Winter storm has residents staying home

The first severe winter storm of the year kept Iowa Parkans shivering in sub-freezing temperatures over the weekend and into this week.

In fact, it was so cold that the high temperatures Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday were all lower here than in Anchorage, Alaska, according to the U.S. Weather Bureau reports.

Roads and streets were so slick following some three-inches of snowfall that Iowa Park schools were cancelled Monday, for the first time in about 10 years. Classes Tuesday were delayed also, but resumed as normal Wednesday.

Virgil Woodfin reported the snow produced .07 of an inch in moisture.

Three different cases were reported to the emergency medical volunteers of persons having slipped and fallen on icy surfaces, but none was injured seriously.

Only three minor vehicle accidents were worked by Iowa Park police.

The most common calls for help police received during the spell came

from people who needed help unlocking their vehicles. Most of those were drivers who got out of their vehicles for some quick shopping, leaving their motors running, and the locks automatically working.

Police were alerted to several situations in which residents failed to use what most would consider common sense.

Those include police having to chase people off the frozen surface of Gordon Lake, and four of those were adults.

Or whoever it was who built a snow man -- in the middle of the 300 block of West Pecan.

Or the driver who was pulling a youth on a sled -- behind his car.

Or the driver of a black Jeep who reportedly had fun making donuts on the yard of Tom Burnett Library -- twice on Saturday.

According to the Weather Bureau's report, the high temperature here Saturday was 23, and 34 in Anchorage; 18 Sunday, compared to 29; 20 Monday, and a warm 42 in Alaska's largest city, and 28 here Tuesday and 32 there.

City seeks bids

The city council Monday night approved proposals to seek bids for several projects, as well as a new storm-warning siren for the north-west part of the city.

The bids to be sought include street and utilities for the second phase of Park Place Addition, and to replace water and sewer main in the 400 block of West Magnolia.

The new siren, expected to cost \$15,000, is to be installed on the new water tower which is located west of Johnson Road.

Administrator Mike Price said that area, which is rapidly developing, has the greatest need because of the old siren that is supposed to cover the area.

A bid of \$14,279, submitted by Larry Slack Ford of Bowie, was the lowest of four submitted on the proposed purchase of a new pickup for the water treatment plant, and was approved.

Three ordinances were approved during the meeting. One concerns definition of terms for the control of junk vehicles, one assists in the collection of outstanding utility bills, and the third concerned abandoning a

portion of Cherokee Trail in Indian Springs Addition.

The council also approved a proposal by the administrator to purchase a backwash return pump for the water treatment plant.

Also approved was a request from the volunteer fire department to place a mobile home at its southside station, to be used for training purposes.

A request for water service on land at the northeast side of Bell and East Highway, submitted by Lawrence Green, was approved, but requires his receiving permission to tap a private line in that area.

One of two resolutions approved by the council included the city's support of passage by the legislature of a bill being submitted by Sen. Tom Haywood.

That bill, if approved, would return five percent of all lottery sales to the city or county in which the sale occurred.

Had the bill been in place during 1996, Iowa Park would have received \$64,729, because local businesses sold \$1,294,585 in lottery tickets that year, aldermen were told.

Closed sessions dominate board meeting

The school board meeting Thursday night was dominated by a series of executive sessions.

After the meeting was called to order, Board President Keith Fisher said one person had requested to speak in open forum, but it would be necessary to close the meeting at that time.

When the meeting was reconvened in open session, trustees took care of routine agenda items and reports, and then went back into executive session to hear a "student discipline matter, and consideration of hirings, resignations, and proposed terminations."

Action was taken on two matters when the meeting was reopened.

A letter of retirement from Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer was accepted, effective June 30.

Palmer will retire at the end of this contract year. His years in education combined with military time give him 30 years, which qualifies him for retirement.

He expects to take over operation of the family farm and increase his participation in historic organizations and civic work.

In their second action, the board unanimously approved a motion calling for "the termination during

contract of Terry Davis." Davis is on suspension with pay until his hearing. Final action on that issue is expected to be taken at the February board meeting.

Thursday's meeting was closed a third time for the annual appraisal of the superintendent.

When the meeting was reconvened, a motion to extend Supt. Michael Caplinger's contract through June 30, 1999 carried unanimously.

Earlier, during the regular meeting, Supt. Caplinger had given a report on student enrollment. He said that 2,144 students were enrolled in the school district on Jan. 7. This is 17

more than the 2,127 students enrolled at the beginning of the school year, on Aug. 19.

The numbers reflected an increase of nine students at Kidwell Elementary, six at Bradford Elementary, and five at the high school. The student count at junior high was down by three.

In other business, the board approved the first reading of Iowa Park CISD Board Policy Update 53, which deals with changes mandated by Senate Bill-1.

Five arrests reported

Five arrests were reported during the past week by Iowa Park police, and at presstime Wednesday they were working hard to make it six.

The case on which they were working was reported at 5:39 p.m. Tuesday. It involved at least one credit card and some personal checks, taken during the noon hour.

At the time the theft was reported, one credit card company had confirmed that more than \$2,000 in purchases had already been made.

The first of the five arrests was made early Saturday morning, when two men were taken into custody in the 200 block of North Pacific.

Jeremy Lynn Erskin, 19, was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant issued locally. The warrant was for minor in possession.

Erskin had two additional charges filed against him, another for minor in possession and a second for no drivers license. He was later released on a personal recognizance bond.

In the vehicle with him was John Leslie Frie, 18, who also had a warrant for his arrest for minor in possession, according to police. He paid \$25 toward his fine of \$118.50 and was released.

Another arrest was made early Sunday morning on an outstanding warrant.

Charles Matthew Hall, 17, had been wanted for assault by threat. He was released after paying a \$87.25 fine, but was issued another charge.

RECIPES FOR COLD WEATHER COOKING

Because of icy road conditions during the early part of the week, we didn't contact anyone to come to the *Leader* office to be interviewed for Cook of the Week.

Instead, we decided to go through back issues and use recipes run previously that would taste good during these cold weather days.

Mexican Cornbread Casserole

1 cup yellow corn meal
2 eggs, well beaten
1 cup sweet milk
1 #3 can cream style corn
1/2 tsp. soda
3/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup bacon drippings
1/2 lb. ground meat
1 large onion, finely chopped
1/2 lb. grated cheese
4 chopped jalapeno peppers

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Combine corn meal, soda and salt. Add eggs, milk, cream style corn, and bacon drippings; mix well. Saute ground meat and drain. Grease large black iron skillet and heat. Sprinkle thin layer of corn meal in bottom of skillet and brown in oven. Pour 1/2 batter into skillet. Add meat, onion, cheese, and peppers. Pour remaining batter on top. Bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 8-10.

Burrito Chili & Cheese Casserole

6-8 frozen burritos
1 - 19 oz. can chili
1 chopped onion
10 ozs. Cheddar cheese, grated
1 ctn. sour cream

Place frozen burritos in casserole dish. Thaw in microwave. Sprinkle chopped onions over the burritos. Warm chili and sour cream together. Pour over burritos. Sprinkle with grated cheese; cover and warm in microwave until hot and cheese is melted.

Brown Stew

2 lbs. beef chuck, 1 1/2 inch cubes
2 Tbsps. oil
4 cups boiling water
1 tsp. lemon juice, fresh, frozen or canned
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 clove garlic
1 med. onion, sliced
2 bay leaves
1 Tbsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. paprika
Dash allspice or cloves
1 tsp. sugar
6 carrots, quartered
6 cubed potatoes
1 lb. small white onions, if desired

Thoroughly brown meat on all sides in hot fat; add water, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce, garlic, onion, bay leaves, and seasonings. Simmer 2 hours; stir occasionally to keep from sticking. Add carrots, potatoes and onions. Continue cooking 20 or 30 minutes or until vegetables are done. Remove bay leaves and discard. Remove meat and vegetables; thicken liquid for gravy and return vegetables to gravy. Makes 6 to 8 servings. (If desired, you can omit cubing the beef and cook as a pot roast.)

Dash garlic powder
3 Tbsps. Mexene chili powder

Enchilada Pie

2 lbs. ground beef
1 med. onion, finely chopped
1/2 tsp. garlic powder
1 can tomato sauce
2 cups canned whole tomatoes, chopped
1 can chopped green chilies
1 pkg. taco seasoning mix
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1 Tbsp. chili powder
1 pkg. corn tortillas
1 can cream of chicken soup, undiluted
3/4 cup milk
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

Combine ground beef, onion, and garlic powder in a large skillet; cook over medium heat until meat is browned, stirring to crumble. Drain

well. Add next 7 ingredients. Cook mixture 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Tear each tortilla into 8 pieces. Place half of tortilla pieces in a baking pan; top with meat mixture. Arrange remaining tortilla pieces evenly over meat mixture. Combine soup and milk in a small bowl, mixing well; pour over tortillas. Sprinkle cheese evenly over top. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees.

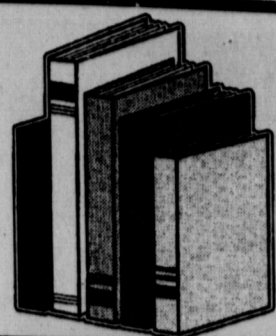

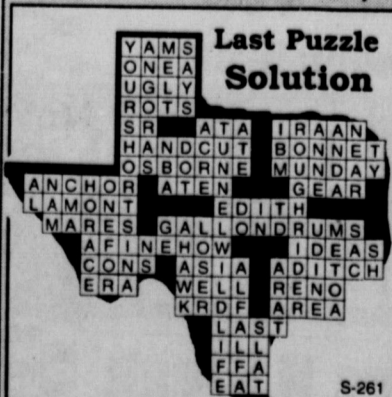

We had such a case Saturday night, during the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. And I only hope the oversight will be overlooked.

A major feature of the evening was to recognize all the volunteer organizations which help make Iowa Park such a great place to live.

The oversight was not recognizing the only organization in the community in which the word volunteer is a part.

I speak of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department.

Ironically, members of the department got up and left during the banquet -- responding to a paged call for help. Some came back later, but their organization, along with the Evening Lions Club, wasn't called to the front to receive a certificate of recognition.

There's no question of the dedication each and every member of the fire department has to their effort. In fact, the total manhours expended by our volunteer firemen likely would

equal, or possibly even exceed, all the manhours of all the volunteer organizations together during a year's time.

And they don't pick and choose the hours in which they do their thing. They respond when others are in need.

Our volunteer firemen responded to a total of 603 calls during 1996. Included in those calls were 446 for emergency medical help, and 157 for fires.

And those numbers don't include all the meetings members attend, to receive training, to participate in civic events such as parades and fundraising activities, maintain and repair equipment, and just taking care of business.

Actually, the Chamber has in the past recognized the VFD. A few years ago, the entire department was named and presented a plaque when named the Outstanding Citizen of the Year.

Like I said, the oversight in recognizing the IPVFD Saturday night was unintentional.

So, let me take this opportunity to thank each and every member for their devoted work in serving -- and saving -- us and our's.

And, please, keep up your fine work.

Ingram spent last summer as a volunteer park ranger at Guadalupe National Park.

OPEN ENROLLMENT PERIOD FOR MEDICARE

An open enrollment period from Jan. 1 through Mar. 31 permits people 65 and over who failed to enroll or dropped their Part B Medicare coverage to sign up.

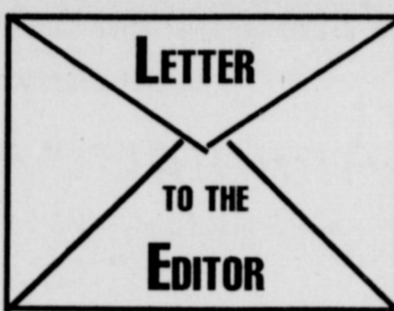
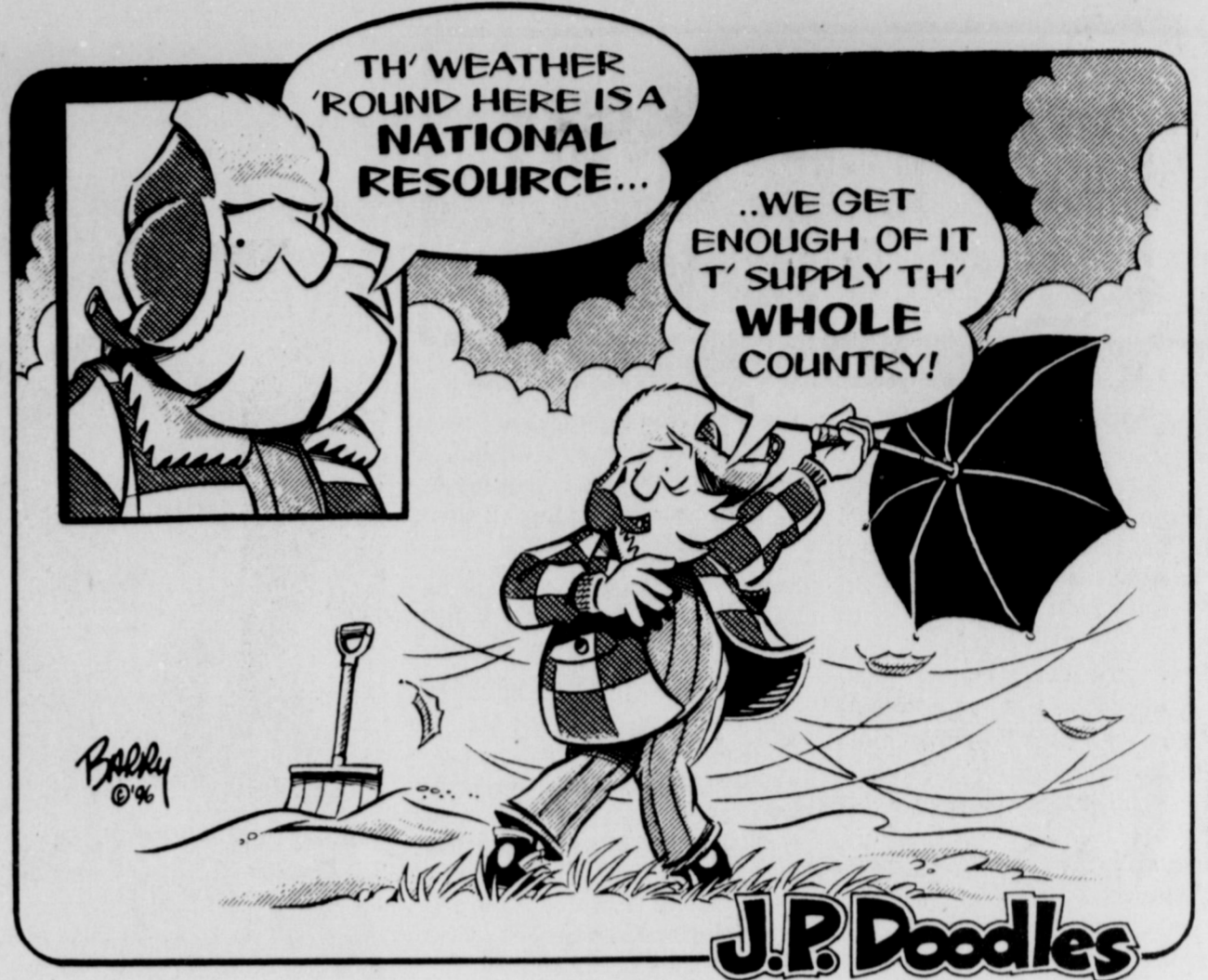
Their coverage will begin July 1, 1997.

Generally, a 10 percent premium penalty will be added to the monthly premium for each year they could have enrolled but did not.

However, there is a special enrollment period if you or your spouse is working.

You may be able to delay enrollment in Part B without paying a premium penalty or waiting for a general enrollment period. You have an eight-month special enrollment period if you have group health plan coverage from current employment at the time you first became eligible for medicare.

This special enrollment begins with the month employment ends or the month your group health plan coverage ends, whichever ends first.



November sales down

When compared with the previous year, Christmas shopping during November was a major disappointment for Iowa Park and the other three cities in the county.

All four had decreases in business, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office.

The report includes sales taxes collected by monthly filers in November and reported in December.

But, if there is anything positive in the report, it is the fact that Iowa Park businesses experienced less of a decrease than did the other cities.

Iowa Park, according to the report, had 6.66 percent less sales taxes collected than November of 1995. The city received a check for that month's collections of \$17,726.80.

Sales taxes collected in Wichita Falls was 12.81 percent less that month, Electra 14.93 percent less, and Burkburnett suffered a reduction

of 21.9 percent. Holliday, however, had a 32.92 percent increase in sales taxes collected in November, as compared with the same month in 1995, which generated a \$5,835.55 rebate check for that city.

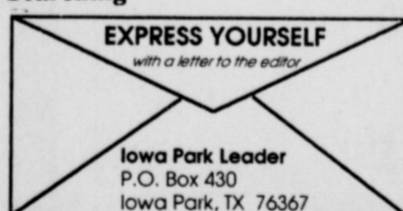

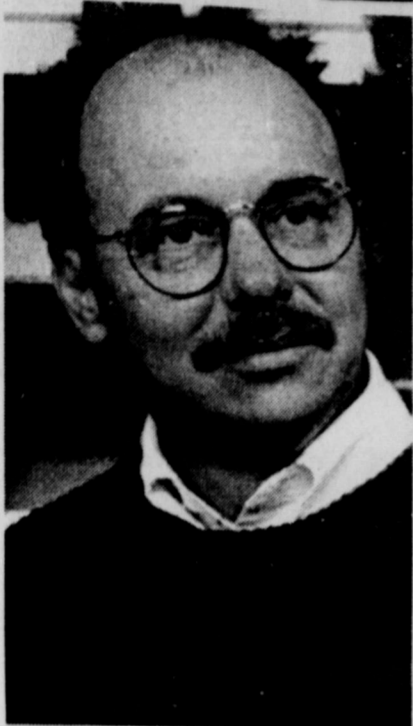

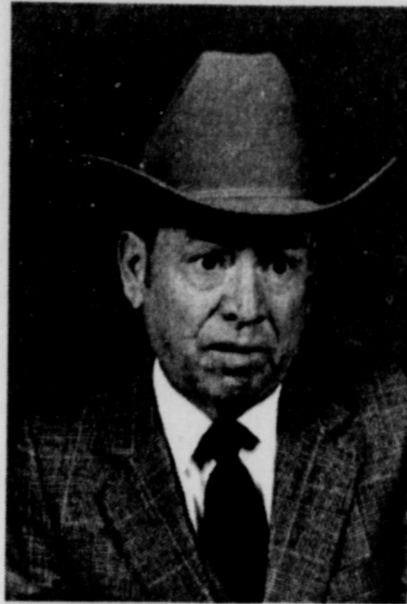

Lady Hawks win, lose outings

Iowa Park maintained the lead for most of the opening quarter and led 12-6 with 2:28 left following Le Ann Jordan's six foot jumper from the lane. Childress ran off the last six points of the quarter to pull even at 12-12 as Jennifer Neal scored her team's final four points of the period.

The Lady Cats took their first lead of the game with 6:19 left in the first half on a layup by Cara Steed,

Hawks open district play with 2-0 record

Head coach Tim Clark used a quote he read in a Sports Illustrated article to sum up his team's play after picking up a pair of district wins to start the season: "There's no sense in beating our chests right now, we've still got a lot of basketball left to play."

But after a 2-0 start, which included a 52-48 road win over Vernon, Iowa Park is exactly where Clark expected his team to be. With only

two road games this half, all the Hawks have to do from this point on is take care of business at home Friday night against Jacksboro, and play a road game at Henrietta before hosting Bowie to close out the first half of district.

Iowa Park opened with a tough game in Vernon that saw the Hawks battle back from a 4-point deficit with only 1:49 left to play.

With Vernon leading 48-44, Jake

Dillard drained a three-pointer to cut the lead to 48-47 with 1:31 remaining. Nick Black followed with two big free throws with 63 seconds left to give Iowa Park a 49-48 lead, Iowa Park's first since the 5:58 mark of the fourth when the Hawks led 41-39.

With 30 seconds left in the game, Dillard missed the front end of a one-and-one, but Levi Scholl grabbed the rebound and was fouled. Scholl drained both free throws to give the Hawks a 51-48 lead. Jody Brannon's three-point attempt from the corner was no good with 12 seconds left and Shawn Campbell pulled down the rebound to seal the win. Black added a free throw with 11 seconds remaining to make the final 52-48.

Iowa Park, 13-11 overall and 1-0 in district, was led by Scholl with 13,

Campbell with 11 and Black with 10.

Vernon fell for only the fifth time and stands at 13-5 overall and 0-1. The Lions were led by Edward Hall with 14, all of those coming in the first half. Brannon finished with 11 while Alan Alberry finished with 10.

"We played great down the stretch," Clark said. "It was a great team effort. We still need to do some work on our free throws, but we made them when we needed to. I thought we played great defensively and I thought they got tired late in the game."

In Tuesday night's game against Childress, Iowa Park blew open a close game in the fourth quarter, then raced to a 70-50 win to improve to 14-11 overall and 2-0 in district. Childress fell to 8-13 overall and 0-2 in district.

Iowa Park opened the game

scoring the first six points to take a 6-0 lead, but the Bobcats outscored Iowa Park 16-7 over the final 5:55 of the first to take a 16-13 lead.

With the score tied at 18-18 with 6:37 left in the half, the Hawks went on a 17-5 run to take a 35-23 halftime advantage. Scholl and Black finished the half with 10 and 9 points respectively for the Hawks.

Iowa Park maintained a double digit lead heading into the final eight minutes of play, leading 47-36 at the start of the fourth quarter.

Childress opened the fourth quarter hitting its first three shots from the floor while Iowa Park missed its first four to cut the lead to 47-42 with 6:07 left to play.

From that point on it was all Iowa Park as the Hawks caught fire making seven in a row from the field while forcing the Bobcats into eight turnovers. Iowa Park outscored Childress 21-2 to take a 68-44 lead with 60 seconds left as Black scored 8 of his game-high 22 points in the run. Scholl and Campbell each scored four points in the run while Todd Yeager added three. Yeager, Black and Scholl were all playing with four personal fouls to start the fourth quarter.

Scholl finished with 18 points to join Black in double figures while Campbell and Fulfer each finished with 8. Childress was led by Willie Thomas with 15 and Michael Davis with 11.

"It sure felt good to know that our kids didn't quit," Clark said. "We looked like we were in trouble early in the fourth quarter. We got our transition game going unlike the Vernon game and we just got after them with our man defense. I thought we played great defense tonight. We did a good job on the boards not allowing them many second opportunities. Our press was effective and we forced them into turning the ball over, especially in the fourth quarter."

The Hawks will be looking for their third straight district win Friday night when they play host to Jacksboro. Iowa Park will then travel to Henrietta on Tuesday before returning home for the showdown with Bowie the following Friday night.

"We're taking this one step at a time," Clark added. "We took care of step one Friday in Vernon. We took care of step two tonight. Step three will be to take care of the Tigers here Friday night and that's the way we're looking at it. One game at a time."

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. I live in the Burkburnett area. I just found all of my tulip and hyacinth bulbs in the back of my refrigerator. Can I go ahead and plant the bulbs now or is it too late?

A. You can go ahead with the bulb planting now. You are not the first person to forget about bulbs in the refrigerator. Try to get the bulbs planted as soon as possible in a well-drained bed area with full sun.

Q. I have a 25 year old Magnolia tree in my Wichita Falls front yard. My question is can I cut a few lower limbs off of the tree and when should I do this? I don't want to hurt the tree.

A. You can remove lower limbs on your Magnolia tree during the

winter season. January and February are excellent times for most pruning jobs. Make pruning cuts where branches just meet the main trunk of the tree. Don't leave stubs which will not properly heal. Never top a tree under any circumstance!


Q. I have an evergreen plant in our landscape which has grown up into the lower canopy of a tree. I am not sure what this plant is, but it has a glossy green leaf with entire variegations on it. The individual leaves are about the size of a quarter with a slightly scalloped edge. I want to know what this plant is called and if I can prune it out of the tree overhead? How much can I cut the plant


back?

A. The plant you are describing may be variegated Euonymus, but this is only a guess based on the information you have provided. Send me a picture and I could be more accurate in terms of identification of the plant. Assuming that the plant is Euonymus, you could prune it back out of the lower canopy of the tree overhead with no problem. Winter time is prime time to get the pruning job taken care of. You could probably cut the Euonymus back by about a third.





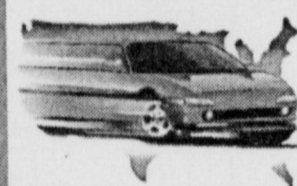
