She remembers that the populaion at that time was probably around 2,000 . There was only one schoo campus hereat that time. Three of the six children were in school and they all worked.
All of the children who could picked cotton or pulled bolls in the Wichita Valley Farms for Jake Watson, Elmer Watts, and other farmers.
Gracie's other children who live away helped financially as much as possible. Her brother bought a cow so the children would have milk and butter, and the oldest daughter a home, Patsy, always helped milk. Gracie sold butter to T.M. Black's Grocery, and Jerry Don, one of th
youngest sons at home went door to door selling milk. What was left al ways went to neighbors or to other needy people.

The youngest son, Jimmy, started shining shoes at Herman Rains Barber Shop for 50 cents a day on Saturdays. Two of the girls, Dorthy and Margie, worked in a snow
