# Council studys course of action for the future

The city council met in a called course of action on what to do with in the operation. garbage in the future.

After hearing six alternatives, offered by Administrator Gary Jones, aldermen agreed that the best solution would be to form a corporation of municipalities to operate one landfill.

At issue is a mandate handed down Agency, governing how landfills will in them, and provisions to protect against Jones said. contamination of water 30 years after they are closed.

The mandate is entitled "Sub-title D," and it is to be overseen in Texas by the Water Quality Control Board. It is to be put into practice Oct. 9, 1993.

While provisions of Sub-title D have been published, changes which yet to be published.

Jones pointed out that landfills date and be subject to all regulations.

As an example, the monthly rate, not including the cost of collection, would be \$21.16 per customer, just to operate the landfill under Sub-title D. The cost to bury one ton of trash was projected to be \$118.35.

Jones' alternatives included: 1) join a multi-city corporation to operate the landfill and share its costs; 2) form a three-city corporation with Vernon and Electra to share one landfill cost; 3) go to the regional landfill concept; 4) contract with a private corporation to dispose of the garbage; 5) sell the city landfill to a private firm to operate; 6) stay in the landfill business alone.

However, that city, which is currently accepting garbage from other cities, figures to double its price in the spring, to charge \$34-\$36 per ton.


The per-ton cost is projected to be \$6.73, should Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Vernon form a tri-cities corporation.

Iowa Park has approximately 22 acres of available space, should the council decide to continue operating its own landfill. On the basis of current tonnage produced locally, that would equate to about 18 years of landfill life.

But, to continue its operation, and meet Sub-title D regulations, expenditure of \$412,000 for equipment and monitors, gas venting and engineering would be necessary, and then the cost of operation is estimated at \$647,593 per

And that does not include a \$1 million cleanup fund that is required, should it become necessary 30 years after the pit was closed, to clean it up in case a water contamination complaint

Whichever path the city takes to do away with its residents' trash, a decision must be made and in operation by next

# Annual Hawk-Lion battle slated Friday at Vernon

"I wish we could start the same 11 players two weeks in a row." - Rick Barker, assistant

The short-handed, hobbled Hawks will travel to Vernon Friday night to take on the state-ranked Lions in the Dist. 4-AAA opener for the two clubs.

Kickoff time will be 7:30 p.m. All conference games will be played 30 minutes earlier than were the nonconference contests.

Most noticable Hawk who will not see action tomorrow will be quarterback Jason Miller. He sprained an ankle on the second play of the third quarter last week at Wellington.

Miller's running ability is a key to

the Hawks' veer offense. He had run for series. two touchdowns, bringing his total to six for the season, and thrown for another before limping to the sidelines.

Tony Lozipone is slated to be the starting quarterback. He will be backed up by Brent Brown.

Two weeks ago, the Mean Green defense was hampered with the loss of two-year starting linebacker T.J. Bean, who broke his arm against Memphis and is out for the season.

The Hawk backfield will be bolstered with the return of Don Ellis and Chris Williams, however.

Ellis, who saw action only as a kicker last week, has been nursing an ankle injury. Williams didn't suit out against the Skyrockets, having a pulled leg muscle.

There are question marks by the names of two starting linemen, Mark Tatum and Scott McNeely.

Tatum has been slowed by a knee injury he received against Memphis, and McNeely has a nagging leg muscle that has been tight from being hit at Wellington.

Both could see limited action at Vernon, coaches said.

This will be the 23rd consecutive meeting between the Hawks and Lions. Because they have won the past five years, the Lions hold the edge in the series, 12-9-1.

Not since Iowa Park knocked off Vernon by a narrow 5-0 score in 1986 have Hawk fans seen their favorites come out on top in the long-running

Even in 1987, when Iowa Park won the district and advanced to the area level in the playoffs, Vernon was the victor, 16-14. They weren't in the same district that year.

Coach Leo Brittain, the dean of district coaches, carries a roster loaded with 19 seniors, 18 juniors and only one sophomore.

Because of that depth, only one player, Benny Cherry, starts both offensively and defensively. The 185pound senior plays wing and short safety.

Vernon is ranked second behind Southlake Carroll in virtually every poll that ranks AAA teams in the state.

And it's not surprising. While extending their season record to 5-0, the Lions have handily defeated teams from larger schools, outscoring them 187-55.

They knocked off Altus, Okla. 48-22, Wichita Falls High 24-8, Burkburnett 46-0, Pampa 42, 12, and Wichita Falls Hirschi 27-13.

Besides being a mature club, the Lions are also big. There are nine players on the roster who weigh 200 or more

Among those heavyweights is a running back, Dexter Butler, who stands 6-2 and tips the scales at 215. Besides being a bruising runner, he has enough speed to have scored on several long

One of the Lions' juniors is their quarterback, Chris Enloe, who earned the starting position last season.





If you are still leasing your telephone from AT&T or any other outfit, let me offer a suggestion.

Buy your own. They don't cost that much, and you can certainly save yourself a lot of trouble in the future.

When we opened the Leader office more than two decades ago, it was a standard deal: you leased your telephones. They weren't available any other way, that I know of. It was all part of the deal you had with Southwestern Bell Telephone.

But, when the courts forced the separation of AT&T from Bell, we all started paying a monthly lease fee for the telephones, which AT&T continued to own.

Things rocked on that way, around the office, until this year. In fact, I had even displaced the leased phones with some I had purchased at Parkway, and just never did anything with them.

Sending them back to AT&T was just something I always planned to get around to doing, some day.

Well, in January, that day came. I made up my mind to turn back the phones after receiving a notice that the per-phone fee was increasing by 95

Actually, I had half-heartedly tried to call the number that the company has on its bill three or four times earlier, but became impatient when asked to hold for an operator to answer.

But on Jan. 10, I made up my mind I would wait them out.

After more than six minutes of listening to taped music, recorded sales pitches and being thanked for holding on and asked to hold a little longer, I got the operator. Her name was Debra.

The operator was very courteous, and asked that I simply take the phones over to a place in Parker Square Shopping Center, so they could be shipped off.

I replied that a utility person had brought the phones here, when they were installed, and I had been paying for them all these years, so I wasn't of a mind to drive to Wichita Falls for the company's convenience.

Actually, I did say I would take them to the place, if they would pay me milage for a 26-mile round trip.

Nope, that wasn't what they did. I could either take them at my own expense, or they would be glad to send me postage bags to mail their return.

That sounded good to me. So I hung up, satisfied. Well, sort of. When I asked her if the telephone call ended the contract on that day, she said it didn't, and they would have to have those valuable pieces of equipment safely in their hands before the contract was cancelled.

Okay, I said. And I went ahead and mailed in my lease payment for January. And, giving the company the benefit of being so large and cumbersome, I did the same in February.

But when the March bill arrived, and still no mailing bags, I balked. I started making a collection of bills, and other related mailings.

Some poor and unsuspecting salesman named Fred Moore called me Mar. 25, to ask if I'd like to discuss AT&T installing new, state-of-the-art telephone equipment in the office.

Well, I unloaded on him, explaining he was the first contact I had with anyone from that giant conglomerate since my Jan. 10 call.

He assured me he had nothing to do with that department, but offered to get

Iowa Park trustees several years ago, said the local district would experience a savings over a seven-year period of \$278,548.

The firm has been contracted by school districts as small as 150 pupils, to several thousands, among which are Wichita Falls and Burkburnett, trustees were told.

The district has done a good job of conserving energy over the past few years, because of its own program, and spends less than most other districts.

"We contractually agree to save you more than we charge, and in areas on each anniversary, where you have not saved more than you spent, we will write you a check. No taxpayer dollars will be involved," Spears said.

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# Retired farmer concentrates on toy tractor collection

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By MYRNA SMITH

"I have more toys than a lot of kids do," Clarence Mahler said with pride in his voice as he stood looking at his display of toy tractors and other farm implements.

They are squeezed side by side on five shelves of a large cabinet in his living room, that his daughter Aquilla Carillo-Miranda got for him. Aquilla lives in Iowa Park, and is the owner of Homestead Ceramics.

Tractors have figured prominently in Clarence Mahler's life many years. But, he has been collecting toy tractors just a little more than six years.

Farming has been his life. The toy tractors also have figured prominently in his life. His hobby of collecting these have helped him to overcome a serious illness, along with his "never give up" attitude to not let cancer and heart problems get the best of him.

I didn't attempt to count all of those cute exact replicas of the big farm machinery, but he knows he has 130 164s. He also has some 116s and 132s.

In addition he has grain carts, anhydrous ammonia tanks, crawler tractors, combines, and industrial equipment, such as motor graders, scrapers, BCH-2 bulldozers, and some trucks.

He has one tractor with a plow attached to the front and a planter hooked up to the back. And, he has a four-row cotton picker, water tanks and individual planters.

Back of the implements on one shelf, Mahler has an old sign that reads, "McCormick-Deering Farmall

He has small combines, old combines and some newer models with augurs. On one shelf he has an old baler and a grain drill that belonged to his son, Barry, when he was small.

Barry, who is farm service director for KWFT, now does all of the farming on the almost 500 acres of land. Part of the time he has his two nephews with him. His daddy said proudly, "He's a go-getter," referring to Barry.

Wherever he goes, Mahler makes the implement dealerships to see if he can find anything different to add to his collection.

He also goes to swap shops. He always tries to make the ones that are held in Gainesville where he can trade some of his duplicates for ones he doesn't have.

Friends and family add to his collection. His grandchildren know almost every model he has and when they see one he doesn't have they get it for him.

His daughter said there have been times she has seen one she thought she would get for him and if her children are with her, they say, "Oh, grandpa has one of those."

The Mahlers have made several trips with the Wichita County Young Farmers. In his collection is one Mrs. Mahler found when they made a trip to Indiana with the group. It is an old one with steel wheels and lugs.

When she saw that one, she knew "Clarence had to have it."

On the bottom shelf is a red barn and house and a silo that Aquilla made for him. She also found miniature furniture for the house. He set the furniture in the house just like he wanted it and used toothpicks and Que Tips to help him glue it in place. A friend built a miniature porch swing for his house. He has rigged up tiny lights so he can turn lights on in the house and barn.

So, how have these "toys" helped Mahler to come back as far as he has after a long year of having a series of debilitating illnesses?

They have functioned as therapy to help his "fighting spirit" in the long process of gaining back his strength.

Mahler's wife and daughter, Aquilla say they think they spent almost the entire year of 1991 in the hospital and neither of them were

Mahler has had heart problems 20 years. He had his first attack in about 1989. Then in January 1991 the doctors found he had cancer in his left lung and started him on radiation. At the end of the treatments, they thought the cancer was in remission.

Then on June 1, his birthday, he suffered a heart attack, so it was back to the hospital. In July his left lung collapsed and he was hooked up to two pumps.

A short time after he got to return home from that bout, his right lung collapsed and he was hospitalized again. This time for two months, from September until the middle of November.

That time, his family and doctors did not think he would live. His wife and daughter, Aquilla, sat in the waiting room so they could go in to see him every four hours.

One time when they went in he was lying in a fetal position and as they left his room they felt it was just a matter of time until they would be approached by someone to tell them he was gone.

The next four hours was up and they could go back to his room. When they went in he had broth and Jello on a tray and was complaining about the food. "I don't know how they expect anyone to get well or gain any strength on broth and Jello," he fussed.

Two days after he got to go home in November, one of Aquilla's sons and her daughter, Clare (Mahler's namesake) were in an automobile accident, so it was back to the hospital again for her.

Mahler could not get out of bed, but he insisted his wife go check on the wreck and see how bad it looked. He also instructed her to take the Polaroid camera and take pictures so he could see what he thought about it. Until then he had not wanted to be left alone. But, that was different. that was his grandkids.

Mrs. Mahler said "1991 was a terrible year. We are just very fortunate that we still have him.'

After he was discharged from the hospital, Mahler could not walk from

the bed to the bathroom. Mrs. Mahler gave him his baths and took care of him all of the time he was bedfast. After a few weeks he could manage with help to walk as far as the bathroom. Then after another period of time he could get to the shower.

He was very nervous for quite a while after he could get up and around and that was when his toy implements helped his so much. He began to dust them, using a Que Tip for the hard to get to places, and rearranging them on the shelves.

He kept himself occupied with the tractors for long periods of time, gaining strength and dexterity in his hands. And it kept his mind off of himself.

One time when he was hunting for something to keep his mind off of his problems and his hands busy, Mahler built a miniature hay baler from angle iron. He welded two pieces of angle iron together and drilled holes in the sides to run the wire through so he could tie the bales. He made small bales from coastal bermuda grass.

On the fireplace mantel is a display of several trophies that Mahler won in tractor pulls, representing first, second and third places. He entered most of the tractor pulls in the area, and always the Wichita County Young Farmers tractor pulls in the

Mahler was raised in Archer County, near Holliday, and has been farming since he was 18 years old. His father died when he was a young man, so it was a case of him having to start farming.

While his father was living Mahler worked with a thrashing crew in the summer. He made \$1.50 for a 16-hour day. He said the only reason he made that instead of the \$1 a day the other workers were paid was because his daddy let him have a team and wagon so he could haul bundles to the thrasher.

Mahler began reminiscing. "I got up every morning before sun-up and fed and watered the team. I would start at dawn and drive the 20 miles from Holliday to a place that is now Lake Arrowhead where we were working. Then I would work until sundown".

When he followed the thrashing crew, he remembered, "We didn't get to sleep in an air-conditioned house, and many times I slept just on a quilt on the floor.

Mahler took a break from farming when he served in the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II. He was stationed in Waco.

Mrs. Mahler worked at Consolidated in Fort Worth during the war from 1942-45, helping build B-34s and B-36s. She and Clarence were married Dec. 7, 1945, when he was transferred to San Antonio where they spent the first year of their mar-

They both laughed when they recalled he was married in his uniform and he put it on when they celebrated their 25th wedding anniversary. Their friends were surprised that it still fit him. In fact it may have been a little large on him.

But, his love of farming never left him and as soon as he was discharged from service, he returned to the farm.

In 1965 the Mahlers bought 492 acres of land north of Iowa Park on Bell Road and moved here from Holliday. They gave up seven acres of the land to Aquilla for her home.

He raised Hereford cattle for many years, both in Archer County and after they moved here. Now he has changed to raising stocker cattle. They raise wheat, and for the first time this year they planted some cot-

Mahler displayed his interest in all that was going on outside during the interview. After he talked a few minutes, he just had to go to the front door and see what Barry was doing. You just knew how he would have loved to be out there doing it himself.

But he doesn't deny himself all of the enjoyment, even though he may have worried his family when he first began getting active about six months ago.

He has overhauled a Ford tractor and painted two four-wheel drive and one two-wheel drive tractors. In addition he hauls anhydrous ammonia and then returns the empty tanks when Barry gets through with them. He continues to maintain an active interest in the farming operations. After all, someone who has been farming the major portion of 55 years, doesn't give up easily.

Oh yes, and he still has to come in for coffee every morning with the group at Harvey's. "I have to catch up on the news," he says.

When they moved here they bought an old barracks building at Sheppard AFB and built their brick house that sits on a hill. It has three bedrooms, two baths, a family room, kitchen and dining area and a living and dining room.

He said, "Labor was cheap at the time and we used farm labor and hired one carpenter to build the house."

Mrs. Mahler supplied the information that she knew who pulled the nails. "Before I was through with that job I decided who ever built those buildings must have been paid by the nail. I never saw so many nails in my

Mrs. Mahler worked for the Wichita Falls State Hospital 20 years, and received the highest award one can get. She was a nurses aide and was in charge of one of the wards.

"I even had to deliver a baby one night, because it decided to get there before the doctor or a registered nurse could make it."

She received the award in 1986. It was the Distinguished Service Award

given by The Mental Health Association from the combined hospitals, Sheppard AFB, Red River Hospital and Wichita Falls State Hospital.

The Mahlers have another daughter in addition to Aquilla. She is Darlene Collier, who is account executive for KAUZ-TV, Channel 6. And they have four grandchildren.

In addition to farming, Mahler has been active in farm related activities and when in Holliday he was a member of the Holliday School Board.

He is a member of the board of Farm Bureau, and "Don't laugh," (his words), "but I'm also a member of Wichita County Young Farmers."

He learned that diabetes is the second-leading cause of blindness and the seventh-leading cause of death.

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
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# Hawks break the ice with 42-18 win over 'Rockets

The Hawks broke a five-game losing skein Friday night, defeating Wellington 42-18.

It was the first victory for Iowa Park since their next-to-last game of the 1991 season, against Breckenridge. Besides posting their first win of the season, it also was the first for the Mean Green since Robert Clensay was named head coach.

While some may have felt the Skyrockets were not worthy opponents and "just scheduled to bolster Iowa Park's record," it's still a fact that Wellington had not lost a regular season contest in two and a half years. In addition, the Skyrockets were the last team to defeat the Memphis Cyclones, who continued on to take the state A title.

Friday's game meant a lot to the Skyrockets, because the Hawks had been chosen as their homecoming game rivals.

The homecoming crowd had a lot to cheer about early on, as the 'Rockets put the first points on the scoreboard, to lead 6-0 with 7:18 remaining in the initial period.

That touchdown came on their second possession. After two incomplete passes, they connected on a 52-yarder, when the Hawk secondary allowed the receiver to get at least 10 yards past them for the easy


At that point, it looked a lot like the previous week's game all over again. Just not as quick. Iowa Park opened the game by kicking off, and drew a pair of 15-yard penalties before the first play was ever run. Less than a minute later, Iowa Park's third major penalty was chalked off.

Hawk fans got into the game shortly after Wellington scored, however. Four plays after the kickoff, quarterback Jason Miller skirted his right end, dodged a pair of would-be tacklers 17 yards downfield, and sprinted to the end zone. The play covered 63 yards.

Don Ellis put Iowa Park ahead then, by kicking the first of seven extra points.

Miller scored again, with 1:11 left in the first quarter, on a 10-yard sprintout around his left end. The play capped a 65yard drive that was highlighted by a Mark de la Rosa 26-yard run.

The Mean Green defense forced the hosts to punt again, after three plays failed to pick up a first down. The drive, which covered 52 yards, ended when Miller hit Brent Brown with a perfect pass as he crossed the goal line. The play covered 32 yards.

Wellington was able to mount its next scoring drive when a roughing the punter penalty gave the Skyrockets a first down on the Hawk 46. The score, set up by a 22-yard pass, was on a 15-yard run.

The Hawks came right back to score again, with 14 seconds remaining until halftime. The 80-yard drive ended on a oneyard plunge by de la Rosa, who had caught a 22-yard pass to set up the play.

Iowa Park scored twice more in the third quarter. But one was unconventional.

Unable to pick up a first down after the second half kickoff, Tony Lozipone shanked his punt out of bounds on the Hawk 45. Wellington had a 12-yard gainer. And then a pitch was bobbled, Hawk tackle Ralph Dillard picked it up on the 37 and raced the distance, with a convoy of blockers, to the end zone.

The balance of the contest was played with Lozipone at quarterback. Miller injured an ankle on the second play of the half, and never returned to action.

Iowa Park's final score was an 11yard run around left end by de la Rosa, to cap a 63-yard drive.

Wellington's "mighty might", junior

quarterback Clifton Burns, scored his second touchdown of the game early in the final period, on a 41-yard sprint. He had also thrown the other TD pass. Burns also played on defense, slicing through blockers to tackle Miller at least four times for losses.

I was recently interviewed for a teaching, coaching position in Wichita Falls, and the interviewer asked me this question: "I'm a parent of a rather small thirteen-year-old boy. He isn't very good, but he wants to play football more than anything. What kind of experience is he going to get out of your football program?" My reply was (which is why I wrote this article) that her child may not start the game, may not play threequarters or even half the game, but that he would get enough playing time to know that he was part of the team.

The interviewer's next question was about winning and if that was everything to me as a coach. My reply was that there is always going to be a winner and a loser, and winning is the goal, but more important is teaching kids to do the best they can do.

Kids learn alot more through sports than the numbers on the score board. We all need to learn this. The Hawks have lost the last four ballgames. Did we, as fans and parents, lose our respect for the players and their coaches just because the score board wasn't in our favor? We are often a bunch of hypocrites: when we're winning, the kids are great and their coaches are great, but when we're losing, the kids are slow, too small, and no good, and the coaches need to be replaced.

The way I see it, the Hawks have played four good ballgames and have been competitive in all of them. The score board wasn't representative of what they learned: respect, discipline, camaraderie, responsibility, loyalty, cptimism, personality, ambition, the desire to improve -- all the things that help a person become a success in life. Winning is great (it's in the blood to win at everything we do), but knowing we've done our best -- win or lose -- is more important. That's a victory in itself!

It is my opinion that all kids up to the age of 15 or 16 should be given the opportunity to participate in sports. The baseball and soccer programs in Iowa Park are excellent, because they understand the concept that all kids should get a chance to show-off for their parents, that they're on a team, having a great time. Parents should also get the chance to see the excitement in their kids' eyes when they get that chance to

What do I mean by too late? The years of elementary age football, baseball, soccer, etc., leagues are short-lived. When these kids get into junior high and high school, the athletes that aren't very good are weeded out to find something else to do. By this time, kids pretty well know their identity, abilities, and whether or not they are good enough to

I don't have a child this age yet, but Iam a Physical Education teacher/coach, and have worked with kids of various ages. I know it will be important to me to see the excitement and glow on my child's face when he gets into the game. I also know that his athletic career could be short-lived. That makes it all the more important that he gets to play while he can. He won't have to play the whole game or half of it, but I hope he will be able to play enough to show his mom and dad that he's on a team and to know that we are there watching him

It is important to me, as well as other parents in Iowa Park, that the kids are having fun while it's their time to have fun. It's no fun sitting on the sidelines, never getting a hance to play. And it's not fair to the parents who have to scrape to find the \$50-\$100 necessary to properly uniform their kids, then take time off to watch the games to show their support and never see their kids in the game. That's not right! Make more teams if there are too many players to work into the game.
