

Two charged with vehicle burglaries

Police arrested two 16-year-old males Friday morning on charges of burglary of a motor vehicle, and transported them to the county juvenile detention center.

The burglaries occurred in the same neighborhood in the West part of the city in late June.

One of the juveniles was charged on seven counts and the other on four,




Only problem is, I can't remember which company put out Bull Durham tobacco. There was another brand called Bugle.

Friendly Door needs help

Because the Friendly Door, Inc. is a recipient of funds from the United Way, it cannot have a fund raiser during the United Way annual drive month. The Board of Directors and employees of the Friendly Door cannot solicit donations.

I am not an employee nor a member of the board. Therefore, I can inform citizens of a need at the Friendly Door.

Members of the board and citizens of the community have been meeting and discussing changes needed at the Friendly Door, Inc. A five year plan has been written and approved by the Board of Directors showing the need for changes in various steps. One of the steps is to add a storage room to house a walkin refrigerator/freezer and for additional equipment in the kitchen for preparation of the meals in Iowa Park instead of transporting them from Wichita Falls. On the five year plan, this step was to occur in two years, but a businessman in Wichita Falls heard of these needs and is offering to sell equipment from his former business site for a fraction of the cost. The equipment is two years old and still under warranty for from two to five years. The equipment consists of a walk-in refrigerator/freezer, a 10 burner stove with 2 ovens, 2 convection ovens, a vent-a-hood, a fire suppression system, and a food slicer with sharpener. The total cost to the Friendly Door for this equipment is \$21,500. The storage facility's quoted cost estimate is \$20,000. If anyone in the community can help with money, materials and/or labor for the above project, or for further information, please call Linda Perry at the Friendly Door, Inc., (940) 592-9311. WHAT DOES GOD SAY?



About the love of God? "He hath loveth not knoweth not God: for God is love" (1 John 4:8). Although God is love, He does not love everything. In fact, there are some things God hates. "Through thy precepts I get understanding: therefore I hate every false way" (Psalm 119:104). "These six things doth the LORD hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him: A proud look, a lying tongue, and heads that shed innocent blood, An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief, A false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren" (Proverbs 6:16-19). It was the evil imaginations of man's heart that prompted God to destroy man from the earth, with the exception of Noah and his family.

God hates "every false way" and inspires all of us to love the truth but He does not force His truth upon any of us. "And with all deceivableness of unrighteousness in them that perish; because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: That they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness in them that perish; because they received not the love of the truth, that they might be saved. And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion, that they should believe a lie: That they all might be damned who believed not the truth, but had pleasure in unrighteousness" (2 Thessalonians 2:10-12). It is extremely difficult to harmonize this love of truth with the modern concept that "it makes no difference what one believes." It is equal to saying, "It makes no difference what God hates and what He loves." God's truth alone makes one free from sin and it must be known (John 8:32).

The other" abominations" of Proverbs 6, mainly relate to our behavior and responsibilities to one another. We could never harm or destroy one another with God's truth, but we can hurt others by lying, misrepresentation, gossip and physical abuse. Marriage, family and social relationships are often destroyed by these. And even more sad is the effect these abominations have upon the spiritual relationships in churches. The absence of God's truth and the presence of "self" is the formula for disaster in any relationship.

We would do well to look to the Son of God to learn to stand firm for what is right, to uphold truth without compromise, to be compassionate toward others, concerned and caring without the self-centeredness that seems to have invaded our lives. "Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves" (Philippians 2:3), is a truth of God that seems most difficult to employ in our lives. We should remember that all these things work in both directions and what we throw at others will ultimately come home to us.

"Love worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fulfilling of the law" (Romans 13:10).

Johnson continues to raise funds to complete the pledge for the Iowa Park Community Room.




