# Council studys course of action for the future

The city council met in a called session Monday afternoon, to decide a course of action on what to do with garbage in the future.

After hearing six alternatives, offered by Administrator Gary Jones, aldermen agreed that the best solution would be to form a corporation of municipalities to operate one landfill.

At issue is a mandate handed down by the Environmental Protection Agency, governing how landfills will be operated, what can and cannot be put in them, and provisions to protect against contamination of water 30 years after they are closed.

The mandate is entitled "Sub-title D," and it is to be overseen in Texas by the Water Quality Control Board. It is to be put into practice Oct. 9, 1993.

While provisions of Sub-title D have been published, changes which can be added by the state agency have yet to be published.

Jones pointed out that landfills operated by smaller communities would become too expensive, should they continue operation after the effective date and be subject to all regulations.

As an example, the monthly rate, not including the cost of collection, would be \$21.16 per customer, just to operate the landfill under Sub-title D. The cost to bury one ton of trash was projected to be \$118.35.

Jones' alternatives included: 1) join a multi-city corporation to operate the landfill and share its costs; 2) form a three-city corporation with Vernon and Electra to share one landfill cost; 3) go to the regional landfill concept; 4) contract with a private corporation to dispose of the garbage; 5) sell the city landfill to a private firm to operate; 6) stay in the landfill business alone.

Jones said discussions had been held with city staffs of Burkburnett and Vernon, on the possibility of forming a corporation to operate one landfill, sharing the costs, to save money.

Since those discussions, other area cities have expressed interest in joining in the operation.

Burkburnett now has a 162-acre tract of land it purchased for landfill use. It would provide 60 years use, if that city continued to operate by itself.

However, the same acreage would provide some 35 or 40 years space for the volume added by Vernon and Iowa Park, and several smaller cities such as Electra, Seymour, Holliday and others, Jones said.

Should a corporation be formed to operate the single landfill, a transfer station would be constructed, staffed, and garbage loaded for transport, at the participating cities.

The corporation would own everything up to that point. And there is a possibility that even the collection process could become the responsibility of the corporation, Jones said.

Prior to the meeting, Jones had said there might be a possibility of Iowa Park simply closing its landfill and transporting the trash to the Wichita Falls landfill, about 12 miles southeast of Iowa Park.

However, that city, which is currently accepting garbage from other cities, figures to double its price in the spring, to charge \$34-\$36 per ton.

The per-ton cost is projected to be \$6.73, should Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Vernon form a tri-cities corporation.

Iowa Park has approximately 22 acres of available space, should the council decide to continue operating its own landfill. On the basis of current tonnage produced locally, that would equate to about 18 years of landfill life.

But, to continue its operation, and meet Sub-title D regulations, expenditure of \$412,000 for equipment and monitors, gas venting and engineering would be necessary, and then the cost of operation is estimated at \$647,593 per year.

And that does not include a \$1 million cleanup fund that is required, should it become necessary 30 years after the pit was closed, to clean it up in case a water contamination complaint was ever filed.

Whichever path the city takes to do away with its residents' trash, a decision must be made and in operation by next October.

## Trustees approve salaries, assignments for coaches

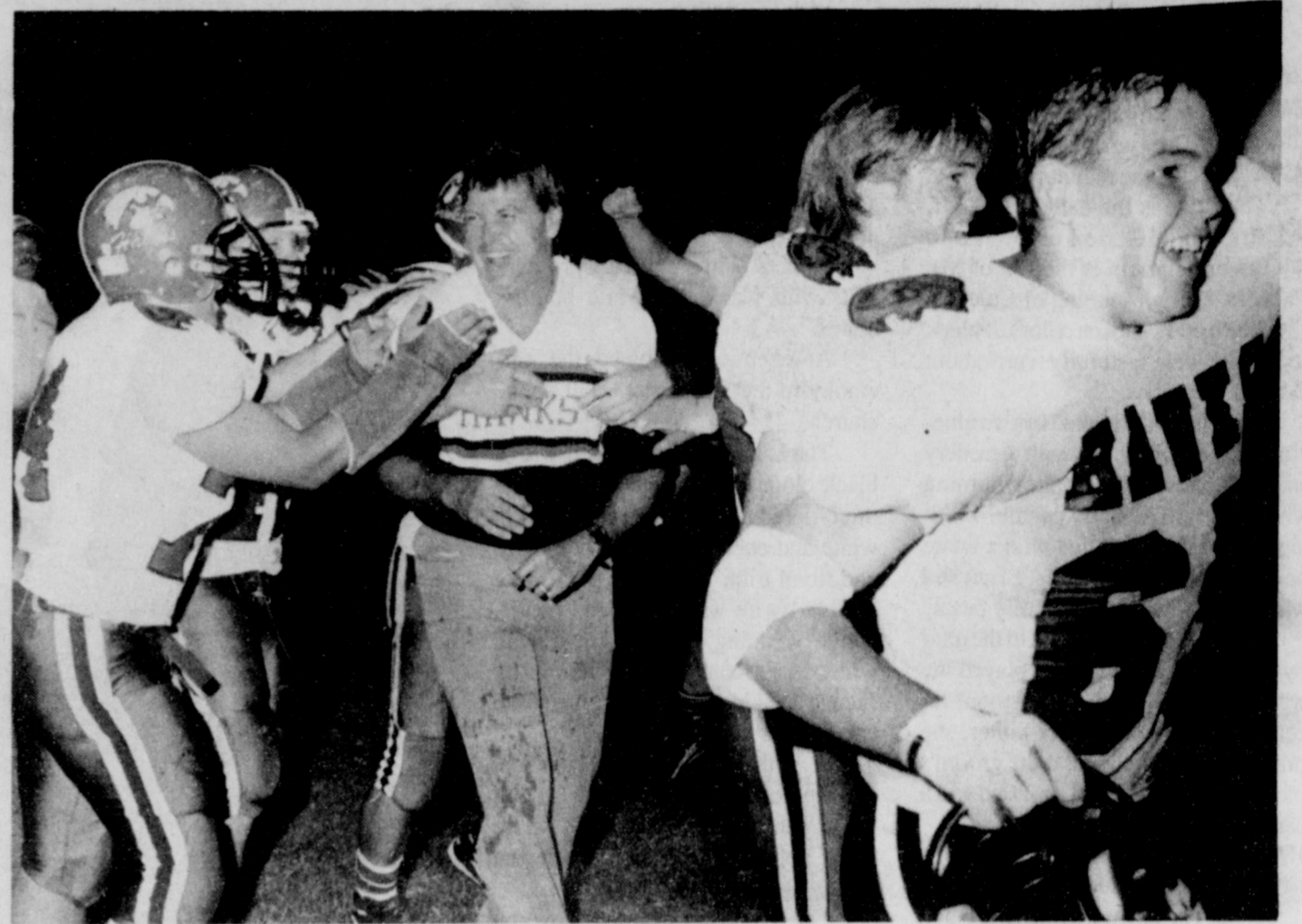
### Hear proposal to save on energy costs

## Annual Hawk-Lion battle slated Friday at Vernon

"I wish we could start the same 11 players two weeks in a row." - Rick Barker, assistant coach.

The short-handed, hobbled Hawks will travel to Vernon Friday night to take on the state-ranked Lions in the Dist. 4-AAA opener for the two clubs.

Kickoff time will be 7:30 p.m. All conference games will be played 30 minutes earlier than were the non-conference contests.

Most noticeable Hawk who will not see action tomorrow will be quarterback Jason Miller. He sprained an ankle on the second play of the third quarter last week at Wellington.

Miller's running ability is a key to

the Hawks' veer offense. He had run for two touchdowns, bringing his total to six for the season, and thrown for another before limping to the sidelines.

Tony Lozipone is slated to be the starting quarterback. He will be backed up by Brent Brown.

Two weeks ago, the Mean Green defense was hampered by the loss of two-year starting linebacker T.J. Bean, who broke his arm against Memphis and is out for the season.

The Hawk backfield will be bolstered with the return of Don Ellis and Chris Williams, however.

Ellis, who saw action only as a kicker last week, has been nursing an ankle injury. Williams didn't suit out against the Skyrockets, having a pulled leg muscle.

There are question marks by the names of two starting linemen, Mark Tatum and Scott McNeely.

Tatum has been slowed by a knee injury he received against Memphis, and McNeely has a nagging leg muscle that has been tight from being hit at Wellington.

Both could see limited action at Vernon, coaches said.

This will be the 23rd consecutive meeting between the Hawks and Lions. Because they have won the past five years, the Lions hold the edge in the series, 12-9-1.

Not since Iowa Park knocked off Vernon by a narrow 5-0 score in 1986 have Hawk fans seen their favorites come out on top in the long-running series.

Even in 1987, when Iowa Park won the district and advanced to the area level in the playoffs, Vernon was the victor, 16-14. They weren't in the same district that year.

Coach Leo Brittain, the dean of district coaches, carries a roster loaded with 19 seniors, 18 juniors and only one sophomore.

Because of that depth, only one player, Benny Cherry, starts both offensively and defensively. The 185-pound senior plays wing and short safety.

Vernon is ranked second behind Southlake Carroll in virtually every poll that ranks AAA teams in the state.

And it's not surprising. While extending their season record to 5-0, the Lions have handily defeated teams from larger schools, outscoring them 187-55.

They knocked off Altus, Okla. 48-22, Wichita Falls High 24-8, Burkburnett 46-0, Pampa 42, 12, and Wichita Falls Hirschi 27-13.

Besides being a mature club, the Lions are also big. There are nine players on the roster who weigh 200 or more pounds.

Among those heavyweights is a running back, Dexter Butler, who stands 6-2 and tips the scales at 215. Besides being a bruising runner, he has enough speed to have scored on several long plays.

One of the Lions' juniors is their quarterback, Chris Enloe, who earned the starting position last season.

A special history project will be on display on the stage in the school's cafeteria.

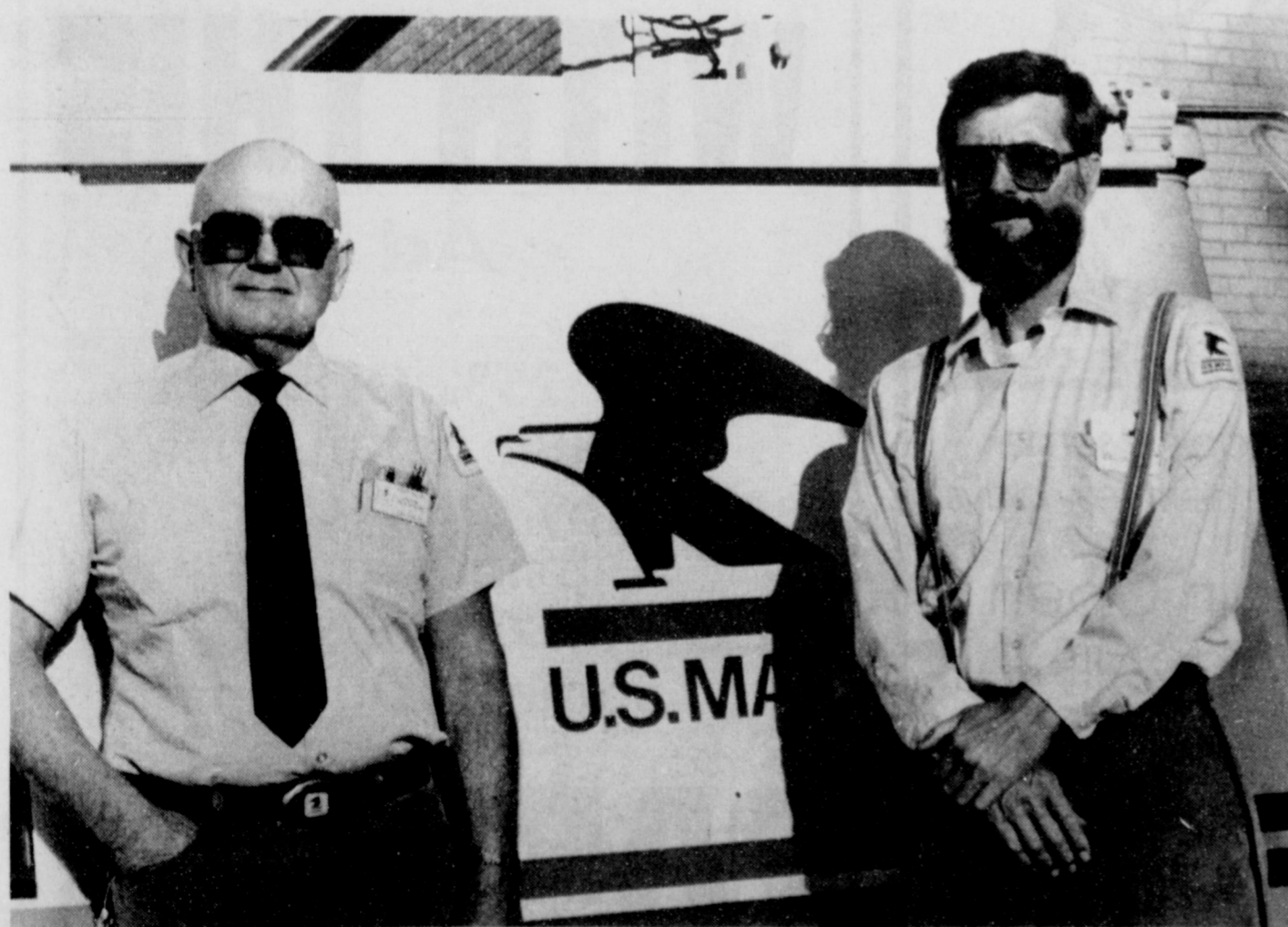
### PSAT exams to be held Oct. 22

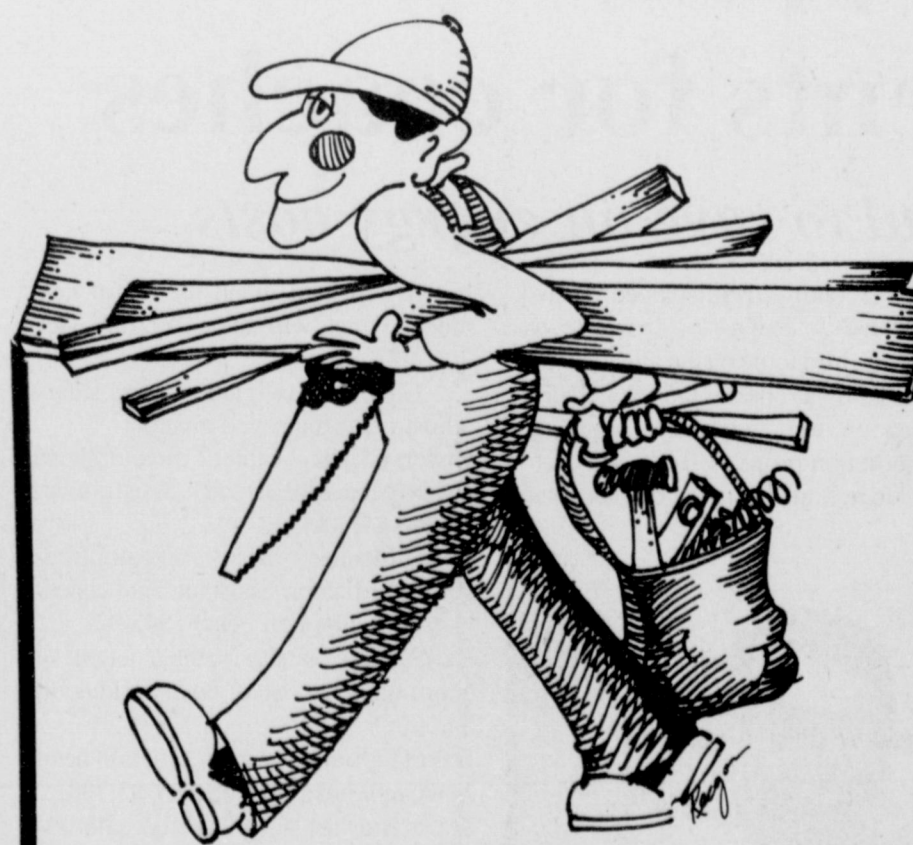
A total of 33 were present for the celebration, including nine grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

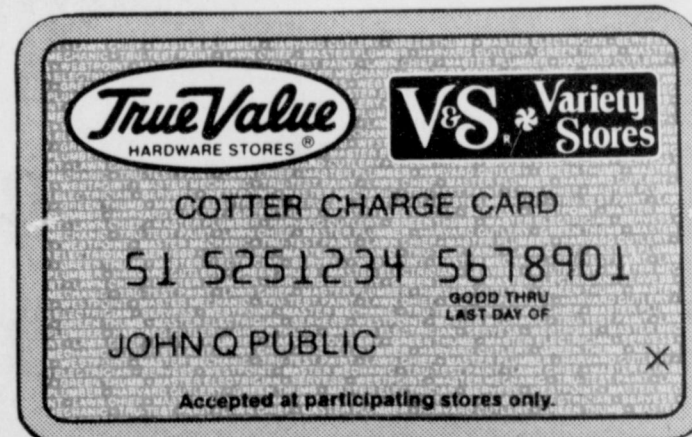

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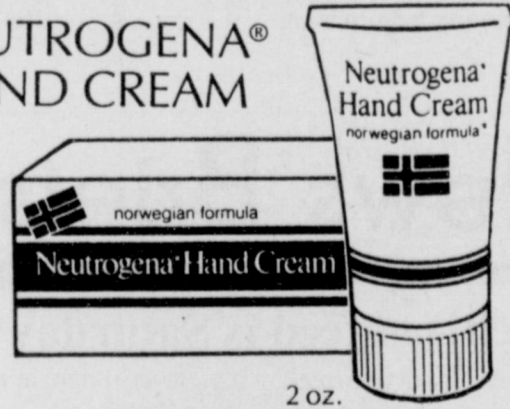
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### FFA Booster Club plans activities

Celeste said that most of her activities are family related, but she also likes to work with wood crafts and do toile painting. She is a member of Amity Study Club.

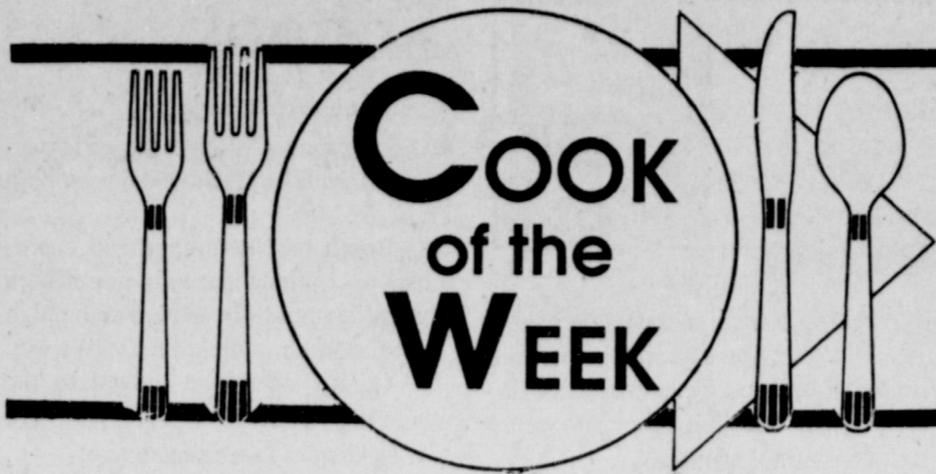

#### Cherry Salad

1 can cherry pie filling  
1 can (flat) crushed pineapple, drained  
1 cup small marshmallows  
1 cup chopped pecans  
1 can angel flake coconut  
1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1 large bowl Cool Whip

Combine:  
2 cups sugar  
1 stick oleo  
1/2 cup shortening

Beat in 5 egg yolks, 1 at a time. Alternately add:  
2 cups flour  
1 cup buttermilk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
Add:  
1 can angel flake coconut  
1 tsp. soda

Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into mixture. Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 3 - 8" layers or 2 - 9" layers.

#### Icing

8 oz. cream cheese  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 stick oleo  
1/2 cup nuts  
1 box powdered sugar  
1/2 cup coconut (optional)  
Mix together and spread between layers and over cake.

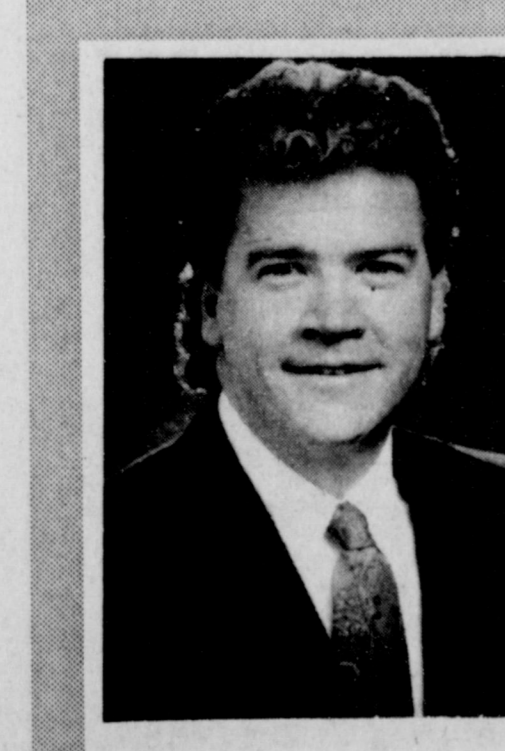

As I See It

If you are still leasing your telephone from AT&T or any other outfit, let me offer a suggestion.

Buy your own. They don't cost that much, and you can certainly save yourself a lot of trouble in the future.

When we opened the Leader office more than two decades ago, it was a standard deal: you leased your telephones. They weren't available any other way, that I know of. It was all part of the deal you had with Southwestern Bell Telephone.

But, when the courts forced the separation of AT&T from Bell, we all started paying a monthly lease fee for the telephones, which AT&T continued to own.

Things rocked on that way, around the office, until this year. In fact, I had even displaced the leased phones with some I had purchased at Parkway, and just never did anything with them.

Sending them back to AT&T was just something I always planned to get around to doing, some day.

Well, in January, that day came. I made up my mind to turn back the phones after receiving a notice that the per-phone fee was increasing by 95 cents.

Actually, I had half-heartedly tried to call the number that the company has on its bill three or four times earlier, but became impatient when asked to hold for an operator to answer.

But on Jan. 10, I made up my mind I would wait them out.

After more than six minutes of listening to taped music, recorded sales pitches and being thanked for holding on and asked to hold a little longer, I got the operator. Her name was Debra.

The operator was very courteous, and asked that I simply take the phones over to a place in Parker Square Shopping Center, so they could be shipped off.

I replied that a utility person had brought the phones here, when they were installed, and I had been paying for them all these years, so I wasn't of a mind to drive to Wichita Falls for the company's convenience.

Actually, I did say I would take them to the place, if they would pay me mileage for a 26-mile round trip.

Nope, that wasn't what they did. I could either take them at my own expense, or they would be glad to send me postage bags to mail their return.

That sounded good to me. So I hung up, satisfied. Well, sort of. When I asked her if the telephone call ended the contract on that day, she said it didn't, and they would have to have those valuable pieces of equipment safely in their hands before the contract was cancelled.

Okay, I said. And I went ahead and mailed in my lease payment for January. And, giving the company the benefit of being so large and cumbersome, I did the same in February.

But when the March bill arrived, and still no mailing bags, I balked. I started making a collection of bills, and other related mailings.

Some poor and unsuspecting salesman named Fred Moore called me Mar. 25, to ask if I'd like to discuss AT&T installing new, state-of-the-art telephone equipment in the office.

Well, I unloaded on him, explaining he was the first contact I had with anyone from that giant conglomerate since my Jan. 10 call.

He assured me he had nothing to do with that department, but offered to get

in touch with someone who could help me.

Somewhat later, I had a call from a woman in a business office somewhere, asking if there was a problem and why I hadn't paid my bill.

I unloaded on her, also. And was told that wasn't her department, but if I would just turn in those phones, or have them mailed in, the problem would be resolved.

I said I'd already gone through that call-in bit, and wasn't about to do it again. If they wanted their dudgum phones, they could send me those mail-in bags.

I failed to document the date of that call.

But I got another Sept. 18, from another woman wanting to know why I wasn't being current with my payments.

Once again, I went through my routine of explanation, and said withholding my payments was my only way

of reaching someone in the company.

This one, however, had a solution. If I'd just hang on for a couple of minutes, she'd get me an operator who would take care of my problem.

It was a full couple of minutes, but the new gal asked me what she could do for me. And I told her. She said she would get those bags right out to me.

Well, I got my mailing bags. They arrived Friday, Oct. 2. They were filled and delivered to the post office the following Monday.

I still haven't paid those bills I was sent since February's last payment. Nor do I intend to.

And to save yourself aggravation, I suggest you get started turning in your leased telephones right away. You might get it completed by mid-1993.

An additional point: what you will pay in lease payments in six months will purchase a very good telephone from the folks at Parkway.

Police investigating theft

Police are continuing their investigation of the theft of a newspaper rack, reported early last Thursday morning.

The rack, believed to have held between \$300 and \$350 in the coin slot, was taken from in front of K&K Food Store on Johnson Road.

Officers later found the rack, which was valued at \$350, completely demolished, near Bell Road, about a quarter of a mile south of the railroad tracks.

Police arrested a 38-year-old Iowa Park man for the second time in two weeks, on a charge of public intoxication.

Jerry Lee Zunk was taken into custody at 1:57 p.m. Tuesday, while walking along North Jackson.

Zunk was arrested Sept. 26 on a similar charge. He was released after both arrests on a personal recognizance bond, according to the police blotter.

Police were called to the junior high school football field concession stand Tuesday afternoon, after it was determined entry into the building had

been forced.

Nothing was determined to have been taken, according to the report.

An 18-year-old driver, who had been stopped in the 1300 block of South FM 368 late Thursday night, was cited on a charge of minor in possession.

James Michael Winkler was stopped on a traffic violation at 11:57 p.m., according to the report. While talking with the driver, the officer saw the end of a gun sticking out from under a seat, and asked permission to search the vehicle.

After receiving permission, it was determined the gun was actually an air rifle.

However, some unopened cans of beer were found, and they and several other items were confiscated.

Winkler was able to have all the items except the beer returned the following day.

A list of items held overnight included \$41 in currency, \$75 in rolled coins, a set of handcuffs, an ice chest, a set of Tarot cards and a Satanic bible.

City meeting set Monday

The city council is expected to join with the county and other municipalities of the county, in a plan of action should a disaster ever strike here.

The ordinance will be considered when the council meets at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

The program includes mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery phase of comprehensive emergency management.

Iowa Park is the only city yet to adopt the program, according to Gary Jones, city administrator.

A similar program was put into action locally, following the tornado in Wichita Falls. Various committees of responsibilities were named and courses of action planned. Meetings were held.

However, Jones said an ordinance was never officially signed and put into the books.

Under the joint agreement, emergency agencies of cities not affected by

a disaster would be available to the areas that were hit by something such as a tornado.

Another ordinance aldermen will consider is one pertaining to resolving a drainage problem on property owned by the Apex Land Corporation.

Bids for two possible purchases will be considered, one on a grass mower and the other on a brush chipper.

Mayor Wayne House's veto of a proposal to waive ordinance requirements for the city administrator to reside in the city also is on the agenda.

When the council voted 4-1 last week to approve the waiver, the mayor immediately announced he would veto the action.

Two "paper work" actions are on the agenda, one for the purchase of a piece of equipment from the state, a gradeall for \$5,300, and the other concerning dedication of \$3,000 monthly in the sewer improvement fund.

Billy Thomas - 7th and 8th girls basketball/assist high school or junior high track, \$2,000.

Board members approved a proposal to continue allowing junior high football games to be played at the high school stadium, unless the field is wet.

Games would be moved to the junior high stadium, if play on the varsity field were to cause damage.

Bill Spears, president of Energy Education, Inc., and former Wichita Falls school board member, explained his energy-saving program, if approved, would be implemented, at no coast to the school district.

He explained his firm's fees, which would amount to \$93,600 over a four-year period, would be collected from the savings of budgeted expenditures.

In fact, he said, should the savings not be realized, he would write out a check for what the district might lose.

Spears, who made a similar offer to Iowa Park trustees several years ago, said the local district would experience a savings over a seven-year period of \$278,548.

The firm has been contracted by school districts as small as 150 pupils, to several thousands, among which are

Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, trustees were told.

The district has done a good job of conserving energy over the past few years, because of its own program, and spends less than most other districts.

"We contractually agree to save you more than we charge, and in areas on each anniversary, where you have not saved more than you spent, we will write you a check. No taxpayer dollars will be involved," Spears said.

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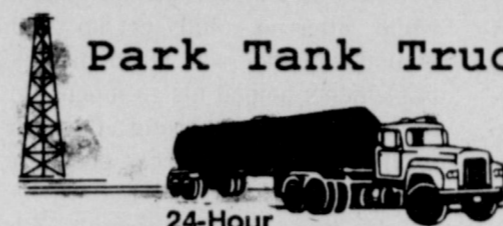
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**Hawks break the ice with 42-18 win over 'Rockets**

The Hawks broke a five-game losing skein Friday night, defeating Wellington 42-18.

It was the first victory for Iowa Park since their next-to-last game of the 1991 season, against Breckenridge. Besides posting their first win of the season, it also was the first for the Mean Green since Robert Clensay was named head coach.

While some may have felt the Skyrockets were not worthy opponents and "just scheduled to bolster Iowa Park's record," it's still a fact that Wellington had not lost a regular season contest in two and a half years. In addition, the Skyrockets were the last team to defeat the Memphis Cyclones, who continued on to take the state A title.

Friday's game meant a lot to the Skyrockets, because the Hawks had been chosen as their homecoming game rivals.

The homecoming crowd had a lot to cheer about early on, as the 'Rockets put the first points on the scoreboard, to lead 6-0 with 7:18 remaining in the initial period.

That touchdown came on their second possession. After two incomplete passes, they connected on a 52-yarder, when the Hawk secondary allowed the receiver to get at least 10 yards past them for the easy score.

At that point, it looked a lot like the previous week's game all over again. Just not as quick. Iowa Park opened the game by kicking off, and drew a pair of 15-yard penalties before the first play was ever run. Less than a minute later, Iowa Park's third major penalty was chalked off.

Hawk fans got into the game shortly after Wellington scored, however. Four plays after the kickoff, quarterback Jason Miller skirted his right end, dodged a pair of would-be tacklers 17 yards downfield, and sprinted to the end zone. The play covered 63 yards.

Don Ellis put Iowa Park ahead then, by kicking the first of seven extra points.

Miller scored again, with 1:11 left in the first quarter, on a 10-yard sprintout around his left end. The play capped a 65-yard drive that was highlighted by a Mark de la Rosa 26-yard run.

The Mean Green defense forced the hosts to punt again, after three plays failed to pick up a first down. The drive, which covered 52 yards, ended when Miller hit Brent Brown with a perfect pass as he crossed the goal line. The play covered 32 yards.

Wellington was able to mount its next scoring drive when a roughing the punter penalty gave the Skyrockets a first down on the Hawk 46. The score, set up by a 22-yard pass, was on a 15-yard run.

The Hawks came right back to score again, with 14 seconds remaining until halftime. The 80-yard drive ended on a one-yard plunge by de la Rosa, who had caught a 22-yard pass to set up the play.

Iowa Park scored twice more in the third quarter. But one was unconventional.

Unable to pick up a first down after the second half kickoff, Tony Lozipone shanked his punt out of bounds on the Hawk 45. Wellington had a 12-yard gainer. And then a pitch was bobbled, Hawk tackle Ralph Dillard picked it up on the 37 and raced the distance, with a convoy of blockers, to the end zone.

The balance of the contest was played with Lozipone at quarterback. Miller injured an ankle on the second play of the half, and never returned to action.

Iowa Park's final score was an 11-yard run around left end by de la Rosa, to cap a 63-yard drive.

Wellington's "mighty might", junior

quarterback Clifton Burns, scored his second touchdown of the game early in the final period, on a 41-yard sprint. He had also thrown the other TD pass. Burns also played on defense, slicing through blockers to tackle Miller at least four times for losses.

Miller, besides completing four of seven pass attempts for 72 yards, finished the evening with 122 yards on 19 carries. de la Rosa, who matched Miller's scoring output, carried only 14 times for 89 yards.

The game, especially the second half, was a big one for Stan Tigrett. The junior had never been handed the ball in a varsity contest. But he got it 19 times against the 'Rockets, and picked up 81 yards.

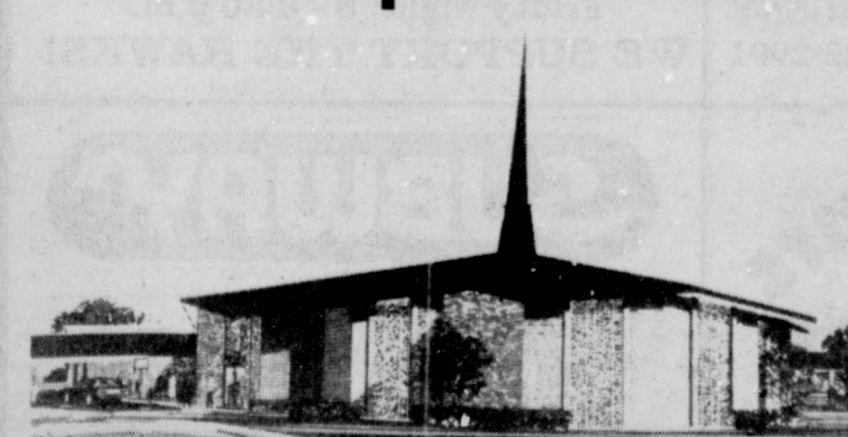

In November of 1987, Darrell E. Lausch learned that his name had been engraved in "The Wall," the monument to America's soldiers who died in Vietnam. Darrell Lausch was very much alive, but his name is on the monument. It is a mistake that cannot be corrected. It is "Etched In Stone."

"See to it that no one comes short of the grace of God; that no root of bitterness springing up causes trouble; and by it many be defiled; that there be no immoral or godless person like Esau, who sold his own birthright for a single meal for you know that even afterwards, when he desired to inherit the blessing, he was rejected, for he found no place for repentance, though he sought it with tears." (Hebrews 12:15-17)

Some mistakes are like Esau's mistakes; the mistakes cannot be undone! A high school student becomes drunk, has a car wreck, and is paralyzed from the waist down. One irresponsible act is etched in stone for the rest of his life.

In a moment of passion a young person loses their innocence. The youth can be forgiven, but lost virginity cannot be restored. Others forget their marriage vows in a moment of passion. They can obtain forgiveness, but faithfulness to those marriage vows is gone forever!

A person may spend five, ten or twenty years resisting the Lord before becoming a Christian. They are saved, but wasted years are etched in stone. Opportunities to influence children, friends, and others are gone forever and cannot be reclaimed.

We can be forgiven of any sin we might commit if we are willing to repent. However, some consequences of our failures cannot be undone or fixed. Think carefully before you act! It is better to think twice than to regret forever!

If you desire to change your relationship with the Lord, it is not too late. Maybe you've etched a lot of unfortunate things in stone. These things cannot all be undone, but they can be forgiven if we repent and obey God.

## Give the kids a chance

Kids, Sports, Parents

Well, here we are "parents," and our kids are ready to try their hand at soccer, baseball, football, etc. But wait! We are going to the games and our kids aren't getting to play! Did we invest \$100.00 in equipment just to watch our kids get splinters in their pants from sitting on the bench, and to see their self esteem slide as they realize they aren't good enough to help their team win the game? How soon will we be dealing with kids who want to quit because the game is no fun, only to turn to other options to find something to do that makes them feel good about themselves, or to other kids who will accept them, like the drug and alcohol gang?

What a shame! Sports are supposed to be fun and stimulating. What a shame that kids are discouraged at an early age from playing sports when it is such a good learning experience -- or could be if the theme wasn't always WIN, WIN, WIN!

I read an article a couple of weeks ago that raised the question: "Do kids have as much fun playing football as we did?" I don't think so! Society and some parents have put such an emphasis on winning that it's hard for kids to go out and simply have fun playing the game.

Kids who are only getting to watch the "good" kids play don't know if the game is fun. They need a piece of the action, too. Many of these kids become so frustrated they decide to quit before their skills are developed, and many of their parents become frustrated because they take their kids faithfully to practice day after day, but never get to watch them play at game time.

Many of these kids, who aren't good enough to help the team win, could become Iowa Park's top varsity athletes when they are older, but because of a poor experience at a young age, they will no longer be interested in sports. Those early days of bench-warming, play a significant role in squelching their identity as an achiever.

Between the ages of six and seven, kids are establishing their identity as to who they are and what they can become, and I believe they should be given every chance to develop healthy identities without pressure from parents or coaches. Let them find which sport is their niche, then let them develop those

particular skills by involvement in the game, win or lose.

I was recently interviewed for a teaching, coaching position in Wichita Falls, and the interviewer asked me this question: "I'm a parent of a rather small thirteen-year-old boy. He isn't very good, but he wants to play football more than anything. What kind of experience is he going to get out of your football program?" My reply was (which is why I wrote this article) that her child may not start the game, may not play three-quarters or even half the game, but that he would get enough playing time to know that he was part of the team.

The interviewer's next question was about winning and if that was everything to me as a coach. My reply was that there is always going to be a winner and a loser, and winning is the goal, but more important is teaching kids to do the best they can do.

Kids learn a lot more through sports than the numbers on the score board. We all need to learn this. The Hawks have lost the last four ball games. Did we, as fans and parents, lose our respect for the players and their coaches just because the score board wasn't in our favor? We are often a bunch of hypocrites: when we're winning, the kids are great and their coaches are great, but when we're losing, the kids are slow, too small, and no good, and the coaches need to be replaced.

The way I see it, the Hawks have played four good ball games and have been competitive in all of them. The score board wasn't representative of what they learned: respect, discipline, camaraderie, responsibility, loyalty, optimism, personality, ambition, the desire to improve -- all the things that help a person become a success in life. Winning is great (it's in the blood to win at everything we do), but knowing we've done our best -- win or lose -- is more important. That's a victory in itself!

It is my opinion that all kids up to the age of 15 or 16 should be given the opportunity to participate in sports. The baseball and soccer programs in Iowa Park are excellent, because they understand the concept that all kids should get a chance to show-off for their parents, that they're on a team, having a great time. Parents should also get the chance to see the excitement in their kids' eyes when they get that chance to

play, to watch them perform before it's too late.

What do I mean by too late? The years of elementary age football, baseball, soccer, etc., leagues are short-lived. When these kids get into junior high and high school, the athletes that aren't very good are weeded out to find something else to do. When it's time to play for the Iowa Park varsity teams, the better players have earned their right to be selected. By this time, kids pretty well know their identity, abilities, and whether or not they are good enough to play.

I don't have a child this age yet, but I am a Physical Education teacher/coach, and have worked with kids of various ages. I know it will be important to me to see the excitement and glow on my child's face when he gets into the game. I also know that his athletic career could be short-lived. That makes it all the more important that he gets to play while he can. He won't have to play the whole game or half of it, but I hope he will be able to play enough to show his mom and dad that he's on a team and to know that we are there watching him play.

It is important to me, as well as other parents in Iowa Park, that the kids are having fun while it's their time to have fun. It's no fun sitting on the sidelines, never getting a chance to play. And it's not fair to the parents who have to scrape to find the \$50-\$100 necessary to properly uniform their kids, then take time off to watch the games to show their support and never see their kids in the game. That's not right! Make more teams if there are too many players to work into the game.
