Stolen car, suspect found near border

The long arm of Iowa Park's law officers reached all the way down to the Rio Grande Valley this week, to solve a case of home burglary and auto theft.

Determination and good investigative work were credited for solving the case.

The incident was first reported at 11:43 p.m. Thursday, by a neighbor of the home's occupants who were away on vacation.

The neighbor, who had just returned for the evening, noticed a light burning in the house, which is located in the 900 block of Dossia, and reported it to police.

Upon investigation, it was determined entry had been forced through a window. A number of household items was missing, as well as a 1982 Honda Accord that had been in the garage.

Among the items missing, police said, were an electric guitar and amplifier, VCR, stereo system, cameras and lenses, and a set of golf clubs.

The guitar and amplifier was recovered by Acting Chief Ray Smock from a local resident.

Smock was able to trace through his investigation that the suspect might have gone to Rio Grande City, west of McAllen. He contacted the Starr County sheriff's department, requesting their assistance, and issued warrants for the suspect's arrest on Saturday.

He was contacted the following day, and informed that deputies there had arrested Guadalupe Garza, 21, on

his warrants for burglary of a habitation and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle.

The sheriff's office, besides informing Smock of recovering the vehicle, said they had placed two additional charges against Garza, for attempting to elude arrest and resisting arrest.

Smock said the Starr officers expressed hope they might be able to find many of the other stolen items in that area.

Garza is to be returned to Wichita County, but likely after he faces the charges against him in Rio Grande City.

Local officers arrested a 21-year-old man, Kristin Gray Smart, Tuesday evening, who is being charged with using a telephone to harass a local woman.

Smart was taken to the county jail after his bond was set at \$750.

The woman had earlier requested

telephone tracer assistance from Southwestern Bell Telephone, which led to Smart's arrest, and subsequent confession.

Police arrested Joseph S. Blizard, 62, Wednesday afternoon of last week, on a charge of public intoxication. He was released about four hours later, after signing a personal recognizance bond, according to the police blotter entry.

A resident in the 400 block of West Jefferson filed a complaint Thursday, that a 22-inch lawnmower had been stolen from his unlocked shed.

The only criminal mischief case listed on the week's blotter was a report of a home's window being broken out in the 1300 block of Sunset. The complaint was received Monday evening.

A dog in the 300 block of East Garden was picked up by the city's animal control officer Saturday morn-

Council to consider finalists for chief

Iowa Park city aldermen are to discuss dates to interview finalists who have applied for the position of chief of police, when they meet Monday night.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Mayor Wayne House has asked the council members to rate the 17 applicants from application forms which have been furnished to each alderman, and a decision will be reached on how many they want to interview, as well as when.

Det. Ray Smock has been serving as temporary chief in place of Wayne Parsons, who resigned July 15.

Aldermen also face a lengthy agenda for their regular twice-monthly meeting.

The agenda includes five requests from the public, two ordinances, action on bids for the sale of two properties, and a resolution.

The public requests include:
* a waiver, until August, 1995, for Iowa Park schools to come into compliance with the plumbing code for the three portable buildings at Kidwell Elementary;

* a proposal by Paul Arrington to lease city property on the northeast side of Lake Gordon to construct a restaurant;

* water service to property, on Coleman Road outside the city limits, for Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Ritchie;

* close Cash Street Sept. 19, from post office drive to Yosemite and 100-200 block of Wall, for Whoop-T-Do;

* and lease on .42 acre tract of Lot 1, Block 20, Redin Heights (Fourth and West Highway) be terminated and new lease issued to A.C. Miser.

The two ordinances concern a joint agreement with the county on emergency situations, and amending the code concerning the city's landfill stickers.

Two tracts of land, 610 East Bank and 303 East Lafayette, have been advertised for bids to sell and those bids will be considered.

The resolution concerns the second public hearing, to be held prior to the meeting in front of Bradford Elementary, in regard to submission of an application for a grant from the Texas Community Development Program, to upgrade the sewer system in the south part of town.

Hawk-Bobcat rematch season's home opener

The Iowa Park Hawks, who earned considerable respect with their fourth-quarter rally last week against Burk Burnett, will play their first home game of the season Friday against Childress.

Kickoff time in Hawk Stadium will be 8 p.m.

Both the Hawks and Bobcats will be seeking their first victories of the young season.

Iowa Park's rally last week fell short, but only because they failed to score either of the two two-point conversions they attempted. The Class AAAA Bulldogs, who led 14-0 going into the final 12-minute period, held on for a narrow, 21-19 win.

Meanwhile, Childress fell victim to the defending Class A state champion, Memphis, a club that has moved up to Class AA this season, 28-9.

All nine of the Bobcats' points were off the talented foot of field goal kicker Josh White. Runningback Jimmy Salas led the 'Cats in rushing with 104 yards, on 18 carries.

This will be the third game of the current series between Iowa Park and Childress. The two clubs met in 1990 for the first time since the 1969 season.

The Bobcats defeated the Hawks 22-6 en route to the state quarterfinals in '90, and last year, took advantage of

four Iowa Park turnovers - two fumbles and two interceptions - to post a 28-13 victory.

Few, if any, active high school coaches in Texas have been at the same school longer than Charlie Johnston. He has built an outstanding program there, and seldom loses two games on two consecutive Friday nights.

The Bobcats, who tied Vernon in a preseason scrimmage, lost heavily to graduation last spring. They are young, but improving.

Hawk coaches' scouting report indicates the Bobcats last week mounted several drives, but couldn't capitalize. "They can move the ball," the report stated.

As a junior, Mark de la Rosa led Iowa Park ball carriers last year, gaining 51 yards on six carries. But the senior is still nursing a knee injury, and is expected to miss this game, as he did last week.

Coach Robert Clensay is being forced to count on his depth at running-back. He first lost Scott Byrd in the scrimmage with Wichita Falls High, because of a foot injury.

Then, in the first half last week, his converted tight end, Mark Tatum, was sidelined, also with a foot injury. The big senior will be held out of action this

week.

"He wants to play, but we definitely will hold him out of action this week," Clensay said of Tatum, who also is a starting linebacker, as is de la Rosa.

Senior Jason Dudley, who took Tatum's place as tight end, also sat out the second half against Burk. He had been ill three days preceding the game, and became overheated during halftime.

Actually, Clensay listed de la Rosa only as being questionable this week. He said he hopes to get him into action for the Frederick game.

Asked if his players were somewhat down, after losing to traditional rival Burk Burnett last week, Clensay said, "I think this group of kids feel they can line up and play with anybody."

Gilmore's love of cycles leads to major business

Jim Gilmore has had a passion for motorcycles since he was an adolescent. In later years his hobby has turned into a profitable business.

His wife and two children now share his enthusiasm for the sport of motorcycling.

Jim began riding motorcycles at the age of 13. By the time he was 16 and a sophomore in Iowa Park High School, he thought he had the sport pretty well figured out and that he knew a lot about how to ride and what to expect.

That is when he had an indelible fact engraved in his mind. "You never know what the other person is going to do."

Jim was riding his 350cc Yamaha one day and "assumed" he had the right of way and that the motorist would observe the sign to yield. The result for him was two broken wrists and two broken elbows.

The accident didn't dampen Jim's love for riding a motorcycle. However, he didn't get to ride again until he was a senior in high school. He wore a cast on one arm for two years.

"That accident may have been a blessing for me," Jim said, "I know

one thing, it made me a lot more cautious rider. I never take anything for granted anymore."

When Jim graduated high school he attended a trade school in Nashville, Tenn., for a year. When he returned to Iowa Park he was married to Vickie Illingworth, also an Iowa Park graduate.

In 1974 when Jim was 21 he bought his first Harley-Davidson. He said he couldn't afford it before then. He still has that motorcycle and he says he will never get rid of it.

In October, 1985 the couple purchased the Harley-Davidson franchise in Wichita Falls and opened the Red River Harley-Davidson Factory Authorized Sale and Service in Iowa Park.

The closest Harley-Davidson dealerships to Jim's and Vickie's is Lawton, Okla., or Bedford or Fort Worth. "Ours is a little unique. We have a large territory, without a particularly large population area that most of the others have," Jim explained.

Although they wanted him to keep his business in Wichita Falls, he wanted to stay in Iowa Park. He had a good location, easy access to the

highway, and he just wanted to be in Iowa Park. And, currently Jim has the only vehicle dealership here.

He declares that Vickie is the boss and "I just work here."

"Now, (because he remembers his accident) when we sell a motorcycle, especially to first time buyers, we always try to impress on their minds that as long as they operate a motorcycle they should be prepared to yield the right of way if it becomes necessary, and to remember that everytime they come to an intersection there may be a motorist there who could run over them," Jim added.

Other safety rules riders are asked to observe are to ride safely and within the limits of the law and individual abilities; ride with their headlight on, wear a helmet and proper clothing and eyewear.

Motorcycling comes as second nature to the Jim Gilmore family. Jim and Vickie's son, Jason, 13, has been riding since he was 10. He has his own motorcycle as does his younger sister, Bobbie Lynn, who has been riding since she was five years old.

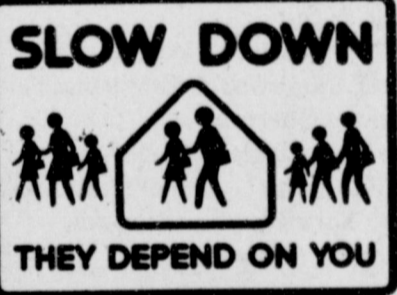

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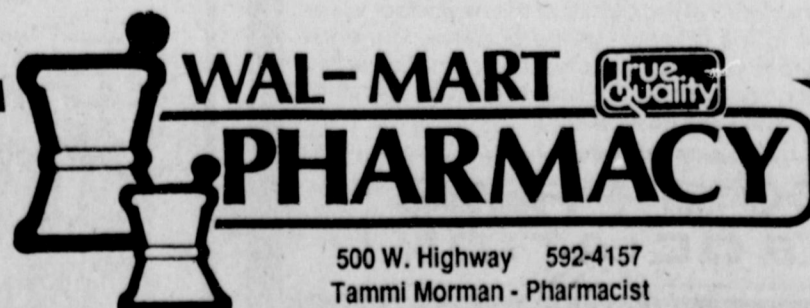
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Health Tips



Vitamin Basics

- Vitamins and minerals work together to keep the blood, bones, teeth, hormonal systems, muscles and nerves functioning properly.
- Vitamins and minerals cannot be manufactured by the body, but are present in food in small amounts.
- Generally, adequate amounts of vitamins and minerals can be acquired through a sound diet which includes daily selections of food from the fruit and vegetable group, the bread and cereal group, the dairy group and the protein group.
- Unfortunately, even though a large variety of foods are available, many of us do not have nutritionally adequate diets. We eat the wrong foods, or inadequate amounts of the right foods.
- Stress is another factor which can greatly increase an individual's need for water-soluble vitamins, such as B-complex and Vitamin C.
- Unlike fat-soluble vitamins, such as Vitamins A, D, E and K, most of the water-soluble vitamins are not stored in the body.
- Vitamin and mineral supplements may be needed when:
the diet is unbalanced or restricted due to a weight reduction program, food faddism or special diets for disease management;
alcohol consumption is high;
oral contraceptives are being taken;
stress, illness, overwork or injury have occurred;
certain medicines are being taken that may change the body's ability to utilize vitamins properly;
a woman is pregnant or nursing;

Risking the likelihood that you readers may determine that all I can do is complain about government, I've got to express my concern about two particular topics being considered on the state level.

Neither is related. One is a proposal to select a site and date where all high school football championships will be played. The other is a proposal for a state health care program.

A strong movement has been underway for some time, to have the University Interscholastic League select a place and date for all high school football games to be played annually.

I say the movement is strong, because the UIL is basically run by school superintendents. And those from the large schools seem to have the most influence, and least understanding.

The vast majority of high school coaches oppose the idea.

Those proposing the idea are using all the other UIL activities, as a case in point.

And, since all UIL state events are held in Austin, you better believe that city's chamber of commerce is working overtime to get the big plumb. It's a matter of economics.

Personnel in the UIL office appear to like the idea. I figure it's because they won't have to leave town to attend the championship games, because the UIL office is, and always has been, located in Austin.

The idea is to have all five division championship games played in the University of Texas Memorial Stadium. On one day.

Naturally, the teams from the smaller schools, who are in the minority as far as numbers of schools are concerned, would play the morning games.

I'm sorry, but this is one change I just can't get worked up about, other than in opposition.

Austin will just have to get along with what it can, and allow high school football championships be played wherever the participating schools choose.

I fully recognize that there is a strong movement, nationally as well as here in the state, to get some sort of handle on health care costs. It's about all you read and hear of anymore.

But a study group that is fixing to make such a recommendation to the state legislature is barking up the wrong socialist tree.

Oh, the proponents explain that it won't be like what happened in Russia, where a patient had no choice of which doctor saw and treated him. They make that very clear.

But the proponents are explaining that the state take over health care for all citizens, get a single insurance com-

pany to handle it all, and we'll all be the better for it.

How would that health care be paid for? Well, by payroll deduction, that's how. One spokesman for the group said he felt it could be done, easily, with a five percent contribution of all salaries paid in Texas.

You business people better perk up your ears and get hold of your legislators on this one. Quick.

Ask educators, especially down in the Rio Grande Valley, about paying for public things for all citizens. They're going broke, fast, down there, because they keep getting more "citizens" every time the river level drops a couple of inches.

As I've said in this space before, concerning health care costs, I don't have an answer. But I'm up to my ears now in payroll taxes, and really don't want any more.

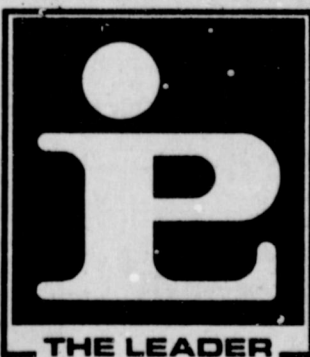

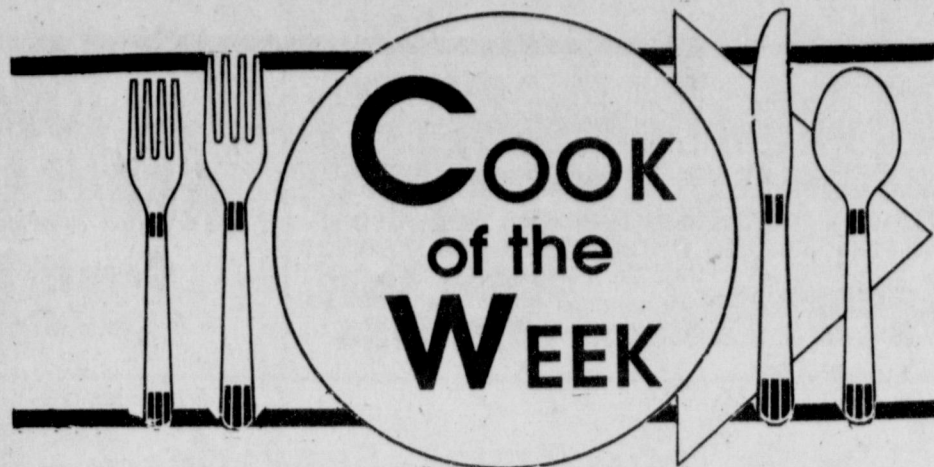
Her son Carl, a high school junior, is a member of the varsity football team, and 14-year-old Matt plays on the junior high's eighth grade team.

Of those appearing in this week's column, Sherry said that the "Apple Pie Crunch," "Mexican Casserole," and "Quick Sticky Buns" are her family's favorites.

Quick Sticky Buns

Combine in large layer cake pan:
2 Tbsps. melted butter
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup pancake syrup
1/4 cup chopped nuts
1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Top with 10 canned biscuits and bake according to package directions, or until golden brown.

Onion Potatoes

1 envelope onion soup mix
2 lbs. potatoes, cut into large chunks
1/3 cup olive or vegetable oil

Preheat oven to 450 degrees.
In large plastic bag, add all ingredients. Close bag and shake until potatoes are evenly coated. Empty potatoes into shallow baking or roasting pan. Discard bag. Bake, stirring occasionally, 40 minutes or until potatoes are tender and golden brown.

Easy Taco Dinner

1 lb. ground beef
1 large onion, chopped (about 1 cup)
1 pkg. (about 1 1/4 oz.) taco seasoning mix
1 cup water
1 pkg. (about 12 oz.) tortilla chips
1/2 head lettuce, shredded
2 medium tomatoes, chopped
1 can sliced (2 1/2 oz.) sliced, ripe olives, drained
1 cup shredded Cheddar or Monterey Jack cheese (about 4 oz.)
2/3 cup sour cream

Cook and stir ground beef and onion until beef is light brown; drain. Stir in seasoning mix and water. Heat to boiling; reduce heat and simmer uncovered 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Spoon beef mixture onto chips and top with remaining ingredients. Makes 6 servings.

Apple Pie Crunch

2 cans apple pie filling
2 boxes Jiffy cake mix (yellow or white mix)

1 cup butter or less worked into cake mix to make it look coarse
Put pie filling in pan and cake mixture (with butter in it) on top of filling. (Can add pecans to cake mixture.) Bake 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees.

Mexican Casserole

1 lb. hamburger meat
Onion, chopped
Garlic powder
2 cans ranch style beans
Velveeta cheese
12 flour tortillas
1 can Ro-Tel tomatoes and green chilies
1 can cream of chicken soup

Brown hamburger meat. As you brown, add onions and a little garlic powder. Meanwhile, line pan with the tortillas (5 or 6). Add browned meat to the pan. Spread the ranch style beans on top of meat, then layer the Velveeta cheese on top of beans. Cover the top with tortillas and then mix the can of Ro-Tel and cream of chicken soup. Pour over top and bake 1 hour in 350 degree oven. Freezes well.

Applesauce Cream

1 Golden Delicious apple
1 Tbsp. water
1 - 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
Dash of Allspice

Core, peel and slice the apple; place in sauce pan with water. Cover tightly and cook over medium heat until apple mashes very easily with fork. Cool.

Using electric mixer, whip cream cheese until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in mashed apple and allspice. Serve dollops of applesauce cream over squares of brownies or spice cake. Makes 1 cup of topping.

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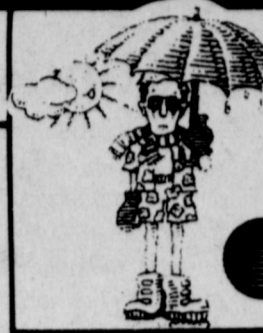
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'Dogs survive Hawk rally, 21-19

Hawk fans got their money's worth, when they traveled to Burkburnett Friday night for the season-opening football game.

They actually were treated to two different games. Game #1 was all Burkburnett; Game #2 was all Iowa Park.

The final outcome was Burkburnett 21, Iowa Park 19.

Game #1 was the first 24 minutes, or first half. It was a Bulldog rout that ended 14-0, but very well could have been 28-0, or more.

The statistics are a pretty good indication: Burk led 17-1 in first downs (that one for Iowa Park came on a penalty against the Bulldogs); Burk had 213 yards rushing to Iowa Park's net four; Burk had 88 yards passing to Iowa Park's 0 = 301 yards from scrimmage for Burkburnett to Iowa Park's 4.

And the second half appeared to be even more of the same, because two Hawk two-way starters, Mark Tatum and Jason Dudley, were sidelined (Tatum with a foot injury and Dudley with dehydration).

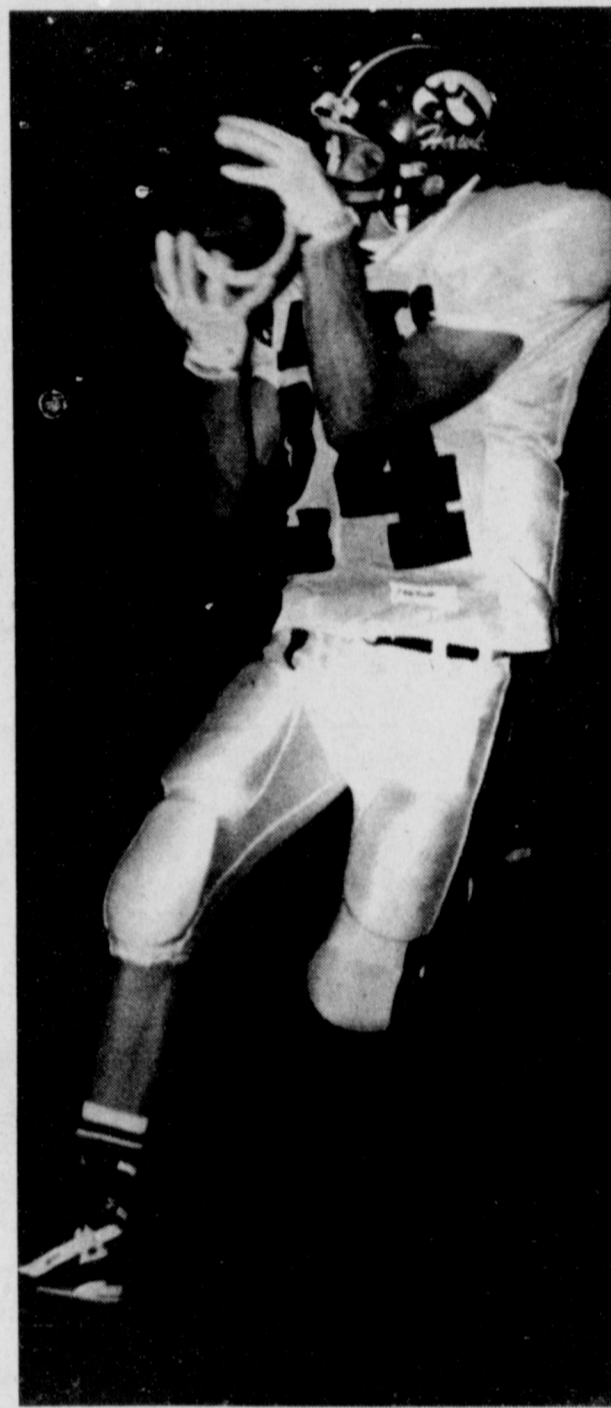
Coach Robert Clensay later said, "They (Burkburnett) physically outplayed us in the first half. But the coaches had felt (before the game) if we were not down by more than two touchdowns at the half, we would have a chance to win it. We were that confident the kids were in better physical shape."

Well, they apparently were. The Hawks won the second half, 19-7, after a scoreless third quarter.

The Hawks began a drive late in the third quarter, when Chris Williams covered a Bulldog fumble on the Hawk 35 yard line. Iowa Park drove to the 'Dogs' 10, and stalled.

Burk was forced to punt from the 12, four plays later, and the Hawks started their initial scoring drive from their own 48.

Quarterback Jason Miller hit Chad Thompson on a 12-yard pass. Then, Williams went on a 22-yard romp. Miller

then skirted left end to Burk's 18, and Don Ellis picked up three more yards. Miller lit up Iowa Park's side of the scoreboard on the next play, rounding right end and diving across the goal line.

A pass attempt for the extra point failed, leaving the score 14-6 with 7:48 remaining on the scoreboard clock.

That didn't last long, however.

Tony Lozipone covered a Bulldog fumble on the first play following the kick-off, at the mid-field mark. But Miller's attempted pass on the next play was intercepted on the 30 and returned to the 'Dog 41. Four plays later, Burk scored from the 30, and kicked the extra point.

The fans were then electrified by Cody Witherspoon's 95-yard kickoff return. He bobbled the ball on the five, picked it up, and ran straight up the inbound markers to Burk's end zone. According to the scoreboard clock, the elapsed time after Burk's touchdown was 14 seconds.

Iowa Park then attempted a trick play for the two-point conversion, that had most of the team offset from the ball in the center of the three-yard line. But it failed.

The ball would again change hands rapidly, following the kickoff.

Burk fumbled on the first play from scrimmage, and Brent Brown claimed it on the 'Dog 37. After advancing the ball to the Burkburnett 23, Miller suffered his second interception, this time on the opponent's one yard line, with 3:28 remaining in the game.

Again, on the first play, Burkburnett fumbled, and Josh Johnson laid claim to the ball on Burk's 11.

Four plays later, Miller covered the final yard needed on a quarterback sneak. Patric Kennedy's kick for the extra point was good, making the score 21-19 with 1:47 remaining in the game.

The hosts picked up a first down, thanks to a major penalty against the Hawks, to run out the balance of time on the clock.

Thanks to that 22-yard romp, Williams repeated last year's accomplishment, as the Hawks' leading rusher against the 'Dogs' defense. He carried seven times and gained a net 50 yards. Last year it took 14 totes to gain 43.

Despite being sacked five times for minus yards, Miller still had a net 34 yards rushing. Ellis followed closely with 33.

The fifth fumble by Burkburnett was in the first quarter, and that one was covered by Kennedy.

Miller completed four of 14 pass attempts, to Brown, Frazier, Ellis and Ken Cooper, for 29 yards.

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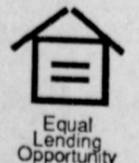

Obituaries

L.D. McLemore

L.D. "Butch" McLemore, 49, a former coach at Valley View and Iowa Park, died Monday from injuries he received in a one car accident near Windhorst.

Services were held Wednesday afternoon at First United Methodist Church in Archer City with Rev. John Taylor, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Decatur, officiating. Burial was in Archer City Cemetery.

McLemore was born April 1, 1943, in Seymour. He was a graduate of East Texas State University with a bachelor's degree in science in education. He was a coach for more than 15 years. After coaching, he worked as an independent agent with Texas Farm Bureau in Archer City, then became an independent oil producer in 1979. He was a member of First United Methodist Church of Archer City and a former member and past president of Archer City Independent School District Board of Trustees. 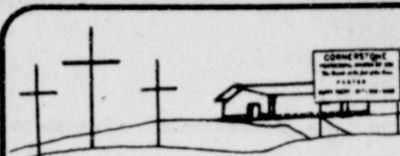

Dennis Levine, who made the above statement, was driving a \$125,000 Ferrari with its twelve cylinder, 48 valve engine. His salary was over two million dollars a year, plus was offered a salary of five million dollars with a five million dollar bonus to sign. He had more than ten million dollars in a hidden bank account. He had a beautiful wife and two precious children. He seemingly had it all including a luxurious Park Avenue apartment in New York. Dennis Levine was rich, becoming richer, living the American dream, and only thirty-four years old.

Why did Dennis Levine envy the common people with their ordinary cars and their ordinary jobs? This man had a secret life that was characterized by shady deals, offshore bank accounts, and dummy corporations. He had just been caught in the insider trading scandal that also ensnared the famous Ivan Boesky and Michael Milken. Dennis Levine tells all about his pain, sorrow, and regret in his book "INSIDE OUT." His wife could not understand it. They had more than enough without insider trading. Questions haunted him: "Why had I started? Why had I not stopped? What will I tell my family?"

How do you tell your five year old son you are going to prison? He said, "You know, when little people make mistakes, they have to be punished. It's the same for big people. 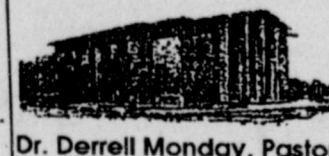

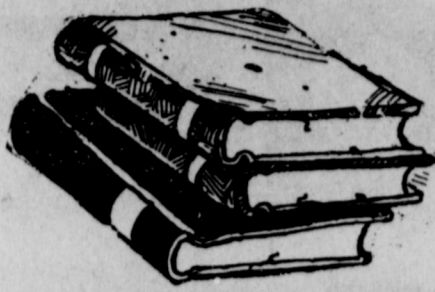

She now is eight. Vickie did have her own motorcycle until someone wanted it bad enough to make them offer they couldn't refuse. "We're not to the point yet that we can say no to a good deal," Jim said. It isn't that Vickie has quit riding, she just rides with Jim now.

In fact, motorcycling is more or less an "all family" sport for the Gilmores.

Jim's mother and father ride. Jim says they ride all over the country, and just recently returned from a trip to Reno, Nev. He said his dad didn't start riding until he was in his 50s.

Two of Jim's three brothers, one of his uncles and his father-in-law are involved in the sport.

Jim and Vickie always ride their motorcycles when they attend dealership meetings held each year. One year they went to Baltimore, one year to San Francisco and another time to Milwaukee.

Each year there is a Motorcycle Rally in Sturgis, S.D. The couple went there when the 50th anniversary rally was held and returned the next year and took their son.

Jim said the town is about the size of Iowa Park, but during the rally there are from 160,000 to 200,000 people there. Motels are booked solid within a 300-mile radius of Sturgis.

According to Jim, the factory sponsors an organization for Harley-

Davidson owners, the largest brand sold in the United States, and has approximately 160,000 members.

He maintains motorcycling is a good sport for anyone from five to 85. They have many customers in their mid-50s, and some in their 70s and 80s.

Each dealership can sponsor a chapter. There is no charge to belong to the local chapter, but there are dues for membership in the national Harley-Davidson organization. The Gilmores sponsor the Wichita County Harley Owners Group.

They meet once a month. Sometimes they ride at the Red River store, or they decide to ride somewhere else. There are between 50 and 60 members in the Wichita County group.

Recently the group rode to Chickasha, Okla. Quite often they ride to some place where someone knows of a really good place to eat within 100-150 miles. They go eat and return just for the fun of it. "Of course," Jim remarked, "we always call ahead to let the restaurant manager know we are coming."

The local Harley Owners Group participate in or sponsor a number of activities to help various groups and organizations.

Members represent families, various professions and career persons, including doctors, lawyers, professors, and business men and women.

The Group sponsors a fund raising activity for the Friendly Door Senior Citizens of Iowa Park and for the Recreational Activities Center here. Among other activities they have a Muscular Dystrophy Association Ride each year.

Jim said he gets shipment on only 26 motorcycles a year. Some 1993 motorcycles have been delivered to Red River.

They also sell a number of used motorcycles. He thinks a motorcycle is not a bad investment. One takes a five percent or less depreciation a year. There is quite a price range, he explained. The least expensive one starts at \$4,800 and goes up to \$16,099.

According to Jim, his mechanic Tim Scott, usually stays two or three days behind in the service department, and some times they are a week behind. He said Scott keeps up with the latest in service technology through a continuing education program. He also has the latest tools Harley-Davidson has to offer.

Since Jim and Vickie opened the Harley-Davidson Factory Authorized Sales and Service in 1985, they have more than doubled their space.

They added all kinds of motorcycling apparel, including leather jackets, chaps, boots, vests, shirts, gloves, caps, bags, etc. In addition they have added collectibles, jewelry, and limited edition pieces. They also have a variety of motorcycle accessories.

Vickie pointed out some of the new jackets they have received this year. Instead of black leather, so often associated with some hard core cyclists who have given the sport a bad name, some of the new ones are navy blue with beige sleeves.

Vickie takes care of the book-keeping and does all of the ordering, in addition to being in charge of most of the sales in the apparel department.

She is a member of the Iowa Park Garden Club and serves as publicity chairman. She is a member of the Iowa Park Church of Christ.

Jim says (tongue in cheek) "I have tried to get her out of everything I could, so she can spend more time with the business".

A featured portion of the luncheon was recognition of the 25 loaned executives, who have volunteered to assist with employee campaigns in larger companies.

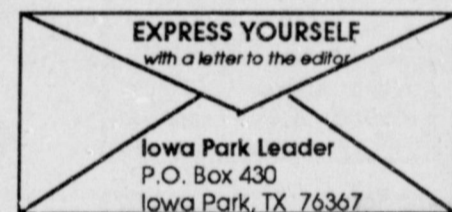
Iowa Parkan Bud Burch, representing Lone Star Gas Co., is listed among the loaned executives.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes the tax rate for last year provides \$3914 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute that same rate now provides \$4213 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.8285 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Holliday school district hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .1015 that will provide \$4148 per student in state and local revenues.

Baptist Women meet Monday

The Thelma Smith Baptist Women of First Baptist Church met Monday evening at the church for the State Missions 1992 program presented by Mrs. E.T. Patterson, missions support chairman. She gave highlights from the material prepared by the Home Mission Board for the five days during the current week.

The theme of the program was "Press On Run the Race," and the scripture verse that furnished inspiration was Hebrews 12:1. Mrs. Patterson said that the goal of the state mission offering, named for Mary Hill Davis who led the women of Texas to set aside a week to pray for the needs of the state and to take up an offering in 1910, has been set at \$5,200,000 and the goal of the local church at \$4,444.

In introducing the program, she reminded the women that sports held a prominent place in the world of the early church just as they do today, and that track events have changed little from those first contests to the Olympic challenges viewed on television today. She said that necessary preparation for the race as Christians today involve Bible study, prayer, ministry and witness.

Mrs. Patterson said "We, as Texans and Christians, are going to take the scripture verse Hebrews 12:1 and run a race through Texas starting with 'a great cloud of witnesses.' The witnesses are the faithful lives of earlier ones who line the race course encouraging Christians to run the race with faith."

Continuing with the next section

of the verse, "throw off everything that hinders," Mrs. Patterson reminded that a serious runner strips off everything that hinders him from running successfully, which is an example for those who run the Christian race.

As she applied "run with patience" to the Christian's race today, she reminded the women that it is the faithful servants trying to keep things in order.

Mrs. Patterson put major emphasis on the last part of the verse "the race that is set before us," and gave statistics about how Texas Baptists are running the race today in organizing

new churches, some language, such as Chinese, Vietnamese and deaf, some in metropolitan areas, others in rural areas. She told how the Texas Baptist Convention had given priority to establish churches in the Laredo area, and have pressed on in the radio and television ministries, volunteer chaplaincy, and retiree builders, care and share programs and resort ministry.

Mrs. V.I. Woodfin served as hostess and presided during the business where it was voted to help furnish cookies for the Mission Friends and G.A.'s carnival Sept. 14. Ten members were present.

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
