Megical nealogical and Historical Society have dug around grave sites and ha searched with metal detectors for the temporary markers placed by the funeral homes providing the funeral ervices.
We have been able to locate only ne or two with intact temporary one or two with intact temporary
markers, while the bulk of the markmarkers, while the buik of the mark-
ers uncovered are only the metal rods ers uncovered are only the metalrod toms of the temporary markers.

If you are unsure of the appropriate markings of a loved one's grave site at Highland or any cemetery, it is imperative that you contact the cemetery or visititin person to insure that the markers are in place and able to
withstand the test of time. thstand the test of time.
Replace temporary markers as soon as reasonably possible; the
weather and the mowers are not forgiving to the small, thin temporary markers. I currently have a small bag of letters that once represented the marker of one of Iowa Park's ancestors. Could they be the last remains
