Council postpones action on electric rate proposal

The city council delayed taking any action on a new rate request proposed by TU Electric, during Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting.

Following a detailed explanation by Dale Cox, spokesman for the utility company, aldermen in a split vote decided to delay taking any action on the proposal until the council's next meeting on June 27.

Cox said the proposal, if approved, would put TU Electric into a more competitive situation with other electricity providers who are successfully wooing away major customers.

He said alternative suppliers are taking advantage of TU Electric's system-wide rate structure to attract major industries as well as entire communities, eventhough the company's rates are the second or third lowest of any supplier in the nation.

As an example, he told the council that, in the case of a major industry considering moving into the area, and considering purchasing its electricity from an alternate source that might be cheaper than TU's rates, his firm would be empowered to at least match the lower rate offered.


If approved, he said the new tariff would be beneficial because it would: hold rates down for all customers, increase employment, increase economic activity, save energy and conserving resources, and improve the environment.

If the council were to have approved the proposal, the new rates would have been effective immediately within the city limits, but in the unincorporated areas it must first be approved by the state Public Utilities Commission, Cox explained.

During a discussion on the issue, it was pointed out that a competitive business could move into the city in which an existing firm was operating, and receive a lower rate than the existing business.

Cox said, however, that the lower rate would be in effect for a five-year period, and after that the rate would be the same as others.

When the proposed new ordinance was considered, a tie developed because one alderman, Mark Raby, was


The council then decided to put the issue on hold until the June 27 meeting. Approving that proposal were Mercer, Woodfin and Hamilton, and Crawford voted against it.

Sales taxes down some

Retail sales apparently dropped here slightly in April, when compared with the same month in 1993, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office in Austin.

The city received a sales tax rebate check for \$13,935.78, which is 1.77 percent less than the \$14,187.92 received this month last year, according to the report.

However, sales taxes still are above the same period last year. To date, sales tax rebates have amounted to \$111,249.17, which is 1.98 percent greater than the \$109,082..58 reported in 1993.

If you'll indulge me, I'd like to get a couple of complaints off my chest that I have about driving in our community.

These are the underaged, unlicensed drivers and people misusing their handicap parking privileges.

We've got kids all over town who are operating motor vehicles both in the streets and the alleys. And they are probably doing it because they don't know any better, their parents don't know any better, or none care about the

includes alleys.

And a motorized vehicle includes mopeds, dirt bikes, golf carts, and the like.

Besides the operator being required to be licensed, whatever vehicle that is being operated on a public thoroughfare, other than those relating to agricultural production or with special permits, also must be registered and licensed.

We had a 12-year-old two-wheel motorized vehicle operator injured Sunday afternoon. I say injured, he was taken to a Wichita Falls hospital complaining of a leg injury. The accident was in an alley in Garden Valley.

The fact is, the youngster just plainly had no business operating that vehicle there. And he was fortunate his to operate any of those vehicles on land other than public thoroughfares. Without it, they are committing criminal trespass.

And then there's those drivers I see who pull their vehicles into a handicap parking place, get out and walk as good or better than I to where ever they're going.

I found information on that situation on the back of an application for disabled person identification and license plate.

It says, "A person commits an offense if the person is neither temporarily or permanently disabled nor transporting" a disabled person.

In other words, that disabled license plate on the vehicle is not a

* Several problems have been observed at city lakes, such as unsafe camp fires, illegal dumping, and unsafe boating speeds;

* Mayor House verbally told the Hotter 'N Hell committee Iowa Park could be used again this year as the "escape route" Aug. 27, and as in the past the west side of the Burnett Library grounds would be available for a refreshment stand.

The council is to hold its second of three scheduled 1994-95 budget workshops at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

* Use soaker hoses and mulch to conserve water and avoid spraying the foliage with irrigation water.

* Tomato plants will shed their blooms if daytime temperatures exceed 92 degrees with night temperatures above 75 degrees. This is a common problem during the heat of summer. Plant heat-set varieties and early maturing varieties during more moderate temperatures.

* The bottom of fruits turn brown or black because of Blossom End Rot. Avoid over-watering and never allow soil to become excessively dry. Keep soils evenly moist. The minor fertilizer element calcium can also help reduce the occurrence of blossom end rot.

* Plants which are yellowing from the bottom up with dark spots on leaves may have Early Blight Fungus. Apply a fungicide spray containing Daconil (Ortho Multi-Purpose Fungicide) every 7-10 days to prevent foliage damage and/or loss.

* Leaves with yellowish spots and bleaching or mottling with fine webbing are signs of spider mite infestations. Check the underside of leaves for small mites. Treat with Kelthane if spider mites are present.

* Worms on foliage or in fruit can be controlled with a B.t. natural insecticide. Ask your nursery professional for Bio-Worm, Dipel, or Thuricide.

* Leaves which are twisted and curled on stunted plants are symptoms of viral infection. Remove infected plants to prevent the spread of virus infection.

Follow all label directions and rates when using any pesticide.

With her work and the children's activities, Debra's schedule is always full. She enjoys watching or participating in sports, especially softball, volleyball, and bowling.


There will be an addition to Debra's family on September 24, when she and Jerry Gardner of Lake Kickapoo will be married.
