## Trustees call bond election

Overcrowded conditions and facility needs in the Iowa Park school
district could possiblybe allevied if voters approve a $\$ 5$ million bond issue on May 1 ssue on May 1.
At their re
ay night, school trustees voted Tunani mously to call a bond election on May 1, the same day as the trustee election, for $\$ 5,200,000$ to take care of facility needs in the district. Board member Larry Dutton was not present.
Before the vote, Supt. Mike Caplinger told the audience of about witness the vote, that the decision had been two years in the making, beginning with work of the Facility Task Force made up of private citizens, educators and board members. "The board has spent a tremendous amount of time on this, and the facility necds have becen studied rom head Murphy Davis, the district's financial advisor, said that there couldn't be a better time to have a bond issue because of the low interest rates. "There are very few times that we've had as low interest rates as we have now," he said.
If the bond issue passes it will mean an 11 and a half cent increase per $\$ 100$ evaluation. Taxes for are frozen and would not be affecte The current tax rate is $\$ 1.30$
