

AT CHILDRESS FRIDAY

Forget all the records, it's time for the real season to get underway Friday night when the Hawks travel to Childress to open Distrist 5-3A play against the Bobcats.

Iowa Park played a very tough non-district schedule, winning fourof-five including four in a row to finish out the non-district schedule, with wins over three 4A schools along the way.

Childress comes into the district opener at 3-2, winning it's last two games by the score of 34-9 over River Road and 34-7 over West Texas High.

The Bobcats opened the season with an impressive 61-6 win over Tulia, then fell to the only team to beat Iowa Park, Holliday, 17-13. Childress' other loss came to Canadian 18-7 in week three.

Iowa Park enters the game averaging 26.8 points per game while the Bobcats are averaging 29.8.

The Hawks are getting it done on the ground, averaging 266.8 yards per game rushing for an average of 5.93 yards per carry, and are averaging 326.2 total yards per contest.

"It's a good feeling to be where

we are right now," said head coach field. Joining Brown and Thomas in Weldon Nelms. "We've played a very tough non-district schedule and we've gained both momentum and confidence along the way, but you can throw all the records away now. Every team in the state is 0-0 going into Friday night. We know that we have to step it up to another level of play in district. This is what we call the real season. This is what we've been working toward since the first day of

"I think this first game is a very important game for both teams," Nelms said. "You don't want to have to play from behind and after Friday night, three teams are going to be one game behind already. Childress is one of the teams that figures to be right there when the playoffs roll around. Charlie Johnston always has his team ready to play and they are very tough at home. We were the last team to beat them at home. Charlie's teams don't beat themselves, they force you to beat them."

The Bobcats are led offensively by tailback Travoy Brown and Willie Thomas, both have breakaway speed and can score from anywhere on the the backfield are fullback Caleb Seal and quarterback Hunter Jones, a twoyear starter. The offensive line averages 236-lbs. and provides plenty of

blocking for the trio of backs. "We've got to keep Brown and Thomas contained and keep them from making the big plays," Nelms said. "Their quarterback is a good passer, but will make some mistakes if he is pressured. Last year we forced him into making some mistakes with

our pass rush and we need to do the same again this year. "

Defensively the Bobcats are led by three-year starter Juan Sierra at middle linebacker.

"Sierra has a great nose for the football," Nelms stated. "We must block him every play to be sucessful. The way he plays usually determines the way their defense plays. Their secondary has excellent speed, mak-

School district receives \$88,000 technology grant

The Iowa Park school district begin Jan. 4, 1999. To date, the TIFB has received a Technology Advancement Grant in the amount of \$88,000 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

Technology Advancement grants were designed to allow schools with little or no direct Internet connectivity the opportunity to establish a local area network or expand a current network. Grants for up to \$100,000 have been awarded in this area for the purchase of computer equipment, networking materials, and other related telecommunications costs

The local school district fulfilled a series of TIFB requirements in order to receive funding. Some of the TIFB requirements included creating a technology task force consisting of teachers, administrators, students, and community members, and committing to provide matching funds. Iowa Park CISD committed \$8,800 in matching funds to the project. The money will be used to purchase the necessary telecommunications equipment to provide Internet accessibility to the classrooms as well as to purchase comput-

"We are very pleased to receive this award," said Superintendent Mike Caplinger. "We will use TIFB funds, along with the matching funds we have committed to the project, to bring the Internet into the classroom as a teaching tool."

KidFish slated Saturday


Youngsters who like to fish, or maybe would like to try their hand at the popular sport, will have an opportunity to catch some large catfish at Lake Gordon Saturday morning.





TFWC district meeting held here

Forty-five delegates attended the 39th annual Fall meeting of Santa Rosa District of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, held Saturday at the Iowa Park RAC. Co-hosting the event were the two local TWFC clubs, Amity Study Club and Twenty Three Study Club.

With District President Patricia Wilkins of Paducah presiding over the meeting, the invocation was given by Loys Campbell, District Chaplain, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Pledge to the Texas Flag.

Margaret Soell, president of Twenty Three Study Club, and Anneta Reusch, president of Amity Study Club, welcomed the visiting club representatives. Response was given by Pat Norriss of Burkburnett.

Special recognition was given to past TFWC State Presidents, TFWC board members, past District President, State TFWC Life Members, Santa Rosa Life Members, and guests.

Reports were given by the president of each club attending, listing their membership, special interests, participation in volunteer services in their communities, and aims for the future.

Theme for this year's State President, Marion Gamertsfelder of Dalhart, is "Accepting the Challenge: Dare to Dream and Deliver."

Pat Norriss gave the Trustee's Report on improvements to the TFWC Executive Mansion in Austin, stating that improvements have been completed and the historic building is now largely able to be self-supporting.

Jo Beard of Burkburnett Study Club, the main speaker for the day, spoke on "A Patient's Idea of M.D. Anderson Center."

A cancer survivor and patient at M.D. Anderson on a number of occasions, Mrs. Beard gave a history of the establishment of the center, which ranks second in the nation for the treatment and research of cancer.

She said patients come from all

over the world for treatment of cancer, which is the biggest challenge to face mankind. In 1995, an average of 1316 patients per day were treated there, where a team approach is used on each patient.

Causes of cancer are considered to be 20 percent genetic and 80 percent environmental. She stated that more than half of the people who have cancer now will be cured, and the five-year survival rate is now over 50 percent.

Currently M.D. Anderson has a 467 in-bed patient capacity, in addition to the many hundreds of outpatients treated daily. An expansion program is now underway which, when completed, will make the facility 30 percent larger with an area of four million square feet..

Mrs. Beard said that shuttles run from the airport every 30 minutes for those patients arriving by air. Parking and housing facilities, including Rotary House International, are conveniently located for patients.

"M.D. Anderson remains committed to the cure of cancer, and TFWC clubs remain committed to support of the hospital through the many avenues of volunteer support available," she said in conclusion.

Following Mrs. Beard's presentation, lunch was served by the hostess clubs. Entertainment during the lunch break was provided by Iowa Park elementary and high school students who presented a program of vocal and dance selections for the guests.

When the meeting reconvened, Beth Duke of Burkburnett introduced representatives of each of the seven program departments of GFWC, which are Arts, Conservation, Education, Home Life, International Affairs, Public Affairs, and Texas Heritage. Each representative gave a report on the projects and programs covered by her department.

Awards were presented for Outstanding Club Program, Yearbook,

Outstanding Americanism Day, A Rainbow of Service, Outstanding Clubwoman, Poetry and Short Story Contest, and M.D. Anderson participation, with the two local clubs winning several awards.

At the close of the meeting, an invitation was extended to all clubs to attend the Spring Convention, which will be held April 10, 1999, in Burkburnett.

Homework is very important. All data must be documented, as to where you searched and the results. If you write for information, keep a correspondence log. Check dates of births, deaths and make sure the time frame is reasonable.





AG AGENT'S REPORT

By JOE RAFF, Wichita County Agriculture Agent .

Rangeland

As we move through the drought of 1998, a couple of things stand out in my mind.

The first is, we know it will rain sometime, we just need to hold out until it does. The weather is cyclic and we will have good and bad years, it's not new, it's life.

Second, it gives us a chance to do some things we were not able to do, like cleaning out stock ponds that are dry or almost dry. A lot of ponds probably needed to be cleaned 10 or 15 years ago anyway.

Third, we could have killed a substantial number of parasites, bacteria, and viruses in the pasture. I don't know how many stomach worms could have survived this summer (my best is not many).

Yes, with some of these meager advantages come a long list of bad things. I'm not going to list these, because you already know them, but here are two that you may have overlooked, or have not thought about yet.

Due to the dry weather and hoof action on our native plants, we could very easily see some irreversible damage to our native pastures. I have mentioned this before, but I think it's worth saying again, "If at all possible, it would be to your advantage to feed hay or cake in those pastures that are average to below average production. Try to save your 'Honey Holes', those pastures that you can always depend on, year in and year out."

Opposed to "wait and see" let's start making plans for our native plant recovery. You have heard me say before "I have a publication in the office".

Well, I do have a publication in the office, and I consider it to be one of the best I have seen for native plant seeding. I use it a lot and those of you that have a copy agree with me, it's real good.

It has step by step information on seeding rangelands, along with 40 to 50 plants that are conducive to our area. It lists number of seeds per pound, seeding rates, time of seeding, conducive soil types, Ph levels, drought and freeze tolerances, warm and cool season, and the normal rainfall required to maintain plant vigor, for each. Come by and get a copy.

Gerald Hobson of Dupont, Jackie Gholson of Estes, and I have been working on some weed control test plots in Wichita and Archer counties this year. It seems that we may have started these demonstrations at the best possible time, because if we have some damage to our native grasses, we may very well see a large weed population this spring.

We had these tests on native rangeland and in coastal pastures. We used different levels of Ally, Amber, Ally + Tordon, Ally + Remedy, Amber + Todon, Amber + Remedy and Ally + Amber. Keep in mind that this is only one year's worth of data, and we are planning to continue these demonstrations so we can give you the best data, and recommendations based on what is happening in our area.

Even though we did get some mixtures to work better than others, the one that seemed to work the best across all the species of weeds was 0.1 to 0.25 oz. of Ally + 6 to 8 oz. of Remedy.

In large mixer bowl, beat sugar and butter until creamy, about 3 min-

To decorate, place white chocolate chips and shortening in heavy-duty resealable plastic bag; microwave on 50% power 3-4 minutes, massaging bag every minutes, or until chips are melted.

Cut off tip of one corner of bag. Pipe melted white chocolate onto cookies to resemble seams on footballs. Makes 4-5 dozen cookies, depending on size of cutter.

Buttermilk Chess Pound Cake

1 cup butter or margarine


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Where Are They Now? **Kellye Lehman Beavers**

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING, COUNTY AGENT - HORTICULTURE

Q. We have a large Silver Maple which continues to look thin and weak this summer. We have tried to water faithfully, but the tree still is not responding very positively. We had several lawn care companies look at the tree. We live in Wichita Falls. What else can we do to help our tree?

A. Silver Maple is simply out of place in the Southwest. Hot, dry weather of an average Texoma summer, not to mention this blistering summer and fall of 1998, will cause leaf drop, leaf scorching and thin canopy.

Watering deeply and regularly at the dripline of the tree where the branches extend out to will help ease the stress symptoms, but it will not eliminate the stress all together.

Silver maples are pushed to their limit in terms of heat and drought tolerance in this region. As I compose this news column from my computer at my grandparents far in central Nebraska, I can attest to the fact that these trees do much better in

a more northern climate. The neighborhoods in the small town close to the farm have many Silver maples within their landscapes. These trees look pretty good because they are growing in an area which does not experience intensive heat in summer.

Remember the vast majority of the feeding root system on many shade trees is within the upper 18 to 24 inches of soil and at the dripline. Hopefully, cooler fall weather will give us and our plants a break.

For the record, a much better choice of maple for use as a shade tree in our region would be Caddo Maple or Shantung Maple. Both of these maples are adaptable to growing conditions.

Q. We have a very well maintained lawn in Wichita Falls. I have read your articles on the severity of chinch bug problems in St. Augustine, however, my problem is that our St. Augustine looks fine while our Bermuda looks bleached out and thin in areas. We would like any input you may have on this problem.

A. The same hot and dry conditions that favor the build-up of chinch bug populations will also lead to problems with Bermuda Mites. As the name suggests, they do favor

These microscopic mites suck fluid out of the turf causing a bleaching and off-color even in properly maintained lawns. The internode length of runners will also be shortened. The internode is the area between leaf blades along the stem or

You may have to bring a sample of your turf to a certified nursery professional, professional lawn care specialist, or your local county extension office for correct identification of the turf problem. I often use a microscope to inspect for the tiny

Treatments include making a Windthorst to take part in the liquid application of Diazinon or Windthorst Tournament, falling to Dursban to the affected lawn areas. Professional lawn care companies report good results using a control In last week's paper, it was re- produce called Evict.

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
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
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Iowa Park hosts meet
