Unusually busy week for local police

Members of the Iowa Park Police Department were kept extremely busy during the past week with an unusual number of cases.

A report was filed last Wednesday afternoon that a cellular phone had been stolen from a vehicle parked at Iowa Park High School.

Tuesday, the instrument was recovered, and an investigation is underway to determine what and how many calls were made when the phone

was used, according to the police blotter.

Also at the high school on Tuesday, minor thefts of cash were reported, and recovered, and citations were issued to possible offenders to report to municipal court.

Tuesday afternoon, the owner of a vehicle that was parked in the 700 block of West Alameda reported a window having been knocked out. The case is under investigation.

Also on Tuesday afternoon, the mother of a male juvenile, 14, reported the youth had bitten her at her home in the 1000 block of Foley. The youth was transported to the county juvenile detention center on a Class A assault charge.

The theft of an air compressor, valued at \$400, and some tools was reported Friday from a residence in the 200 block of East Pecan.

Late Friday night, James Robert

Ellis, 25, was taken into custody on a charge of filing a false report to an officer. Ellis was later transported to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

A representative of Dollar General called the police department Monday afternoon and reported having a shoplifter in custody.

Carolyn Ann Rodriguez, 46, reportedly had attempted to leave the store with two shirts, each valued at \$5.

Rodriguez was arrested on a charge of theft under \$50, and also issued a citation for failure to identify to an officer. She was later released on personal recognizance bonds concerning both offenses, after promising to appear in municipal court.

Monday evening, Eric Craig Medford, 18, was taken into custody on an outstanding warrant for speeding, with a bond of \$130.

Holiday affects some city services

The City of Iowa Park, along with most businesses, will observe Monday as its July 4th holiday and allow most of its employees a day off from work.

Only the police force and utility employees will be working Monday. And because of that, some changes in Monday's trash collection

route will be observed, according to Belvin Lytle.

Monday's route for collection, which is all of the south side of the city and all roll-out carts, will be affected by the change.

Half of Monday's regular route will be picked up Friday, and the other half on Tuesday.

All green roll-out carts for the entire city will be picked up Tuesday.

Residents in the south side and those with roll-out carts who have not had their trash collected by Tuesday should contact city hall, either at 592-2131 or 592-2642.

All roll-out carts should be by curbside Tuesday morning.

Chamber slates activities dates

Dates of three city-wide events were scheduled during Monday's meeting of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

The annual Back-to-School City-Wide Yard Sale will be held on July 31. That earlier-than-usual date was slated because Iowa Park schools are to begin classes on Aug. 12.

For the second consecutive year, the Chamber will sponsor a Punt, Pass & Kick event on the evening of Monday, Aug. 2.

The activity, which is planned to give people something to do while waiting for the first official workout practice of the Hawk football team, attracted a large turnout.

Teams are allowed by the Uni-

versity Interscholastic League to begin practicing on Tuesday, Aug. 3. So the players will hit the field at 12:01 a.m. for their first session.

This year's annual Whoop-T-Do event will be held on Saturday, Oct. 16. The activity has always been scheduled on the weekend Iowa Park High School observes its homecoming.

Other topics involving the Chamber during the meeting included finances, a city map, funds for next year's Parkfest event, and possible other activities.

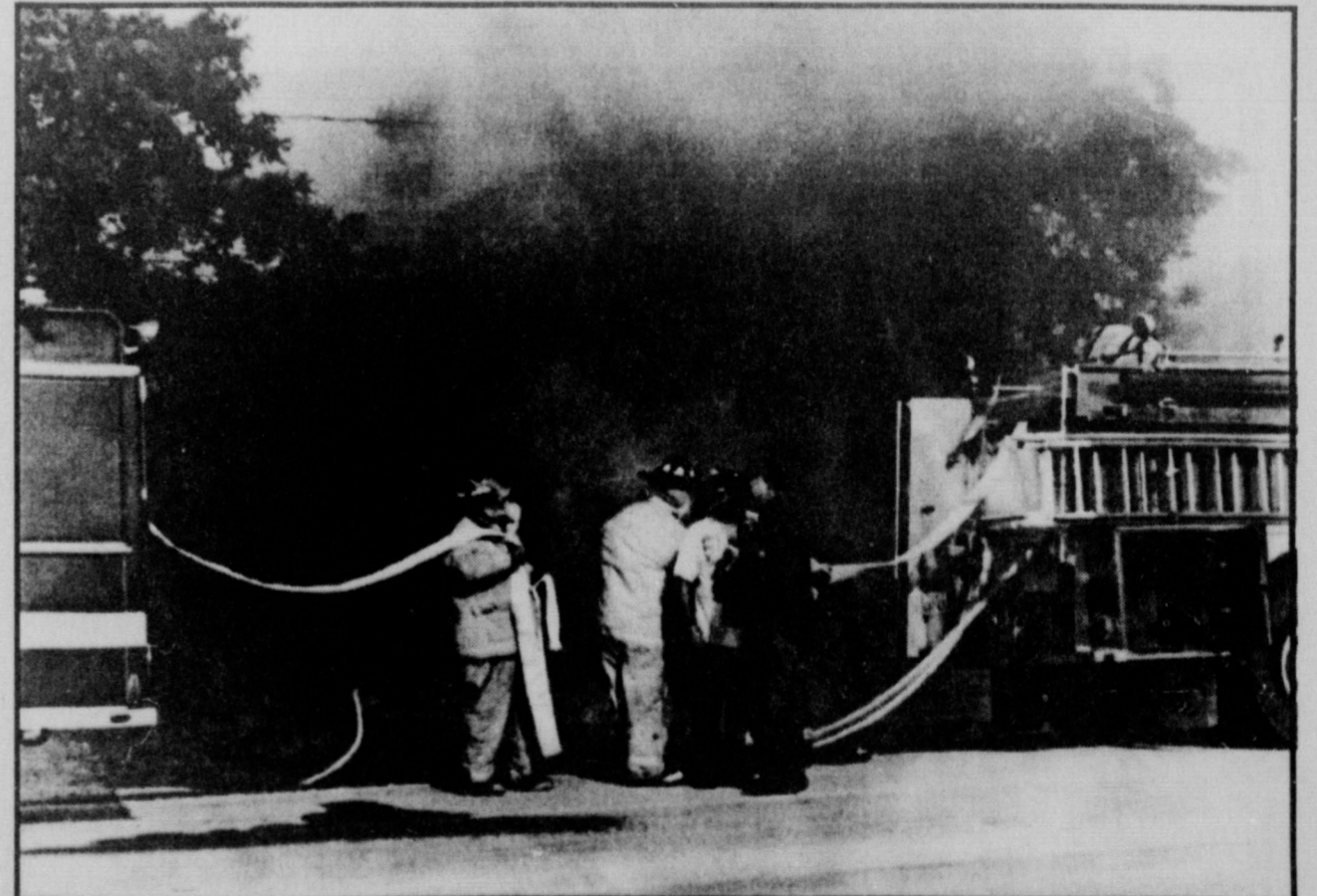
The Red Cross reported 13 pints of blood were donated by Iowa Park

Sheppard AFB preparing for Fourth of July event

Sheppard Air Force Base is once again busy preparing to welcome friends and neighbors to one of Texoma's premier Fourth of July events, Freedom Fest.

Admission is free and everyone is invited.

Freedom Fest is to kick off at 4 p.m. in the picnic ground area near the base hospital, and come to a close at 10 p.m. with a fireworks display choreographed to some of America's favorite patriotic songs.

Approximately 20,000 people are expected to visit the festival grounds. Festival attendants are asked to enter the base through the Missile Road gate. Handicap entrance is through the hospital gate. Shuttle buses will be provided to and from the festival grounds and to the static displays.

"As people come out, they'll see a lot of red, white and blue. This should be a good time for all to celebrate our country's birthday," said Jan Wehmeyer, 82 Training Wing Services. "We look forward to everyone coming out for this year's celebration and having a great time. This is just one way Sheppard can show appreciation for all the support the community gives the base."

For the young at heart during Freedom Fest, lots of activities are planned, for those who like to have fun, such as face painting, dunking booth and balloon animals. Children can also take part in pony and horse rides, moonwalk, and Jupiter jump. Tutti Frutti and Pepper the Clown will travel around the grounds providing various amusement. As another attraction, three shows will exhibit Magic Ramblin Rose.

While walking the grounds, Freedom Fest attendants will see food, beverage and novelty booths and canopies which can help quench thirst, satisfy appetites and just be fun.

Craft tents will also be on site, offering various arts and crafts at a reasonable price.

More than 80 cars will be on display, ranging from street rods, an-

tiques, classics, convertibles and customized trucks.

Top awards will be presented in each of the categories and an overall commander's choice, people's choice and best of show will be awarded.

Sheppard has lined up many rising talents which are bound to satisfy several musical fancies.

Beginning in the afternoon, and continuing until dusk, attendants can enjoy a variety of tunes on the stage located on the north end of the festival grounds.

There will be non-stop entertainment on two stages from 4 p.m. right up through the start of the fireworks display. The Ranch Rockers and Shasta, Bigloo, A.A. Bottom, Profile, Michael Merrill, and D.J.s from Apex Broadcasting as well as Texas Nightlife will ensure the crowds are continuously entertained. In addition to individual performance, the entertainers will join forces to present an All Star Review during the minutes leading up to the spectacular fireworks display which Freedom Fest is known for throughout the Texoma community.

Several aircraft displays will be on the ramp behind Building 1020, approximately one quarter mile from the festival grounds. Among the aircraft to be displayed are: a C-130 Hercules, KC - Stratotanker, F - 16 Thunderbird, F-111 Aardvark, T-37 Tweet, AT - 38 Talon, F-15 Eagle and a A-10 Warthog. Photography is allowed and pilots and maintenance personnel will be on hand provide guided tours and answer questions about the planes.

Throughout the day, tournament events for single and team sports take place for participants and spectators alike.

This year's games offer seven different competitions, several softball, racquetball, and mud volleyball tournaments, basketball, shoot-out, and 5K and 10K run/walk. Advance registration is necessary to participate in all of the sporting events.

Pullman blankets donated to museum

George M. Pullman (US inventor, 1831-97) would be pleased!

The Wichita Falls Railroad Museum recently acquired three woolen Pullman blankets for their Pullman car. The car is among the museum's prestigious train collection and other railroad memorabilia.

Each blanket is imprinted PULLMAN and two are imprinted with specific berth numbers. Also included with the blankets was a Pullman pillowcase.

Randy Duke, museum president, accepted the donations from Mrs. Anne Strome of Burkburnett (formerly of Iowa Park).

The blankets and pillowcase, believed to be more than 50 years old, belonged to Mrs. Strome's mother, the late Mrs. Lloyd (Betty) Lowe of Iowa Park.

Mrs. Lowe's brother, William M. Flippen, of Keddie, Calif., and a former brakeman for the Western

Pacific Railroad, had given the blankets to his sister when the company replaced them with new ones.

"Times were hard in those days and many families didn't have blankets to keep warm during the winter months," said Mrs. Strome. "The company gave them to the railroad families instead of destroying them," she explained.

Flippen and a fellow brakeman were killed in a company-owned cabin in Bieber, Calif., Nov. 16, 1952. The two-man crew had been dropped off from their run to get some rest and were to be picked up the next day.

It was then that the in-coming crew made a gruesome discovery. The cabin had burned to the ground during the night, and the pair had perished in the fire.

It was determined by authorities that the men had attempted to escape but had been overcome by fumes and asphyxiation. The fire had started

from fireplace cinders that had apparently rolled out onto the floor while the men were sleeping.

The museum, located at 501 Eighth Street, is open to the public each Saturday from noon until 4 p.m. Museum personnel give guided tours.

"Their wealth of information on railroad history is well worth a visit," said Mrs. Strome.

The tours are free of charge, but donations to the historic restoration are always appreciated.

Soells travel to Singapore

Dr. Erwin F. Soell, member of the Iowa Park Rotary Club, and his wife Margaret, were among some 18,000 Rotarians and guests from 125 countries gathered in Singapore June 13-16 for Rotary International's 90th annual convention.

The Rotarians were drawn together by a common mission -- building better communities and helping children through its vast international network of volunteers.

Through plenary sessions, panel discussions and workshops, participants helped plan for Rotary's future and exchange information about international humanitarian projects addressing literacy, poverty and hunger, and exchange programs.

International President James R. Lacy acknowledged the warm welcome by Singapore, as Rotary's annual convention returned to Asia for the third time in 11 years.

"In Singapore, we found that the people and government embrace the same spirit of community that Rotary club members strive for in their hometowns," said Lacy.

"When it comes to community involvement, it is important that business and professional leaders work with the government and reach out to those who are in need," said Dr. Soell.

She likes to prepare old fashioned recipes and does not like to use mixes.

Mary and David are members of the Church of Christ.

King Ranch Casserole

- 1 pkg. corn tortillas
- 1 large fryer
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 large chopped onion
- 1 large chopped bell pepper
- 1/2 lb. grated Cheddar cheese
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- Garlic powder to taste
- 1 can Rotel tomatoes

Add some whole kernel corn. Stew chicken in salted water until tender. Remove meat from the bone.

Soak tortillas in hot chicken broth until wilted.

Line a 9x12 layer pan with tortillas. Then add diced chicken. Mix other ingredients and pour over chicken. Spread Rotel tomatoes over soup mixture. Top with grated cheddar cheese.

Bake at 375 degrees 30 minutes.

This casserole will freeze well.

Vegetable Medley Casserole

- 1 pkg. frozen California Blend vegetables
- 1 can cream mushroom or chicken soup
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

"I usually cook the vegetables some first, otherwise they don't get good and done."

Drain and mix in the can of soup and the cheese. Pour into casserole dish.

Topping
Crush about 30 Ritz crackers and stir into one stick of melted butter or oleo.

Sprinkle over top and bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

Sweet Potato Casserole

- 3 cups mashed sweet potatoes or 2 large cans drained
- 1 1/2 cup sugar
- 3/4 stick oleo
- 1 cup canned milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix and pour into greased casserole. Bake at 425 degrees 20 to 25 minutes.

Topping
3/4 stick of oleo
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup crushed corn flakes
1/2 cup pecans

Mix and spread over potatoes. Return to oven for 20 minutes at 400 degrees. This freezes well.

Chocolate Pie

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 3 Tbsps. cornstarch
- 2 squares Bakers unsweetened chocolate
- 4 eggs yolks

Mix well. Cook until thick; beat mixture until smooth. Pour into baked pie shell.

Shoe Peg Corn Casserole

- 4 cans shoe peg corn
- 1 cup milk
- 3 Tbl. flour
- 8 ounces cream cheese

Add all together with pinch of salt; add jalapenos, chopped, to taste (3 or 4 large peppers).

Bake in casserole 350 degrees one hour.

Ginger Snaps

- Cream until fluffy:
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup firm packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 egg

- Sift together:
- 2 1/4 cups flour
- 2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. ginger
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. cloves

Stir into honey mixture. Form balls, about the size of a quarter. Roll balls into granulated sugar. Place balls onto cookie sheet. (do not mash the balls.) Bake 350 degree for 8 minutes. This is a soft cookie.

I'm sure hoping the majority of our subscribers get their issues of the paper on time this week.

There were some changes in rural routes in the Iowa Park area this week, and Wichita Falls completely eliminated two of its zip codes.

The changes caused me about five hours of extra work on one of our computers, as well as one serious headache.

I just hope I made all the corrections that were specified.

As has happened before, the Wichita Falls post office never bothered to communicate with me. I had to learn of that change by reading about it in the Wichita Falls newspaper.

For an outfit that handles everybody else's communications, the Wichita Falls postal people don't do a very good job of their own.

About 20 years ago, a part of Iowa Park's rural route was turned over to Wichita Falls. The first I heard of it was when that post office sent me a bill for several dollars, with corrections on the dozens of address changes.

I complained, and finally didn't have to pay that bill. But all those subscribers failed to get their papers a couple of weeks.

The Iowa Park area is growing these days, and so for improved efficiency, apparently, changes were

made for all three of the rural route carriers.

No, the changes didn't completely require me to redo my mailing list, but there were several of them.

This was necessary, because we bundle papers according to the rural route number.

This wasn't the first time for changes in the rural route. There used to be only two routes, so when the third was added, it required a wholesale changing on our computer.

That was kinda like, but not as bad, as when our post office added a fifth letter carrier route.

Oh, I'm furnished a listing -- of sorts -- on how the routings are numbered, but some times when these things come about, I kinda get confused.

That's why I said, I sure hope all our subscribers get their papers on time this week. I've done what I could to assure it.

I failed to make mention about the passing of politician Bob Bullock.

When he became state comptroller, Bob and I locked horns a number of times. I didn't like some of his actions and comments, and he didn't like what I wrote about them in my column.

One day I picked up a box addressed to me at the post office. When

I opened it, and rummaged through wadded up newspapers to get to the middle, I found Bob's message.

It was a horse dropping, with his personal card stuck to it. I later heard he did the same thing for two daily newspapers in the state, but I was the only weekly so recognized.

The message was plain and understood.

I still have it. I had planned to take it to Austin this past spring, when the folks down there were giving him a farewell party, and return it, personally, with my business card stuck beside his.

But I didn't.

Actually, in the period following that mailing, when Bob began to sober up and realize he also could make mistakes, we developed a very cordial friendship.

When he'd visit with other newspaper types and I wasn't there, he'd ask about me. I appreciated it.

Bullock's death kinda hit me, and I hated to read of his passing.

He was a toughie, turned into a real Good'un.

Rest in peace, Bob Bullock.

Local TAAS scores above state's

Results of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) tests, taken by Iowa Park students last spring, show that most scores remained relatively stable.

Students in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and tenth grades took the test.

This is the first year that special education students' scores have been included.

When comparing local test results to the statewide average, Iowa Park students did well, surpassing the state in most areas.

Following are the local TAAS results.

At the third grade level, 93 percent of all students who took the reading test passed, while 87 percent passed the math test.

Ninety-four percent passed the fourth grade reading test; 98 percent passed the math test; and 82 percent passed the writing test.

In the fifth grade, 91 percent passed the reading test and 95 percent passed the math test.

Ninety-two percent of all students taking the sixth grade math test passed, and 89 percent passed the reading test.

In the seventh grade, 88 percent passed the math test and 83 percent passed the reading test.

On the eighth grade level, 88 percent passed reading, 86 percent passed math, 96 percent passed writing, 93 percent passed science, and 75 percent passed the social studies test.

On the 10th grade exit-level test, 91 percent passed the reading test, 82 percent passed math, and 96 percent passed the writing test.

Tips for automobile theft prevention

Every five minutes a car is stolen in Texas.

This is something the Texas Department of Transportation's Automobile Theft Prevention Authority (ATPA) wants to change.

In observance of Watch Your Car Awareness Week, May 21-28, ATPA is reminding Texans that participating in auto theft prevention programs pay off.

This year the "Watch Your Car" campaign will focus on a law that prohibits motorists from leaving their vehicle unattended while it is running. Texans found breaking the law would face a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$200. Records show that nearly 20 percent of all vehicles stolen had the keys in them.

ATPA is partnering with law enforcement officials across the state and the Texas Department of Public Safety to spread the message about auto theft prevention. Public service announcements began airing this week and local law enforcement agencies across the state are planning registration drives for anti-theft programs.

One program available to vehicle owners is Help End Auto Theft (H.E.A.T.) registered 60,000 vehicles in Texas.

Protect Our Parts (P.O.P.) is another program motorists can take to increase the recovery rate of stolen

vehicles and parts. Vehicle owners can obtain information on the program from law enforcement officials

during Watch Your Car Awareness Week or by calling 800-CAR-WATCH.

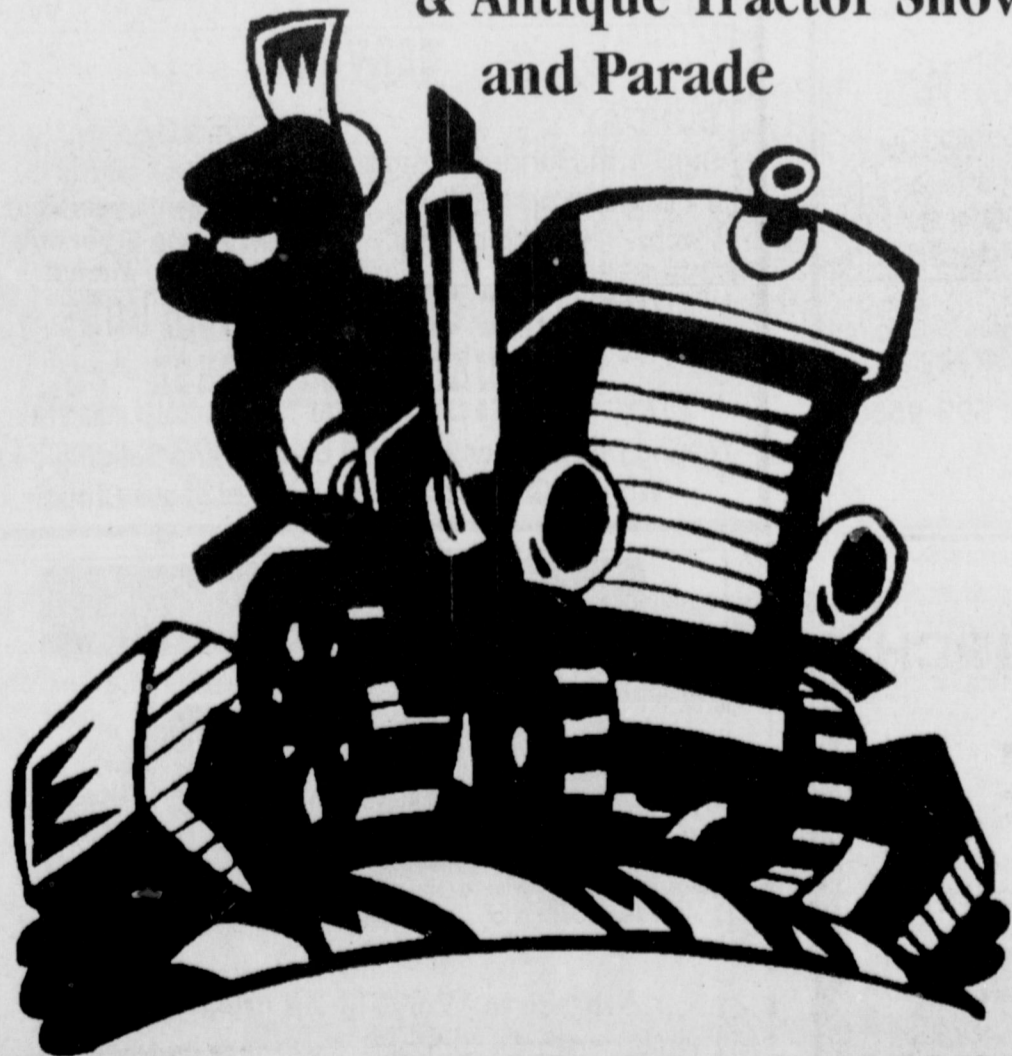

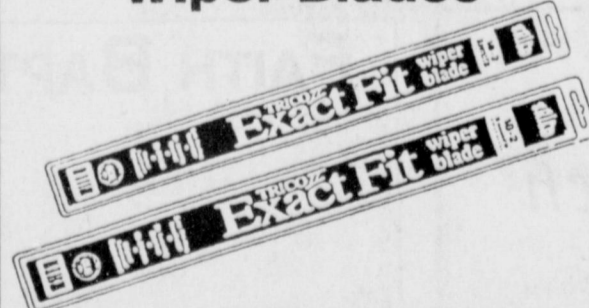

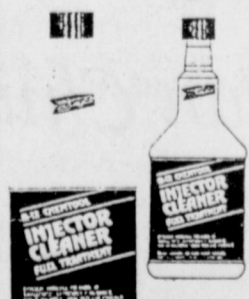

Sealed Air Corp. holds annual meeting

Sealed Air Corporation announced on June 18 that it had adjourned its 1999 Annual Meeting of Stockholders for the second time. The Company's Annual Meeting will reconvene on Friday, July 16, at 10 a.m. local time at the Company's headquarters at Park 80 East, Saddle Brook, N.J.

The meeting was adjourned in order to accept additional votes and proxies from stockholders of record as of March 24, 1999 on proposals to repeal three provisions in the Company's Charter. The Sealed Air board has recommended that stockholders vote for the repeal of these provisions: a classified board; a prohibition against stockholder action by written consent; and an 80% vote requirement for repeal or amendment of company by-laws. These provisions were inherited when the Sealed Air and Cryovac Packaging busi-

nesses were merged in March of 1998. The repeal of these inherited provisions requires the affirmative vote of at least 80% of the combined voting power of the company's stock.

T.J. Dermot Dunphy, Sealed Air's Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, said, "We are continuing our efforts to remove these inherited provisions that we believe are not in the best interests of the company and its stockholders. We have already received a substantial favorable vote for these proposals and are currently within approximately three percent of the required 80% approval. Of those who have voted, over 89% have voted in favor of repealing these provisions. We believe we are in sight of

our goal."

At the first session of the annual meeting on May 21, the company's stockholders selected four Class I Directors of the Company and ratified the appointment of KPMG LLP as the independent auditors of the company for the year ending December 31, 1999.

AG AGENT'S REPORT

Odds and Ends

Well, we just about have the wheat out of the fields. This has been a quick harvest when you consider all the rain and adverse weather conditions we have had to work through. I have heard of some good years across the county, and hope that you made at least what you expected or more.

I have some "odds and ends" to take care of this week. None of which was really long enough to make one article, so I decided to combine them.

First thing is the A.I. Clinic which will be sponsored by ABS. The contact person on this clinic is Vernon Friedrich, of Friedrich Breeding Service in Gainesville. The clinic will take place on July 22-24 at Wichita Livestock Auction, which used to be Arrowhead Livestock Auction.

In addition to teaching A.I. and/or pregnancy determination, participants will get classroom instruction in anatomy and physiology, successful feeding and mineral programs, genetic selection and record keeping, programs for heifers, techniques used in handling calving problems, and effective herd health programs.

The total cost of the clinic, if you want to learn to A.I. only is \$300, pregnancy determination only is \$300, and A.I. and pregnancy determination together is \$500.

To sign up, you need to call Vernon Friedrich at (940) 665-4952 and send a \$100 deposit. The remainder will be collected the day of the clinic at Wichita Livestock Auction.

Next, there is a great school on grazing and grazing management that Kim Barker puts on around the state. This school teaches the finer points of grazing management. Topics to be discussed will include: grazing from an animal's perspective, with an eye toward animal performance, the effects on various grazing behaviors on forage, how to use animals as tools to accomplish long term goals, grazing planning and use of charts, how to set goals for the long term ecology of your ranch, monitoring your forage, and how to manipulate successions.

What I need, is to see if there is enough interest in the area to put on one of these schools. The cost is around \$200 per person, and it is generally 2 to 3 days in length.

If you are interested, give me a call at the office and we will go from there. Most of these schools require that we have around 20-30 participants before the school makes. So, give me a call if you are interested.

And lastly, Steer Validation. If you own a steer that you are planning to show at the county stock show or at a major stock show, Steer Validation will be June 29 at Mark Copus' barn in Burkburnett. From I-44 take the very last exit before you cross the bridge into Oklahoma, Mark's barn is located about half a mile west from I-44.

Validation will start at 7 a.m. The cost of validation is \$3, which covers the cost of the tag. Remember that all cards must be signed by the parent and exhibitor, so parents need to be on site to sign cards. And, remember to bring your SS #.

GARDENING HINTS

By MARK TERNING

Q. I have a large planting of Crapemyrtles in my Wichita Falls landscape. Some of the plants have a mildew on the leaves. Others are fine. What is happening? How can I control this problem?

A. The problem with your Crapemyrtles is a common disease problem during humid, wet weather which is appropriately called Powdery Mildew.

Some cultivars of Crapemyrtle appear to be more susceptible than others. Newer hybrids developed by the United States National Arboretum typically have greater resistance to this fungal disease.

Location in the landscape also has an effect. Locations with limited air flow, such as in courtyards or tight groupings of plants will undoubtedly have a greater occurrence of mildew. This may explain why some of your plants are affected and others are fine.

Controlling Powdery Mildew on Crapemyrtles is fairly easy. Apply the fungicide Funginex at 10 to 14 day intervals when conditions are favorable for disease development.

For your information, we are developing a Crapemyrtle test site in Dallas at our Texas Agricultural

Extension Service Research and Extension Center. We will test a vast number of different Crapemyrtle cultivars for performance and of course disease resistance at this location. This should offer some excellent information in the years ahead.
