## School budget on tap

Tax rate could increase by four cents

The Iowa Park school board will hold a public hearing at 7:30 pom. Monday in the junior high school libray on a proposed budget
1993-94 year of $\$ 7,763,906$. To fund the budget, a tax increase would be required. If approved, taxpayers would asked to pay a rate of $\$ 1.16$ per $\$ 100$ valuation. That is four cents above the combined local and County Education District total district taxpayers paid
last year last year.
The new rate and other receipts, including cafeteria, fees and athletic
gate receipts, is anticipated gate receipts, is anticipated to generate
$\$ 3,799,105$ locally. That would be supplimented by $\$ 4,016,694$ in state and federal monies.
Those two sources, added to the
estimated carry over from local rev estimated carry over from local revenues at the end of the 1992-93 school year, would produce an estimated $\$ 8,747,345$, leaving $\$ 983,439$ with

## Council votes to sell landfill, equipment <br> The city council voted Monday

 night to get out of the trash collection to a private company.Aldermen voted unanimously to
virtually turn over the city's landfill site, related equipment and trash truck and containers to the Bell Group, fo

In return, the city expects to save approximately $\$ 200,000$ per year, and and businesses at the current rates.

No contract was signed that night, but is expected to be finalized within the next two weeks.
Action on the issue followed an matey 45 minutes.

Prior to the vote, once the council returned to the chambers from its closed session, a representative of Texas Waste Management, another firm
which had submitted a bid that did not include taking over the landfill, atinclude taking over the landfill, at-
tempted to convince the council to change its mind and consider a counter proposal.
The action in effect nullified Iowa Park's possible participation in a riin which that city and Vernon would join in its operation.

Iowa Park has contributed funds o a study of the Burkburnett landfill, with the other cities, as a possible alfacing since the Environmental Pro action Agency mandated "SubtitleD" regulations over such opera

Greed is showing its ugly head in the entertainment business. I'm sure that doesn't surprise anyone. It's just that when that bunch
does it, it's usually a messy situation that gets more than its share of publicity.
And it usually winds up costing us, the consumers, more money. Two prime examples of what I'm talking about is the situation of selling used CD discs, and he figh be local stations.

Can you imagine the entertainers Ceing upset with used CD discs being marketed in stores? "They'rebeing sold for a profit, and we're not getting any royalues, cry he recording aruists.

The new discs, of course, wer promoted both because of their im proved quality, and the fact that they don't scratch or break, making them something to last forever.
A big bunch of recording artists, such as Garth Brooks, have issued in structions to ueir recording compa-
nies that they cannot market new disc for sale to businesses that also deal in used discs.
A parallel to that is like Ford wanting a piece of the action any time a used pickup is traded in, and the dealer puts the vehicle up on the used car lot for sale.
manufacturer wouldever demand some of the profits for that
sale? I don't think so

In the row brought up by the local television stations -- that's nation-wide by the way -- with cable companies, actually both sides have their arguments.

The local stations lobbied congress --- again, does that surprise you passed. It requires cable companies to passed. It requires cable companies to
be given permission by broadcasters to carry their signals, or pay to carry carry
them.

On the other hand, cable compa nies quickly point out that the local stateinsers free of charge in the first

I m not in love with cable compa nies, their operations and rates. But I be the first to admit that viewing of
television programs was never more pleasant than after cable service was connected at our house

I don't miss the poor pictures and reception we used to have, pre-cable. And there's more to that story. I don't intend to. Not until I'm ready, anyway. The real losers in all this fight is those viewers who live 20 miles or more from the transmitter tower. Their picture is even worse.

Those local station "personalities who have been encouraging us to call
our cable company and tell them "don't our cable company and tell them "don't
take away our local stations" may have a surprise coming.

I frankly don't depend on any of those stations for my information. It's
available from too many other sources Their local news is not my reason to turn on my set

But their attitude toward me and the public in general is enough for me to not turn on my set.
