## School budget on tap

#### Tax rate could increase by four cents

The Iowa Park school board will hold a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the junior high school library on a proposed budget for the 1993-94 year of \$7,763,906.

To fund the budget, a four-cent tax increase would be required.

If approved, taxpayers would be asked to pay a rate of \$1.16 per \$100 valuation. That is four cents above the combined local and County Education District total district taxpayers paid last year.

The new rate and other receipts, including cafeteria, fees and athletic gate receipts, is anticipated to generate \$3,799,105 locally. That would be supplimented by \$4,016,694 in state and federal monies.

Those two sources, added to the estimated carry over from local revenues at the end of the 1992-93 school year, would produce an estimated \$8,747,345, leaving \$983,439 with which to start the 1994-95 year.

#### Iowa Park teen killed in wreck

Jason Priddy, 18, of Iowa Park, was killed in a two-vehicle wreck early Wednesday morning in Wichita Falls, according to Melvin Joyner of the Wichita Falls Police Department.

The collision took place at the intersection of Kell Blvd. and Allendale Road. According to accident reports, Priddy was travelling north on Allendale Road at the intersection, when his white pickup was struck on the driver's side by a TNM&O commercial bus, travelling east on Kell East Blvd.

Upon impact the pickup burst into flames, killing Priddy instantly.

The driver of the bus, 50-year-old John Ross of Lubbock, was thrown through the windshield of the bus. He is listed in serious condition at Wichita General Hospital. Several of the 13 passengers aboard the bus were treated and released from the hospital, according to Joyner.

The bus was en route to Wichita

Falls from Lubbock.

Monday's hearing will be the result of four study sessions held by the trustees, which have resulted in almost \$100,000 in cuts from requests.

Expenditures accounting for most of the requested increase in tax revenues were necessitated by additional technological equipment such as computers and related materials, additional teachers and support personnel, state-mandated salary increases, and the state cutting its payment to the district by approximately \$100 per student.

Also, Supt. Glen Mitchell is asking the board to permit him to set aside \$83,000 to be used on district maintenance needs, an area he asserts has been short-funded the past three years.

If the tax rate is approved, the owner of a \$50,000 home would pay \$580 in taxes, a \$22 increase over last

## Council votes to sell landfill, equipment

The city council voted Monday night to get out of the trash collection and landfill business, and turn it over to a private company.

Aldermen voted unanimously to virtually turn over the city's landfill site, related equipment and trash trucks and containers to the Bell Group, for

In return, the city expects to save approximately \$200,000 per year, and hold garbage collection fees to homes and businesses at the current rates.

No contract was signed that night, but is expected to be finalized within the next two weeks.

Action on the issue followed an executive session that lasted approximately 45 minutes.

Prior to the vote, once the council returned to the chambers from its closed session, a representative of Texas Waste Management, another firm which had submitted a bid that did not include taking over the landfill, attempted to convince the council to change its mind and consider a counter proposal.

The action in effect nullified Iowa Park's possible participation in a tricities landfill operation at Burkburnett, in which that city and Vernon would join in its operation.

Iowa Park has contributed funds to a study of the Burkburnett landfill, with the other cities, as a possible alternative to a solution all cities are facing since the Environmental Protection Agency mandated "Subtitle D" regulations over such operations.

No information on details of the pending contract is available as yet.

The Bell Group is actively soliciting additional acreage in the area of the city's 23-acre landfill tract, to have room for several years of usage and is expected to make it into a regional landfill operation.

Council members in the past have stated they would not agree to sell the city's landfill to anyone, unless the state provides in writing an agreement that the city would not be held liable any time in the future should any violations of Subtitle D be detected.

#### **OTHER BUSINESS**

In a public appearance, Richard Porter of Fort Worth told the council he is interested in developing a 48-acre tract north of US 287 and west of FM 368 for housing and possibly commercial businesses.

Porter said he had owned the tract several years, and had been a partner with two Wichita Falls investors in building Woodbriar Apartments. Those two partners continue to own most of the land between Porter's and the apartments.

He asked the city to extend water to the area to be developed, and also to participate in its sewage line installa-

He also pointed out that he expected to petition that the area be annexed into the city.

Porter presented a hand-drawn plat of the area, which included only six lots on the north end of the tract for homes on lots larger than two acres each.

He was told the council was in-

city administrator to advertise for bids to have a contractor install a new sewer line and lift station in the south part of the city. Funds for the project are to come from a Community Development Program grant.

Also approved was a request by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department to close most of the 100 block of East Cash Saturday night for a fundraising street dance.

The council agreed to a recommendation by Administrator Mike Price to have its investments fund transferred from Nations Bank in Wichita Falls to the local branch of Parker Square Bank.

He explained the money actually is in the Texpool, but funds are transferred electronically from Nations Bank. Parker Square is the only local facility with the same capability, Price said, to support his request.

The council has been unable to complete its study on the 1993-94 annual budget, until the landfill situation could be resolved.

With that action having been taken, and believing the contract will be available for action Monday, the council decided to meet that evening both to act on the contract and also to hold the first of two public hearings on the budget.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

During the general discussion period, Dr. Erwin Soell informed the council that Park Clinic had been charged for long distance calls to addresses in Wichita Falls.

Contact with Southwestern Bell was promised by one of the aldermen, in an attempt to find out why the calls were charged.

The Iowa Park Garden Club had


asked to use the meeting room for its annual show and contest.

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Watch for signs of head lice, such as frequent head-scratching. Anyone can get lice . . . from another person or from sharing hats, brushes, combs, etc.

Check all family members for lice and nits (lice eggs) at least once a week. (It helps to use natural light and a magnifying glass.)

Treat only those family members who do have lice. Buy a lice product at your drug store, the pharmacy section of your foodstore or call your doctor for a prescription.

Follow package directions carefully! Use the product over the sink (not in the tub or shower). Keep the eyes covered with a

Call your doctor first if you are pregnant, nursing or allergic to weeds, plants, etc. Never use a lice product on your baby!

Remove all nits (which will stay on the hair after treatment). This is essential! You can do this with a special lice comb, scissors or your fingernails.

Wash sheets and recently worn clothing in hot water and dry in a hot dryer. Combs and brushes may be soaked in hot (not boiling) water for 10 minutes.

Vacuuming is the safest and best way to control lice on mattresses, rugs, furniture and stuffed animals.

Continue to check heads every day for 2-3 weeks to make sure head lice are gone. Regular checking is the best prevention. When you find a case of

I'm sure that doesn't surprise anyone. It's just that when that bunch does it, it's usually a messy situation that gets more than its share of public-

And it usually winds up costing us, the consumers, more money.

Two prime examples of what I'm talking about is the situation of selling used CD discs, and the fight between cable television companies and local stations.

Can you imagine the entertainers being upset with used CD discs being marketed in stores? "They're being sold for a profit, and we're not getting any royalties," cry the recording artists.

The new discs, of course, were promoted both because of their improved quality, and the fact that they don't scratch or break, making them something to last forever.

A big bunch of recording artists, such as Garth Brooks, have issued instructions to their recording companies that they cannot market new discs for sale to businesses that also deal in used discs.

A parallel to that is like Ford wanting a piece of the action any time a used pickup is traded in, and the dealer puts the vehicle up on the used car lot for sale.

The local stations lobbied congress --- again, does that surprise you? -- and got the Cable TV Act of 1992 passed. It requires cable companies to be given permission by broadcasters to carry their signals, or pay to carry

On the other hand, cable companies quickly point out that the local stations are sending their signals out to receivers free of charge in the first place, so why should they pay for it.

From my standpoint, it appears the two stations in Wichita Falls have geared their entire arguments in the case toward Vista Cablevision, the lone company serving Wichita Falls, because they are the largest market.

But it appears, from what I've been able to read, that TCI, which serves Iowa Park and most of the other communities in this area outside Wichita Falls, has said it will not pay for the signals. And apparently Vista isn't going to either.

standing that different petitions were necessary for each community being targeted for toll-free calling.

In other words, should that area want toll-free calling to Iowa Park and Electra, two different petitions would be required.

Then there would be an election of rural telephone residents, to determine the interest, and 70 percent of the ballots must be in favor of the change, Williams told the crowd.

If approved, the new rate would affect all within the district, because it is not an option once the election passes.

Keith Fisher, president of the Iowa Park school board, said the school district during the past year has had as many as 200 calls in a single month into the Valley View area, all at long distance rates.

It was also pointed out that students living in that area who wanted to call their parents' home from school had to do so with a long distance collect call.

At one point, a suggestion was made that all communities in Wichita County might be included in extended calling, such as is the case of all communities with Wichita Falls.

However, it was pointed out that the extreme southwestern portion of the Iowa Park school district extends into Archer County. The district basically reaches from Wellington on the east to Lake Diverson.

During a discussion of whether the majority of rural residents on the GTE system would be in favor of a higher rate for extending calling, Mrs. Cravens responded, "If I had 25 people against it, I'd be surprised."

Much of the contact with the PUC is being made for the committee by County Commissioner Woody Gossom, who said he has both traveled to Austin to get information as well as telephoned that office.

State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday was to have attended the meeting, but had called to say he would not be there because of car trouble in Stephenville. Paul Hayers, attorney in Electra,

told the group residents of his community were very interested in extended calling to Iowa Park, Valley View, Wichita Falls and others. Mrs. Cravens told the group the

next meeting would be called once the senate bill was made available.

The rate has climbed every year except once since then. It was increased to 75 cents in 1986, 76 in 1987, 81 in 1988, stayed the same in 1989, raised to 96 cents in 1990, \$1.02 in 1991, the first year of the CED, and \$1.1168 in

Of the proposed \$1.16 rate, \$1.06 would go into the general operating fund and 10 cents toward bonded in-

Even with seven personnel being added to the payroll, at the board's last meeting, the payroll percentage of the total budget remained basically unchanged from last year, 71 percent.

Helping to offset a larger tax rate increase in order to fund the proposed budget was the fact that the district's assessed value increased more than \$2 million, from \$251,267,952 to \$253,991,760.

- regular office hours of the Early Voting Clerk and voted in like contests of your former county in Texas. (Known as Limited Ballot.)
- 6. Moving within the same precinct in the county, if it is over 90 days since you move you cannot vote legally. This is also true if moving from one precinct to another within the county. (Read the back of your voter certificate.)
- 7. Number 6 above is a TRUE statement; when is it NOT?
- 8. Approximately 63,000 new voter registration certificates will be mailed out the latter part of November 1993. They will be Yellow and White. They are valid if all the information on the face of the certificate is correctly maintained by the Voter. If not the certificates will come back to our office. Usually 12 to 14,000 of them by January 1st. These returns are automatically cancelled on August 16, 1994 if the Voter does not turn in a change to the Voter Registrar.

An ice cream and watermelon feed will be given the players, members and potential members Saturday afternoon at the field house.

To begin at 5 p.m., the public will have an opportunity to meet all the freshman, junior varsity and varsity players, as well as their coaches.

At the regular 7 p.m. Monday meeting in the field house, any parent with last year's varsity player yard sign is asked to turn them in, or to be changed if the son's number is different from last year.

## Coaches looking for more improvement

The Hawk coaching staff is looking for continued improvement, when the team travels Friday to Abilene Wylie for its final non-conference scrimmage.

The downside of last week's scrimmage against the Class AAAA Wichita Falls Coyotes was the fact that the Black and Red outscored the Hawk first unit 4-1.

The upside, however, was the fact that all the larger school team's scores but one was long distance. "They were never able to mount a sustained drive" against the Hawk defense, Coach Robert Clensay pointed out.

In action tomorrow, the Freshmen are to go just as far south as Holliday, where they will scrimmage at 5:30 p.m. with the Eagles.

Three scrimmage sessions will be held at Abilene Wylie. The second unit Junior Varsity will take on Wylie's freshmen, starting at 5:30. That will be followed by the JV first unit scrimmage, and the Varsities will begin between 7:15 and 7:30, Clensay said.

First-unit Varsity teams will each run 20 plays on offense, followed by 15 plays of each team's second units. First units will then return to the field for game-situation contact, and probably wind up with a few goal line plays.

Wylie returns five offensive and defensive starters from last year's club that advanced into the playoffs.

In Wylie's scrimmage last week at Stamford, the host team outscored the

visitors 6-1. Wylie quarterback Chris Kincaid was about the only success story offensively, completing five passes out of 12 attempts for 116 yards, but suffered two interceptions.

For fans who have never driven to Abilene Wylie, the easiest route is to take the western loop around town, continue past the San Angelo turnoff and turn south at the Buffalo Gap exit. A few miles down the road is Wylie, and the stadium is on a road to the right after passing almost through the community. A sign on the side of the road gives direction to the stadium.

A 12-yard pass from Tony Lozipone to Stan Tigrett accounted for Iowa Park's scoring against Wichita Falls High last week.

Two key plays on the drive was an 18-yard sprint by Brent Brown, and a 13-yard pass by Lozipone.

The Coyotes scored three times in their first offensive series, once on a pass that covered 60 yards, a 70-yard run, and the third a 50-yarder on a busted play.

Old High's other touchdown was in the second series, a one-yard plunge set up by a long pass.

The Coyote second unit's only score was a 49-yard sprint by a player who was a starter last season.

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

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

the highest honor in fox hunting circles.

"I took Dale on a fox hunt that lasted five and a half hours, his first. I'm not sure if I'll get him to go again," Kim said.

One of the big differences in western and English riding is in the saddle, and in handling the horse. The saddle has no horn, so you have to know how to mount the horse, and you control the horse by your legs and seat instead of reins, she explained.

Kim said western riders always want to use the reins to control the mount and it isn't easy every time not to try using the reins, but a horse trained for English riding does not know what it means for you to pull on the reins.

The western riding horse can also be trained to English riding. Western riding horses are used mostly as working class horses, such and
