, stopped and made a citizens arrest. Law men arrived a short time later and took them into custody.

The Exxon Station is operated by Chester Lee and Mr. Gilmore is the night attendant at the station.

Students must be in the top 10 percent of the junior or senior academically to be considered for membership.

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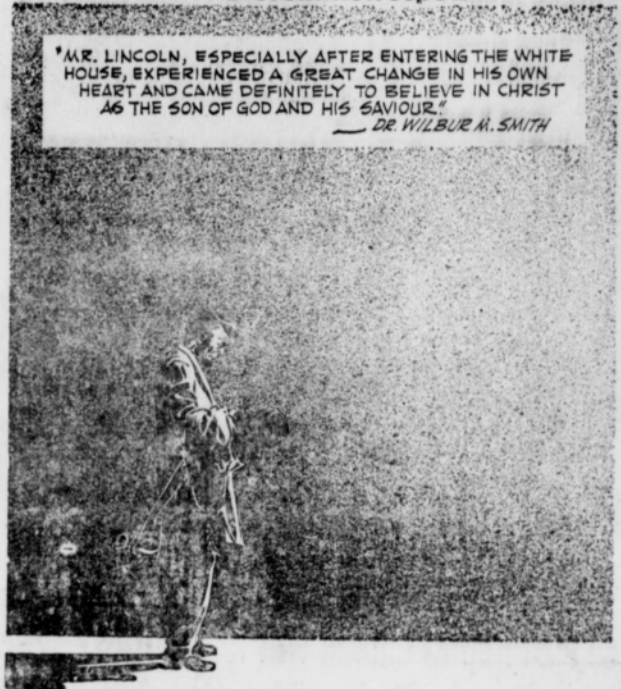

THE ENERGY CRISIS... IS IT TRULY FOR REAL?

Is there an energy crisis?
You can draw your own conclusions from the following facts

1. The U. S. has only 7 per cent of the world's proved oil reserves, yet has 37 per cent of the world's demand for refined oil products.
2. In 1971, we had 83 years' supply of oil compared with 109 years' supply in 1961.
3. In 1971 our per capita consumption of oil was 26.8 barrels against 19.6 barrels 10 years earlier, an increase of 36 per cent.
4. Present our supply of natural gas is enough to last 124 years. Then years ago we had 202 years' supply. There has been a decline of 38 per cent in a decade.
5. Our use of hydrocarbons is increasing faster than we're finding new domestic supplies.
6. Demand for motor fuel increased 44 per cent from 1961 to 1971; for distillate fuel, 41 per cent; for residual fuel, 45 per cent; and for jet fuel, 250 per cent.
7. Motor vehicle registrations 1971 were 49 per cent greater than in 1961.
8. Total consumption of natural gas in the U. S. grew 76 per cent in the past decade, including residential use up 56 per cent; commercial use up 100 per cent; electric power plant use up 123 per cent; and all other industrial use up 70 per cent. At the same time, proved natural gas reserves increased only 4 per cent.
9. Demand in the rest of the world for hydrocarbons is growing even faster than demand in the U. S. From 1960 to 1970 demand for refined oil products in the world outside the U. S. grew 170 per cent, compared with 52 per cent in the U. S. In Western Europe the increase was 220 per cent; in Japan, 480 per cent.

If there is no energy crisis in the U. S. yet, one certainly is building up unless something is done.

But what can be done? To oilmen, the answer is in finding more reserves. They say that their industry has been discouraged by adverse government policies, that if market forces were left freer more oil and gas would be found. In 1971 fewer wells were drilled than in any year since 1945.

Some experts insist that we should have no fear of running out of oil at a price. They not only contend that there is a vast amount of oil and gas yet to be discovered, but our tremendous known reserves of oil shale assure us that we will not run out.

But until research finds more economical means of producing it or until the price of oil rises to the point that the present methods become commercial, our shale oil reserves, estimated to exceed a trillion barrels or about three times known crude reser-

ves in the world, cannot be used. Still other analysts say that there is no need to worry as long as world reserves are so large because all we have to do is remove import restrictions or at least liberalize them. This seems simple, but it creates problems of transport capacity and, worst of all, will increase our dependency upon foreign oil, which none of us wants to see.

The other side of the two-dimensional problem is demand. We are hearing more predictions that gasoline and possibly other fuels will have to be rationed to force a decrease in demand.

I have seen no study on it, but I dare say there is a great deal of waste in our use of energy and probably the greatest of all is in the large, low-mileage automobiles. We may be obliged to turn to small cars whose gasoline consumption per mile is considerably less.

Conceivably the energy situation ultimately will lead to an expansion of mass transportation systems both urban and interurban. Public transportation seems certain to have a revival.

Now Is Best Time To Select Trees And Shrubs From Nurseries

According to County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross, now is the time to find the best selection of trees or shrubs at garden centers and nurseries.

Trees and shrubs are generally sold in three forms: ball or burlapped (B&B), container-grown or bare roots.

For the B&B type, a ball of soil, in proportion to the top growth of the plant, is wrapped in burlap and pinned. In handling, the plant should not be lifted by its stem or trunk. Rough handling can loosen the ball or soil and endanger the plant.

B&B plants are usually larger than container-grown plants of the same price. They are usually field-grown and may be better adjusted to conditions in your landscape.

Container-grown plants are continuing to gain popularity. The most common sizes are one and five gallon containers. Two distinct advantages of plants grown in containers are that there is less shock during transplanting and less chance of

damage due to rough handling.

Metal cans are usually cut with special shears by the nurseryman so that the plant can be lifted out of the container with a minimum root disturbance. Some of the new plastic containers are designed to allow the ball of soil to slip out without cutting the sides. Plants should never be planted with the container intact.

Many fruit and nut trees as well as some shrubs and vines are offered for sale with bare roots or with roots packaged in sawdust or similar material. Such plants do best if set out during the dormant period of late fall and winter.

"When setting out bare root plants, two things are important. First, never allow the root system to dry out or be completely submerged in water for long periods of time. Second, pruning at transplanting time is essential," cautions Gerngross.

The amount of pruning differs among species but generally a third to a half of the top growth should be removed. Any damaged roots should also be pruned back to healthy wood.

Regardless of the type of tree or shrub you plant, be sure to dig the hole large enough, at least 1 1/2 times larger than the diameter of the ball or root spread. Set the plant at the same depth it grew at the nursery and work plenty of humus material into the soil. Tamp the soil and then water thoroughly. A good mulch on the surface, along with adequate water, will insure maximum growth during the establishment period. A small amount of fertilizer may be added when new growth begins.

VETERANS - WIDOWS PENSION CUT AFTER SS INCREASE

Thousands of veterans and widows of veterans were recently dealt a financial blow by the reduction of their Veterans Administration disability and death pension payments. R. M. Cunningham, local Veterans Service Officer for Callahan County, states that his office has received numerous inquiries concerning these reductions. Many people contacted his office after receiving a letter advising them of the reduction in benefits, while others became aware of the situation when they received their January 1973 checks, and found them to be for lesser amounts than for previous months. All such decreases were effective January 1, 1973.

The local service officer advises that the reduction were the result of a 20 percent increase in Social Security benefits effective September 1, 1972. Since the Congress adjourned in October without enacting any legislation which would change the annual VA income limitations, the reductions in 1973 payments were necessary. Social Security benefit payments are counted as income, less a 10 percent deduction.

The Congress is again in session, and consideration is be-

ing given to legislation which would help in restoring the lost pension benefits to many veterans and widows. The Veterans Service Office will have information concerning any such legislation which may be passed by the Congress during the present Session. It will be necessary for the Veterans Administration to continue the reduced payments until action is taken by the Congress.
