Cryovac expanding, again

Cryovac has announced the seventh expansion of its Iowa Park manufacturing facility, in order to meet the continued growth in demand for the company's products.

The 17,000 square foot addition to the existing facility will allow the plant to meet the increasing needs of its customers by making space available for additional production capability.

"The quality of people in Iowa Park and the Greater Wichita Falls community, the strong public education system, and the support of the local elected officials and civic leaders have contributed to the success of this plant," said Ray Youngblood, plant manager.

Cryovac, a unit of W.R. Grace & Co. - Conn, is a world leader in the development of flexible packaging systems and materials, and is headquartered in Duncan, S.C.

Construction of the local plant was completed in 1975 and has undergone building expansions in 1979, 1980,

1984, 1985, 1987 and 1988.

"The steady stream of expansions of this facility is an indication of Cryovac's commitment to this community and to the overall quality of work by our employees," Youngblood said.

Construction is expected to begin in September on the new addition to the facility which already covers 437,000 square feet, and should be completed late this year, according to Charles Lee, plant engineering superintendent (not to be confused with the plant's original manager who had the same name).

Additional production capability is also being added to the Iowa Park plant and equipment installation will be going on inside the present facility to improve the flow of materials on the production lines.

The addition of production equipment will allow the local plant to use the latest technologies and control systems and to produce the newest

products being developed by Cryovac.

Storage areas in the production facilities will be moved into the new addition in order to make space for the increased production capacity.

The number of employees to be added over the next 24 months for the expanded operation was not announced, but the total employment at the plant is expected to be approximately 620, with an annual payroll and benefit outlay of some \$31-million.

No figures were released on the cost of the construction project.

Cryovac, which is the world's leading innovator in flexible packaging systems and materials, is a part of Grace Packaging, which has annual world-wide sales in excess of \$1.3 billion.

W.R. Grace is the world's largest specialty chemicals company and holds a leadership position in specialized health care.

City facing big decisions

Several far-reaching decisions that will effect Iowa Park are facing the city council, during Monday night's 7 o'clock meeting in council chambers.

They include trash collection and disposal, sewer improvements, a housing development, possibly changing financial institutions holding city investments, and a golf course.

Aldermen will consider awarding a contract for collecting and disposal of garbage, having received bids from two different private corporations.

Bids were sought, as a possible solution to disposal of trash once the city closes its solid waste landfill. One bid was received last month, and the second bid is expected to be ready for consideration.

The city has been granted funding under the Texas Community Devel-

opment Program, to improve a major sewer line in the south part of town that has caused numerous backup problems during heavy rainfall periods, and the new line, along with a larger lift station, are expected to eliminate the problem.

A personal appearance has been requested by Richard T. Porter, who reportedly will seek permission to have a housing area on property he owns north of the city, served by the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp.

The area Porter proposes for a housing development is outside the city, and on the west side of FM 368.

Permission for the water district to serve the area must be granted by the council, however, because its line would venture south of a 1,000-foot boundary previously agreed upon.

Administrator Mike Price, according to the tentative meeting agenda, is to discuss the possibility of changing financial institutions for all short and long term investments.

A recommendation submitted by the city's golf course committee, that the city fund a feasibility study which could possibly lead to development of a golf course at Lake Iowa Park, will be considered.

No action, however, is expected to be taken on the proposal at the meeting, but rather will be considered in the city's 1993-94 budget.

The administrator also will discuss setting dates for the council to meet to finalize next year's budget, as well as setting dates for the required public hearings.

First-day enrollment higher than last year



HARD, HOT WORK - Helen Schell and all the others on the Kidwell Elementary staff had to suffer all day Tuesday, preparing for Wednesday's first classes. The building had no electricity for either lights or air conditioning. TU Electric crews worked well into the night to restore service. The administration had already decided that, if service was not restored in time, classes would not be held Wednesday, due to the heat.

As school administrators had been predicting, total enrollment of Iowa Park students Wednesday was higher than first-day attendance in 1992.

There were 2,020 pupils in classes at the four campuses of the district, with Kidwell Elementary posting the greatest gain over last year.

The first-day report last year included 2,004 students, and that was the first time since 1976 more than 2,000 students had been in classes on opening day.

As has been the case over the years, additional students are expected to enroll here during the next four weeks. Within a month after the start of school last year, enrollment grew to a total of 2,044.

There were 1,987 students reporting for classes the final weeks of the semester last spring.

Iowa Park High School counted 562 students in classes Wednesday, junior high had 487, Bradford 503 and Kidwell 468. Those same campus last year were reporting 562, 487, 503 and 468, respectively.

Local police have busy week

The past week was an unusually busy period for the Iowa Park police, who made five arrests, three of them for other agencies.

In addition, an investigation was launched after it was discovered several units at Mini-Con Storage had been burglarized.

The first arrest was of William Brandon Mack, 19, on an outstanding warrant from Clay County, where he is accused of burglarizing a habitation.

Mack was turned over to a Clay County deputy shortly after midnight Saturday.

When a patrolman ran a computer check on occupants in a vehicle that was stopped at 11:44 p.m. Saturday near Johnson and Magnolia, it was learned one man was wanted.

Dale Kenneth Turner, 21, had an outstanding warrant for his arrest for bond forfeiture on a charge of carrying an unauthorized weapon.

About 2 a.m. Sunday, police arrested Troy Douglas Ray, 26, when it was determined he was wanted on a charge of theft under \$20 and over \$200.

Both Ray and Turner were turned over to a Wichita County deputy at 4:25 a.m., to be transported to county jail, according to the police blotter.

The fourth arrest was reported at 10:18 p.m. Friday, when an officer took Thomas Carl Naukan, 31, into custody on a public intoxication charge. He was released some four hours later after posting a \$71.50 bond.

The police dispatcher received a call at 8:12 p.m. Thursday from a man who said he had found his rented stor-

age unit had been broken into and several items missing.

Investigation determined six other units also had been burglarized. The list of items taken from the units, compiled thus far, amounts to a value of approximately \$850, police said.

Also arrested on a charge of public intoxication was Alambar John Christopher, 28, at 12:02 a.m. Sunday in the 300 block of West Texas. He was released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

A resident in the 300 block of Kathleen turned in a report Sunday that a battery and hood ornament had been taken from a pickup parked overnight at that location.

Ronald Doyle Braziel, 28, was issued citations Saturday for operating a vehicle that had a license plate registered to a different vehicle, and also for driving without an operator's license.

Parents of three youngsters have agreed to make restitution to the owner of a structure in the 700 block of North Wall, where nine window panes had been broken, according to the blotter entry.

Police arrested Tracy Ann Brown, 27, Wednesday morning on an outstanding warrant for speeding. She paid her fine and was released.

McIlroy is flown to Dallas hospital

Joel McIlroy, who was severely injured in a one-vehicle accident July 19 while on vacation in Colorado, was flown to Dallas Tuesday.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam McIlroy has been recuperating in a Gunnison hospital since the accident.

He is expected to remain in the Baylor Institute for Rehabilitation for two to three months, after which his family was encouraged by a hospital spokesman as saying, "He should be back to normal."

Church continues to make improvements

Cooperation of parishioners, their volunteer work, and leadership of their pastor has resulted in marked improvement of church property located at First and Clara Streets.

Spearheaded by Rev. Patrick Burke, who came here 10 years ago to serve as pastor of Christ the King Catholic Church, work has continued to progress. It has culminated in a new brick building and large paved parking area that was dedicated in 1988.

Taking it a step at a time, through ongoing effort of the church community, several amenities have been added to the building and grounds.

Currently plans are being made to add a volleyball court west of the building for the young people. Also trees and more landscaping will be done.

The most recent outside addition is a grotto in a niche on the west side of the building, designed by Burke. It was dedicated two years ago on Mother's Day in memory of deceased mothers and in honor of living mothers.

Here again diligent volunteers from the parish provided the work, making the stone benches that sit in a grass covered rectangle in the center of the area a short distance from a statue of the Virgin Mary.

Burke commented that this par-

ticular statue was used since the grotto was dedicated to mothers and that Catholics refer to Mary as the Blessed Mother. A red rosebush is planted on either side of the statue, and circular stepping stones lead to the foot of the pedestal on which the statue rests.

A concrete walkway encircles the grotto that is protected on the south and north sides by walls of the building. The east and west ends are enclosed with a white wrought fence that stays locked, except when someone wishes to use it.

Between the walkway and the building are plantings of crape myrtle, Rose of Sharon, Italian cypress, boxwood and other ornamental evergreen shrubs and plantings.

The grotto provides a quiet, serene place for parishioners who wish to go to meditate, or pause to refresh mind and spirit.

A stone bench has been placed just across from the office door on the north side of the building. There are several regular walkers who go by the building or walk in its parking area. The bench was placed there for those who might need to rest.

One family of the church takes care of the church grounds and flowers.

When Rev. Burke came to Iowa Park, the church was meeting in the old metal building on the south side

Bedding Kit - 2 new or good, clean used flat sheets and pillow cases, 2 new pillows.

Kitchen Utensil Kit - metal tea kettle, 1 and 3 qt. metal cooking pots with

lids, 12-inch metal skillet with lid, spatula, hand-held can opener, 16 oz. plastic bottle dish detergent, large package paper napkins, plastic salt and pepper shakers, 2 each dish towels, pot holders, sponges, 3 large serving spoons, 4 durable plastic plates, bowls, cups, 4 sets stainless steel eating utensils.

Food Staples Kit - 1 lb. box iodized salt, 8 oz. can pepper, 32 oz. plastic bottle cooking oil, 12 oz. canned beef or corned beef, 12 oz. canned tuna or chicken, 4 lb. bag dry beans, 5 lb. bag white rice, 1 lb. box granulated sugar, 4 lb. box powdered milk, 8 oz. instant coffee, box 25 tea bags.

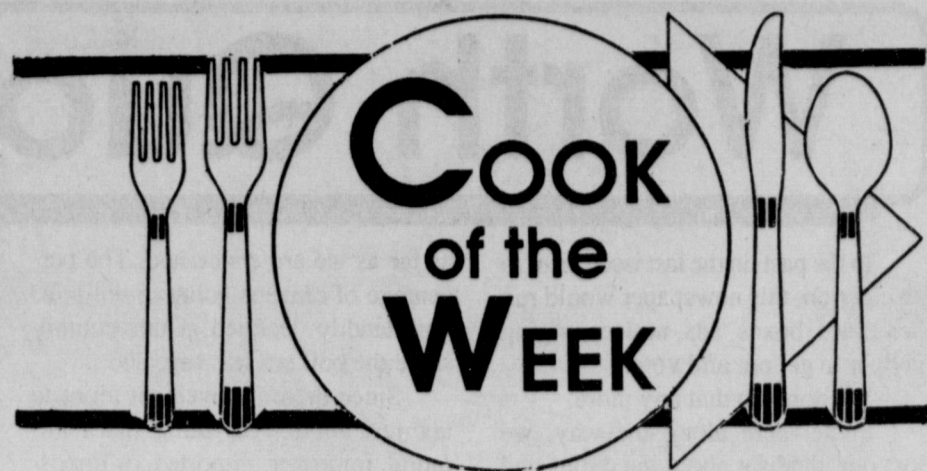

Apple-Pineapple Pie

4 apples, peeled, cored and chopped
1 small can crushed pineapple
1 1/2 cup sugar
Cinnamon to taste
1/4 cup flour

Mix all together and pour into 10-inch unbaked pie shell. Cover with pastry for top crust and sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees, until golden brown.

Peach Preserves

4 cups peaches, thinly sliced
3 1/2 cups sugar
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 Tbsp. butter

Combine ingredients in saucepan. Bring to a boil and simmer 10 minutes; stir and simmer 12 minutes more. Pour into bowl and let set overnight. The next morning, heat the mixture and pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Spinach

Chop up a bunch of fresh spinach (remove stems) and boil until tender. (Drained, canned spinach can be used.)

In a skillet, make a paste with bacon drippings and flour (not too thick). Add spinach, salt and pepper and cook until heated through.

Chicken Casserole

1 pkg. egg noodles, cooked & drained
1 - 1 1/2 cup chicken, cooked & boned
1 can cream of chicken soup
1/2 soup can milk

Combine ingredients; pour into casserole dish and bake 30 minutes.

Hambone Soup

Place a hambone with meat on it in a pan and add enough water to cover. Boil until well done.

Add 1 can of tomatoes and 1 medium onion, chopped.

Dumplings:

Slightly beat 2 eggs and add enough flour to make a soft dumpling mix. Salt to taste. Drop by 1 1/2 teaspoonfuls into soup and continue cooking until done.

Octoberfest reservations accepted

Reservations are being accepted for the 15th annual Octoberfest, held at the Texas 4-H Center on Lake Brownwood and sponsored by the Extension Service.

Sessions will be held Oct. 5-8, 12-15, 19-22 and 26-29 for both men and women who are 55 years of age and older.

"Hands-on" learning centers include leather working, oil painting, woodworking, stained glass, and others. Educational topics such as horticulture, photography, nutrition, and finances have been popular with participants in the past.

Boat rides and fishing on the lake is a major activity, along with the facility's lighted tennis courts, horse-shoes, billiards, volleyball, shuffleboard, dominoes and card and table games.

Eligible residents can register by calling the Wichita County Extension office at 766-0131. Each week's sessions are limited to 165, and a "nominal" fee is charged.

You wouldn't think that I'd let history's biggest tax increase get by with only one week's column comments, would you?

I'm enjoying reading some articles relating to that "mandate" of congress to raise taxes to "cut the national deficit."

Like, for instance, a news release from the National Republican Congressional Committee, recognizing eight Democrats who have "... reserved themselves a permanent place in the Hypocrisy Hall of Fame."

Chairman Bill Paxton of New York said the eight, including our own Rep. Bill Sarpalius, had earned "The Golden Flip-Flop" award for voting against Clinton's tax package in May, and then voted for it in August.

Another of the eight was from Texas, Charles Wilson of Dist. 2. Three were from Pennsylvania, and one each from New York, South Dakota and Missouri.

Sarpalius has announced a "town hall" meeting in Wichita Falls, supposedly to explain his reason for supporting the bill. Noticing he had chosen to have the meeting in the capital of Democrats of Wichita County, I just tore up the announcement, so I don't know when or where it'll be held.

The other U.S. Representative from the Panhandle, Republican Larry Combest of Amarillo, explained at a meeting last week in Brownfield, "I don't have one constituent who lives in Washington that can tell me how to vote."

It was interesting to read what two Texas Democrats said when they got back in their own districts, about why they voted against the bill.

Rep. Chet Edwards of Waco was quoted in the *Lampasas Dispatch Record*, "After carefully reviewing the president's budget, I have decided I cannot support it. Before we ask

Americans to pay higher taxes, Congress must prove it is willing to make major cuts in spending.

Edwards added, "Spending cuts need to be deeper and up front. Too many of the cuts are unspecified and put off for three to four years, whereas new programs and new taxes begin immediately or even retroactively."

About being retroactive, my friend Dick Richards wrote in his *Aransas Pass Progress*, "If they were that hard up for money, why didn't they just make it retroactive back to 1980?"

Rep. Pete Geren, the Democrat from Fort Worth, visited last week in Springtown and Azle. As one of the 41 Democrats who voted against the

budget plan, he was welcomed by a standing ovation from the Springtown Optimist Club, and received a tongue-lashing from a man at the Azle senior citizens center, for "not supporting the president."

"I am not going to go up there (to Washington D.C.) and vote to destroy our defense," Geren said.

Around home, I'm hearing from more and more readers who agree with my comment about the cost of living going up because of the added gasoline tax.

You remember that tax, don't you? The president just forgot to mention it during his televised address to the people before that important voting in the senate.

Worth Quoting

In the past, in the last issue prior to an election, this newspaper would run headlines, boxes, ads, notices, urging people to get out and vote.

We don't do that any more. Somewhere along the way, we lost our idealism about the duties and responsibilities of a good citizen.

Personally, we don't care whether you go vote or not.

If a citizen thinks so little of his individual responsibility in maintaining a democratic form of government, that he has to be reminded, cajoled, wheedled, and coaxed into going to the polls, then he's not much of a citizen anyway.

Recently, we noticed where a trial balloon was floated to the public to set up voter registration booths at the same locations where food stamps are obtained, also at the place where commodities are distributed, and at health centers for the poor.

Jumpin' jeeehosopah!
It's a step in the opposite direction,

as far as we are concerned. The percentage of citizens going to the polls has steadily declined in this country since the poll tax was repealed.

Since there's movement afoot to tax just about everything that's immoral, improper, imported, or impossible, perhaps we should place an inherent value on the vote and levy a stiff tax on it.

If you had to pay \$25 or \$50 for the right to cast a ballot, perhaps you'd bother to exercise your right to vote.

Wouldn't that raise the hackles of LULAC, NAACP, AARP, URP, UL,

OUCH, and the American Civil Liberties group? Even the introduction of such a bill would probably spawn apoclectic fits on liberals all the way to Halifax.

So our suggestion is if you haven't bothered to read about the qualifications of the candidates or the proposed amendments -- stay home. If you're interested and informed, exercise your duty and obligation as a citizen and vote.

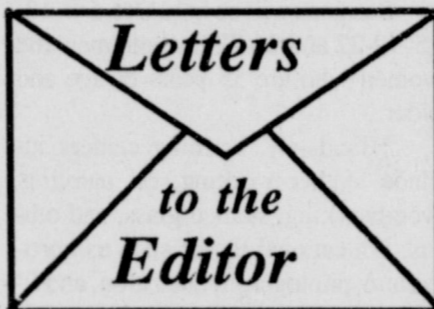

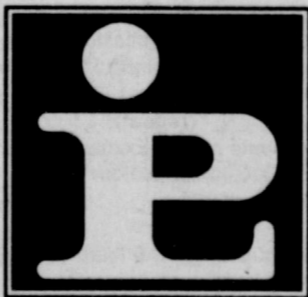
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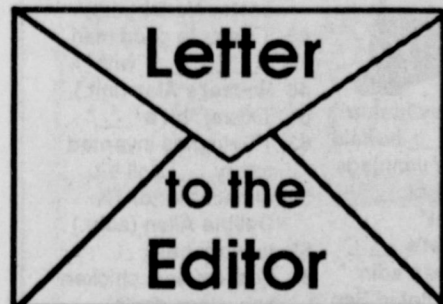

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Landfill closure deadline extended for communities

Iowa Park and other communities considering closing landfills have been given some extra time to either make up their minds to close the facilities or continue their operations.

The Texas Water Commission, which will lose that identity Sept. 1, is proposing the extension of effective dates of new requirements for management of solid waste landfills.

The proposals coincide with similar plans by the U.S. Environmental Protection Administration.

Iowa Park's city council a few months ago had declared the landfill would be closed the first part of August, in order to close out the facility.

Aldermen have been seeking several avenues to take with the city's trash, including a tri-city landfill proposal at Burkburnett, taking bids from private companies, and transporting to the Wichita Falls landfill.

The state commission's proposed extensions would apply to recently-adopted rules that impose more stringent landfill management standards required by the EPA and known collectively as Subtitle D of the Resource Recovery and Conservation Act.

The rules involve location restrictions, facility design and operations, groundwater monitoring, financial assurance, corrective action measures, and conditions for closure and post-closure care.

The original EPA regulations were issued in 1991, with an effective date of Oct. 9, 1993. However, during the interim two major developments have prompted the EPA and TWC to propose certain time extensions.

First, the original EPA standards included an exemption for small landfills in arid and remote locations. However, a federal court has ordered the EPA to eliminate that exemption.

Second, the EPA and TWC have received numerous reports from small communities about the problems they face in meeting the original timetable.

As a result, the TWC supports the EPA proposals for the following extensions that would affect Iowa Park:

Oct. 9, 1994 - All owners and operators of landfills would have an additional year to complete closure of landfills that stop receiving waste before the effective date of the regulations.

April 9, 1995 - All owners and operators of landfills would have an additional 18 months to meet new financial requirements. These include

surety bonds, letters of credit, insurance, or other guarantees that assure the ability to cover landfill-related expenses.

Oct. 9, 1995 - Owners and operators of landfills receiving fewer than 20 tons of waste per day (Iowa Park averages 16 tons) and fewer than 25 inches of annual rainfall would have an additional two years to implement all of the new regulations.

The Texas Water Commission loses its identity as of Sept. 1, when it merges with the Texas Air Control Board to form a "super" environmental

agency known as the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

Once formed, the TNRCC will be one of the largest and most comprehensive state environmental protection agencies in the nation, according to a recent news release from Austin.

The agency will include almost 3,000 employees, 15 regional field offices and will have responsibility for controlling and reducing air and water pollution throughout Texas.

The new agency was created under terms of Senate Bill 2, adopted by the Texas Legislature in 1991.

AUSTIN — Superconducting Super Collider officials ordered most construction on the 54-mile tunnel suspended last week because of funding uncertainties.

The order halts construction by four subcontractors on \$130.5 million in contracts for no more than 90 days.

Paul Gilbert, project director of team overseeing construction, said between 100 and 200 workers will be laid off, furloughed, forced to use vacation time or reassigned.

Most workers would be recalled if the \$10 billion project in Ellis County received funding for fiscal 1994, Gilbert said.

Although only 11 U.S. senators have acknowledged support for the super collider, Texas lawmakers say they are amassing reinforcements for the project.

Texas Sens. Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison say they have met with all 44 Senate Republicans and have lined up at least 30 GOP votes.

Newspaper Surveys Senators

In a recent telephone survey conducted by *The Dallas Morning News*, 11 senators said they had decided to support future funding for the giant atom smasher and 35 said they intend to vote it down.

Eight said they were leaning toward approving funding for the project and four are leaning against it.

Another 29 lawmakers told the newspaper they had yet to make up their minds, and nine said they don't respond to media surveys.

To date, \$1.6 billion in federal funds has been spent on the collider and the Clinton administration is seeking \$640 million for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

David Beckwith, an aide to Sen.

Hutchison, said the senator has received pledges of support from at least two of the Republicans whose aides told the newspaper they would vote against it.

Notification Bill Eyed

State Rep. Pedro Nieto, R-Uvalde, says he will push legislation that would require parole officials to notify local law officials when violent offenders are moved into their community.

The bill — prompted by the move of convicted child-killer Raul Meza to a private residence near Uvalde — also would require the parole board to hold public hearings so that citizens could express their views.

After Meza's release from prison on mandatory supervision, he asked to live with relatives near Uvalde. That request initially was denied. Meza then was driven from El Paso, San Antonio, Wichita Falls and Sweetwater by intense public protests.

Denton Blasts TU Contract — State Rep. Betty Denton, D-Waco, last week urged cities served by TU Electric to reject service contract agreements proposed by the utility that include waiving rights to reimbursements in rate disputes.

"In any other business, the hefty amount of money TU is offering cities essentially to waive their right to challenge the rate increase would be considered a 'bribe' at best," Denton said.

Denton has asked the Public Utility Commission to review the legality of the proposed franchise agreements. A request has also been made for a legal opinion from the attorney general.

But TU Electric spokeswoman Kathi Miller said the agreements are legal and in the best interest of cities.

Miller said 300 of the 372 cities

served by TU Electric have accepted the agreements.

TU Electric is seeking a 15 percent rate increase from 2.2 million customers it serves in central and north Texas.

Judge Donations Targeted

A coalition of public interest watchdog groups is asking appeals court judges and candidates to voluntarily limit how much they spend in their 1994 campaigns.

Pledge forms were mailed last week to candidates for the Texas Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals and state courts of appeals.

Suzi Woodford, executive director of Common Cause of Texas, said the pledges were being sought to restore confidence in the judicial system.

Candidates signing the pledge will agree not to:

- Spend more than \$2 million in a contested election;
- Accept more than \$5,000 from any individual;
- Accept more than \$25,000 from members of the same law firm; and
- Accept more than \$50,000 from political action committees, nor to spend more than \$10,000 of their own money for their campaigns.

Rail Experts Help St. Louis

The Texas Railroad Commission has sent experts to assist officials in St. Louis who are working to stabilize propane tanks that lifted off their foundations due to heavy flooding.

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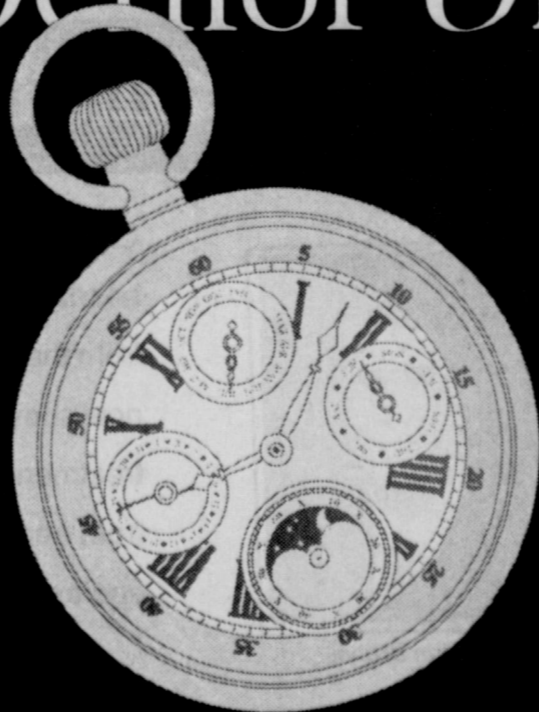

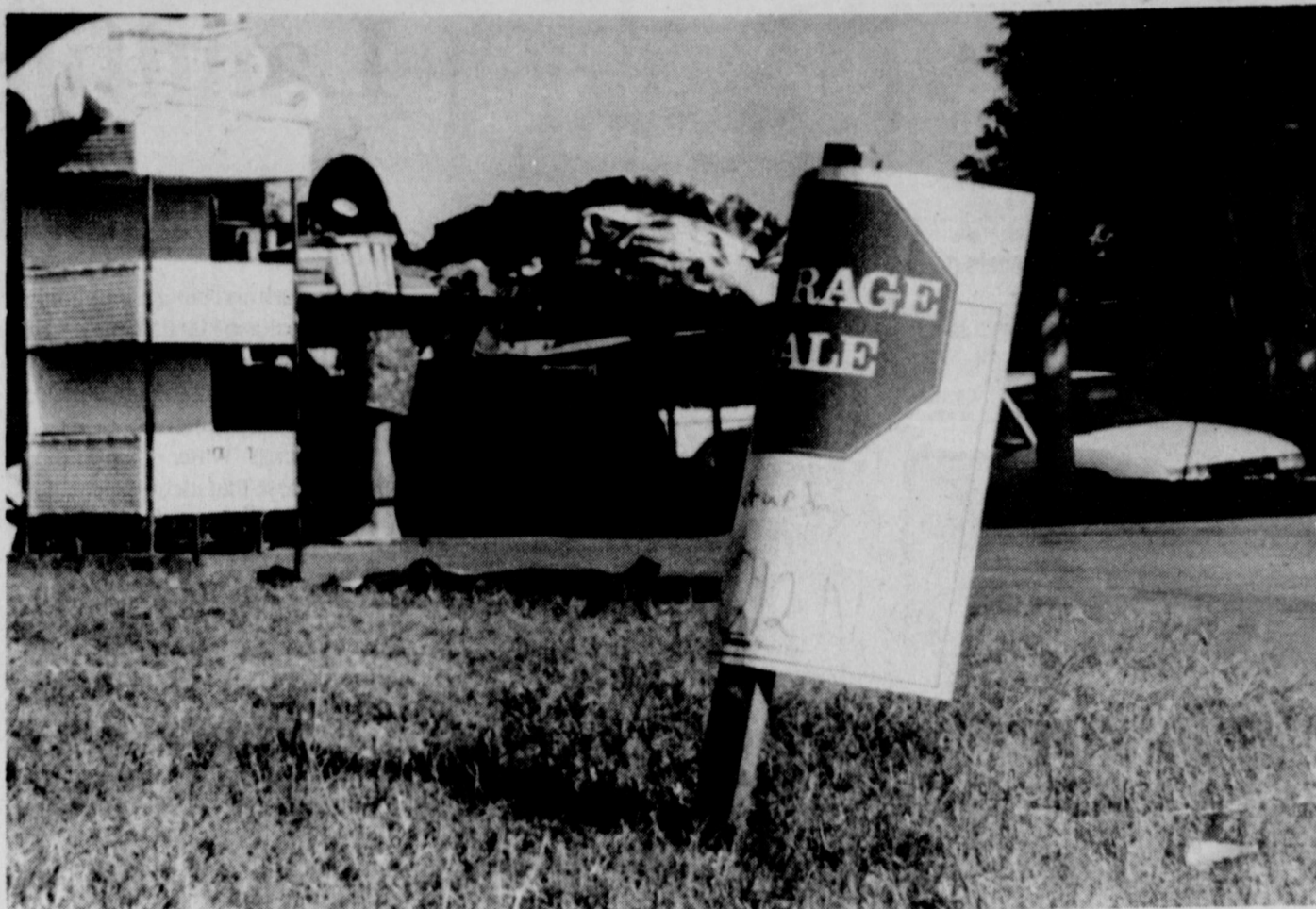

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GARDENING HINTS

The pecan weevil is a late season pest in several areas of Texas. In years when severe infestations occur, this insect may destroy a large portion of pecan crops.

In our area of Texas this unwanted pest will normally be found in late August. Estimated spray dates are August 23 (first spray) and September 2 (second spray).

Let's take a closer look at the life cycle of the weevil and best controls.

Life cycle: The adult weevil is a brownish color and about 3/8 inch long. The female's snout is as long as the body; the male's is somewhat shorter. After nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole through the shell and deposits her eggs inside the nut.

Creamy white grubs with reddish brown heads hatch and feed inside nuts during late summer and fall. They will consume the kernel completely. When the grubs mature, they chew a hole in the shell. This may happen in late September until late December and sometimes even later.

Following emergence from the shell, grubs enter the soil to a depth of four to 12 inches and construct earthen cells.

Grubs will remain in the soil for one to two years as they transform into pupae and then into adults. These adults then emerge from the soil and begin the whole cycle over again. One female can damage about 25 nuts, and a male, five nuts.

Control: Certain trees in an orchard may be infested more heavily than others, usually early varieties such as Stuart, Mahan, etc. Begin checking these early varieties right now. Several methods of sampling for weevils can be used.

Jarring limbs give an indication of weevil presence. To accomplish this, place a large sheet under limbs and use a pole to jar the limb. Weevils present will drop from limbs, land on the sheet and remain motionless for a short time.

Another method is to use emergence cages which can be monitored for weevil activity.

As few as 1,000 weevils per acre can cause extensive damage and yet finding even a few of them spread over an acre of pecans can be very difficult.

Sevin insecticide can be used for weevil control according to all label

instructions. Treat areas with a history of pecan weevil infestation at gel stage. Plan on making one to three treatments at 10-day to two-week intervals for best control.

Brown Ranch, Throckmorton; Burnett Ranches, Guthrie; Double U Ranch, Levelland and Post; Green Land and Cattle, Albany; Johnson Ranches, Amarillo; Moorhouse Ranch, Benjamin and Iowa Park; Pitchfork Land and Cattle, Guthrie; Renderbrook-Spade Ranch, Lubbock; Tongue River and Spur Headquarters, Spur; U Lazy S Ranch, Post, and W.T. Waggoner Ranch, Vernon.

Since bronc riding, wild cow milking, branding, penning and roping are all in a day's work, the cowboys perform with the precision and skill that rank tops in showmanship.

For the cowboy, it's a time to put on their town duds, have fun and make some money for their favorite charities. For the spectators, it's a time to gasp with awe or cheer with delight.

To watch a guy thrown high into the air, land in a disarranged heap and then walk away laughing isn't the everyday fare for the average citizen. Rides like that are exciting to watch.

The spectator can experience another wide range of emotions when observing the wild cow milking. A 750-pound cow can totally eliminate the question "where's the beef?" -- because the beef is all over the cowboy in a head-sliding, power-kicking fit.

If and when the mission is accomplished, the cowboy must run as fast as possible to the finish line with the bottle containing the hard-won milk.

It has been known to happen to have that rugged cowboy who has just wrestled an angry cow, to get up, start running a break-neck speed and stumble over his own boots. So much for winning -- but the crowd loves it.

For those who might enjoy watching competition outside the arena, there is an event called Talent on Saturday morning at 10:30. The ranches enter their photography, painting and crafts in a contest which can be viewed by the public.

They also produce skits, song and verse. From the rough and tumble arena, one finds the beauty and peace of their lifestyles expressed in their various art forms.

Cooking is staged on Saturday at high noon, between the ranches. The 1993 menu is chicken fried steak, beans, cornbread and cobbler.

Local citizens enjoy the mouth-watering experience of serving as judges. With only their taste buds to guide them, will go about rating each dish from all 10 ranches.

Over the two-day period, points are kept in all divisions of competition. When the last event is over and the last point counted, the 1993 "Best Ranch in Texas" will be named.

Also, the "Top Hand" title is awarded by the same point system.

In 1992, the R.A. Brown Ranch and Donnell Brown were the two winners.

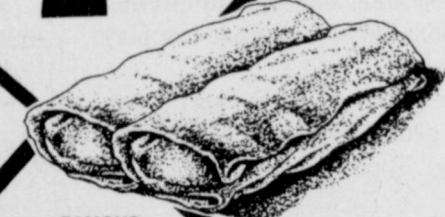

of the present edifice.

All of the landscaping on the church grounds was done by Burke. He also was the drafter and designer of the new building and remodeling of the old, with the assistance of the late Joe (Bud) Moer.

Pat paused here to reflect and comment, "His death was a great loss to me. I not only lost a working partner, but I lost a great friend."

The new building houses the pastor's study, secretary's office, a large entry area, the nave and sanctuary, a reconciliation room, or confessional. This room is different to the older enclosed confessional booths. The confessor and the priest can now meet face to face, if desired, or a partition can be between them. Confessions are heard by the priest before Sunday morning Mass.

Downstairs is also the Blessed Sacrament Chapel where the reserved sacraments for those who are ill are kept. Sometimes weekly services are held there.

Upstairs is a nursery, a cry room for mothers with small babies, a choir room, a conference room and class rooms.

Another difference in the new building to the older buildings is a baptistry, into which the baptismal font is incorporated. Burke explained that Catholics now baptize by immersion for those who desire to be immersed.

The church has a computer organ with chips and synthesizer, programmed for music used in the Catholic Church when they do not have an organist in their parish. The organ also has a portable keyboard.

The metal building was converted into a parish hall, religious education area, and a youth meeting area where the young people can play table games.

The kitchen in this area will soon be enlarged and appliances updated. Rev. Burke came to Iowa Park

from New Orleans soon after his ordination as a deacon.

It was challenging for him, a young man who had been raised a devout Catholic in a predominantly Catholic city. One with a wife and two children to take the mission as pastor of a church.

At the time it was rather unusual for the Catholic Church. Due to the shortage of priests, it had been decided by church officials to try this type of ministry as a unique way of maintaining the church community.

At the present time Burke and two other deacons in the Fort Worth diocese are pastoring churches. He also serves St. Paul's Catholic Church at Electra. Services there at 8 a.m. on Sunday. And he goes to Electra once during the week.

But, everyone here adjusted. The parish purchased a rectory to accommodate Burke and his wife, Linda who is choir director and also works as secretary for Sacred Heart Church in Wichita Falls. Their two children, Christopher and Karen, are enrolled at Midwestern State University.

"I really hated to leave New Orleans," Burke said, "but now I wouldn't want to go back. We love it here."

The church has grown each year since he has been here, Pat said. He believes it is because it is more visible to the community. Currently there are 110 households, or approximately 400 individuals who are members.

As a deacon, Burke can perform all of the rites of the church except the Mass, hearing confessions and anointing for the sick. He assists in Sunday morning 10 o'clock Mass by delivering the sermon.

Finnell demands right to remove grassfire hazards

State Rep. Charles Finnell last week demanded the federal Environmental Protection Agency grant Texas the right to remove the scorched grass, tangled undergrowth and brush that feed wildfire.

The Democrat from Holliday was responding to the plague of grass and brush fires in the drought stricken legislative district he represents.

In a single engine airplane trip at relatively low altitude from Iowa Park to Abilene Wednesday of last week, Finnell said he saw "stark and visible

evidence of a half-dozen large grass fires."

More than 3,300 acres of jack and Young counties have burned in wildfire that began some 20 days earlier on July 18. Now blunted by traces of rain, those flames, authorities report, still smoulder in the canyons of Young County's Ming Bend.

At least four counties -- Archer, Jack, Throckmorton and Young -- already have issued wildfire emergency orders prohibiting open burning. Grass fires have been reported throughout the 13-county legislative district.

Finnell said the EPA should respond immediately and affirmatively to requests from Texas DOT Director Arnold Oliver, a native of the 68th House district. Oliver seeks exemptions from EPA regulations.

Those rules prohibit blading to remove the dry grasses which act as tender for wildfires. This dry undergrowth is as flammable as gasoline and must be removed, Finnell said.

"We need the federal permission now and forever in order to avoid the hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage to crops, pasture, livestock,

equipment and, more importantly, to people and the homes in which they live," Finnell said.



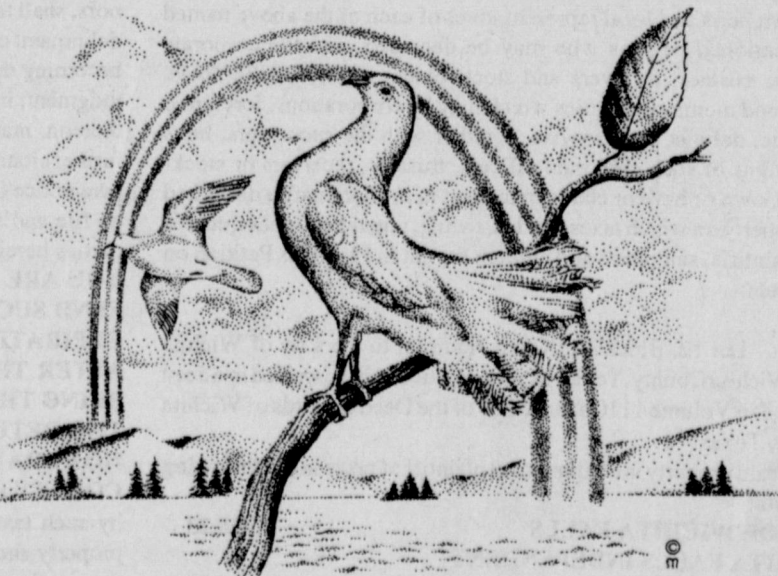

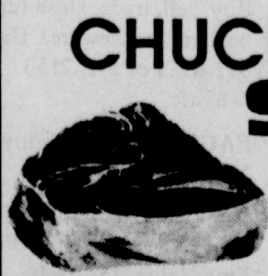
