

Texas prisons are nearly full. In response to growing concerns about crime

Recently, the Texas Board of Criminal Justice cited prison expansion as a

major factor in the reduction of crime. But while the "Texas Solution" has

made Texas safer, prison capacity is at 97.9 percent. Today, there are four

times as many Texans in jail than there were in 1988. By 2003, the state prison

in the late 1980s, Texas lawmakers lengthened sentences and tripled prison.

capacity at a cost of \$2.5 billion. This approach became known nationally as

Actually, we have added even more security to our residence in recent years, in addition to locking.

I had a sensor light installed overlooking my driveway, and it is highly effective.

Additionally, because we love dogs, we now have three living in the house, including one that could tear the leg off an intruder.

My parents never locked our house while I was living at home. Well, actually, they did for some reason or another, one time.

I'll never forget that one time. It was the first day of summer vacation after the school year. I worked all that day on my new job as a lifeguard at Hereford's first swimming pool.

Sitting out in the sun all day was nothing for me. After all, I had been active in track all spring, and had my usual suntan.

That's not accurate, actually. I had always worn my track shoes, so my feet weren't tanned.

Boy, they blistered badly, before I knew it.

After the pool closed, I rushed home to change into some tennis shoes, because I was on a softball team that was playing under the lights that night.

For some reason I can't remember, my folks had gone to visit some friends. And they had locked the

I went on and played the game that night . . . in a brand new pair of leather shoes. It was painful.

My feet swelled so badly by the time I returned home that night that I couldn't walk the next day.

Obviously, that painful situation has nothing to do with whether or not we locked our doors. I just thought about it when discussing the need of securing homes and vehicles.

Folks, learn from the experience of others. Lock your vehicles and homes when you're not in them.

It could very well save you a lot of trouble . . . and our police officers





Expanding the prison system to accommodate the expected 5,000-bed shortage over the next few years could cost up to \$400 million-a considerable expense to taxpayers when combined with other important needs such as funding our One alternative is to lease beds from county jails. There are some 4,000 prison beds available in county jails that could be leased by the state. The state has been leasing about 3,000 county prison beds for the past two years. This alternative allows for the continued lock up of people who choose to break the law and could prove beneficial to some local county jails. However, it may prove only a temporary solution.

Some believe that early and more frequent parole of convicted criminals is another alternative for creating prison space. In 1990, almost 80 percent of inmates considered were approved for parole. By 1998, this figure was reduced to 20 percent. Some policymakers counter that many non-violent offenders are denied parole who might benefit from job training, literacy, and substance abuse programs to ease them back into society. However, even with low parole rates, more than two-thirds of the 37,000 incoming inmates were parole or probation violators in 1998.

A related issue is prison violence. Some prison officials argue that lengthier sentences and decreased rates of parole have led to an increase in prison violence. In 1990, there were 1,400 reports of violence in Texas prisons; in 1999, there were 14,500 such reports. As conditions become more crowded, inmates feel they have nothing to lose through violence.

Test dates set for Credit by Exam

Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District students can receive credit for classes by taking a "Credit by Exam" test in any elementary grade level or secondary subject area. The state has identified two different types of these tests:

1: With Prior Instruction Credit by Exam

A student who has received prior instruction in a course or subject but failed the course or subject with a grade of no less than 60 may earn credit by passing an examination on the essential knowledge and skills defined for the subject or course. To receive credit, a student must score at least 70 on the examination. A student may not use this examination to regain eligibility to participate in extracurricular activities. Students must pay the testing fee to participate in this type of Credit by Exam.

2. Without Prior Instruction Credit by Examination

A student will be permitted to take an examination to advance to earn credit for an academic course for which the student has no prior instruction. A student planning to take an examination for acceleration must register with the counselor no later than 30 days prior to the scheduled testing date. The District will order and pay for the test and administer it. A student must score 90 or above to receive credit for the course or subject for which he/she is taking the test.

After witnessing the Iowa Park firemen and EMTs trying to save the life of his grandfather, Michael Fulbright decided he wanted to be a part of the team that works hard to save lives and property.

He joined the fire department in 1996 shortly before his father, Randy joined. Michael says he thought he had to be 21 to join or he would have joined sooner.

Fulbright says shortly after joining the fire department he learned not a lot of people want to volunteer their time. He says the firemen count is not growing with the growth of Iowa Park.

Only six or seven of the firemen are available during day time hours.

Fulbright is employed at Eighth Street Campus of United Regional Health Care Center as a security officer. He recently switched to the night shift so he could be available for fire and EMT calls during the day.

He explained, when they are a daytime fire call, they don't always have enough firemen to give them a

When they go into a structure fire, besides their 25 pound bunker gear (fire protection clothes, boots, and helmet), they must pack an air tank that weighs about 25 to 30 pounds. The air tank holds 25 minutes of air but if a firemen doesn't control his breathing the air tank can run out in a lot less time. A bell sounds when they get low on air to alert the fireman it is time to exit the structure. The average time a fireman stays in a structure fire is nine to 12

Carrying the weight, coupled with the extreme heat, can quickly take it's toll on a person. Some of the firemen handle the heat better than

Although a structure fire gets really hot, Fulbright says sometimes fighting a grass fire can be worse. "When the temperature is 100-plus degrees with the fire producing heat and the heavy gear, in about ten or fifteen minutes it can zap you," Fulbright said.

There is more to being a fireman than answering calls. Fulbright says though this department is volunteer many don't realize the firemen and EMTs still must have the same training and abide by the same rules and

requirements as a professional fireman or EMT.

Each year firemen attend training throughout Texas. Many use their vacation time to go to training. Fulbright says he used his vacation time two years ago to attend the Texas A&M Fire Training Program.

"Many times people don't think about what we do until they have to use our service," Fulbright said.

He says when the firemen are trying to put out a house fire they are not just trying to stop the fire, they are also trying to save as much of the contents as possible. "People's lives are in that house. Pictures, things their children have made them and many other memories that we are trying to save," Fulbright said. "While we are inside the house trying to contain the fire we often pick up items that we think might mean something to the family and try to keep it from getting wetter or more damaged as we put out hot spots."

Fulbright says what the fire department does with children brings him the most enjoyment.

The Toys for Tots program is one of his favorites, because his heart goes out to children.


The fire department also gives programs at the schools. In addition to fire prevention, they give programs teaching children not to hide, This involves putting on their gear and getting in the floor with the children and talk with them so the kids can see and hear what they are like when in their fire gear.

Fulbright says during a fire often children get scared and hide behind and under things and it helps when the child knows how a fireman looks and sounds.

He added the firemen are trained to look for children hiding and it is amazing where they might hide dur-

Fulbright says in addition to all the things he enjoys doing with the fire department he really enjoys the family relationship they have.

Fulbright says his fiancee, Mindy Atchley, is excited about what he does and she understands when they have to miss a date or something. He says his son, who is a year old, has started waving "bye" when the fire tone is sounded.

Ice Cream & Cookie Sundaes

4 soft oatmeal cookies (2-3 inches in diameter)

1/2 cup butterscotch, chocolate or caramel ice cream topping 1 small banana

2 cups vanilla or chocolate ice cream 1/4 cup peanuts

Break cookies into small pieces. Arrange a layer of cookie pieces in the bottom of each dish. With a small spoon, put some of the ice cream topping over the cookie pieces. Save the rest of the topping for later use.

Peel the banana. Slice it with a table knife. Arrange some banana slices in each dish. Use an ice cream scoop or large spoon to place icream into each dessert dish. Spoon the remaining ice cream topping over the ice cream. Sprinkle each serving with some peanuts.

Top each dessert with whipped dessert topping and serve right away. Makes 4 servings.

Grilled Meat & Cheese Sandwich

1 Tbsp. butter or margarine 2 slices white or whole wheat bread 2 slices American, Swiss, Cheddar, or Colby cheese

Spread butter or margarine on The following recipes can be one side of each bread slice. Put one slice, margarine side down, in the skillet. Put a slice of cheese; a slice of ham, chicken, or turkey; and another slice of cheese on top. Put the remaining slice of bread with the margarine side up, on top of the cheese.

> Put the skillet on a burner. Turn the burner to medium, and cook for 4 to 5 minutes or until the bottom side is toasted and golden. To check the bottom, lift the sandwich with a spoon so the dough is slightly spatula and peek underneath.

Dip apple wedges, orange slices or strawberries into the chocolate

Cookies 1/2 cup margarine or butter (1 stick)

Chocolate Chip Oatmeal

1 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. baking soda 1 cup quick-cooking rolled oats

1 - 6 ounce pkg, (1 cup) semisweet chocolate pieces Remove the margarine or butter

from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before making the cookies.

Turn oven to 375 degrees. Put margarine in large bowl and beat 30 seconds with electric mixer at medium speed.

Crack the egg into a custard cup or small bowl. Add egg, flour, sugar, brown sugar, vanilla, and baking soda to the margarine. Beat on medium speed about 2 minutes or until well mixed. As you mix, scrape sides of bowl with rubber scraper as needed. Use a spoon to stir in oats and chocolate pieces.




Put the cookie sheet in the oven and bake 8 to 10 minutes or until brown. While the cookies bake, drop more cookie dough on another cookie sheet. Use hot pads to remove the cookie sheet from the oven. Put the second cookie sheet into the oven. Use a spatula to lift the baked cookies onto a cooling rack. When the first cookie sheet is cool, drop more dough onto it. Repeat with remaining dough. Makes about 40 cookies.

Fresh Sweet Butter

Pour 1/2 pint heavy cream into a 1 pint jar with tight-fitting lid. Screw the lid on the jar. Be sure it's tight. Shake the cream intil it makes a lump of butter. Spread the fresh butter on toast, biscuits, muffins or pancakes.

There will be some liquid left in the jar. That's buttermilk! Drink it or use it in cooking.





AG AGENT'S REPORT

Drought Assistance

This is just a reminder of the different drought assistant programs that are available through TDA. I have had some calls from local growers and others about some of these programs, so I thought it would be applicable to list them again.

November 2, 1999, Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman declared Wichita County a disaster due to losses caused by drought that occurred June 1 through August 31, 1999. Also eligible, because they are contiguous, are Archer, Baylor, Clay and Wilbarger.

The programs that I am aware of to date are the following: Loan Guaranty Program, The Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA) provides financial assistance through loan guarantees to eligible agricultural businesses that are, or proposed to be, engaged in innovative, diversified, or value-added production, processing, marketing, or exporting of an agricultural product or other agricultural-related rural economic development projects.

These include projects involved in the development of nature-tourism in Texas.

may provide a direct loan to an eligible applicant in cooperation with the applicant's lender. TAFA consider a direct loan in an amount not to exceed \$250,000 only when the eligible applicant and a participating lender provide evidence that a direct

loan is in the best interest of the applicant, the lender, or TAFA.

Participation Purchase Program . . . TAFA is authorized to provide assistance to lending institutions for eligible agricultural projects through the purchase of an undivided interest in a loan made by a lender. The program provides that the maximum participation purchased by TAFA cannot exceed \$5 million.

Young Farmer Loan Guarantee Program... TAFA provides financial assistance through loan guarantees to eligible applicants from 18 to 39 years of age who wish to establish or enhance their farm and/or ranch operation or establish an agricultural-related business. The program provides up to a 90 percent guarantee to a lender for an eligible applicant, not to exceed \$250,000.

Farm & Ranch Finance Program . . . TAFA provides financial assistance to eligible, credit-worthy

applicants for the purchase of farm land and/or ranch land that will be in full time agricultural use. Applicants may finance the land purchase through a participating lending institution with a 5% minimum down payment. The program provides a maximum commitment by TAFA of \$250,000.

Linked Deposit Program . . . TAFA encourages private commercial lending at below market rates to eligible applicants for eligible projects. Eligible projects include: production of an alternative crop, a value-added project, a project that is located in a USDA, or Presidential declared disaster area, and a project using water conservation techniques

or purchasing water conservation

equipment.

SBA Declaration 9F80... These loans are available to small businesses that have suffered financial losses and are dependent on farmers and ranchers who sustained crop losses as a result of drought. Farmers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought can apply.


