Past year's top news stories reviewed

The year of 1996 was a busy one for the Iowa Park community and its residents, full of spectacular events and accomplishments, elation and sorrow.

The following is a brief review of the year's happenings, as gleaned from the pages of the *Iowa Park Leader*.

JANUARY

The year of 1996 wasn't exactly the way it started out on New Year's Day -- snow and rain deposited .88 of an inch total precipitation on the first day of the year. Both varsity basketball teams got the year started properly, as a Hawk victory raised the team's record to 14-4 and the Lady Hawks were standing 11-7. During the city council's first meeting of the year, aldermen voted to override a veto issued by Mayor Wayne House, concerning a janitorial contract at city facilities. Penny Bradberry earned the honor of being named a member of the All-State Band. Four young men were accused of inflicting at least \$1,600 in damages to vehicle and building windows, while on a BB shooting spree. Jim Riley Goetze, a 1980 graduate of Iowa Park High, earned a Doctor of Philosophy in Zoology from Texas Tech Univ. The Tom Burnett Memorial Library observed its 10th anniversary on Jan. 15. Recognized during the annual Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce banquet were: Scobee's Mini-Mart, Business of the Year; Jean Johnson, Outstanding Educator; Dean Henderson, Outstanding Senior Citizen, and O.N. Newman, Outstanding Citizen of the Year, and Dr. Derrell Monday was installed as new Chamber president. Two Iowa Parkans, Thomas Cecil Sims and David Edward Stevens, both 29, were sentenced in court for stealing and cashing a government check. Dusti Welch was among 10 area youth to receive the Good Citizen Award from the Major Francis Grice chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution. Initial phase of widening Magnolia Street between West Highway and Johnson Road was undertaken jointly by the City of Iowa Park and Wichita County. Mrs. Verna Laura Moore observed her 100th birthday on Jan. 29. Robert S. Smith joined Park Clinic as a physician's assistant.

FEBRUARY

Police never found a man who shook up a woman's store clerk badly, after the man explained he was shopping for a dress and wanted to try it on himself, then called the clerk into the dressingroom asking for assistance, actually had nothing on, and departed in short order. Three local Boy Scouts, Kyle Chaney, Ricky Ashton and Anthony Dillman, served as delegates to Gov. George W. Bush's "Report to State" in Austin. During the University Interscholastic League's biannual realignment, Graham and Bridgeport were moved from Iowa Park's district, while Henrietta and Childress replaced them. Coach Larry Beard launched Iowa Park High's girls' baseball history when he had the Lady Hawks to scrimmage Hirschi. A suit was filed in district court against the school district and former trustee Wendall House by former coach and athletic director Robert Clensay. School trustees voted to return to a previously-held policy of one-year contracts for administrative personnel. IPHS students Blain Hefner and Kevin Lilley were awarded scholarships for their entries in Midwestern State University High School Art Competition. Although January was a promising month for precipitation, by mid-February grassfires became uncomfortably common, due to drought conditions. Brandon Scott earned the Herdsman Award during the annual Iowa Park Project Show. Boosted by a fund-raising drive entitled "Coins for Corey," more than \$670 was raised to benefit Corey McMahon, seven, son of Mr. and Mrs. David McMahon who underwent surgery to remove a tumor from his brain. Eight members of the Lady Hawk basketball team, including Amanda Thompson, Dusti Welch, Alora Foster, Randi Tigrett, Sarah McCarty, Wendy Bridwell, Julea Ricks and Kim Overman, were named to the Academic All-District team, and Welch was named to the All-District player's team.

MARCH

Erica Knight became the third inductee into the Hawk Track Hall of Fame during the annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays. Iowa Park hosted the regional power lifters' meet. Brad Green's Yorkshire placed second in the huge Houston Fat Stock Show, and brothers Bo and Garred Vernon were winners in the calf scramble. The God is Love Ministry, headquartered on Peterson Road, observed its 25th anniversary. Iowa Park's annual City-Wide Clean Up Week was held the last week of the month. Hawks named All-District in basketball included David Waterbury, first team, and Nick Black, second team. Two of three men involved in a firey two-truck accident on US 287 between Peterson and Rifle Range died. The Lady Hawk power lifting team placed 10th among 22 teams at the state meet. Tyson Spruiell and Keith Hoover qualified to compete in the boys' state power lifting meet.

APRIL

Horticulture students at the high school held their annual spring plant sale the first Saturday of the month. After a local resident rejected a telephone solicitation to advertise in a publication sponsored by the Iowa Park Police Dept., he called the police station to see if there was such a publication -- there's wasn't. When the city council held a discussion concerning development of a golf course here, they were critized by Tim and Gus Rich, who claimed some discussions had been held in "private." A wrought iron gazebo was constructed on land donated by the W.F. George Estate to Highland Cemetery Association. School trustees approved the sale of land which was formerly occupied by the Valley View Independent School District. Cayce Gauthier and Benn Bennett were named winners of an oratorical contest sponsored locally by the Optimist Club. In its initial year, the Lady Hawk softball team captured the district championship. Receipts generated by the annual Harley Owners Group Fun Run, held here, benefitted the Friendly Door. During the 70th annual convention of the North and East Texas Press Association, Dolores Hamilton was named recipient of the Tom Mooney Memorial Award and Kari Collins received first place in best-advertising judging. Stephen Morris captured first place in boys' tennis singles in the district tournament. A prisoner being transported from Arizona to Missouri excaped at Vernon, stole a pickup, and was captured here by local police. The Hawk Band earned its 13 consecutive Sweepstakes in UIL competition. Also Sweepstakes was earned by the IPHS A Cappella

MAY

Michael L. Caplinger was selected superintendent of Iowa Park schools by trustees, to succeed Glen Mitchell, who was to retire at the end of the school year. Greg Wood, assistent chief of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept., was named Firefighter of the Year by the West Texas District of Firemen's and Fire Marshall's Association. Results of the city council election included: Tim Hunter, mayor, defeated Bud Mercer and George Witherspoon; Joe Ward, alderman, defeated Terry Johnson and David Ohm; and Joe Singer, alderman, defeated Tim Rich and Ida Zimmerer. Lisa Nichols was named valedictorian, and Karen Schell salutatorian, of Iowa Park Junior High School. The Baseball Hawks earned the district championship. Former Hawk athlete Scott Davis was named head track and cross country coach at Hastings College in Hastings, Neb. Six members of the Lady Hawk track team, Julea Ricks, Dusti Welch, Bambi Pryor, Alisha Clements, Brandi Butler and Wendy Bridwell, qualified to compete in the state track meet. Steven Bowen, 28, was charged with driving while intoxicated after his vehicle struck a pickup containing Todd Duncan, 30, and Jack Witherspoon, 42, killing both men. Ashli Thomas and Brandon Herder were named valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, of the 1996 IPHS graduation class. Two resolutions were passed by the city council with the intention of assuring fire protection to two industries which adjoin the city limits. Proceeds earned by the Junior High Band students during their annual subscription sale of the Iowa Park Leader amounted to \$1,018, and all was donated to the Friendly Door Building Fund. Drought conditions caused Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp. to ask all customers to curtail outside watering. The Baseball Hawks were eliminated from the state playoffs after losing 8-6 in extra innings in the Area game to Perryton, and finished with a season record of 24-6.

JUNE

Cryovac announced the purchase of the Siemens property north of Wichita Falls, which will be used as a shipping ware-

house. Most city and school district taxpayers received notices that their property appraisals had been increased, including homes on Rita which were hiked as much as \$15,000 to \$19,000. Wayne Nicholson, Kathy Woods and Ray Featherston were the big winners in the annual All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament. The Iowa Park Police Dept. sponsored its annual "Show and Shine" vehicle show. Chris Norris, ace Hawk hurler, was named the Most Valuable Player when the All-District team was announced. Straight wind was blamed for heavy damage inflicted in the southeastern part of the city, with the school's agriculture barn area hardest hit. The Leader was awarded first place in the Texas Press Association's better newspaper contest for features written by reporter Myrna Smith. Graduated Hawks Clint Witherspoon and Dusty Owens competed in the annual Greenbelt Bowl in Childress, and Witherspoon was awarded the W.C. Hoot Voyles Award by officials. Randi Tigrett was named an All-American Cheerleader.

JULY

Members of the Friendly Door moved into their own brand new building, located just north of the Recreational Activities Club on North Third. School Supt. Mike Caplinger announced that, due to newly-enacted state law, a complete band on the use of tobacco products on school property is in force. A group from the Wichita Falls chapter of NAACP met with the school board after a lunchroom employee filed a complaint. On a 3-2 vote, the city council rejected a request to rezone three lots on West Highway to allow a business to build there. A rain storm moved over the city on July 24, depositing .40 of an inch of precipitation, and that raised the month's total to .60.

AUGUST

The Hawks got an earlier-than-usual start on the 1996 football season, by holding their first practice the first minutes allowed by the UIL, which meant they started at midnight. Iowa Parkan George W. Clay IV was elected to represent Congressional District 13 at the Republican National Convention. Vocational Education teachers George Martin, Ray Dillard and Wendy Meadows were recognized by their state organization for their work with newspapers. A car stolen here was found in Port Arthur. Buildings, trees, fences, lawn furniture and children's toys were victims of a wind storm, primarily in the western portion of the city, but no injuries were reported. Numerous parents of school children became upset when the school board decided to end most in-city bussing of students. The city council approved reducing the tax rate by five and a half cents per \$100 valuation, to 70.5 cents, to fund its adopted \$3.1-million budget. School administrators reported first-day enrollment at 2,128, an increase of 19 over the previous year and the third-highest on record here.

SEPTEMBER

School trustees adopted a \$1.14 per \$100 valuation tax rate. City officials were notified a suit had been filed against the City, its police department and a former officer of the department in the 1994 shooting death of Mark Allen Swanson, 34. Six members of a door-to-door soliciting crew were arrested after refusing to purchase a permit which is required by city ordinance. Local, county and state lawmen shut down traffic on US 287 west of the city for a period of time after a truck driver from Idaho reported a shooting had occurred in his cab, and it turned out to be a hoax. Three Masons, Bill Lane, Miles Thompson and R.B. Wilkerson, were recognized as 50-year members of the fraternal organization.

OCTOBER

Rolling Plains Management Corporation, a private firm, began contracting with individual families to transport students to and from schools, following the school's cutoff of certain incity routes. Homecoming attracted 20 former classmates to attend their 50-year reunion. Shannon Gafford was crowned 1996 Homecoming Queen. Don Duerson was reunited with his family in Florida after 45 years of separation. Dr. Derrell Monday, pastor of First Baptist Church 10 years, accepted a call

to a Pampa church, and also resigned as president of the Chamber of Commerce. The second-annual KIDFISH attracted several hundreds to Lake Gordon. For the 15th consecutive year, the Hawk Band earned a Division One rating in the UIL marching contest. After 36 years with Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS), David Robnett retired.

NOVEMBER

Iowa Park High's Hawk Band earned fourth place in the UIL state marching contest, held in Mesquite. Of major local interest concerning the general election, Gordon Griffith was successful in his bid to be re-elected Precinct Three county commissioner. and Alton Yeakley unseated Sam Fairchild in his bid for Precinct Three constable. The city's rezoning of land along West Highway, known as Barber's pipe yard, was reportedly accomplished as a site for construction of a supermarket. A large group of community members, teachers and administrators began functioning as a task force to study school facility needs. The Hawks closed out the football season as runners up in Dist. 3-3A and a 21-6 bi-district loss to Abilene Wylie, finishing with a season record of 8-3. At the annual all-membership luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce, Dale Cox was elected to fullfill the unexpired term of Derrell Monday, as well as being the next year's president, and Cryovac manager Frank Terlizzi was the luncheon's guest speaker. A credit card scam cost a local florist a reported \$2,000. Winter's first storm struck the 23rd of the month, bringing more than an inch of rain and snow and coating stretches of roadways with dangerous frozen surfaces.

DECEMBER

No one was injured in an early-morning fire that destroyed the home of Dale Williams, 410 West Pecan. Area telephone customers were notified that the state's Public Utilities Commission had approved the change of the area code from 817 to 940, but it would not become effective until some time in the spring of 1997. Hawk quarterback Todd Yeager was named Outstanding Offensive Player, to head a list of seven other team mates named to the All-District first team. A crowd of children estimated in excess of 100 took the opportunity to visit with Santa Claus, when the annual Christmas lighting ceremony was held at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.



Need system changed Dear Editor:


During the next session of the Texas Legislature, the folks in Austin will be discussing changing our civil court system. One area they will address will be to see what can be done to unclog our court system -especially with frivolous lawsuits and those without any merit.

A number of suggestions have been made to deal with this issue, such as passing a law that gives judges more authority to send out of state lawsuits back to the states they came from. Under current law, Texas taxpayers can be forced to pay for a trial from Alabama, even though none of the injured workers are from Texas. This does not seem right.

Another suggestion is to give judges more authority to dismiss frivolous lawsuits and/or people who have been named in a lawsuit. One answer may be to give state district court judges the same ability to throw out cases similar to the system used in the federal courts.

I hope your readers will get interested in these issues and contact their elected officials. We need to make our civil and criminal justice system in Texas work more fairly and more efficiently. Sincerely,





New surgical treatment may benefit emphysema patients

A new multi-center study of a surgical treatment for severe emphysema may benefit patients throughout the United States.

Baylor College of Medicine in Houston is one of 18 national sites chosen to participate in a seven-year study by the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute (NHLBI) and the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) to determine the safety and effectiveness of a procedure called lung-volume reduction surgery (LVRS).

Baylor will also participate in a similar study supported by the Department of Veterans Affairs(VA).

Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has adopted broad revisions to rules regulating technical standards for and Fil Spangler installation of new on-site sewage facilities (OSSF), or "septic systems."

> "Increasing residential development in nonurban areas all across the state means that more and more Texans are turning to on-site sewage facilities as a convenient and affordable means of treating household wastewater," said TNRCC commissioner John Baker.

"Past experience, however, shows that systems can develop serious problems when the technology used is inappropriate for the soil conditions and inadequate for the lot size or when the system has been installed incorrectly.

"These problems -- like leaking tanks or flooded drainfields that expose raw or inadequately-treated effluent -- pose significant threats to both human health and the environment. In revising the OSSF rules, our aim has been to protect Texas while ensuring tht the septic system remains a viable option for a growing popusisters, Sylvia Winkler and Christine lation of Texans," Baker added.

The TNRCC worked closely

with counties, installers, and the industry in revising the rules. The agency held 11 public meetings throughout the state on the proposed revisions and consulted with a 14member ad hoc advisory committee to help shape the final rules.

The revisions update technical standards and criteria to reflect changes in the OSSF industry that have occurred since the rules were first issued in 1989.

Now the rules specify standards for such technologies as cluster and drip systems, intermittent sand filters, and leaching chambers.

In addition, the revisions eliminate the percolation test as the sole factor for determining whether an OSSF is feasible for a particular site, establishing, instead, a site evaluation process based on soils analysis to ensure that the proper types of OSSF will be installed.

The rules also reduce certain setback requirements to allow greater flexibility in selecting among OSSF

In addition, the revisions implement a legislatively-mandated certification program for designated representatives, who oversee OSSF installations for local governments delegated this responsibility by the TNRCC.

The revised rules establish a certification program for site evaluators and enhance existing certification of installers by requiring additional training to handle complex OSSFs.

In 1990, the state issued 18,000 permits for new OSSFs. In 1995, some 38,000 permits were issued; for 1996, about 45,000 new on-site sewage facilities will be permitted.





AUSTIN - There was room under the Christmas tree for property tax relief, but there was no way to squeeze a fully formed plan through the chimney.

Scurrying Capitol elves drafted a proposal that would cut school property taxes by about \$3 billion a year - buy left some important questions unanswered. Such as, how can the cuts:

■ Be made permanent?

• Be kept from creeping higher? (Gov. George W. Bush has said he will reject any bill that does not promise taxes won't creep back up, either through hiking tax rates or higher property tax appraisals.)

■ Be made so as to not disrupt school funding formulas?


· Be made without picking a political fight with business interests?

"We're looking at all these issues. There are still a lot of things to figure out," state Rep. Tom Craddick, chairman of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, told the Austin American-Statesman.

Though Craddick thinks there is a way to shift more of the \$10 billion school property tax burden from property owners to the state government, there is no concensus on whether cuts can be made without making a mess of the painstakingly devised school funding formulas.

Rep. Paul Sadler, chairman of the House Public Education Committee, told the American-Statesman it's impossible to shift the burden without affecting school funding formulas.

"It's an exercise in futility because you are looking for shortterm answers to fix long-term problems," he said,



More Texas students were hitting the books for final exams last week because of a new state policy that has prompted school districts to quit exempting students from finals.

The new policy by Education Commissioner Mike Moses ended all funding for students who are not at school because of exemptions from final exams.

In the past, school districts would let students with good grades skip finals and still receive the same amount of money. School funding in Texas is based on student attendance.

The policy became effective this semester and is now affecting students for the first time.

"You can no longer get paid for kids being absent," Dr. Moses told the Dallas Morning News. "I have this personal feeling that if you exempt kids from final exams all the way through high school, they may have trouble when they wind up at a state university and have to take a semester exam for the first time," he said.
