Council postpones action on electric rate proposal

The city council delayed taking any action on a new rate request proposed by TU Electric, during Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting.

Following a detailed explanation by Dale Cox, spokesman for the utility company, aldermen in a split vote decided to delay taking any action on the proposal until the council's next meeting on June 27.

Cox said the proposal, if approved, would put TU Electric into a more competitive situation with other electricity providers who are successfully wooing away major customers.

He said alternative suppliers are taking advantage of TU Electric's system-wide rate structure to attract major industries as well as entire communities, even though the company's rates are the second or third lowest of any supplier in the nation.

As an example, he told the council that, in the case of a major industry considering moving into the area, and considering purchasing its electricity from an alternate source that might be cheaper than TU's rates, his firm would be empowered to at least match the lower rate offered.

If approved, he said the new tariff would be beneficial because it would: hold rates down for all customers, increase employment, increase economic activity, save energy and conserving resources, and improve the environment.

If the council were to have approved the proposal, the new rates would have been effective immediately within the city limits, but in the unincorporated areas it must first be approved by the state Public Utilities Commission, Cox explained.

During a discussion on the issue, it was pointed out that a competitive business could move into the city in which an existing firm was operating, and receive a lower rate than the existing business.

Cox said, however, that the lower rate would be in effect for a five-year period, and after that the rate would be the same as others.

When the proposed new ordinance was considered, a tie developed because one alderman, Mark Raby, was absent.

Aldermen Johnny Crawford and Bob Hamilton voted for its approval, and Bud Mercer and Virgil Woodfin voted against it. In the case of a tie, the mayor casts the deciding vote, and Wayne House voted against it.

The council then decided to put the issue on hold until the June 27 meeting. Approving that proposal were Mercer, Woodfin and Hamilton, and Crawford voted against it.

Three other ordinances were approved during the meeting, however.

Two concerned replating of lots, one on Valley near Wall, and the other at the corner of Jackson and Poe.

The third ordinance approved rezoned five lots in the 100 block of West Washington from general commercial to general residential.

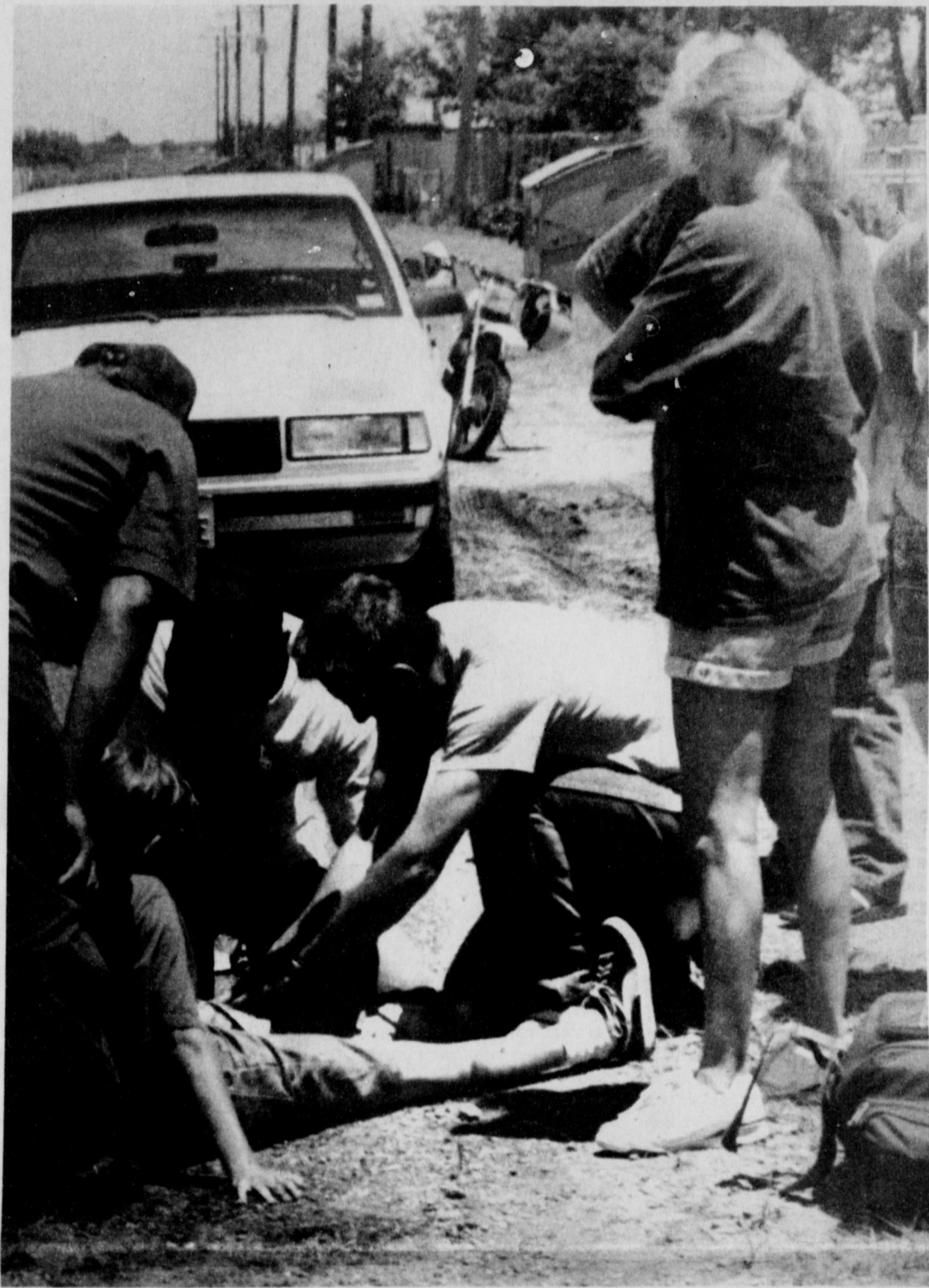
The contest was judged by music educators, university professors and professional musicians from throughout the United States. The format of

Bicycle seller is arrested

A man attempting to sell an expensive-looking bicycle for only a few dollars led to his arrest and the return of the vehicle to its owner last week.

Police were alerted Wednesday afternoon by a business operator on Johnson road that a man was soliciting the sale of the bicycle for \$10.

An officer responded and interviewed the man, who identified himself as Johnny Adolfo, 30. A computer check was run, but no information found on him.

So the officer told the man to not only stop trying to sell the bicycle, but also return to his home in Wichita Falls.

Shortly afterward, the officer saw the same man with some juveniles on the service road, again trying to sell the vehicle.

He was taken into custody and transported to the police station, where after more questioning, admitted not only that he had stolen the bicycle, but

was a walk off from the state hospital in Wichita Falls.

Authorities identified him as Armondo Cavazos Lopez, 29. He was turned over to a county deputy to be returned to the hospital.

Identification of the bicycle's owner was gained through investigation, when a bicycle shop in Wichita Falls was contacted.

The owner, who did not know until being contacted by police that his bicycle had been stolen from his home, retrieved the racing bicycle valued at \$850.

Police are investigating two local theft reports, both reported Saturday.

One report concerned property reportedly taken from the garage of a residence in the 300 block of East

Ruby, and the other was of \$18 worth of gasoline allegedly taken overnight from a vehicle in the 800 block of North Park.

Only one arrest, other than that of the mental patient, was entered in the police blotter during the past week.

Jason Timothy McGrath, 21, was taken into custody at 12:23 a.m. Sunday in the 300 block of West Highway and charged with public intoxication.

McGrath, according to the blotter entry, was released at 7:25 a.m. after paying a \$280 fine.

A resident in the 300 block of West Washington filed a criminal mischief complaint with police Thursday, that a window screen on the home had been damaged as well as a vehicle's spark plug wires.

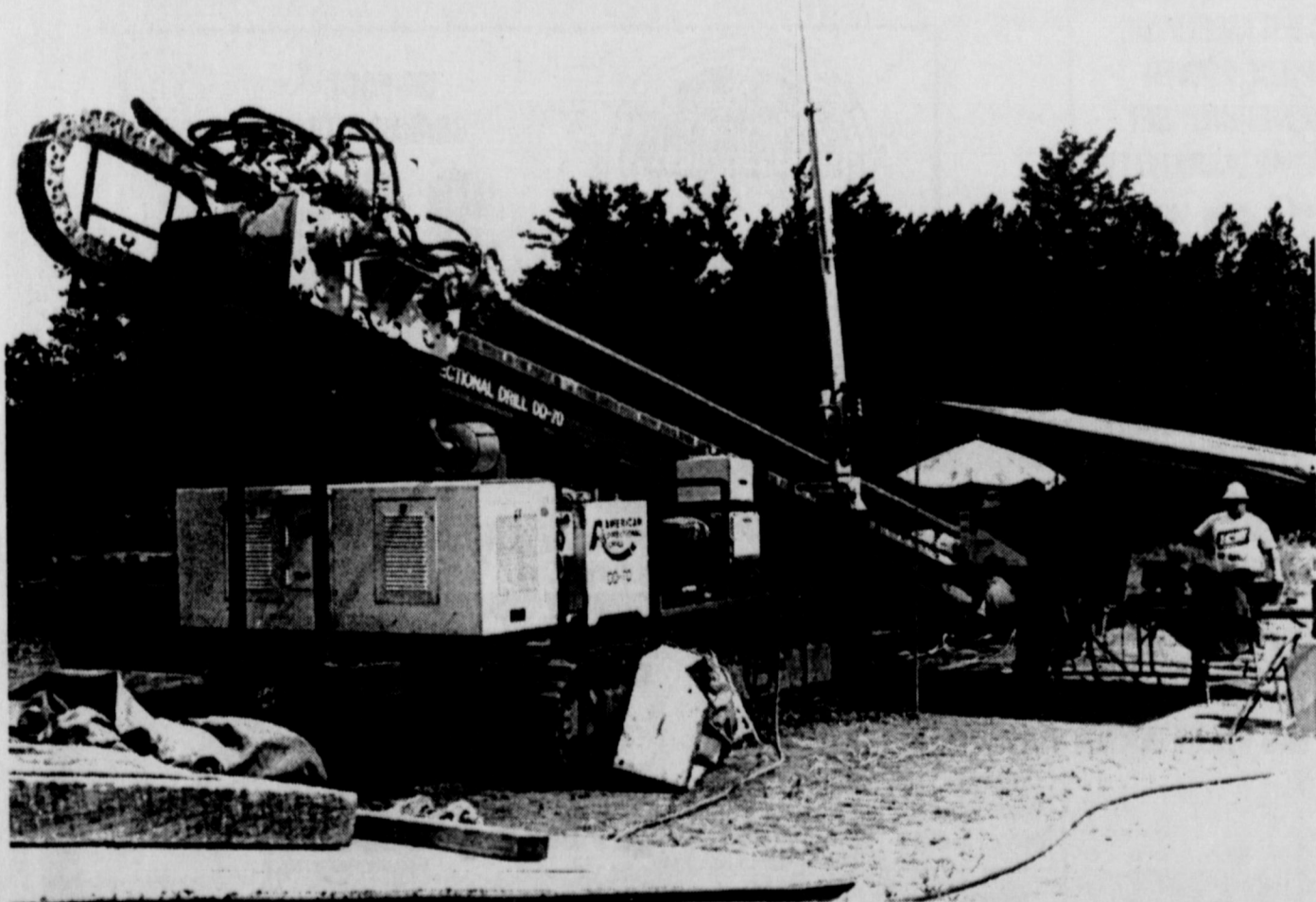
Sponsored by the Maskat Shrine, all proceeds will go to cripple children of Texas and Oklahoma.

Sales taxes down some

Retail sales apparently dropped here slightly in April, when compared with the same month in 1993, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office in Austin.

The city received a sales tax rebate check for \$13,935.78, which is 1.77 percent less than the \$14,187.92 received this month last year, according to the report.

However, sales taxes still are above the same period last year. To date, sales tax rebates have amounted to \$111,249.17, which is 1.98 percent greater than the \$109,082.58 reported in 1993.

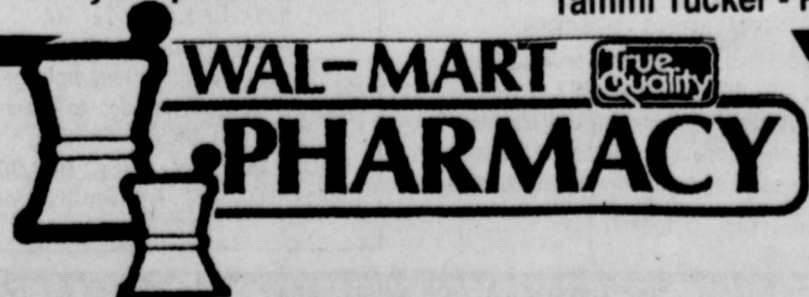


Tips for the Summer Traveler

- The best way to enjoy your vacation is to plan ahead and be well-prepared.
- Motion-sickness while traveling by sea, air, train or even by car, is common. Many anti-motion-sickness medications are available and work well if taken 30 minutes to one hour prior to departure. Ask your pharmacist to recommend one.
- Sun-screening agents are essential while having fun in the sun. Those with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 15 or higher provide the most protection.
- You can get sunburned even when it is overcast. The risk of serious sunburn is increased at high altitudes where there is less atmosphere to filter ultraviolet rays.
- Be sure to pack an adequate supply of any medications you are taking. Don't leave your medications in checked luggage. Lost or delayed luggage could mean that you miss one or more of your medication dosages. Keep medication in its original container with the proper label attached.
- Don't forget to bring your health insurance information and insurance card.
- Your traveling "medicine chest" should include: basic first-aid supplies, sunscreen, a thermometer, mild pain reliever, an antacid, diarrhea medication, cough/cold remedies, a topical anti-itch product, an antihistamine, and insect repellent.

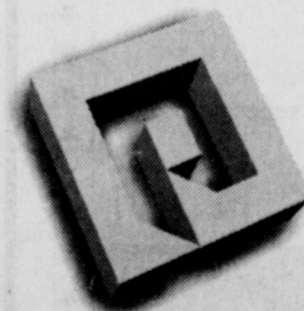
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
