Lower telephone bills due rural residents

It will be a belated Christmas present, but one appreciated none the less for the residents of the Kamay/Valley View area.

Extended local calling for telephone customers of the Kamay exchange is to go into effect sometime in January.

Announcement of the Public Utility Commission's granting interim approval of extended calling was made during an informal meeting Tuesday evening by Shirley Cravens and Woody Gossom.

The new monthly rate for residents of the exchange area will be \$3.50 per month and \$7 per line per month for businesses.

Additionally, residents on the Tel-Assistance Program will pay \$1.23 per month.

Mrs. Cravens, who coordinated the effort to achieve the change, said she and her committee members had begun working on the project in January of 1993.

Through the efforts of that committee, residents of the exchange area were able to cast their votes so the PUC would know their desires.

The extended calling program was made possible by actions taken by the Texas legislature.

Precinct One County Commissioner Gossom served as the committee's liaison with the state office.

Service should begin at the new rate in January, after computer and equipment modifications have been made, Gossom said.

GTE is reacting to over 150 such petitions throughout the state. Some exchanges are not able to be converted

Hawks at Electra Friday

When Iowa Park travels to Electra to take on the Tigers Friday night at 7:30, both teams will be looking to improve on last week's offensive showings.

The Hawks fell 36-0 to Burkburnett, a 4-A opponent while Electra dropped a 28-7 decision to Jacksboro. Iowa Park managed only 112 total yards against the Bulldogs which is just six fewer yards than Electra gained against Jacksboro.

"Offensively, we struggled last week," head coach Weldon Nelms said. "We made too many mental mistakes and with our type offense, you can't afford to be in first-and-15 and second-and-long situations and be successful. The kids started to get going late in the game and moved the ball inside their 10 yard line on two occasions, but just couldn't get it over the goal line. Burk ran some inside stunts that gave us some problems, but I thought Corky Petty did a good job running with the football for only his second game at the position.

"I was disappointed in our blocking and in our passing game," Nelms added. "I thought we'd be able to run the ball inside on them some, but we had problems picking up their stunts, and our passing game has got to get better. We have to get better timing and run more disciplined routes to

make things work the way we want."

Defensively, the Hawks played pretty well except for four big plays that led to 28 of Burk's 36 points.

"There were some bright points on defense," Nelms said. "Our secondary did a real good job after looking rough in their last two games, and even on the plays they scored on we were there and just didn't make the play to bring him down. I thought Brandon Green and David Ohm both played exceptionally well for us.

"Overall, I was hoping to be able to stay with them but it turned out to be a snowball effect where we just never got over the first quarter. The kids played hard for all four quarters and didn't let up. That says a lot for their character."

In Friday night's matchup against Electra, it will match two teams that run the same type offense and defense.

The Tigers might be a bit more balanced offensively than the Hawks after their first game. In the Jacksboro game, Electra rushed the ball 28 times and threw it 21 times.

"They are a real balanced ball club," Nelms said. "Right now, their defense is way ahead of their offense. They're not going to beat themselves by making a lot of mistakes. I think the team that makes the fewest mistakes will come out on top. One of the things

going for us is that they have seven

City to consider contract

The city council is to consider turning over its water and sewer line maintenance to a private contractor, when aldermen meet Monday night.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Bids have been received from contractors to take over the maintenance of all sewer and water lines in the city. Those bids will be reviewed during the meeting, and the council will consider authorizing the mayor to execute the contract.

Work at the water and sewer treatment plants is not included in the proposal.

Until this summer, four employees were doing the maintenance work. One of those has quit and the other three have already been assigned to other departments, aldermen were told.

Disturbance results in death

A 34 year old Iowa Park man was fatally wounded in the back yard of his residence Friday night by a police officer after allegedly threatening the officer with a club.

Mark Allen Swanson died in a Wichita Falls hospital shortly after having been transported there by an ambulance.

The case is being investigated by the Wichita County District Attorney's office and is expected to be presented to the county grand jury when it next convenes on Sept. 21.

Sgt. Jack McGuinn was dispatched to a domestic disturbance at a residence in the 300 block of East Lafayette at 10:20 p.m.

The officer was confronted by Swanson, who reportedly was highly intoxicated, at the residence.

A struggle ensued. Swanson is alleged to have armed himself with a long wooden object, believed to have been the leg of a piece of furniture. McGuinn reportedly used his service-

issued club to ward off Swanson, but to no avail.

As the two were in the darkness of the back yard, McGuinn was heard by neighbors to shout at least twice for the victim to drop the club.

And then a single shot rang out. McGuinn immediately called for emergency medical workers and additional police.

Normally, when an officer responds to a domestic disturbance, another officer is available as a backup. One had been called, but almost the entire department's personnel were in the area of the football stadium, where the crowd that attended a game was still dispersing.

Swanson was struck in the lower chest. He was treated at the scene by EMTs of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept.

Once the police arrived at the residence, it was sealed off and an investigation commenced with the assistance of the Department of Public Safety trooper, two investigators from

the Wichita Falls Police Dept. and investigators from the District Attorney's office.

Both Swanson's wife, Cheryl Ann Cook, and his father, Harold, deny the victim had anything in his hand when he was shot.

Swanson was employed by building contractor Jack Witherspoon. McGuinn has been taken off patrol duty during the investigation period and has been assigned to work in the police station.

"We grieve with the family," commented Chief Ray Smock. "It's powerful to us. It affects the department, it affects the citizens. It's just a very tragic, tragic thing."

He continued, "Still, we'll do everything we can to help them (the family). There's just not a whole lot you can say."

Smock admitted he was limited to what he could say to the news media, while the case remains under investigation by the District Attorney's office.

Friday busy for police

In a five-hour period prior to the fatal shooting incident Friday night, police not only had their hands full with a huge football crowd, but also arrested five individuals.

Four of those arrested were on charges of public intoxication, and the fifth was wanted on outstanding warrants both from here and Archer County, according to the police blotter.

At 4:54 p.m., an officer on patrol observed a subject driving in the 100 block of East Alcott whom he knew to have outstanding warrants for his arrest.

David Lee Hayman, 34, was taken into custody and transported to the police station, where he was booked.

Hayman, according to the report, had six warrants issued locally, with fines totaling \$1,136.50.

Additional research determined a warrant for his arrest had been issued by the Archer County Sheriff's Dept., for a motion to revoke probation on a DWI second offense charge.

After paying \$120 on one of his local charges and bonding out on the other five, Hayman was released to an Archer County deputy to be transported to Archer County.

The first arrest for public intoxication was reported at 8:26 p.m., when Matthew Curt Wallace, 36, was taken into custody. He was released the next

morning after posting a \$130 bond.

The other three arrests were of men in one vehicle, at 9:02 p.m. in the 1600 block of Johnson Road.

Those arrested were Russell Alan Klimek, 24, Jonathan Michael Koons, 20, and Billy J. Mills, 17.

Klimek was released after paying a \$28 downpayment on his \$280 fine. Koons paid his fine of \$130. Mills was released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

The trio's vehicle was impounded because it was improperly registered, according to the blotter entry.

A magnetic sign valued at \$50 was reported stolen Monday from a vehicle parked in the 100 block of James drive. It was later found but unusable, police said.

First wedding published in Leader

September 18 will mark the 25th anniversary of the first issue of the Iowa Park Leader. Sept. 13 will mark the 25th wedding anniversary of Jim Bob and Linda Kay Merrick.

The common link between these two events is that the Merrick wedding was the first one received by Bob Hamilton, publisher, to be printed in that first issue of the Leader almost 25 years ago.

Linda Kay Steger of Iowa Park and Jim Bob Merrick of Quana were married in Iowa Park First Christian Church, Sept. 13, 1969.

The Merricks will leave soon for a second honeymoon to an unknown destination. Their first wedding trip was to "Dallas and points of interest in South Texas."

At the time of their marriage, Mrs. Merrick was a junior at West Texas State University in Canyon. Her husband was serving in the U.S. Navy and was awaiting port call to Morocco, North Africa. Soon after their marriage he received his call and she joined him a short time later.

After two years in Morocco, Merrick was returned to the States. He was sent to Washington, D.C. where he was with Naval Security two years,

in charge of personnel and assisting in deprogramming Vietnam prisoners of war. They lived in Alexandria, Va.

Merrick was next stationed in Houston where he was in recruiting three years. After his tour in Houston he was sent to Norfolk, Va., for three years, assigned to the air craft carrier Independence to decode messages.

In 1979 they returned to Iowa

Park where they have since made their home. They have two children, J'Bill, a student at Texas Tech, and Geri, a sophomore in Iowa Park High School.

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As I See It. . .

Well, the day has finally arrived. As of this issue, I am no longer a "newcomer."

You probably never look at the volume and issue number we print on the front page of every issue, but this one just happens to be Vol. 25, No. 52.

That means this is the final issue of our 25th year of publishing the *Iowa Park Leader*.

So what does that have to do with being a newcomer?

Well, you never hear it around town any more. But back in 1969 when we moved here, the old saying was that one is a newcomer in Iowa Park until they've lived here 25 years.

The Hamilton family had loaded into our stationwagon and combed the entire city on Labor Day of 1969, looking for a place to rent.

If you think rentals are tough to find these days, you should have been with us then. The Chamber of Commerce had three addresses for us to try.

One was too small for our seven-member family, one had already been taken, and the third wasn't decent enough to be used as a hen house.

Discouraged, and believing we were destined to have to stay in neighboring Wichita Falls until something became available, we had started on our way home.

But, as we drove down West Magnolia we noticed a man driving a "for rent" sign's stake in the front yard of a house in the 500 block. And sure enough, what he had just fit our needs.

Little were we to know we would live slightly more than a year right next to a man who would some day become the city's mayor -- Wayne House.

But our deal was made to rent the house. We returned to Littlefield and began packing for the move.

Everything was working out. Iowa Park school's starting date had been delayed one week later than scheduled, because the high school building hadn't been completed on time. (In fact, they didn't move into that fine structure until the following February.)

After we got here, we found office space right next to the McClendon Feed Store, just four doors west of where our office is now.

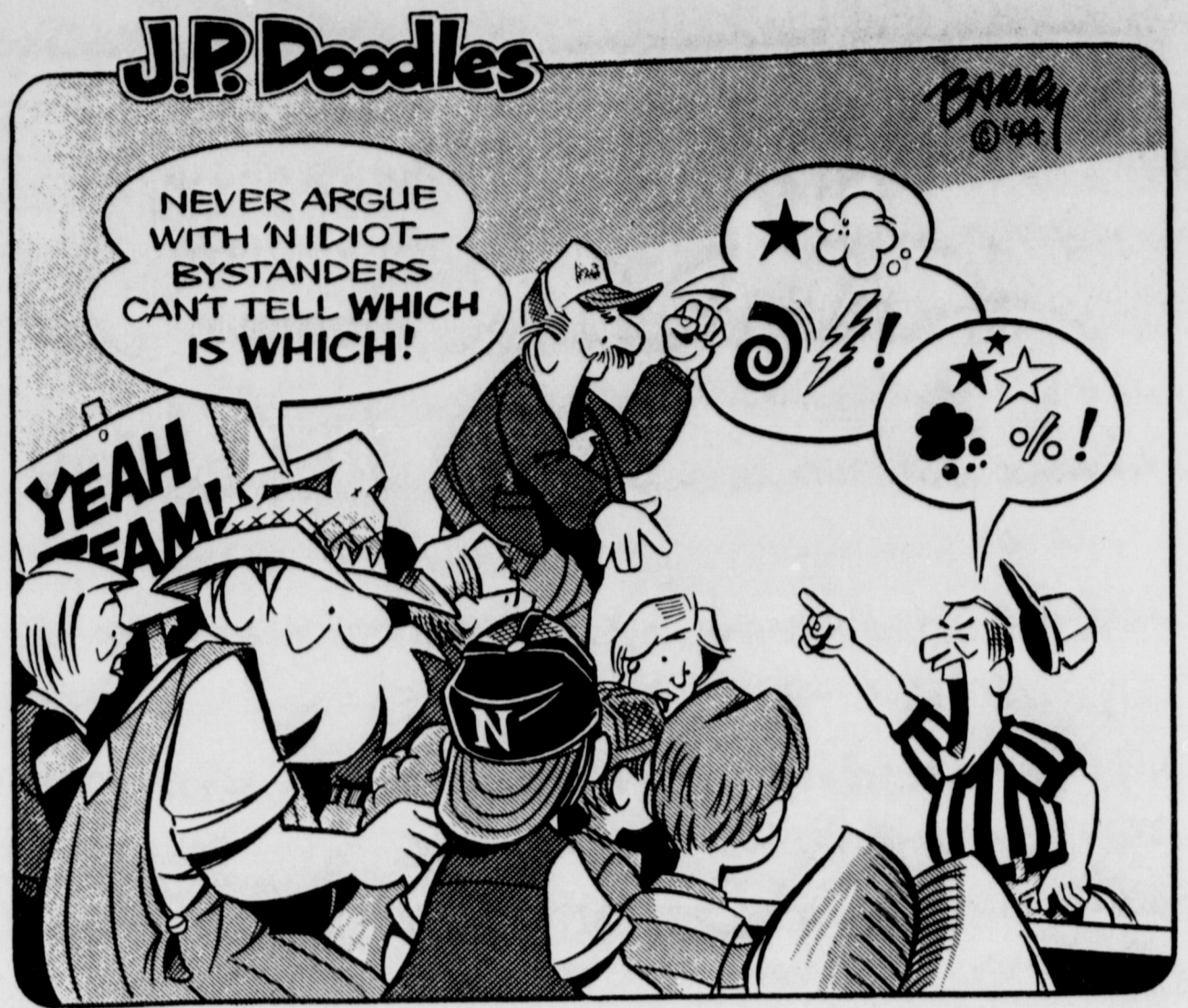
I had to hustle up enough equipment to put out our first issue (part of it I bought in Austin), and hired a typesetter who was the wife of a new coach. She was Annetta Reusch, wife of Earnie, and she is now the journalism instructor at Wichita Falls High.

We were under the gun to get started, for several reasons, but I felt it most important to have an issue that would report the results of the 1969 Hawk season opener.

That issue carried a dateline of Sept. 18. And we've never missed one since.

I've said it before, and I'll very likely say it many times in the future -- hopefully 25 years from now -- we've been able to succeed and stay only because of the loyal support of our readers and advertisers.

Without that support, I'd very likely have to become a "newcomer" somewhere else. And I wouldn't want to go through that again.



Worth Quoting

A few weeks ago, I wrote about Marie Harris, this newspaper's former regional editor.

Today, I want to tell you about Myrna Smith, the other Grand Dame who alleges to have kept my nose clean (wiped, I think she would say) during my earlier days at *The Herald*.

Myrna Smith was more than just a colleague, she was a confidant.

Myrna not only put in her regular time during the workday, but she also spent a lot of extra hours at night as *The Herald's* "society" editor for 21 of her 25 years here.

We had a lot of heart-to-heart conversations at night in which she would give me advice, counsel, admonition and encouragement.

In turn, I would hear the pain of a mother and grandmother concerned about "family problems" that eventually seem to be a part of all our lives.

If I ever had a "second mother," Myrna was it.

She and her late husband Buster sort of grew up in the newspaper business, working for and/or owning papers in Amarillo, Turkey, Gould, Okla., Wichita Falls, Abilene, Vernon and Tulia.

One of my favorite memories is a Herald Christmas party with Myrna sitting close to her husband of more than 50 years, and singing in a husky voice, "St. Louis Blues," as *The Old Masters of Swing* played in the background.

When they leased the Turkey paper, Buster told her, "The back part (printing) is mine, the front part (editorial) is yours. You don't bother me and I won't bother you."

"I came up in the old school of the weekly paper that says you have to do it all," Myrna recalled in her retirement story.

That even included writing some sports.

Which is only fair since I wrote an occasional wedding story for her, even though I didn't know *peau de soie* from *moire taffeta*.

Myrna endeared herself to the public with her wonderful features, columns and coverage of clubs and organizations.

She sent me on lots of assignments. I kidded her that I covered "sports and old ladies meetings."

Myrna retired 10 years ago in June and, true to her word, has remained active.

Today, at 78 (sorry, ma'am, you taught me to be thorough in providing information) she is writing for the *Iowa Park Leader* and still winning awards.

She also received many honors in appreciation for her dedicated journalistic efforts.

In an editorial when she retired, I wrote: "Smith may be a common name. But when the name Myrna preceded it, you could be assured of an uncommon dedication to all that's good and right about this business."

I miss you, Myrna, and you may sing the following in your best contralto:

*Got the St. Louis Blues,
As blue as I can be,
That woman got a heart
Like a rock cast in the sea.
Or else she wouldn't have gone
so far from me.*

until 1996.

Once the equipment and modifications are in place, residents and businesses in the Kamay/Valley View area will be able to call numbers in Iowa Park, Holliday and Wichita Falls without having to pay a long distance toll.

The same is true for telephone customers in those neighboring areas, to call without paying a long distance fee.

According to GTE reports, the company will eventually seek a state-wide rate adjustment due to revenue changes and new service costs. However, such an adjustment will be nominal, compared to current long distance rates.

It is not uncommon for Kamay/Valley View telephone customers to experience monthly charges of \$250 and \$350, Mrs. Cravens said.

Committee members credited with working long and hard were singled out by Mrs. Cravens, as being Johnette Phillips, Rob Pinkerman, Pat Cravens and Mr. and Mrs. Pete Ermis.

AUSTIN — Tougher criminal laws adopted last year by the Texas Legislature went into effect Sept. 1, requiring murderers, rapists and child molesters to serve half their prison sentences or 30 years before becoming eligible for parole.

Sponsor of the legislation was state Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, chairman of the Criminal Justice Committee. He told the *Houston Chronicle* that under previous law, Texas prison inmates often "came out worse than they went in."

Some nonviolent, first-time felons will get probation instead of prison under the revised laws that call for supervised probation up to five years and six months in new state lock-ups.

Nonviolent offenders on probation may be required to undergo drug and alcohol treatment, counseling sessions, community service and educational and vocational training.

"Over the last 50 years," Whitmire said, "our prisons had become a revolving door...but under the new plan, we don't want to commingle young offenders with hardcore rapists, murderers and child molesters."

Violent offenders, who often served a month for each year of a sentence under the state's old, "revolving door" de facto policy, will be doing more hard time with 22,000 more state prison beds scheduled to be ready for use by the end of next year.

Richards Cleared in Phone Flap
Gov. Ann Richards and her staff have been cleared of wrongdoing in the 1993 destruction of telephone records in her office.

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle issued an Aug. 26 statement saying that there was no evidence of criminal intent on the part of Richards or her staff.

Karen Hughes, spokeswoman for the campaign of GOP gubernatorial challenger George W. Bush, reacted to Earle's statement, charging that records were improperly shredded in Richards' office and that senior staffers told different stories why the shredding occurred in an effort to cover it up.

Richards' chief of staff, John Fainter, said he approved the destruction of the phone records because the governor's office was drowning in paper, and that he misunderstood rules requiring that phone bills be retained for three years.

Judges Asked to Redraw Lines
A group of Republicans has presented a three-judge federal court panel in Houston a plan to reshape half of the state's congressional districts before the Nov. 8 statewide election.

The state, however, has asked the panel to keep the current boundaries — drawn by the Legislature in 1991 — intact for the election.

The judges ruled on Aug. 17 that of the state's 30 congressional

districts, one in Dallas and two in Houston are racially gerrymandered and must be redrawn to comply with the U.S. Constitution. Redrawing those districts will affect dozens of contiguous districts.

Lawyers for the GOP plaintiffs say the proposed new districts are more compact and would help minorities gain seats, but Texas Attorney General Dan Morales argued that if new lines are to be drawn, they should be drawn in the next session of the Legislature.

Happy Hours Left Intact

The Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission last week rejected a proposal to ban happy hours but promised to consider new restrictions on such promotions as nickel-beer nights.

Mothers Against Drunk Driving has been urging the commission to eliminate happy hours, contending they encourage heavy drinking over a short period of time.

But bar owners and the Texas Restaurant Association argued that such regulations would limit competition and amount to price-fixing.

TABC chairman Ray Orr of DeSoto, said he and his colleagues are convinced that a happy hour ban is warranted, but they will look at some new restrictions in October.

Gibson to Leave Chamber Post
Bruce Gibson, former Democratic state representative from Godley, will leave his post as president of the Texas Chamber of Commerce to become vice president for government affairs at Houston Industries Inc., whose holdings include Houston Lighting & Power Co.

There are reports that Gibson may not be replaced at the chamber, which is continuing merger talks with the Texas Association of Business.

Other Highlights

■ State Rep. Ben Campbell, R-Carrollton, has until Sept. 6 to appeal his April federal court conviction for bank fraud, affecting whether he can be replaced on the Nov. 8 general election ballot. On Aug. 26, Campbell was sentenced to 51 months in prison and five years probation upon release. U.S. District Judge Paul Brown also ordered the senator to pay \$540,229 in restitution and to report to prison in 30 days.

■ New Jersey Gov. Christine Todd Whitman warned both Republican and Democratic candidates about attacking women as soft on crime. "Women care about crime as much as anybody else," said the first-term governor while campaigning last week for George W. Bush, the GOP nominee for governor, and Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

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Texas Historical Commission seeks information for project

Dig into the attic and forgotten trunk. Resurrect the old handed-down picture albums and scrapbooks.

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is interested in acquiring or copying historic photographs, documents, publications, or ephemeral items relating to the history of the Texas State Cemetery in Austin.

Many of the cemetery's some 3,000 monuments, as well as the historic greenhouse and fountain, need repair and maintenance. Plans for restoration of the cemetery are now underway, and the THC is acting as a restoration advisor for the project.

According to Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, who referred to it as the Arlington National Cemetery of Texas, the State Cemetery should rank among Texas' most cherished landmarks, and the condition of its monuments and other elements should reflect its status.

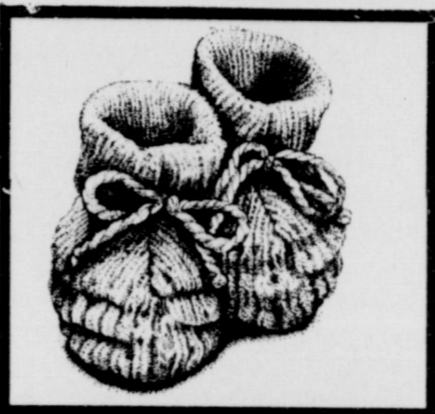
After a recent visit to the cemetery, Bullock called for the cemetery's restoration, and directed numerous state agencies to oversee the work over several years.

"Early photographs, documents, and other materials would help make our research for a historically accurate restoration of the cemetery possible," said Gerron Hite, preservation architect with the THC.

The materials also may be used for an exhibit in a visitor center that is being planned for the 18-acre graveyard that dates to the mid-19th century.

The Texas State Cemetery contains the graves and monuments of many of Texas' greatest military leaders, pioneers, government officials, educators, and literary figures who contributed to the growth and history

of Texas. The graves and monuments of Stephen F. Austin, Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston, William Alexander Anderson "Bigfoot" Wallace, and folklorist J. Frank Dobie are among them. 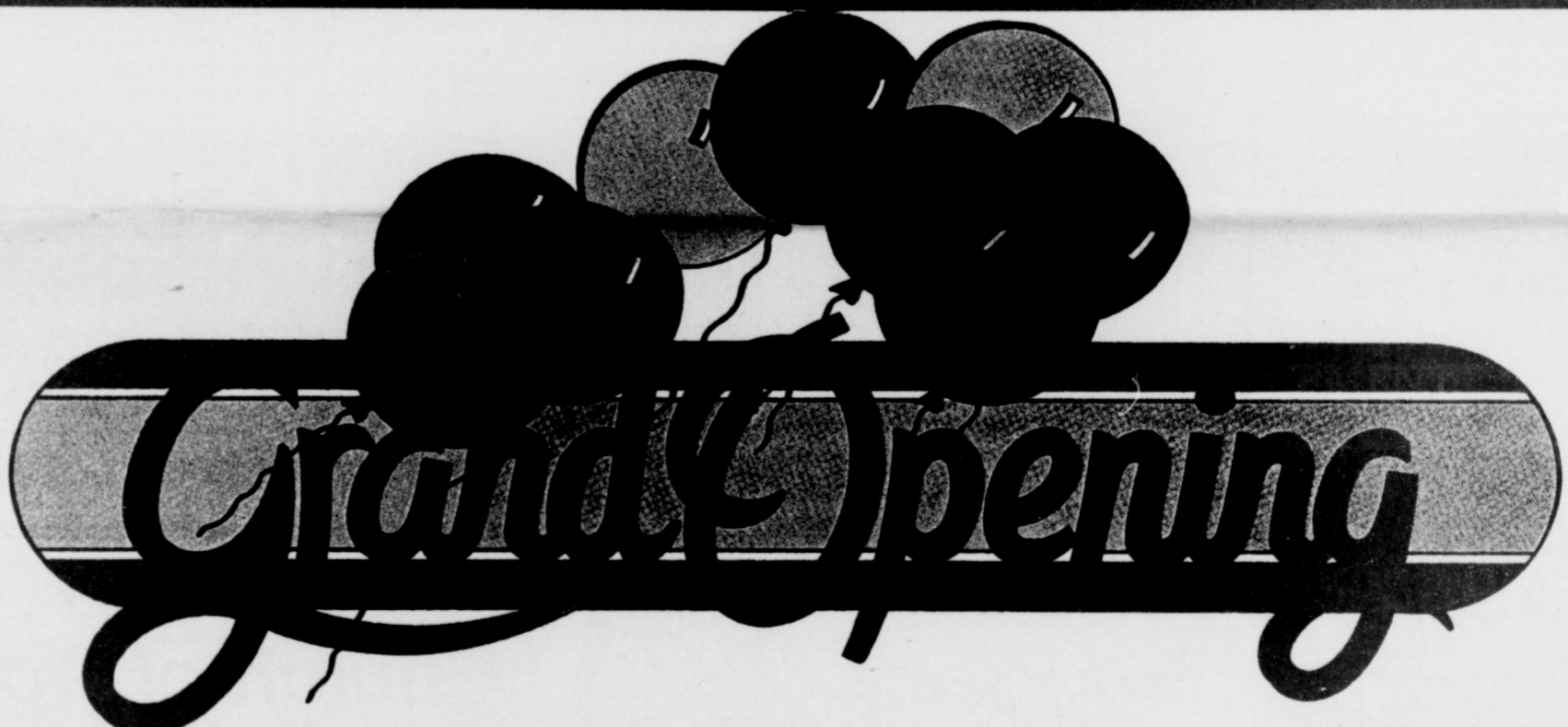

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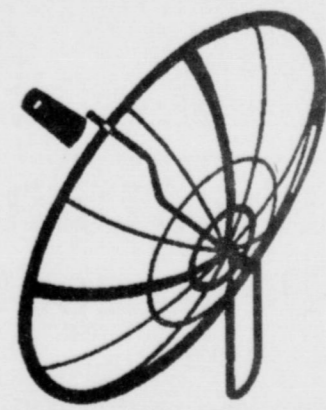

Lactose sensitive people need calcium

A few words of caution for people who are lactose sensitive---don't forget the calcium, says a gastroenterologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Millions of Americans are unable to digest lactose, a sugar found in milk and other dairy products, leaving many of them void of the recommended daily allowances for calcium.

"When you don't take in lactose, you also may not be taking in sufficient calcium," said Dr. Alan Buchman, an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor.

Lactose intolerance sufferers are deficient in lactase, an enzyme in the small intestine that breaks down lactose. Symptoms of lactase deficiency can occur at birth or later in life. The condition is especially prevalent in minorities.

Nearly 100 percent of Asian-Americans and native Americans are lactase-deficient, compared to five to 24 percent of whites.

In lactase-deficient people, lactose remains undigested in the intestine, causing stomach cramps, bloating, gas and diarrhea. In rare cases, weight loss, severe dehydration and vomiting, malnutrition and death from an intestinal disease can occur.

Adding an artificial form of lactase to milk can break down the lactose, making it easier to absorb. Lactase substitutes can be purchased over-the-counter in most pharmacies,

and lactase-containing milk can be bought in many grocery stores.

Buchman says there are other ways to avoid the ill effects of lactose. He recommends substituting dairy products with calcium-rich items like leafy green vegetables, nuts, broccoli, salmon and fermented milk products like yogurt, which contain active cultures that partially break down lactose.

Yogurt and hard cheeses are low in lactose-containing-whey and are good choices, along with milk substitutes.

"Instead of dairy ice cream, you can enjoy ice cream made with tofu or frozen yogurt with fruit" he said.

Buchman also advises carefully reading food labels.

"Lactose is a sugar and is sometimes used as a sweetener," he said. "Look at the ingredients label and avoid foods containing 'hidden' lactose."

The best way to confirm a case of lactose intolerance is to take a simple test called a lactose breath test hours to perform.

The test uses a gas chromatograph to measure hydrogen levels in the breath after the patient has had one or two glasses of milk or a lactose solution.

Buchman says people with lactose intolerance typically have increased levels of hydrogen in their breath after consuming lactose. Hydrogen is emitted because the

unabsorbed lactose travels to the colon where bacteria break it down, releasing the hydrogen.

"If you suspect you are sensitive to dairy products, take the test," Buchman said. "You will feel better about what you eat and more importantly, avoid complications. Many people find out they are not lactose-intolerant after all."



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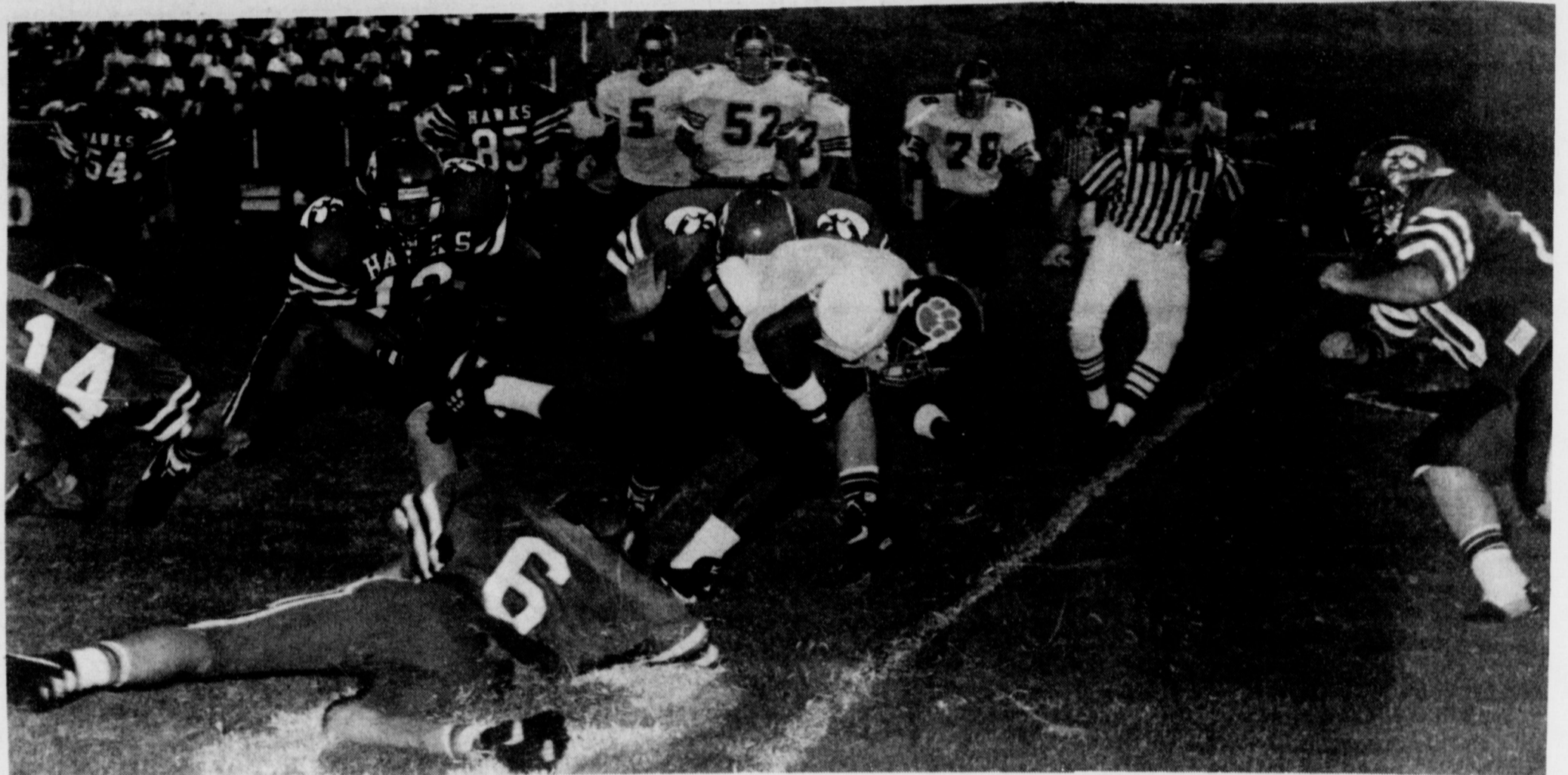
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'Dogs dump Hawks in opener

Burkburnett's big play offense proved to be too much for Iowa Park to handle Friday night as the Hawks fell 36-0 in the regular season opener for both teams.

The Hawks gave up touchdown runs of 38 and 53 yards and TD passes of 39 and 48 yards to the Bulldogs, who didn't have a drive that consisted of more than seven plays.

Iowa Park took the opening kickoff and had trouble moving the ball and was forced to punt the ball away. Burk took over at the Hawk 45 yard line and went on a seven-play drive, all running plays, that culminated in a one-yard run by Eddie Donnell to make the score 6-0 with 6:55 left in the first quarter. Kobe McFadden picked up a bad snap on the point after and ran in to increase the lead to 8-0.

The Hawks went four plays and out on their next possession and were forced to punt the ball away. Following a short punt, Burk took the ball at the IP 38 and on its first play from scrimmage, McFadden took a pitchout to the left and scampered in for the score to make it 14-0 with 5:43 left in the first period.

Iowa Park was again unable to move the ball offensively on its next possession and had to punt the ball away.

On the Bulldogs' first play from their own 47 yard line they went to the same play that they had scored on earlier, the pitchout to the left, this time Donnell went the distance to bring the score to 21-0 following Travis

Turner's point after. The Bulldogs added two points on a safety to make the score 23-0 when they blocked Jason Young's punt in the end zone with 1:26 left to play in the first quarter.

The second quarter saw the Hawks tighten their defense not allowing Burk a first down until the 3:17 mark of the quarter. Iowa Park had a golden opportunity to get on the board following a short punt and a face mask penalty that gave the Hawks the ball at the Burk 24 yard line. But the Bulldogs stuffed Chad Simpson on first down and stopped Corky Petty on second down. Young couldn't connect on either of his pass attempts on third or fourth down turning the ball over to Burk with 3:17 left before halftime.

The Bulldogs, who moved the ball to the Iowa Park 39 with time running down, scored on the final play of the half on what looked like a play that came after the horn had sounded to signal the end of the quarter.

Burk quarterback Michael Williams lofted a pass that Bo Witherspoon ran under for the touchdown as the Hawk players and coaching staff thought the half was over. The play stood and following the point after, the score was 30-0 as both teams went to the locker room.

"We just got frustrated early on," said Iowa Park head coach Weldon Nelms. "We started off slowly on offense then we tried some trick plays that backfired on us. We just need to shake it off and move on and that will come

with maturity."

Burk came out in the third quarter and made it 36-0 when Donnell caught a 48-yard screen pass from quarterback Nathan Mowat with 6:59 left to play in the period.

"I feel sure the kids will bounce back from this," Nelms added. "We'll get better, we just need the playing time to get some things worked out."

Petty led the Hawk rushers finishing the night with 79 yards on 13 carries. Simpson added 28 yards on 11 carries.

Diet, exercise may help chronic fatigue sufferers

When your energy level seems stuck at zero, changes in eating and exercise habits may be all it takes to recharge your battery.

According to researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, most people experiencing chronic fatigue who are not clinically ill are suffering from unhealthy behaviors.

Only about one percent of people experiencing overwhelming tiredness actually suffer from Chronic Fatigue Syndrome.

"The culprits are usually poor nutrition and lack of exercise," said Dr. Ken Goodrick, Baylor assistant professor of medicine and a behavioral psychologist.

"Caffeine abuse may also cause fatigue rather than overcome it, and alcohol/drug abuse, stress and depression, or irregular sleep patterns can play a role."

Not eating enough, eating too much fat or not drinking enough water can cause a person to feel fatigued, Goodrick said.

To help increase energy, poor nutrition habits should be replaced by a well-balanced diet that provides no more than 30 percent of the total calories from fat.

A healthy eating plan also includes five or more servings of fruits and vegetables and at least eight glasses of water a day.

Regular, vigorous (but not necessarily strenuous) exercise also in-

creases energy and helps with sleep as well, Goodrick said.

Experts from Baylor's Debakay Heart Center Nutrition Research Clinic recommend 45 minutes of brisk walking three to five times a week as part of a healthy lifestyle routine.

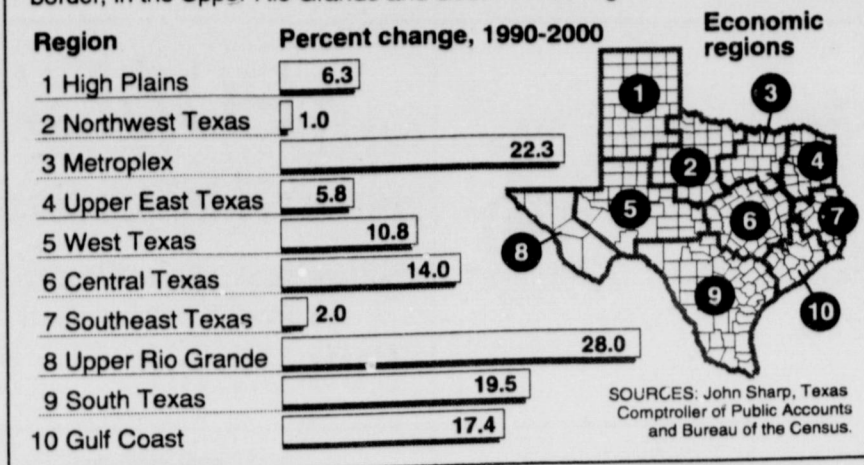
"People who use caffeine to combat fatigue are not doing themselves any favors. Caffeine blocks the "tiredness signals" normally sent to the brain to trigger sleep, so we ultimately become more tired," he said.

Research from sleep laboratories also shows caffeine disturbs quality of sleep, leaving the body tired.

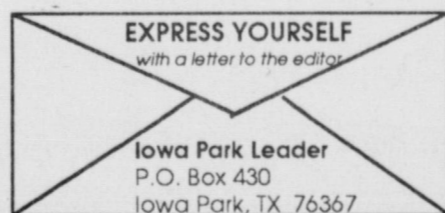

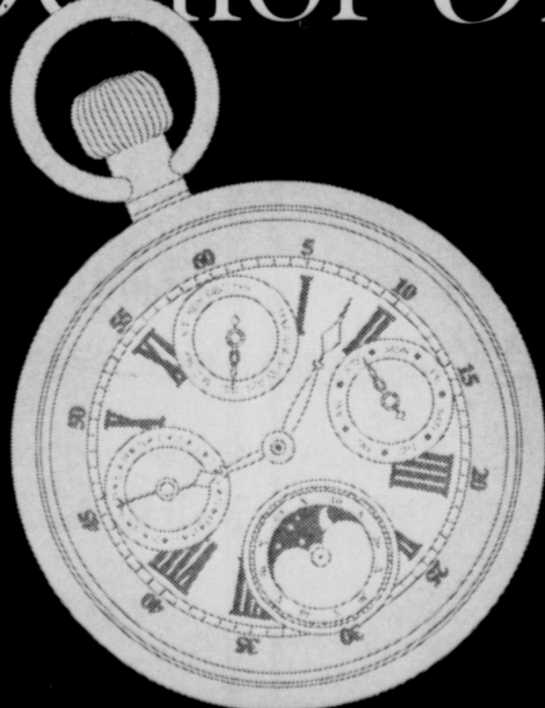

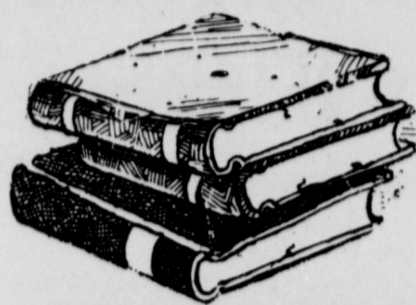
