## council drops tax rate

The Iowa Park city council took an unusual step for taxing entities Monday night -- they cut the tax rate.

At a time when almost all governmental bodies are having to increase their rates, growth and increased values allowed council members to drop their's, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

The cut was slightly more than one and a half cents -- \$.68999 per \$100 valuation, to be exact.

Price said the city's total budget for the year 1997-98 was \$3,163,300, which includes \$1,974,900 for the general fund, which comes primarily from taxes, and \$1,188,400 for the water and sewer fund.

Residents and property owners will see the new rate applied to their tax notices this fall. However, if their property was increased in value by the county appraisal district, their tax bill may or may not be less than last year

Mayor Tim Hunter, following the council's approving vote on the new tax rate, congratulated Price and his staff for their efforts in cutting budget requests which were submitted to the council early this summer.

In other business, the council approved requests to re-zone two

areas in the city, accepted bids for water service on Ruby Street, authorized additional funds for the rebuilding of Victoria Street, and approved a policy concerning water service requests for property not in-

side the city. One of the re-zoning requests approved was on three lots near the intersection of Third Street and Access Road. The change was from general residential to automotive and recreational commercial.

Brent Patterson wants to build a small animal clinic on two of those

The entire block on which Catlin Quick-Change, Mean Green Car Wash and Masonic Lodge are located also was re-zoned from light industrial to automotive and recreational commercial.

Both zoning changes were approved by the city's Planning and Zoning Commission.

Victoria Street is to be completely rebuilt between Cash Street and the Access Road, through a program of the Texas Department of Transportation. Similar projects of the program include Washington Street and South Wall.

The city's matching fund on the

Victoria project was increased by \$31,293, when bids on the project came in higher than projected. The city had already put up \$121,666, according to the administrator.

Work on the project reportedly is to commence in one to three weeks.

Aldermen accepted the lowest of four bids for a water main replacement/extension on Ruby, submitted by Wichita Contractors, to increase the size of the water line to eight inches, and also to increase offshoot

The low bid of \$85,111 was approximately \$14,000 lower than the council had budgeted for the project, and Price said the remaining money would be used on other projects to serve residents.

Funding for the project is by a state grant.

The council voted to continue its policy concerning certain requests for water service to areas outside the

city limits. The long-standing policy requires that requests from owners whose property is contiguous to the city limits must request annexation into the city before service is approved.

One additional point was included in the policy, however. Any request, whether contiguous or not, can be only for a line no larger than three-quarters of an inch in size.

In other business, aldermen approved the purchase of a used pickup truck from an Archer City dealer by the fire department.

The truck replaces a former police patrol unit which had been used by the fire department until it was involved in a wreck. Insurance funds

Police have the names of two alleged accomplices, both Electra residents, and expect to have them both in custody in the near future, according to Collins.

Lupus




Lupus results when the body's immune system loses its ability to differentiate between foreign substances and its own cells, causing inflammation, tissue damage

and pain. The most common form of this connective disease usually attacks the tissues (such as skin, muscles, tendons and ligaments) that support the body. Usually occurring in young to middle-aged women, its cause is unknown. Typical signs of lupus are a red rash over the cheeks and nose (often following exposure to sunlight), muscle or joint pain, and fatigue. Lupus is often difficult to diagnose. Treatment may include pain relievers, corticosteroids and immunosuppressive drugs. Rest and exercise are also important.





Secondly, do not, and I repeat, do not, throw anything away after classes start. Nothing ruins a school day morning more than unwinding yards of toilet paper off the roll because your junior academician forgot to tell you she needed an empty toilet paper roll the night before.

I found it is much easier to keep a trash bag in the garage filled with all those little items every parent is expected to provide at a moment's notice -- toilet paper tubes, paper towel cores, coat hangers, string, popsicle sticks, assorted pieces of lumber, etc. One morning I dug in my miscellaneous sack and created a "machine" on short notice. A slanted piece of wood and a short piece of dowel rod added up to an incline plane.

about. There is one piece of advice I would like to offer. Treasure this time that you have with your children. After they are finished with their education and out on their own, your

memories of the hectic mornings, curfew fights, money requests, lost books, missed deadlines and other stressful events will quickly fade. You will look back and only the golden memories will remain.

August 14, 1997 marks the 62nd anniversary of the signing of the Social Security Act - legislation that now touches the lives of nearly every American.

It's a good time for people to pause and reflect on how the program has grown to become an essential aspect of American life.

Social Security is the nation's primary means of insuring a continuing income to a family when a worker dies, or becomes disabled or

retires. About 44 million people receive monthly benefits, with over 68 percent of the money going to 26.4 million retired people.

Over 21 percent of the money is paid to 12.5 million children, spouses, widows and widowers. And over 10 percent is paid to four million disabled workers.

It's that time of year again, when schedules are pushed to the limit. With the beginning of school also comes football, band, and soccer practice, along with all of the other extracurricular activities the students are involved in.

Because it gets increasingly difficult to put a hot meal on the table, this week's recipes are ones that can be prepared the night before and cooked the next day, or frozen for later use.

#### Overnight Tuna Casserole

7 ozs. uncooked macaroni

2 - 7 oz. cans tuna, drained 1/2 cup finely chopped green bell

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped

1 Tbsp. chopped pimento

2 - 10 oz. cans cream of mushroom soup

2 cups milk

1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Combine macaroni, tuna, green pepper, onion, eggs, pimento, soup, milk and cheese in large bowl. Mix well. Spoon into greased 3-quart baking dish. Chill, covered, for 8 hours to overnight. Let stand at room temperature 15 minutes. Bake at 375 degrees 1 hour to 1 hour and 10 minutes or until casserole is bubbly and macaroni is tender.

#### Italian Meatballs

2 lbs. lean ground beef 2 eggs, beaten

1 cup saltine crackers, finely crushed 1 Tbsp. dried parsley flakes

2 tsps. instant minced onion

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. garlic powder, if desired

1/2 tsp. dry mustard

1/2 tsp. pepper

1/4 cup water

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Combine all ingredients in large bowl and mix until well blended and smooth. Roll into approximately 80 to 90 (1-inch) meatballs. Place on 2 ungreased 15x10x1" baking pans. Bake at 450 degrees 8 to 10 minutes or until meatballs are browned and no longer pink side.

To freeze meatballs, cool completely in refrigerator. Place in 3 freezer containers or bags, label and store in freezer. To reheat, thaw completely in refrigerator. Place in 1quart casserole dish and bake covered at 350 degrees 20-25 minutes or until thoroughly heated.

#### Pinto Beef Casserole

1 lb. ground beef

1/2 cup chopped onion 1/2 cup chopped bell pepper

1 clove garlic, minced 1 - 15 oz. can tomato sauce

2 tsps. chili powder 1 tsp. salt

3 cups hot cooked rice

1 can pinto beans, drained 1 cup shredded Velveeta cheese

Brown ground beef in a skillet. Add onion, bell pepper and garlic. Cook until tender. Add tomato sauce, chili powder, and salt; mix well. Grease a 2-quart casserole dish. Arrange meat mixture, rice, beans, and 3/4 cup cheese in layers, beginning and ending with the meat mixture.

Sprinkle remaining cheese on top.

Bake at 350 degrees 20 minutes or

#### Ham and Egg Casserole

1 - 6 oz. pkg. seasoned croutons

1 tsp. onion flakes 1/4 tsp. lemon pepper

until bubbly.

6 ozs. Swiss cheese, sliced

6 ozs. Cheddar cheese, sliced 8 ozs. ham, cut into bite-sized pieces

2 cups half and half

1 1/2 cups milk

1/4 tsp. dry mustard 1/4 tsp. salt

Sprinkle croutons in greased 9x13-inch baking dish. Sprinkle with onion flakes and lemon pepper. Layer Swiss cheese, Cheddar cheese and ham in prepared dish. Beat eggs with half and half, milk, dry mustard and salt in large bowl. Pour over layers. Chill, covered, overnight. Bake at 325 degrees 55 minutes. Let stand 5 minutes before serving.
