Police arrest woman for altering \$10 bill

The First Assembly of God may be a victim of Iowa Park's first driveby shooting, according to police.

Charles Hensley, the pastor, called police Friday morning after finding what he believed to be a bullet hole in a trailer house parked next to the church.

Upon investigation, Collins determined the hole on the side that faces Poe was in fact a bullet hole, and also found another on the side of the

He also found a damaged place on a vehicle parked next to it which appeared to have been caused by a bullet, but because of a rusting area, did not feel it was caused when the others were

All three damaged areas were within 25 feet of each other, and about the same height from the ground.

The bullet which passed through the Poe Street side penetrated at least two more walls and a door. A fragment

of the bullet was found in the carpet. Robert James Cason, 17, was taken into custody at 8:48 p.m. Saturday at Allsups, after an officer recognized

him as having a warrant for his arrest. But before the arrest was completed, additional charges were levied

against him. Actually, two different warrants for Carson's arrest were outstanding at the time. One was issued by the sheriff's department, for criminal trespass, and the other, "disobeying police officer" issued last May, was issued locally.

Cason reportedly resisted being taken into custody, but two officers completed the seizure.

The additional charges against him were resisting arrest and escape. No charge was filed, though it could have been, for assault of a police officer.

Because Life Line's request for a rate increase had already been approved by the other entities, aldermen were told that their choice was either to accept the rates of the amendment, or not have any ambulance service available to residents.

Life Line's previous rates included \$198 for an "Advanced Life Support" call, \$144 for a "Routine" call, and \$3.20 per "loaded" mile.

The company had requested raising those rates to \$290, \$185 and \$5, respectively.

However, the contract Iowa Park finally agreed upon called for increases to \$218, \$158 and \$4, respectively.

But, it just happened that two of the council members had recent experience with Life Line, and the itemized bills they received indicated that rates were being charged higher than those that had been in effect, and even higher than the newly-approved rates.

Alderman Bud Mercer showed an accounting for a call to his home on Dec. 22, and Alderman Virgil Woodfin for a call to his home on Jan. 8.

In both cases, the Emergency run charge was \$230, and the per-mile rate was \$4.

Additional charges for alleged services performed enroute in Woodfin's case were also listed on his bill, which is said to be a standard procedure.

The council had hoped Life Line owner Mike Harmon would be in the audience for the meeting, to answer questions on the billing.

Harmon, however, had told City Administrator Mike Price earlier that he had a 5 p.m. meeting already scheduled, but would come to the meeting if possible.

Mercer, Woodfin and Price are to hold a meeting in Wichita Falls with Harmon, in an effort to obtain explanations on the apparent overcharges.

It was also suggested, during the council's discussion, that some sort of oversight, other than annual audits, be made on bills during the year to see if only the approved rates were actually being charged to customers.

No action was taken on that point,

Kirk Jensen, who is having a new home built on Quail Valley Road, just outside the city limits, petitioned the city to be annexed, and asked that water service be made available for the contractor's use.

The required public hearings on Jensen's request for annexation will begin in two weeks, but the council went ahead and approved his request for water service.

Also approved were proposals to advertise for water and sewer installations and the sale of city property.



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



Open house honoring Mila Capes-Altom will be Friday from 7-9 p.m. at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

The public is invited to attend the event and become acquainted with Mrs. Capes-Altom. Persons who have Indian blood, but have not traced their ancestry will be especially interested.

She has a genealogy publication, "Journey Into The Past," that contains basic guidelines to Indian ancestral research.

It is a small publication, but represents many hours of work and research on how to go about tracing one's Indian ancestry. The publication has a heavy stock cover with spiral binding and may be purchased Friday evening.

Mrs. Capes-Altom has presented genealogy programs locally and for the North Texas Genealogical Association in Wichita Falls.

Her next speaking engagement will be at the Oklahoma University of Arts and Sciences at Chickasha, Okla.

A Chickasaw and Choctaw Nations descendent, she was raised to live in both the "traditional and nontraditional" worlds.

She attended Concho Indian School, Fort Sill Indian School, Bethania School of Nursing, and Midwestern State University.

Although the author had been thinking about this project for a long time, after meeting so many people who want and need to locate information to prove their Indian ancestry, she decided it was time to put what she had learned into written form so others could profit from the many hours she has already spent.

She says everyone needs to know that there is no guarantee one can find, or prove their Indian ancestry.

"Journey Into the Past" is the first of Mrs. Capes-Altom's written work to be published, but another, larger book is more than three-fourths finished and is expected to be released sometime this summer.

Her first publication has only 20 pages of text, but it is filled with information to help one get started on researching. It includes where to begin, listening to people and making tape recordings, information about the Dawes Roll Books, documentation and presentation. It also includes

names of the Oklahoma tribes and addresses of officials.

A member of the Chickasaw Nation Legislature, who is a friend of Mrs. Capes-Altom, is assisting her in setting up interviews with tribal elders and making appointments with remaining members of the original enrollees for her second publication entitled, "Journey Into the Past and Back".

She has been given access to some of the original diaries and records kept by those making the Trail of Tears.

Her second publication, will be an evaluation and basic description of the removal of the five civilized tribes, Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, Creek, and Seminole, and their relocation. It will be a study of before, during and after the Trail of Tears.

Other chapters will include personal characteristics, routes taken, what kind of government they had,

Open house honoring author set Friday and where each tribe settled, gleaned from personal interviews and from archive journals in Indian museums. Some legends also will be included.

"There is a lot of work that goes into tracing one's ancestry, it takes hours of searching old records, spending money, and sometimes spending a lot of time waiting," Mrs. Capes-Altom

"I was a teenager before I realized that not all people know their lineage. I stay excited as I find more and more about my own past. It is thrilling to me to think about every name I find belonged to a human being that lived, loved, laughed and dreamed,"she added.

An embryo is now forming in Mrs. Capes-Altom's mind for a third publication. In the future, she hopes to personally explore the original homeland of the tribes, and travel as nearly as possible the original trail her ancestors took to Oklahoma.







Add flour to grease to make a gravy with water. Add 1 can cream of mushroom soup. Pour over meat; add enough water to cover well. Bake about 3 hours at 350 degrees.

Note: Onion soup mix may be added to gravy mix.

- 2 lbs. ground chuck
- 2 eggs 1 cup milk
- 2 cups tomato sauce
- 1 1/2 cup cracker crumbs
- 1 small chopped onion 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper

Mix all together, addingmeat last. Bake 45 minutes to 1 hour in 350 degree oven.

Chocolate Chip Cake

1 box yellow cake mix 1 small box chocolate instant pudding 1 ctn. sour cream

3 eggs 3/4 cup water 3/4 cup cooking oil



Combine in mixer on medium for 2 minutes. Fold in 1 cup chopped pecans. Then fold in 1 small bag choco-

Pour mixture into greased and floured bundt pan and bake 55 minutes at 350 degrees.

Pecan Pie

- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 Tbsps. butter 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 Tbsps. flour
- 1/4 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup white Karo
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 unbaked pie crust Cream butter and sugar; add flour

and salt and mix well. Add eggs, beating well. Mix in Karo. Place pecans on bottom of crust. Pour pie mixture over pecans in crust. Place in 350 degree oven and bake 30-35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Frozen roast of your choice

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

Teacher has book published

Beverly J. McClure, a fifth grade teacher at Bradford Elementary School, has had her second article published in a children's magazine and a third will be published in June.

Evidently she really isn't discouraged, because she has two other novels in various stages of completion. "I'm always starting more than one thing at a time," she said.

One of the novels she is working on is for young adults. The other is a biography of her mother's life.

Mrs. McClure's first article appeared a year ago in a magazine for children entitled, Happiness, that is published in Virginia. It was on Fire Prevention and Safety.





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GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Area gardeners should be gearing up for the spring season.

Soil preparation, landscaping planning, cole crops, and lawn weed prevention are top priorities for the next month in Texoma. This garden checklist will help remind you about special care practices in the lawn, landscape and garden for February. Planting:

* Cool-season color can still be planted. Pansies, ornamental cabbage and kale can brighten the late winter landscape.

* Fruit and pecan trees are available at local nurseries and ready for planting.

*Container grown shade trees can be planted for property value improvement and summer shade. Use recommended varieties.

* Test your garden soil before planting or fertilizing. Contact your local county extension office for details.

* Prepare garden soils now for spring planting. New gardeners should consider constructing raised beds. Fill the bed area with a quality potting mix for an instant garden area.

*Onion transplants can be planted now. The famous 1015Y Texas Supersweet onion is available at local garden centers.

* Cole crops can be planted soon. These include cabbage, broccoli, Brussels sprouts.

Weed and Pest Control:

* Apply pre-emergent herbicide to established lawns for warm season annual weed control. Products such as Balan, Balan XL, Betasan, and E.C. Grow are available at garden centers and pest control outlets. Follow all label rates and directions when using these products.

* Apply dormant oil sprays to fruit trees, pecans and other scale prone landscape plants. Apply dormant oil when temperates are between 40 degrees F. and 70 degrees F. and is predicted to remain moderate for several days. Follow all label directions.

Fertilizers:

* Apply a 21-0-0 fertilizer around pecan trees in late February. One pound per square inch of trunk diameter is sufficient.

* Fertilize asparagus beds with a

high nitrogen product at label rates.

* Use a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio plant

* Prune peaches and plums to an open center with strong side branches.

* Prune grape vines back by 80 percent.

* Prune bush roses around Valentine's Day. Do not prune climbing roses until after their main flowering cycle in late spring.

Graham also won that night's Junior Varsity game, 50-45.



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
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

Classes buy bricks

To support the beautification projects in Iowa Park, eight third grade classes are buying engraved bricks that will be placed around a flagpole at the Recreational Activities Center (RAC).

To celebrate the 100th day of school last week, students in the third grade classes were asked to bring 100 pennies to school. The coins were used throughout the day in working math problems, and the students learned how to roll them up in wrappers supplied by a local bank.

The students wanted to use the combined pennies to buy engraved bricks, and there were enough for each of eight classes to have a brick with their homeroom name and date engraved on it.

This activity is one of the third grade students' community projects, and one of their teachers, Mike Bean, says they are looking for other ways they can help in the clean up and beautification projects now going on in the city.

Parental problem drinking detrimental to children

(This is the third in a series of articles on alcoholics in the home by Diane Grandbury, school counselor.)

Studies indicate that parental problem drinking is most detrimental for children of six to seven years old, then again in early adolescence, and again in later adolescence.

Throughout their development children are consistently confronted with change. They must face the challenge of growth, plus the necessity to maintain the security of the past.

Children of alcoholics encounter major growth problems, but possess little security from the past upon which to draw. Because of this in times of an alcohol crisis, these children may regress to an earlier level of emotional development.

This defense mechanism is called regression. Unpredictable crying spells, baby-talk, bedwetting and a return to a previously extinguished habit, like thumb sucking, are some signs that a child has regressed.

Loud, angry voices late at night, the sharp smell of whiskey or the sour smell of emptied beer cans, a parent sprawled on a couch or passed out on the floor, the screech of tires as the family car turns in the driveway, or the silence, the waiting, the tension when the drinking parent has not come home are just some of the things that children of alcoholics endure with few opportunities for ventilation of their own feelings.

Repression is the defense mechanism that children in alcoholic homes often use. They repress their feelings to prevent "rocking the boat".

They may also repress actions like not inviting friends to their homes for fear of what the unpredictable alcoholic parent will say or do.

Projection is another defense mechanism used by some children of alcoholics. Projection is the denial of unacceptable behaviors and situations by attributing them to others.

A child in an alcoholic home might ignore his or her own inappropriate behavior while (unrealistically) blaming another for the same behavior. This mechanism functions to allow the child to disassociate from realities he or she cannot bear to face.


