WHERE GOES EDUCATION?
We are shocked when we read of a young Ph.D. who is so disappointed when he does not receive honors on his dissertation that he kills the student who won the coveted prize, and three of the professors who served on that committee.
When will we learn that educating the head is not the answer to the world's problems? Through education doctors not only capable, but willing to help people commit suicide. Through education "smart" mer. are able to bilk the elderly out of millions while they sit behind desks in savings and loan associations. Through education the lives of little tabies are snuffed out by abortion. How long will it take us to realize that great education, separated from the development of character, is the sword of Damocles hanging by a hair over our heads?
In discussiing educational ideals in the ancient world, william Barclay teils us that "the Jews were much more concerned about the moral character of the teacher than they were aboui his a ademic qualifications. Their frst question would not have been: "What kind of a technical scholar is he?" but rather "what kind of a person is he?" It was character which the Jews were seeking to produce, and they were well aware that only charac' or can beget character."
Over a century ago John Ruskin wrote, "Education does not mean teaching people what they do not know. It means teaching thein to behave as they do not behave. It
is not teaching the youth the stapes of letters tricks of numbers, and leaving them of letters and the metic to roguery and their lite them to turn their arith the contrary, training them into the to lust. It means, on the contray, training them into the perfect exercise and continual, and diffeult bodies and souls. It is a painful, watching, by wint work to be done by kindness, by watching, by warning, by precept, and by praise, but
above all - by example. above all - by example."
Admittedly, these views have fallen out of favor over the past century. More than ever, we are going to have to depend on the home and the church to instill training in character. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom.
