# Gracie Lee undaunted by unusually hard life

Pain, poverty, disappointment, loneliness, abuse, back-breaking work --- Gracie Lee has experienced it all during her lifetime that has spanned more than eight decades. Is she bitter? Doesn't she harbor anger and resentment?

The answer is no. However, she was left with some identifying traits that might be attributed to the hard years.

When one knows the story of the octogenarian's life it reminds you of a young tree that is blown and bent by unrelenting winds and just becomes much stronger because of its will to survive.

In addition to her never-say-die attitude, she has an undaunted spirit, a loving, giving attitude and an earnest desire to help others who are lonely, heartbroken or "down on their

Gracie was born Oct 6, 1910, in Indian Territory and was raised in the small Indian community of Lee's Chapel and Muldrow, Okla.

When she was two her father died with "dropsy". When she was five, her mother died with German measles, leaving Gracie and her brother, the late Garvin Allen, formerly of Iowa Park, alone.

The children were sent to an orphanage and her brother was later adopted by relatives, but Gracie was left in the orphanage until she was eight years old. At that time she was adopted by a relative and spent most of her youth being passed around to different relatives.

She remembers that she worked at many hard jobs. Some of her relatives were cruel and abusive. She never had an opportunity for a formal education.

In her early teens Gracie ran away with a young Cherokee Indian, hoping to find the things she had never had and had always longed for---love, security, happiness, and kindness.

Soon, the babies started coming. Nine of them in 20 years. That would not have been bad, if Gracie had found what she was looking for when she married.

But, she suffered great physical and mental abuse during her 22 years of marriage, protecting her children, and trying to leave, yet not knowing how she would provide for them.

Since this was during the Depression years, she and her husband faced rough economic times and endured great hardships. Her husband drank a lot and was violent and abusive when drinking. He left her and the children

when the youngest was a year old. Gracie had eight of her nine children at home with only a neighbor or midwife to help with delivery. Some she had before anyone got there to help her, and one she had completely alone.

The following day she would get out of bed to cook, clean, and help haul water. They had to carry all of the water they used more than a mile from the source. They lived in a house with a dirt floor.

Gracie did all of her washing on a rub board and since water was not easy to acquire, she saved the rinse water in the tubs for the children to

By the time her seventh child was born, her oldest had left home and had a good job in Illinois. He bought

his mother her first wringer-type washing machine.

Squirrel, rabbits, chickens, and a huge garden supplied most of their food. All garden produce was canned and berries, cherries and grapes were picked so Gracie and the children could make jellies, jams and cobblers. And one of Gracie's favorite foods became poke salad, which is still a

She passed on to her children some of the things she was taught at the orphanage. Never put off until tomorrow what you can do today, and to be grateful for whatever they had. She also taught them to "work hard, help others, and don't complain."

Everyone from the toddlers up worked to help make ends meet. The children had only one pair of shoes a year and they had to save them for winter and walk barefoot to school. They lived two miles from the school and all of Gracie's children and the neighboring children walked to school, rain, snow or sunshine.

Gracie made all of the children's clothes by hand. "I made diapers out of flour sacks," she remembered. Those years took their toll on Gracie's eyesight. She has been declared legally blind. The doctors say because of the years she sewed so much by the light of a kerosene lamp that her eyes were irreparably damaged.

After Gracie's husband left in 1951, she moved with six of her children to Iowa Park from Sallisaw, Okla., to begin a new search for happiness, near her brother. The six children ranged in age from 13 months to 14 years. The older ones had left home to find work.

When she came here housing that she could even think about affording was very hard to find. She finally found a two room house that was owned

by Bertha Garner on North Victoria (where a mobile trailer park is now located) for the seven of them.

Gracie soon found a job as a dishwasher at the Circle L Cafe, at 504 E. Highway.

She remembers that the population at that time was probably around 2,000. There was only one school campus here at that time. Three of the six children were in school and they all worked.

All of the children who could picked cotton or pulled bolls in the Wichita Valley Farms for Jake Watson, Elmer Watts, and other

Gracie's other children who lived away helped financially as much as possible. Her brother bought a cow so the children would have milk and butter, and the oldest daughter at home, Patsy, always helped milk.

Gracie sold butter to T.M. Black's Grocery, and Jerry Don, one of the youngest sons at home went door to door selling milk. What was left always went to neighbors or to other needy people.

The youngest son, Jimmy, started shining shoes at Herman Rains Barber Shop for 50 cents a day on Saturdays. Two of the girls, Dorthy and Margie, worked in a snow cone stand for Rolland Battles, when they were 9 and 12.

They also worked for the C.L. Metz Restaurant and Bonanza Drive-In Restaurant, as well as Roland's

Gracie began doing housework, along with her work at the cafe. Some of her first jobs she recalls were for Bonnie Denny, Mr. and Mrs. Lindsey, (the late Mrs. John B. Barbour's parents), Perle Pace, Barney Bradford,

# Holliday superintendent announces he will retire

Dan Owen, superintendent of Holliday schools almost 14 years, announced his retirement to his board of trustees during Monday night's meet-

The effective date of Owen's retirement would be Jan. 30, 1995, however. He explained he wanted to let his plans be known early, in order become fully acquainted with that post before he left.

"Hopefully, the board will have

the replacement in place by July 1st," said Owen, who is completing his 40th year in education.

In other business, trustees called the school's annual board election, approved seeking waivers for both class size and testing, and approved extension of contracts for key personnel.

Three positions on the board will as terms will expire of Dan Tucker, place one; Jack Parkey, place two, and

Ralph Surles, place three. Six candidates file

for the May 7 school board election, six candidates have filed for the four open positions.

Only the three city council incumbents had filed for that election, which will be held the same day as the

Actually, Monday was officially the first day for filing, under state regulations. But because it was a holiday, Tuesday became the opener.

Martha Dudley, incumbent for Place One on the school board, has filed, and is thus far unopposed. And Dennis Yeager, who has filled in the Place Five position after Robert Cook resigned, has filed to complete that term of office.

The two incumbents who already have drawn opponents are Wendall House, Place Two, and Sheri Kennedy, Place Three. Both have filed.

Newcomers Larry Dutton filed as a candidate for Place Two, and Bert Williamson filed for Place Three. Mayor Wayne House and alder-

men Bud Mercer and Johnny Crawford are the only candidates to have filed for the city's election. Candidates for both elections have

until 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Mar. 23, to file for places on the ballots. Early voting will begin Apr. 18 and end May

All three incumbents filed for reelection Monday, the first day applications could be accepted.

Because the district is entering into a classroom contruction program, a waiver from class limits for grades kindergarten through third will be

# Two-inch rain reported

The extended dry spell that has caused concern, primarily for farmers and ranchers, was broken during the past week.

Though measurement reports varied widely, the area received between two and three inches of precipitation from systems that moved over the area late Saturday, most of Monday and Tuesday morning.

Virgil Woodfin said he measured .21 from Saturday's shower, .85 Monday night and 1.03 after it cleared Tuesday, for a total of 2.09.

Besides benefitting the wheat crop and pastures, as well as yards and gardens, runoff water enhanced a lot of completely dry stock tanks.

Several residents reported pea-size hail Monday, but no damage was reported from it. Some electric power lines were downed by high winds on Huntington Lane, but no structures were said to have been damaged in the Iowa Park area.

A bolt of lightening apparently struck an underground computer cable connecting equipment in city hall and the police station. Administrator Mike Price said three terminals were knocked out and staff was still reassembling data that had been stored on the machine's memory.

Holmes is a Veteran of Foreign Wars, a member of the Order of The Eagles, American Legion, and the American and International Society of Telecommunications Engineers.



It just goes to show you. Any major college coach who is willing to go through what Wilkinson did, to get a player he wants, might be as successful as Wilkinson was.



As each of Gracie's children graduated, they would help with the remaining ones to see that everyone completed school.

The family's first Christmas in Iowa Park is one of the highlights of their life in their memories. They all consider it the happiest one they can remember.

During their life in Oklahoma, they never had received any type of Christmas gifts. Most people could not afford them.

That first Christmas at Gracie Lee's house on N. Victoria in Iowa Park was a jubilant one.

Then Mayor Bert Van Horn brought a Christmas tree with all of the trimmings and took the oldest daughter (now Patsy Frazier) and bought her first pair of high heel shoes.

Other merchants and businessmen in Iowa Park brought all kinds of food and gifts for all of the children. The first gifts, dolls, are kept by the girls today. Thereafter, Iowa Park made sure that Christmas was a special occasion for Gracie's family in years to come.

Some of the merchants who were so kind and generous were Fred Hays, who owned Rexall Drug Store at that time, Rollins Woodall, Claude Reaves IGA Grocery and Black's Grocery.

The family had no car or television at that time. Everyone walked where they wanted to go, to the grocery, church or school. They were members of the Church of God on Cash Street at that time.

Gracie now is a member of the First Assembly of God where her son-in-law and daughter, Charles and Betty Hensley, pastor.

"All of my children are married,"
Gracie said, "and I have 17 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren
with No. 16 on the way by my granddaughter, Kathy Frazier Arledge."

She also has three ministers in her family. Her children are Floyd of Rockford, Ill., Norma Compton of Wichita, Kans., Betty Hensley, Patsy Frazier, Margie Negri, and Jaynell Manuel, all of Iowa Park, Dorthy Major of Lawrenceville, Ga., Jerry of Dallas, and Jimmy of Plano.

Jimmy has wanted his mother to move to Plano to be near him, but she has refused. He tells her she just doesn't want to leave the girls. But, Gracie says, "I don't want to leave Iowa Park."

"The people in Iowa Park were so kind, generous and giving to me and my children when we had no one to help us. They became a "parent" to our family and I and my nine children will never forget how they helped in our great time of need," Gracie said.

They also have given her encourgement and care through three surgeries. She had gall bladder surgery, then cancer surgery, which was a trying time, but there were many prayers

said for her and when she had the surgery the pathologist's report came back there were no cancer cells present.

Later she broke a hip and a wrist in two places. She was told that she could never cross her legs again and that she would not be able to bend over, but with her determination and the help from her children, who all took turns in staying with her, even those who do not live here, she is able to do both.

"I have tried to keep the giving spirit of Iowa Park people alive in my children by teaching them to give and help others. I have tried to give back to the residents of Iowa Park, by helping the elderly in the rest home, those that have lost a mate, or those that are sick. In fact, I would like to publicly thank the town for all the many kindnesses shown me and my chldren over these 43 years I have been a resident," Gracie said. And thoughfully added, "The greatest gift in all the world is a loving, helping hand."

The story has a happy ending. Gracie found security, happiness, kindness and love in this community. She said, "My husband remarried after he left in 1951 and he and his wife and

five children by that marriage are all loved and respected by me and my children. Both families truly care for each other and we visit several times a year."

Gracie then voiced the thought and action that has probably been responsible for the form her own life has taken through the years, "We must forgive and go on and be kind and loving to each other."

Olive I. Blalock, 89, long-time civic leader and former society editor for the Iowa Park Leader, died Tuesday in a Wichita Falls care center.

Funeral services will be 2 p.m. Friday at First Baptist Church with Dr. Derrell Monday, pastor, officiating. Burial will be at Highland Cemetery.

She was born November 30, 1904 in Davidson, Okla., and had lived in Iowa Park since 1908. Her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John J. White and her father, the late James J. White, settled near Iowa Park in 1891.

She and Homer Joel Blalock were married Jan. 15, 1927. He preceded her in death June 14, 1965.

She retired as a newspaper reported having working in that capacity 45 years. During that time she worked for the Iowa Park Herald, Wichita Falls Record News, and the Leader.

Mrs. Blalock began working as a reporter for the Leader in November, 1969, and retired in April, 1988.

She has a long history of outstanding accomplishments and service to the community.

She was valedictorian of her graduating class at Iowa Park High School and attended Texas Univ. at Austin. Before her marriage, she worked with the Lyceum Company directing home talent plays for churches and PTA's.

Mrs. Blalock had been a member of First Baptist church of Iowa Park since she was 13 years old. She was a longtime Sunday School teacher in the high school department and was a member of the Women's Missionary Union, having served twice as its president and in other capacities.

She compiled a history of the church WMU and served as a member of the constitution and by-laws committee during the mid-1980's, and served as a committee member on arrangements for the 100th year celebration of the First Baptist Church in March, 1990.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary of the church was named Olive Blalock

She was a member of the Friendship Sunday School Class and Thelma Smith Baptist Women. A longtime member of the 23 Study Club, Olive served as its president twice, and held several District Federation offices. She was also a member of the Evening Lioness Club, serving as its reporter over 30 years. She received two plaques from the club for her service.

She served as sponsor of Epsilon Eta Chapter of ESA Sorority.

She received the Jaycee Citizen of the Year award in 1967, and was selected as the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce Senior Citizen of the Year in 1985. Her name was placed in the Golden Book of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Historical Foundation for reporting.

During the days of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, she served as director of the women's division for the fair.

For many years, Mrs. Blalock was much in demand for telling Christmas stories for churches and clubs, and served as toast mistress for banquets.

She is survived by a son, James Keith Blalock of Three Forks, Montana; a sister, Flora May Davis of Sherman; four grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

The family suggests that memorial be made to the Iowa Park First Baptist Church Building Fund.
