

For the next six years he served as an assistant professor at Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene, Texas, teaching botany and establishing the HSU herbarium. Subsequently he continued his graduate studies by attending the University of Tennessee at Knoxville where he received the Ph.D. in Botany/Plant Taxonomy in Andrea McFadden and long-time associate 1968. herbarium in 1973. Mahler was publisher of Sida, Botanical Miscellany after he and Barney Lipscomb founded the journal in 1987. Under his guidance, the SMU herbarium grew by 72,000 specimens, eventually reaching about 400,000.

Mahler published Shinners' Manual of the North Central Texas Flora (1984, 1988), well known for its clarity and ease of use. The manual, that included the summer and fall flora for North Central Texas was an expanded version of Shinners' (1958) Spring Flora of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area Texas. For his work, Mahler received the Donovan Stewart Correll Memorial Award for scientific writing on the native flora of Texas in 1991 from the Native Plant Society of Texas. Other notable publications include the Keys to the Plants of Black Gap Wildlife Management Area. Brewster County, Texas (1971), Flora of Taylor County, Texas (1973) and The Mosses of Texas (1980). Mahler's specialties include Fabaceae. Baccharis (Asteraceae), mosses, floristics, pollen morphology, and the study of endangered plant species. In 1988, Mahler was the first recipient of the Harold Beaty Award for his work with endangered plant species in Texas from the Texas Organization of Endangered Species. The Native Plant Society of Texas again honored Mahler in 1995 with the Charles Leonard Weddle Memorial Award in recognition of a lifetime of service and devotion to Texas native plants.

In 1987 MSU put its herbarium on permanent loan to a newly created organization, The Botanical Research Institute of Texas (BRIT). Mahler received early retirement from SMU (Associate Professor Emeritus) and served as the first Director of BRIT (1987-1992). Along with

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

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Know your local fireman

Andy Payne joined the Iowa Park Fire Department Feb. 2000, to help people of the community.

Payne says one of the reasons he was drawn to the fire department was because of an incident that happened when he and his family lived in Burkburnett about five years ago.

Payne and his family were home when a fire started in their home. He says his middle son was just three weeks old. Payne says he was scared but he managed to get the fire out before the Burkburnett Fire Department got to the scene. But, he still needed their assistant in ventilating the home. Though all the family members were home there were no injuries.

Payne and his wife, Jessica, have three sons, Timothy, Levi and Kyle. They moved to Iowa Park in 1995.

Besides being an active fire department member he is also a member of the Iowa Park Optimist Club where he is on the board of directors and operates their BINGO program. He also assists with chaperoning when the club holds a dance.

Payne is employed at the United Regional Health Care System, Eleventh Street Campus in Facility Management.


The 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. hours allows him to be available to answer firedepartment calls during the evening hours and weekends.

Payne explained he and several other firemen and a couple of EMTs live on the south side of town and in the event a call comes in for that side of town, and there is a train blocking the intersections, the people on south side will still be taken care of.

They keep two trucks at the southside station. In the event of a structure fire the firemen respond to the station they live nearest, gear up, and roll the truck.

He says at times they can stay on a fire for several hours and they count on having a backup crew to give them a break. They also count on the lady auxiliary who are there with sports drinks to keep them from dehydrating.

Often when the firemen return to the station after a large fire the ladies have food there. Many times the food is donated by local eateries.

Payne says they do a lot of things besides fight fires and answer medical calls. Such as hazardous chemicals calls.

One type of chemical call they respond to is when the police find a Nazi Lab, the fire department retrieves and disposes of the chemicals and containers.

Some of the firemen attended a drug class sponsored by Department of Public Safety covering Nazi Labs and other type drugs.

Though the firemen go through a lot of training they also learn a lot from watching the veteran firemen. Such as learning what to say when trying to calm family of an injured or ill patient.

Payne says members of the fire department and the ladies auxiliary are an extended family. They work hard when they are on a call, and other times they play hard and have a great time.

Payne says he has taken his boys to the fire station and given them a tour of the station and trucks. He says they all say they want to be firemen and when they are old enough if thats what they want to do he will support

He says his brother-in-law has decided he would also like to be a member of the fire department and will be joining soon.





Council to meet Monday

Only two items were posted on the early and tentative agenda Tuesday for Monday's meeting of the city council.

They included an ordinance to annex 137 acres of land into the city limits, and a resolution concerning filing for a grant to upgrade the water line on East Washington.

Other items could be added to the agenda before it is finalized for posting Friday afternoon.

The regularly-scheduled meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Aldermen held another lengthy meeting Monday night to consider the budget from 2000-2001.

Nothing was finalized, because the council wants to wait until the year's tax roll is certified.

She says the biggest water conservation she uses is saving the water from the washing machine.

She explained she has plastic trash cans the water from the washer drains into and it is then pumped, using a sump pump, from the cans to shrubs, trees and other plants she

wants to water. Washing a full load of clothes also is a big water saver. When you wash a small load you really don't

save that much water, Pat says. Pat said she called the health department two or three years ago to verify water could be recycled. The washer water that is recycled cannot contain feces such as that from diapers, and of course no toilet water or water from the sink that contains grease. Also, no bleach water should be used because the bleach will kill

Pat says the other things she and her family does to save water is really just simple things such as," wet your hands and then turn off the water while you lather them, don't let the water run while brushing your teeth and turn the water off while washing the counters. She agrees with what the council is doing with the water restrictions and says they could be even more strict. After all, she reasons, if a family of eight can use less than 11,000 gallons of water a month can't

a family of four use half that? Ray Copening says he is much more conscious of the water he uses and now makes sure he turns off the water while shaving and brushing his teeth as well as stopping outside wa-

tering. He says at the restaurant he owns, City Cafe, they also have done what they can to cut their water use. It the past they sprayed the dishes off before washing them in the dish washer now they wash the dishes in a tub of water before running them in the dish washer. He says they also have stopped serving water unless the costumer asks for it.

Wanda Hunter says she has been concerned about the water situation before the restrictions were implemented. As a result she and Sam began saving rain water to water their garden and other foliage they just couldn't bare to lose.

She said they recently purchased a 200 gallon tank to keep the rain water in. They sit plastic barrels and buckets around the edges of the house to catch rain. Wanda says she was surprised at how much water they are able to catch running off the house.

She says they have also cut down on their water usages during bath time. She explained they wet down with a shower head turn the water off lather-up and then turn the water back on to rinse. She says we all would like to have a nice long shower but we must save water.

The rest of Iowa Park's games will be played on Friday nights starting at 7:30 p.m., with the first against Burkburnett on the road followed with Wichita Falls Hirschi here and Gainesville here. The Hawks will close out the non-district portion of their schedule on the turf at Memorial Stadium against Wichita Falls High School on Sept. 29.

Following the Coyote game, Iowa Park will have a bye week to help prepare for the start of district play

Not only will the district opponents have a bit of a different look, so will the district itself.

Last year Iowa Park competed in District 5-3A. This year with the new realignment, Iowa Park is now in District 6-3A.

Iowa Park's opening district game should be it's toughest, when the Hawks take on last year's district champs Graham at home on October

Graham is returning 24 lettermen from a 6-5 team, including six offensive and six defensive starters. The Steers lost 23 lettermen off of last year's squad.

The Hawks will hit the road for
