Hawk-Bobcat rematch season's home opener

The Iowa Park Hawks, who carned considerable respect with their fourthquarter rally last week against Burkburnett, will play their first home game of the season Friday against Childress.

Kickoff time in Hawk Stadium will Both the Hawks and Bobcats will

be seeking their first victories of the young season.

Iowa Park's rally last week fell short, but only because they failed to score either of the two two-point conversions they attempted. The Class AAAA Bulldogs, who led 14-0 going into the final 12-minute period, held on for a narrow, 21-19 win.

Meanwhile, Childress fell victim to the defending Class A state champion, Memphis, a club that has moved up to Class AA this season, 28-9.

All nine of the Bobcats' points were off the talented foot of field goal kicker Josh White. Runningback Jimmy Salas led the 'Cats in rushing with 104 yards, on 18 carries.

This will be the third game of the current series between Iowa Park and Childress. The two clubs met in 1990 for the first time since the 1969 season.

The Bobcats defeated the Hawks 22-6 en route to the state quarterfinals in '90, and last year, took advantage of

four Iowa Park turnovers - two fumbles and two interceptions - to post a 28-13

Few, if any, active high school coaches in Texas have been at the same school longer than Charlie Johnston. He has built an outstanding program there, and seldom loses two games on two consecutive Friday nights.

The Bobcats, who tied Vernon in a preseason scrimmage, lost heavily to graduation last spring. They are young, but improving.

Hawk coaches' scouting report indicates the Bobcats last week mounted several drives, but couldn't capitalize.

As a junior, Mark de la Rosa led Iowa Park ball carriers last year, gaining 51 yards on six carries. But the senior is still nursing a knee injury, and is expected to miss this game, as he did

Coach Robert Clensay is being forced to count on his depth at runningback. He first lost Scott Byrd in the scrimmage with Wichita Falls High, because of a foot injury.

Then, in the first half last week, his converted tight end, Mark Tatum, was sidelined, also with a foot injury. The big senior will be held out of action this

"He wants to play, but we definitely will hold him out of action this week," Clensay said of Tatum, who also is a starting linebacker, as is de la Rosa.

Senior Jason Dudley, who took Tatum's place as tight end, also sat out the second half against Burk. He had been ill three days preceding the game, and became overheated during halftime.

Actually, Clensay listed de la Rosa only as being questionable this week. He said he hopes to get him into action for the Frederick game.

Asked if his players were somewhat down, after losing to traditional "They can move the ball," the report rival Burkburnett last week, Clensay said, "I think this group of kids feel they can line up and play with anybody."

Gilmore's love of cycles leads to major business

Jim Gilmore has had a passion for motorcycles since he was an adolescent. In later years his hobby has turned into a profitable business.

His wife and two children now share his enthusiasm for the sport of motorcycling.

Jim began riding motorcycles at the age of 13. By the time he was 16 and a sophomore in Iowa Park High School, he thought he had the sport pretty well figured out and that he knew a lot about how to ride and what to expect.

That is when he had an indelible fact engraved in his mind. "You never know what the other person is going to do."

Jim was riding his 350cc Yamaha one day and "assumed" he had the right of way and that the motorist would observe the sign to yield. The result for him was two broken wrists and two broken clbows.

The accident didn't dampen Jim's love for riding a motorcycle. However, he didn't get to ride again until he was a senior in high school. He wore a cast on one arm for two years.

"That accident may have been a blessing for me," Jim said, "I know

one thing, it made me a lot more cautious rider. I never take anything for granted anymore." When Jim graduated high school

he attended a trade school in Nashville, Tenn., for a year. When he returned to Iowa Park he was married to Vickie Illingworth, also an Iowa Park graduate.

In 1974 when Jim was 21 he bought his first Harley-Davidson. He said he couldn't afford it before then. He still has that motorcycle and he says he will never get rid of it.

In October, 1985 the couple purchased the Harley-Davidson franchise in Wichita Falls and opened the Red River Harley-Davidson Factory Authorized Sale and Service in Iowa

The closest Harley-Davidson dealerships to Jim's and Vickie's is Lawton, Okla., or Bedford or Fort Worth. "Ours is a little unique. We have a large territory, without a particularly large population area that most of the others have," Jim explained.

Although they wanted him to keep his business in Wichita Falls, he wanted to stay in Iowa Park. He had a good location, easy access to the highway, and he just wanted to be in Iowa Park. And, currently Jim has the only vehicle dealership here.

He declares that Vickie is the boss and "I just work here."

"Now, (because he remembers his accident) when we sell a motorcycle, especially to first time buyers, we always try to impress on their minds that as long as they operate a motorcyle they should be prepared to yield the right of way if it becomes necessary, and to remember that everytime they come to an intersection there may be a motorist there who could run over them." Jim

Other safety rules riders are asked to observe are to ride safely and within the limits of the law and individual abilities; ride with their headlight on, wear a helmet and proper clothing and eyewear.

Motorcycling comes as second nature to the Jim Gilmore family. Jim and Vicki's son, Jason, 13, has been riding since he was 10. He has his own motorcycle as does his younger sister, Bobbie Lynn, who has been riding since she was five years old.

Vitamin Basics

- Vitamins and minerals work together to keep the blood, bones, teeth, hormonal systems, muscles and nerves functioning properly.
- · Vitamins and minerals cannot be manufactured by the body, but are present in food in small amounts.
- Generally, adequate amounts of vitamins and minerals can be acquired through a sound diet which includes daily selections of food from the fruit and vegetable group, the bread and cereal group, the dairy group and the protein group.
- · Unfortunately, even though a large variety of foods are available, many of us do not have nutritionally adequate diets. We eat the wrong foods, or inadequate amounts of the right foods.
- · Stress is another factor which can greatly increase an individual's need for water-soluble vitamins, such as B-complex and Vitamin C.
- · Unlike fat-soluble vitamins, such as Vitamins A, D, E and K, most of the water-soluble vitamins are not stored in the body.
- Vitamin and mineral supplements may be needed when: the diet is unbalanced or restricted due to a weight reduction program, food faddism or special diets for disease management;

alcohol consumption is high; oral contraceptives are being taken;

stress, illness, overwork or injury have occurred;

certain medicines are being taken that may change the body's ability to utilize vitamins properly;

a woman is pregnant or nursing;

certain ages are reached, for example, infants and children have special requirements due to growth patterns; also, some elderly people eat irregularly due to dental or economic problems.

The idea is to have all five division championship games played in the University of Texas Memorial Stadium. On one day.

Just try to convince a kid that he needs to get out of bed at 4 a.m., so he can make a 7:30 a.m. kickoff of a championship football game.

Naturally, the teams from the smaller schools, who are in the minority as far as numbers of schools are concerned, would play the morning games.

I'm sorry, but this is one change I just can't get worked up about, other than in opposition.

Austin will just have to get along with what it can, and allow high school football championships be played wherever the participating schools

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. In large plastic bag, add all ingredients. Close bag and shake until potatoes are evenly coated. Empty potatoes into shallow baking or roasting pan. Discard bag. Bake, stirring occasionally, 40 minutes or until potatoes are tender and golden brown.

1 large onion, chopped (about 1 cup) 1 pkg. (about 1 1/4 oz.) taco seasoning

1 lb. hamburger meat Onion, chopped Garlic powder 2 cans ranch style beans Velveeta cheese 12 flour tortillas

Brown hamburger meat. As you brown, add onions and a little garlic powder. Meanwhile, line pan with the tortillas (5 or 6). Add browned meat to the pan. Spread the ranch style beans on top of meat, then layer the Velveeta cheese on top of beans. Cover the top with tortillas and then mix the can of Ro-Tel and cream of chicken soup. Pour over top and bake 1 hour in 350 degree oven. Freezes well.

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
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
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'Dogs survive Hawk rally, 21-19

Hawk fans got their money's worth, when they traveled to Burkburnett Friday night for the season-opening football game.

They actually were treated to two different games. Game #1 was all Burkburnett: Game # 2 was all Iowa Park.

The final outcome was Burkburnett 21, Iowa Park 19.

Game # 1 was the first 24 minutes, or first half. It was a Bulldog rout that ended 14-0, but very well could have been 28-0, or more.

The statistics are a pretty good indication: Burk led 17-1 in first downs (that one for Iowa Park came on a penalty against the Bulldogs); Burk had 213 yards rushing to Iowa Park's net four; Burk had 88 yards passing to Iowa Park's 0 = 301 yards from scriminage for Burkburnett to Iowa Park's 4.

And the second half appeared to be even more of the same, because two Hawk two-way starters, Mark Tatum and Jason Dudley, were sidelined (Tatum with a foot injury and Dudley with dehydration).

Coach Robert Clensay later said, "They (Burkburnett) physically outplayed us in the first half. But the coaches had felt (before the game) if we were not down by more than two touchdowns at the half, we would have a chance to win it. We were that confident the kids were in better physical shape."


Well, they apparently were. The Hawks won the second half, 19-7, after a scoreless third quarter.

The Hawks began a drive late in the third quarter, when Chris Williams covered a Bulldog fumble on the Hawk 35 yard line. Iowa Park drove to the 'Dogs' 10, and stalled.

Burk was forced to punt from the 12, four plays later, and the Hawks started their initial scoring drive from their own 48.

Quarterback Jason Miller hit Chad Thompson on a 12-yard pass. Then, Williams went on a 22-yard romp. Miller

then skirted left end to Burk's 18, and Don Ellis picked up three more yards. Miller lit up Iowa Park's side of the scoreboard on the next play, rounding right end and diving across the goal line.

A pass attempt for the extra point failed, leaving the score 14-6 with 7:48 remaining on the scoreboard clock.

That didn't last long, however.

Tony Lozipone covered a Bulldog fumble on the first play following the kickoff, at the mid-field mark. But Miller's attempted pass on the next play was intercepted on the 30 and returned to the 'Dog 41. Four plays later, Burk scored from the 30, and kicked the extra point.

The fans were then electrified by Cody Witherspoon's 95-yard kickoff return. He bobbled the ball on the five, picked it up, and ran straight up the inbound markers to Burk's end zone. According to the scoreboard clock, the elapsed time after Burk's touchdown was 14 seconds.

Iowa Park then attempted a trick play for the two-point conversion, that had most of the team offset from the ball in the center of the three-yard line. But it failed.

The ball would again change hands rapidly, following the kickoff.

Burk fumbled on the first play from scrimmage, and Brent Brown claimed it on the 'Dog 37. After advancing the ball to the Burkburnett 23, Miller suffered his second interception, this time on the opponent's one yard line, with 3:28 remaining in the game.

Again, on the first play, Burkburnett fumbled, and Josh Johnson laid claim to the ball on Burk's 11.

Four plays later, Miller covered the final yard needed on a quarterback sneak. Patric Kennedy's kick for the extra point was good, making the score 21-19 with 1:47 remaining in the game.

The hosts picked up a first down, thanks to a major penalty against the Hawks, to run out the balance of time on the clock.

Thanks to that 22-yard romp, Williams repeated last year's accomplishment, as the Hawks' leading rusher against the 'Dogs' defense. He carried seven times and gained a net 50 yards. Last year it took 14 totes to gain 43.

Despite being sacked five times for minus yards, Miller still had a net 34 yards rushing. Ellis followed closely with 33.


The fifth fumble by Burkburnett was in the first quarter, and that one was covered by Kennedy.

"I looked with envy at the ordinary people driving their ordinary cars to their ordinary jobs." - Dennis B. Levine.

Dennis Levine, who made the above statement, was driving a \$125,000 Ferrari with its twelve cylinder, 48 valve engine. His salary was over two million dollars a year, plus was offered a salary of five million dollars with a five million dollar bonus to sign. He had more then ten million dollars in a hidden bank account. He had a beautiful wife and two precious children. He seemingly had it all including a luxurious Park Avenue apartment in New York. Dennis Levine was rich, becoming richer, living the American dream, and only thirty-four years old.

Why did Dennis Levine envy the common people with their ordinary cars and their ordinary jobs? This man had a secret life that was characterized by shady deals, offshore bank accounts, and dummy corporations. He had just been caught in the insider trading scandal that also ensnared the famous Ivan Boesky and Michael Milken. Dennis Levine tells all about his pain, sorrow, and regret in his book "INSIDE OUT." His wife could not understand it. They had more than enough without insider trading. Questions haunted him: "Why had I started? Why had I not stopped? What will I tell my family?"

How do you tell your five year old son you are going to prison? He said, "You know, when little people make mistakes, they have to be punished. It's the same for big people. They get punished by a judge. I went to see a judge, a man who punishes big people." Through tears, his little boy asked, "Daddy, did you know what you were doing was wrong?" His father replied in the affirmative. He asked his dad, "why did you do it?" Dennis B. Levine had no answer.

Personally I am convinced that the best and happiest people on God's green earth are those who live their lives by teachings of the Bible. 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

A featured portion of the luncheon was recognition of the 25 loaned executives, who have volunteered to assist with employee campaigns in larger companies.


Iowa Parkan Bud Burch, representing Lone Star Gas Co., is listed among the loaned executives.

Baptist Women meet Monday

The Thelma Smith Baptist Women of First Baptist Church met Monday evening at the church for the State Missions 1992 program presented by Mrs. E.T. Patterson, missions support chairman. She gave highlights from the material prepared by the Home Mission Board for the five days during the current week.

The theme of the program was "Press On Run the Race," and the scripture verse that furnished inspiration was Hebrews 12:1. Mrs. Patterson said that the goal of the state mission offering, named for Mary Hill Davis who led the women of Texas to set aside a week to pray for the needs of the state and to take up an offering in 1910, has been set at \$5,200,000 and the goal of the local church at \$4,444.

In introducing the program, she reminded the women that sports held a prominent place in the world of the early church just as they do today, and that track events have changed little from those first contests to the Olympic challenges viewed on television today. She said that necessary preparation for the race as Christians today involve Bible study, prayer, ministry and witness.

Mrs. Patterson said "We, as Texans and Christians, are going to take the scripture verse Hebrews 12:1 and run a race through Texas starting with 'a great cloud of witnesses.' The witnesses are the faithful lives of earlier ones who line the race course encouraging Christians to run the race with faith."

Continuing with the next section

of the verse, "throw off everything that hinders," Mrs. Patterson reminded that a serious runner strips off everthing that hinders him from running successfully, which is an example for those who run the Christian race.

As she applied "run with patience" to the Christian's race today, she reminded the women that it is the faithful servants trying to keep things in order.

Mrs. Patterson put major emphasis on the last part of the verse "the race that is set before us," and gave statistics about how Texas Baptists are running the race today in organizing

new churches, some language, such as Chinese, Vietnamese and deaf, some in metropolitan areas, others in rural areas. NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes the tax rate for last year provides \$3914 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute that same rate now provides \$4213 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.8285 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Holliday school district hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .1015 that will provide \$4148 per student in state and local revenues.
