

Iowa Park school costs below state average

Despite widespread reports last fall of school budget cuts, trustees around the state adopted the largest spending

increase in history -- \$1.8 billion more. Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending.

Spending was \$1.4 billion more than budgeted revenue, and trustees increased school taxes by a billion

dollars. However, when the beginning balance of \$4.2 billion was included, resources far outpaced expenditures.

The figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks 1991-92 School District Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,979 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$617 per student for capital outlay.

Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District's budget provided \$3,255.57 per student for current operations, \$133.26 for debt service, and \$153.09 per student for capital outlay based on the 1,935 students enrolled in October 1991.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by the Iowa Park school district in October 1991 was \$26,001, plus supplements for the career ladder and bonus for in-district residency.

The average for administrators was \$41,521, and \$29,950 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Taxes, budgets are common city, school meeting topics

Taxes and budgets are the common topics found on the posted agendas for the city council and school board, when they next meet.

The school board is to meet at 7 this evening in the junior high school library, and city council at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

School trustees are to set the date for a public hearing on the 1992-93

budget, set a date for adopting the budget and tax rate, and amend the 1991-92 budget. Trustees also will continue their study of the proposed new budget, according to the agenda.

The city council will act on a resolution which would accept the 1992 certified tax rolls, and approve minutes of three workshops held on the budget.

Trustees also will act on bids for purchasing a copy machine, gasoline and diesel fuels, computer upgrades for the administration office, and classroom furniture and equipment, according to the agenda.

Other topics on the board's agenda are accepting resignations and employing new personnel, as well as setting the tuition fee for transfer students.

Authorization will be considered by the city council to auction a tract of land, at 303 East Lafayette, and setting a minimum bid of \$560.

Tickets will be sold from 8 a.m. until 12-noon, and 1-4 p.m. weekdays, Richard Davis, principal, announced.

City to flush fire hydrants

Beginning Monday of next week, the city's water maintenance crew will begin flushing fire hydrants throughout the city, Mike Price, public works director, announced.

The city normally flushes its water system twice a year.

Residents will experience low water pressure while the crews work in their areas. The pressure will resume to normal, however, in 10 to 15 minutes.

The flushing will take place after 7 p.m. each day, and should be completed on Thursday evening.

The swimming season is about to come to an end for 1991 in Iowa Park. Bicentennial Swimming Pool will cease operation following the close of

business on Sunday, Aug. 16. The pool's operation dates have always coincided with the school's schedule, and classes start Aug. 19.

Tick bite changed his life's direction

The bite of a degenerate insect served as a catalyst that changed the course of the life and career of 32-year-old Greg Ammons, pastor of Faith Baptist Church.

How could a wingless mite cause a person to turn his life around?

A sports enthusiast, Ammons was 19 and enrolled in Oklahoma University where he also played intramural sports. His major was TV and Radio Broadcasting. His goal at that point was to be sports announcer for the Texas Rangers.

Now, the prelude to this story is that the young man from Boswell, Okla., "had my first experience with the Lord," 10 years before.

But, as many young people do, "I wandered away from the Lord during my high school years," Ammons said. But when he was 17 he felt he had the "call" to preach. "However, I just kept running away from the feeling," he added.

At this point, one thinks of the Bible story of Jonah, the reluctant missionary, and the big fish.

In fact, Ammons sometimes has compared himself to the early day prophet who was evading his duty, and who was taught by bitter experience the lesson of obedience and the depth of divine mercy.

That day in March 1979, when he was bitten by a tick, he was umpiring an area high school baseball game in Boswell, while on spring break from OU. He was not concerned about the bite.

Three days later, Ammons became ill and went to a doctor. His illness was misdiagnosed as the flu. When he didn't improve after 10

days, he was taken to Sherman where a dermatologist diagnosed his illness -- Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

The disease mimics the flu, and is characterized by high fever, pains in the bones and muscles, headache and eventually a red spotted eruption on the skin which becomes confluent, and sometimes there are even mental symptoms.

At Sherman Greg's kidneys began to fail. They were not prepared to take care of that condition properly there, and he was sent to Parkland Hospital in Dallas.

In Dallas Ammons remained in intensive care three weeks, most of the time in a semi-conscious state. The disease attacked his central nervous system, and in addition to kidney failure he had congestive heart failure.

For 10 days he was on a dialysis machine. Doctors at Johns Hopkins who were keeping in touch with the doctors at Parkland, said they had never known of a person to live with such severe kidney failure.

Ammons was not aware when his family was called in, nor that doctors did not expect him to live through that night. But, he did. The doctors told him his kidneys would never work again on their own. But they did. "I have never had problems with my kidneys, heart, or any other problems since," Ammons said.

"I lost all of my hair, and you can imagine how that was for a 19-year-old, (that's hard to imagine when you look at Greg's full head of black hair), but I was just so thankful to be alive that little else really mattered. Believe me, I came back to the Lord and this time I didn't try to run away."

"There were many people pray-

ing for my recovery," the minister said. He attributes his complete recovery in part to that, but he also says, "I feel deep in my heart that the Lord set me apart to do his work, and kept me here for that purpose. I think he had a plan for my life, and I have never doubted that this is what I was intended to do."

Ammons continued, "Someone once told me, if there was any other occupation I could be happy in, then I was not called to preach. I could not have another occupation I could find the joy and fulfillment I do in preaching."

The next fall Ammons transferred from OU to Oklahoma Baptist University to begin his journey on the ministry trail. He received his bachelors degree cum laude in 1982.

From 1982-84 he served as associate pastor of his home church, First Baptist, in Boswell.

He and his future wife, Lisa Bacon, grew up and went to school together in Boswell. They were married in February 1985.

Rev. Ammons entered Southwest Seminary in Fort Worth with a goal of going straight through to get his Masters and Doctorate degrees. The second part of his goal was to graduate with a 4.0 grade point average, which he achieved at age 28, the second youngest person to receive a Doctorate at the Seminary.

They didn't confer honors, Ammons said. "I believe they said 'If you graduate from the seminary, just thank the Lord you got out.'"

The dissertation for his doctorate degree was titled, "Divorce and Remarriage" and gave opinions on how the church should deal with this issue.

Ammons commented, "There is a lot to be considered in the situation of divorce and remarriage by believers."

While he was working on his doctorate, Lisa worked as a secretary at the elementary school at Floyd, near Greenville to help him complete his goal, and he preached at Floyd Baptist Church five and one-half years before coming to Iowa Park in January 1990.

Greg is the youngest of three children. The family lived in town and his father was bank president 27 years and had stock in banks in both Oklahoma and Texas. He said his father didn't enjoy being a banker as much after it got so a "man's word wasn't as good as his bond", so he decided to retire.

Lisa, who is half Choctaw Indian, owns two horses that she usually rides every day. Horses are her hobby. Her family lived on a farm near Boswell and she grew up loving horses.

Her parents were not rodeo performers, but several other members of the Bacon family were.

Lisa likes rodeos and has competed in some. She continues to attend Play Days and competes in barrel racing.

Though Greg doesn't share his wife's interest in horses, he supports her in her hobby.

Lisa is attending Midwestern State University full time, working toward a degree in Health Fitness Management.

Both Lisa and her husband work with children and youth activities and play volleyball. Lisa sings in the

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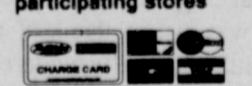
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Mrs. Ernest Putthoff

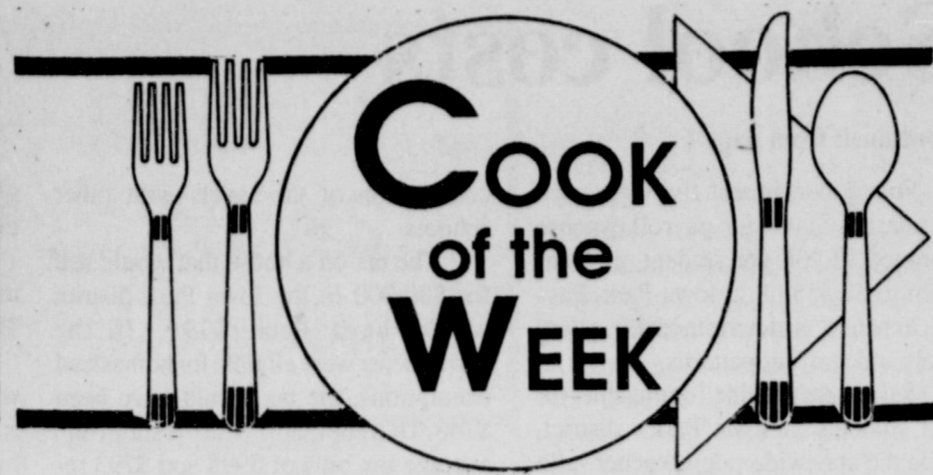
The family are member of Christ the King Catholic Church, where Marilyn teaches sixth and seventh grade religious education on Sunday mornings, and is a lay minister.

Swiss Plum Whya

- 1 unbaked pie shell
- 10 to 12 black plums cut in half (seed removed)
- 1 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/3 cup flour
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Dash of cinnamon

Place plums in pie shell. In a bowl mix together sugar, flour, eggs and vanilla. Pour mixture over plums. Sprinkle top with cinnamon. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 minutes to 1 hour or until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

Serve warm or cold. It is especially good topped with ice cream or whipped cream.

NOTE: Sliced peaches can be used instead of the plums.

Swiss Strawberry Shortcake

- 2 cups flour
- 2 Tbsps. sugar
- 3 tsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 3/4 cup milk

Mix dry ingredients together. Cut in shortening. Add milk and egg. Roll out on floured surface about 3/4-inch thickness. Cut with a large biscuit cutter or glass. Place on greased cookie sheet and bake 10 to 15 minutes in 325 degree oven.

When done take apart like a biscuit. Place strawberries in the center, and top with more strawberries. My family enjoys cream poured over theirs.

Baked Egg Plant

- 1 large eggplant diced into 1-inch cubes
- 1 cup cracker or bread crumbs
- 2 eggs beaten

- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 onion diced
- 1/3 cup butter

Cook eggplant cubes in salt water until very soft. Drain to remove excess water. Brown onion in butter. Combine all ingredients. Pour into greased baking dish. Bake at 325 degrees about 30 minutes. The unbaked casserole freezes very well.

Baked Chicken Salad

- 4 cups diced, cooked chicken
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1 can cream of chicken soup (removed)
- 2 cups chopped celery
- 4 hard cooked eggs, sliced
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. minced onion
- 2 tsps. lemon juice
- 2 pimentos, chopped
- 1 cup crushed potato chips
- 2/3 cup finely shredded sharp cheese
- 1/3 cup chopped almonds

Mix first 9 ingredients. Place in a lightly greased shallow baking dish. Combine chips, cheese and almonds. Sprinkle over the top. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 to 30 minutes.

Party Potatoes

- 8 to 10 potatoes, cooked and mashed or 8 servings of instant mashed potatoes
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
- 1 - 8 oz. ct. sour cream
- Dash of garlic powder

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into greased baking dish. Dot the top with 2 to 3 teaspoons butter. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake about 30 minutes at 350 degrees.

As I See It

As I've watched lawsuits wind up with someone collecting huge amounts of awards in court cases, I've wondered if there'd ever be an end to it all.

There've been reports of people receiving awards from businesses because they were injured, and the money was more than the recipient could have earned in three lifetimes.

I would not have been surprised to see a manicurist lose a lawsuit to a client who, because a hangnail was the cause of having snagged a new, \$75 silk blouse, had to pay the client \$750,000.

That hasn't happened, of course, but a recent case down in the Rio Grande Valley is almost as bad.

And the Rio Grande Valley Chamber of Commerce is fighting back. They've organized the Citizens Against Lawsuit Abuse, and with \$258,000 in donated funds, are launching a public-

ity campaign.

Let me tell you how it all came about, from information I read in the *Dallas Morning News*.

State District Judge John F. Dominguez had a deal going with the Weslaco Independent School District, to sell the district a 20-acre tract of land for a new campus.

But, during a public meeting, a member of the Weslaco airport board suggested that "the land might be inappropriate for a school because it was under an airport flight path."

Now, that doesn't sound so bad. Does it. I mean, this man with knowledge of airports suggesting that an airplane in flight could possibly crash into the school building, or on its grounds, if something went wrong.

Well it was bad as far as Judge Dominguez was concerned. "The very

idea," he apparently thought to himself. "I had this land sold to the school, and this upstart screwed it up. That cost me money."

So the judge and his wife filed suit against the city of Weslaco and Walter H. Baxter III, a former chairman of the Valley Chamber of Commerce board.

One could get in trouble, trying to read between the lines about the outcome. But the fact is, a visiting judge, Joe E. Kelly of Victoria, found the Weslaco airport board "maliciously convinced school officials they should not buy the 20-acre tract."

Now, I'm sure these two judges had never met. After all, one was from Victoria and the other from Weslaco. That's a bunch of miles.

Anyway, the good Judge Kelly found merit in poor Judge Dominguez's allegation.

And he figured that since those accused had cost Judge Dominguez \$200,000, since the sale didn't go through, Judge Dominguez and his poor wife should be compensated.

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,236 per student, as compared to \$2,555.68 in Iowa Park. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 17.2 students in Iowa Park's district, while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.3 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.274 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.8 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.259 (\$1.274 times 98.8 percent) statewide.

Locally, the Iowa Park district imposed a rate of \$1.020 including \$.750 by the county. Property was appraised at 101.4 percent of its market value making the true rate \$1.034 per \$100 of market value.

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid

comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in the Iowa Park district would have been \$799. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$748. That compares with the statewide average tax bills of \$998 and \$793 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year, the Iowa Park district's revenue from the property tax increased by 2.0 percent for 1991-92 as compared to a 12.0 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$3,046 per student in the district, as compared to \$3,969 statewide.

The state and the county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program, which averaged \$2,784 per student last year and was \$2,461 in the Iowa Park district.

Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$831 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$354 per student to

guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts.

Enrichment by the Iowa Park district was \$373; the state guarantee added \$212.

For the coming school year, there will be \$1.3 billion more for 1992-93 school budgets without any tax increase by school trustees other than the 10-cent increase by county education districts.

That will consist of \$627 million from the county tax plus \$684 million more state aid already appropriated by the legislature, the report states.



Worth Quoting

Alva Wright was in a class all by himself.

I've written about his golfing feats and talents in this corner many times over the years as he climbed to an unbelievable 691 times in shooting his age. His goal was 700, but a bout with cancer and his death last Friday morning brought his quest to an end.

While golf may have been the impetus that kept him going to the age of 92, there was much, much more to the man.

Alva was a gentleman of the old school. He had strong opinions about many things, and he didn't hesitate to express them, sometimes in graphic language. Most of these opinions were predictable to his friends who understood his firm moral guidelines.

Alva was a frequent visitor at the come-who-may coffee club that meets every morning at First National Bank. His contribution to the conversations were always to the point. And many times he would have a story, quotation or a verse to underline what he was saying.

Tall and courtly even in his advanced years, Alva was a self-educated man. Although his formal education stopped at about the sixth grade, he continued to learn and read until his final day. None of his friends really has an idea of just how many poems and philosophic sayings he had committed to memory, but he never ceased to amaze us.

Alva started work for Texas Power and Light Company as a bill collector using a side-car motorcycle when he was in his early twenties. He progressed to the point that he was sent to McGregor as its first manager in 1952. Until his death, Alva continued to be a repre-

New blood tests enhance safety

Red Cross has changed two infectious disease tests as part of its ongoing commitment to maintaining the safety of the blood supply.

"Donated blood is now being tested for HIV-2, a new and rare strain of the virus that causes AIDS. The new combination test also screens for HIV-1 and will replace the old HIV-1 test, which has been performed since 1985," said Charles Gurley, Administrator for Southwest Region Red Cross Blood Services, Wichita Falls location.

The HIV-2 strain is extremely rare in the United States. To date, only 31 cases of HIV-2 are known to exist in this country, and none of the known patients contracted the disease through a blood transfusion.

Those with the disease either lived in or visited West Africa, where HIV-2 is more common.

Transmission methods for the

HIV-2 mimic those of HIV-1. The rare strain is spread through sexual contact or exchange of blood, usually during IV drug use with shared contaminated needles.

The American Red Cross has monitored blood supplies around the country since 1987, and has not found one blood donor with HIV-2. Because of the similarities in the two viruses, the previously used HIV-1 test would likely detect most HIV-2 cases.

Red Cross implemented the new combination HIV-1 and HIV-2 test to further enhance the safety of the blood supply and screen out as many possible contaminants as is humanly possible.

For the same reason, Southwest Region Red Cross Blood Services has begun using an improved test to detect hepatitis C. The new test is more sensitive than the hepatitis C test originally licensed by the Food and

Drug Administration nearly two years ago. It should further reduce the risk of transfusion-associated hepatitis.

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The Red Cross now performs four tests for hepatitis, as well as the combination HIV-1/HIV-2 test and tests for syphilis and HTLV-1, a virus linked to a rare form of adult leukemia.

Additionally blood type and screening for irregular antibodies is accomplished on every voluntarily donated unit of blood. If any test is

found to be reactive, the unit of blood is quarantined and destroyed per strict guidelines and the volunteer donor is notified.

Finnell committee to hear testimony

A house government organization subcommittee heard testimony in Austin this week that 26 state agencies have created a total of 300 advisory committees with 4,000 members at an expense of approximately \$10 million during the current two-year budget cycle.

As a result, Rep. Charles Finnell, subcommittee chairman, suggested that all 231 state agencies be required to fully disclose the number of their advisory committees, function, memberships and cost of each entity, "within five working days."

"We need to know the extent and magnitude of this increasing phenomenon.

"Our state can ill afford a 'business-as-usual' attitude on the part of state agencies in creating numerous advisory committees. Each of these must have an explicit purpose without duplication or undue expense," he said.

Finnell's three-person subcommittee will reconvene in late August or early September to report on the feasibility of establishing guidelines for state agency advisory committees.

The report will be presented to the 73rd Legislature which convenes in January.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

AUSTIN - Attorney General Dan Morales says the Democratic plan to redistrict the state Senate — the one passed late by the Texas Legislature — may yet come to fruition.

This year's elections are based on a plan drawn by a three-member federal judge panel in Austin after the Texas Supreme Court tagged the Legislature's plan as being unfair to minorities. Democrats fear it and hate it.

Morales, a Democrat, has been fighting more than a year to substitute the court plan, even though it was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Last week, Morales persuaded a three-judge panel in Washington to approve the Legislature's state Senate plan, and this week he is exploring implementing it for the November elections.

That means finding a federal judge to invalidate the election

and order new party primary elections...and quickly.

Texas Republican Party director Karen Hughes said: "I can't believe that a federal judge is going to invalidate an election that has been ordered, held and validated by the U.S. Supreme Court."

Last Primary Over

Primary elections are now concluded in Texas, including a lingering congressional runoff last week in Houston which was as hot as the summer temperatures.

There, state Sen. Gene Green

defeated former state Rep. Ben Reyes for a congressional seat deliberately drawn for a Hispanic.

Reyes called Green a "lackey" and indicated he might endorse the Republican nominee, Clark Kent Ervin, a black businessman.

Black lawmakers split their support in the heated race. Reyes was backed by state Sen. Rodney Ellis, while Green was supported by state Rep. Ron Wilson.

Lawmaker Sues for Libel

State Rep. Sylvester Turner filed a libel suit against Houston's Channel 13 for a mid-election broadcast which linked Turner to a \$6.5 million fraud of nine insurance companies.

The broadcast reported the faked drowning death of fashion model Sylvester Foster a few days after Turner drafted Foster's will. Foster was found alive and in prison in Spain on drug charges.

The TV station reported that Turner, despite "fishy" circum-

stances, began legal action to pro-bate the will.

Turner accused the station of malicious and false statements; many in Turner's camp think the broadcast, wired in the final days of his mayoral campaign against Bob Lanier, was the reason Turner lost the election.

Backs Child Support Law

Morales endorsed federal legislation that he says will make it easier to report parents delinquent on their child support to credit reporting agencies.

The measure is being proposed by U.S. Rep. Mike Andrews, D-Houston, as part of an urban aid bill.

"You'd be surprised by the number of parents who finally become concerned about their child support obligations once they realize they won't be able to finance the car, boat or home of their dreams because their delinquent child support case shows up on their credit report," Morales said.

Citrus Juice Mislabeled?

On another front, Morales accused a large fruit juice company of "mugging our school children for

their lunch money" by mislabeling the juice it sells to public school lunch programs.

Morales sued Cal-Tex Citrus Juice Inc. of Houston, alleging that it falsely claims on its juice carton labels that the product is fortified with vitamin C. A Cal-Tex spokesman denied the charges.

Juice that was tested by the state and found to be deficient in vitamin C was taken from Fort Worth, Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso, Lubbock and Longview school districts, Morales said.

Insurers' Stock Eyed

A state Senate committee is looking into legislation that would force insurance companies to divest themselves of stock in companies that operate psychiatric hospitals.

A recent Texas Department of Insurance report found that 11 of the nation's biggest insurance companies hold \$1.4 billion in stock of corporations that operate psychiatric hospitals.

The Senate committee's staff has recommended that the state's Health and Safety Code be amended to require denial or revocation of a license whenever the applicant or licensee is found to be in the health

insurance business.

Other Highlights

U.S. Rep. Craig Washington, D-Houston, on his vote against funding the Super-Collider at the expense of domestic programs: "Everybody wants to see Jesus, but nobody wants to die."

More than 100 angry charity bingo operators descended on the Texas Alcohol Beverage Commission last week, seeking relief from

a tax increase they say will soon put many of them out of business. Last year, the Legislature raised the tax on bingo receipts from 4 to 7 percent.

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs announced that \$1 million is available statewide for home improvement loans for eligible low income homeowners. The maximum loan amount is \$15,000. For more information, call (800) 792-1119.

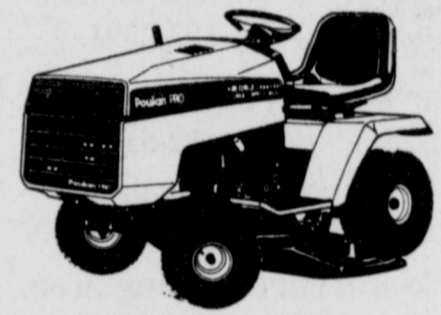

Fairchild fulfilling office term

Sam Fairchild wasn't expecting to assume the office of constable until after the November general election, but began working Tuesday.

A.L. Bohannon resigned the post he had held 16 years, effective Friday, July 31.

Bohannon did not seek re-election for another four-year term, and Fairchild won the Democratic Party primary nomination in his first bid for an elected office. He will be unopposed on the general election ballot.

Bohannon cited the cut in salary, to \$554 annually, made by commissioners court, as his reason for quitting. "I'm not going to take it (the cut)," he stated.

Fairchild took the oath of office to fulfill the balance of Bohannon's term Monday afternoon, and served his first papers Tuesday, he said.

Fairchild said he had submitted a budget to commissioners court, seeking a reinstatement of the salaries paid two other constables, of \$13,836 annually. The court has yet to finalize the new budget.
