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MUSICAL TWO-A-DAYS - The Iowa Park High School marching band began its own version of two-a-days this week. Band members meet in the mornings for inside rehearsals and again in the evening for outside marching practice. The band will have its first public marching performance this year at the halftime show of the Texoma Kick-Off Classic football game on Thursday, Aug. 31, when the Hawks play the Holliday Eagles.

School dress code will be enforced

"This year we will enforce the dress code to the letter," said Alan Seay, principal at Iowa Park High School.

He said students found in violation of the dress code will not be sent home, but will be given the opportunity to call someone to bring them appropriate clothing. If they don't, the student will go into ISS for the rest of the day.

Seay commented that the length of shorts and sleeves have been the main problem in the past. Sleeves must go to the edge of the shoulder. In other words, no spaghetti straps, tank tops, or blouses with narrow shoulder straps. The length of shorts must not be more than four (4) inches above the knee when the student is standing.

Following are dress codes for each of the four campuses in the Iowa Park school district. The information should be of benefit to parents when they are shopping for their children's school clothes.

Iowa Park High School

Dress Code

General Appearance

Personal Grooming

1. Hair shall be clean and well groomed. Any hair coloring that distracts other students will not be allowed.
2. Sunglasses are not to be worn inside the campus building.
3. No nose rings, belly button ring, or tongue rings.
4. Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. Flip-flops and thong sandals are not allowed.
5. No belt chains or wallet chains will be allowed.
6. Hats, caps, headbands or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except on approved occasions.

Clothing

1. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures, or that advertise alcoholic beverages or tobacco products shall not be permitted.
2. Shirts, blouses and dresses should cover the top of the shoulders. Shirts designed to be worn in will be tucked

in at all times. Armholes on shirts should be appropriately sized to the individual, showing no underwear or skin. The neck opening on any type of shirt may not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar button of a dress shirt.

3. Pants must be no larger than 2 waist sizes above the normal for the student and the length of any pants must not compromise the safety of the student.
5. Length of shorts shall not be more than 4" (four inches) and skirts shall not be more than 2" (two inches) above the top of the knee when the student is standing. Leggings are considered to be an undergarment and are unacceptable as an outer garment. Leggings are permitted as long as the

outer garments meet dress code policy.

6. No jackets to be worn below the knee.

Specific Rules for Boys

1. Mustaches shall be well-groomed and shall not extend beyond the corner of the mouth or touch the red part of the lip. Beards shall not be acceptable. Sideburns shall be kept above the jaw line and trimmed so as not to form a beard.

2. Earrings, nose rings, belly button rings, or tongue rings are not acceptable for boys.

Specific Rules for Girls

1. See-through blouses, bare mid-ribs, halters, cut-offs, bike pants, and

Three theft cases reported

Iowa Park police are investigating three theft cases that were filed during the past week.

A resident in the 800 block of West Smith told police Saturday that numerous pieces of property had been stolen.

The items missing included a motorcycle, 1984 three-wheel vehicle, television set, microwave oven and radio-CD player.

Wednesday evening, a burglary of a building located in the 300 block of East Ruby was reported.

Included were two circular saws, two leather nail pouches, two framers, an aluminum square, and the center console for a 1983 Jeep.

Investigators reportedly have located the missing property, and charges against a suspect are expected to be filed this week, according to police.

Thursday, the owner of a 4x8

foot flat bed trailer that was parked in the 600 block of West Bank reported the property had been stolen. Value of the trailer was set at \$1,000.

A tire on two different school buses parked at the school bus barn reportedly was cut some time Tuesday night. This is the second attack on vehicles at that location, according to the police blotter.

Officers arrested Blaze Kelsey East, 21, Wednesday evening on a charge of Class C assault. The incident reportedly took place at a residence in the 100 block of West Emerald.

East was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Warnings were issued to four different residents during the past week for either watering on days not specified by the city, or for washing cars, which is not permitted under current restrictions.

Weekend shoppers to save on sales taxes

This will be a major weekend for shopping, especially for parents of school children.

The state is offering its second annual holiday Friday through Sunday, to give Texans a break on state and local sales tax on selective clothing.

Most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 will be exempted during the three-day period. According to the state comptroller's office, each qualifying item under \$100 is exempt from sales tax, regardless of a customer's total.

Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletic activities or as protective wear, including golf cleats and football pads, will not qualify for the tax exemption.

However, tax will be waived on

athletic wear used for nonathletic activities, including tennis shoes, baseball caps and jogging suits. Gym suits and uniforms are also tax exempt.

Items under \$100 that will be taxed include accessories, such as jewelry and watches, that are carried rather than worn, such as handbags, briefcases and wallets, and clothing rentals.

Belts with attached buckles are tax-exempt, but buckles without belts are not.

Customers who want to take advantage of layaway plans will also be able to benefit from the tax holiday. Qualifying clothing and shoes placed in layaway during the tax-free holiday will be tax-exempt even when taken out of layaway at a later date.

Annual yard sale slated this weekend

Saturday will be a most popular day for people who enjoy shopping yard sales.

It is the annual Back-To-School Yard Sale that is coordinated by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce. The addresses are included in an

advertisement in this week's Leader classified section.

They also will be printed on leaflets that will be available free of charge Saturday at Scobee's and K&K, according to Susan Dillard, Chamber secretary.

This week we are featuring recipes of Pat Cravens, principal at Bradford Elementary.

Pat says after cooking for a family it was hard for her to cut down and cook for just two. She says they have a lot of leftovers. She says during school she doesn't cook much but makes up for it during the summer when she has more time.

When Pat has time for hobbies she enjoys cooking, hand crafts, reading fiction books, and working in the yard.

Silver Dollars

5 cups carrots (cooked until tender)
1 med. onion chopped or a bunch of fresh green onions
1 green pepper chopped
Blend the following ingredients

together and pour over carrots, onions, and pepper.

1 10 1/2 ounce can tomato soup
3/4 cup white vinegar
1/2 cup oil
1 cup sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. mustard
1 tsp. black pepper
1 tsp. Worcestershire
Chill at least 12 hours.

This is a recipe from my mother. It's a great way to eat carrots.

Chicken Noodle Casserole

1 chicken cooked and deboned or 3 or 4 breast cooked
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 small diced onion
1 large can chopped green chilies
1 jar Cheese Whiz or 1 pound velveeta
1 package cooked noodles (drained)

Using broth from chicken (or canned broth) make a sauce by adding, cream of mushroom soup, cream of chicken soup, diced onion, chopped green chilies, Cheese Whiz or velveeta.

Bring to boil to blend ingredients well. Cook noodles. In 9X13 pan (pyrex preferred) layer noodles, chicken, sauce and then repeat layers. Top with grated cheese if desired. Cook at 350 degrees for 45 minutes to one hour. It should be bubbling.

This is a family favorite.

Cheese Ball

I got this recipe from Earlene Davis years ago but it is still my favorite cheese ball. It is simple to make and I usually divide it into 2 balls.

2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese
1 - 8 oz. pkg. Cheddar cheese, grated
1 Tbsp. chopped onion
1 Tbsp. chopped green pepper
1 Tbsp. chopped pimiento
1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 tsp. lemon juice
Dash garlic powder and salt
Shape in ball and roll in chopped pecans.

Roll Cobbler

Dough
1 1/2 cup flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 cup shorting
1/2 cup milk
Mix all ingredients. Roll or pat into oval shape.

2 cups fruit, raw, canned (drained) or frozen.
1 stick melted butter
1 1/2 to 2 cups sugar
2 cups water

Put fruit on pie crust and spread out. Roll up like a jelly roll or cinnamon roll. Slice about 3/4 to 1 inch and lay in 9X13 glass baking dish with melted butter in it.

Caramel Cream Pie

2 cups milk
3 egg yolks
1 1/2 cups sugar (divided)
2 Tbls. flour
2 Tbls. butter
1 tsp. vanilla
1 baked pie shell
Meringue
3 egg whites
pinch of cream of tartar
1/3 cup sugar

Beat together in sauce pan milk and eggs yolks. Set aside.
In skillet cook 3/4 cup of sugar over low heat. (It will melt and turn brown while you are putting the rest together.)

In a bowl mix 2 Tbls. of flour with 3/4 cup of sugar. Add to milk and egg mixture. Put into sauce pan.

Heat this until it starts getting thick. Add the cooked sugar that is now brown to the saucepan mixture. Keep cooking until it smooths out.

Remove from heat and add butter and vanilla.
Pour into baked pie shell.
Beat egg whites until stiff, add cream of tartar and sugar. Beat until stands in peaks. Put on pie and brown in oven.

This recipe is one my mom used to make when I was growing up. I don't make it often but it is well liked by everyone. You just don't get caramel pie every day.

Tomato Dip

3 cans stewed tomatoes
3 small cans tomato sauce
1 can green chilies
1 onion
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup of vinegar
garlic salt and powder
salt and pepper

Boil all ingredients 30 to 45 minutes.

You can put Rotel or jalapenos to make this hotter. It is sort of like Salsa.

Banana Nut Bread

2 cups sugar
1 1/3 cup oil
3 eggs
4 bananas, mashed
3 cups flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tsps. baking soda
1 cup pecans

Mix together and put in 2 loaf pans or 1 bundt pan. Cook 1 hour at 350 degrees.

This turns out really moist with an excellent flavor.

Fudge

5 cups sugar
2 sticks oleo
1 tall can carnation milk
2 six ounce packages chocklate chips
1 pint of Hip - O - Lite Marshmallow cream
3 cups chopped pecans

Mix sugar, oleo, and milk together and bring to rolling boil. Boil 11 minutes (or soft ball stage) and pour in chocolate chips and marshmallow cream.

When mixed, add pecans and mix well.
Pour into butter cookie sheet and cut when cool.
White chocolate can be used instead of chocolate if desired.

Danny's mother, Marie, makes this at Christmas - both chocolate and white chocolate. It's always a favorite. Everyone has to sample one of each so they can compare.

Italian Cream Cake

Cream well:
2 cups sugar
1 stick oleo
1/2 cup Crisco
Add:
5 egg yolks, one at a time
Alternately add:
2 cups flour
1 cup buttermilk
1 tsp. soda
1 can coconut
Fold in:
5 egg whites, beaten stiff
Pour mixture into 3 layer pans and bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees.

Icing:
8 oz. cream cheese, softened
1 stick oleo, softened
1 box powdered sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup nuts, chopped
I make this every year for Thanksgiving. It's always a hit.

It was only then that we would meet those who came to help and assist in any way they could until the medical team arrived. We don't know your names, but can feel your support, care and kindness to this day. You know who you are and I bet your neighbors do too.

You held us (dad, mom, two teenage girls and pet dog) and kept us calm. You gathered our things spread all over the highway and placed them in our car. You wished Godspeed and a get well soon as we were whisked away to the hospital.

We can only tell you how thankful we are for each and every one of you. We know you had choices to make... do I stop and help or do

I go on? Thank you for the choice you made to stop and render aid.

Thankfully, we all survived the accident and our wounds will heal. We want you to know how thankful we are to have been supported by the wonderful and caring community of Iowa Park, including the Police Department and Emergency Medical Support team.

Hopefully, we will once again be one of the thousands of cars passing through Iowa Park on our way to Colorado again some day soon. We thank God and you for being on our way and know you will be in our hearts for many years to come.

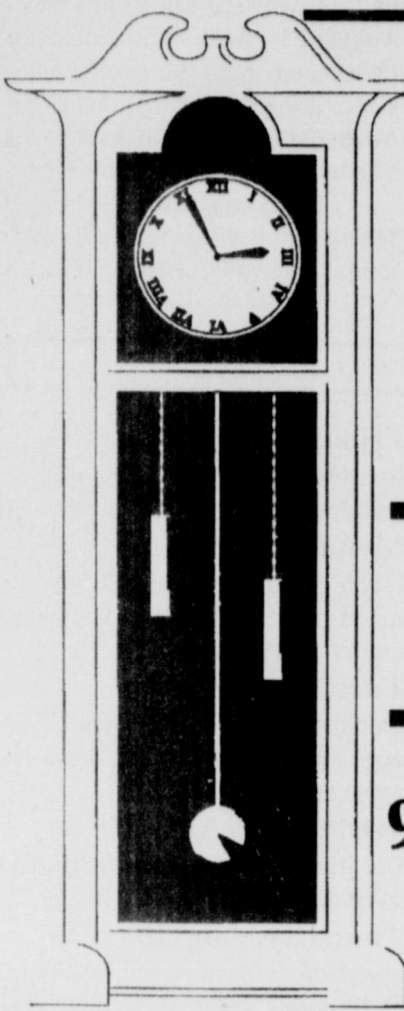

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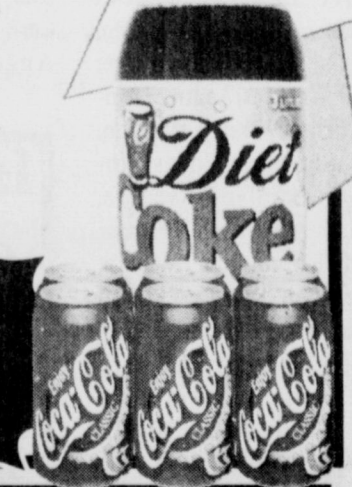

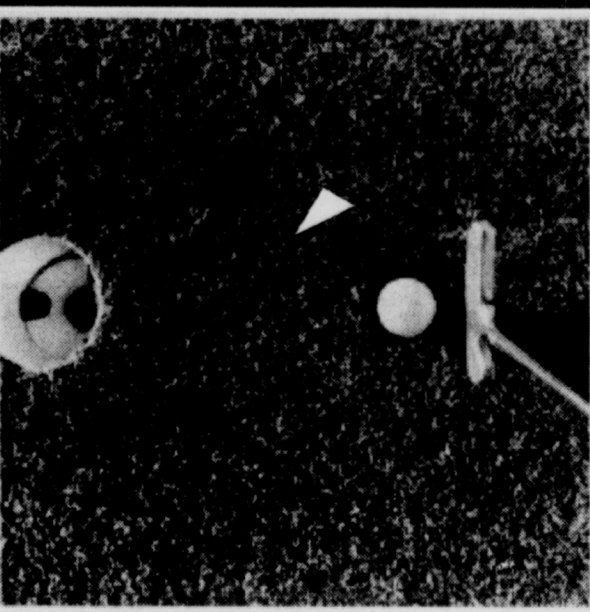

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Godwin, Tara plans to major in Horticulture Science at Texas Tech Univ.

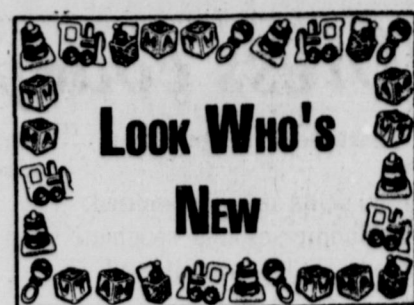

mini skirts are not permitted.
2. Sundresses and spaghetti strap dresses will not be allowed.

W.F. George Middle School Dress Code

Teachers who determine that a student is in violation of the dress code will send the student with a discipline slip to the office.

Dress Policy for Girls

1. Length of shorts shall not be more than 4" (four inches) and skirts shall not be more than 2" (two inches) above the top of the knee when the student is standing. See-through blouses, bare midriffs, halters, cut-offs, bike pants, and mini skirts are not permitted. Shirts, blouses and dresses should cover the top of the shoulders. Sundresses and spaghetti strap dresses will not be allowed.

2. Leggings are considered to be an undergarment and are unacceptable as an outer garment. Leggings are permitted as long as the outer garments meet dress code policy.

3. Umbro type or wind shorts will not be allowed. Baggy pants and gang related type clothing will not be permitted.

4. No headbands.
5. No jackets to be worn below the knee.

6. Shirts designed to be worn in will be tucked in at all times.

7. No belt chains or wallet chains will be allowed.

8. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures shall not be permitted. Underwear-type and tank-type shirts are not acceptable as outside clothing. Shirts are to be worn in, unless designed otherwise. Shirts that advertise alcoholic beverages or tobacco products are not acceptable.

9. Hair shall be clean and well groomed.

10. Footwear shall be part of regular attire.

11. Sunglasses are not to be worn inside the campus building.

12. Earrings are allowed only in the ears. No nose rings, belly button rings, or tongue rings.

13. Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except on approved occasions.

Dress Policy for Boys

1. Length of attire shall not be more than 4" (four inches) above the top of the knee when the student is standing.

2. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures shall not be permitted. The neck opening on any type of shirt may not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar button of a dress shirt. Underwear-type and tank type shirts are not acceptable as outside clothing. Shirts are to be worn in, unless designed otherwise. Clothing that advertises alcoholic beverages or tobacco products is not acceptable.

3. Umbro type or wind shorts will not be allowed. Baggy pants and gang related type clothing will not be permitted.

4. No headbands.
5. No jackets to be worn below the knee.

6. Shirts designed to be worn in will be tucked in at all times.

7. No belt chains or wallet chains will be allowed.

8. Cutoffs or bike pants are not acceptable as outer garments.

9. Footwear shall be part of regular attire.

10. Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except approved occasions.

11. Hair shall be clean and well-groomed.

12. Beards shall not be acceptable.

13. Mustaches shall be well-groomed and shall not extend beyond the corner of the mouth or touch the red part of the lip.

14. Sideburns shall be kept above the jaw line and trimmed so as not to form a beard.

15. Earrings, nose rings, belly button rings, or tongue rings are not acceptable for boys.

16. Sunglasses are not to be worn inside the campus building.

shorts be worn under dresses and skirts for physical education classes. Long dresses and spaghetti strap dresses are not permitted.

2. Sleeveless shirts are permitted. Sleeves must be hemmed and not of the tank top or spaghetti-strap variety. Cut-off (midriff) shirts, net-type shirts, tank tops, and shirts with undesirable pictures or slogans will not be worn.

3. Baggy pants and gang related type clothing will not be permitted; jeans must be short enough so as not to walk on the hem; no headbands; no jackets to be worn below the knee; and shirts designed to be worn in will be tucked in at all times.

4. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures shall not be permitted. Shirts that advertise alcoholic beverages or tobacco products or with inappropriate messages are not acceptable.

5. Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except on approved occasions.

6. Boys may not wear earrings. Other body piercing - nose, tongue, belly button, etc. - will not be allowed.

7. Students may not wear tattoos (face, arm, hand, etc.), even during football season.

8. Shoes with cleats (mud catchers), shoes with metal taps or bells, or high heel shoes shall not be worn. Sandals, especially the flip-flop or backless type, are discouraged (mainly because of safety on the playground and PE). Shoes and clothing should be suitable for both playground and indoor wear.

The final decision regarding appropriate attire will be left to the discretion of the principal.

Kidwell Elementary School Dress Code

Teachers who determine that a student is in violation of the dress code will send the student with a discipline slip to the office.

It is recommended that students not wear sandals without straps because it is difficult for P.E. Instead, they should wear shoes that are good for P.E. and recess.

Dress Policy for Girls

1. Length of shorts shall not be more than 4" (four inches) and skirts shall not be more than 2" (two inches) above the top of the knee when the student is standing. See-through blouses, bare midriffs, halters, cut-offs, bike pants, and mini skirts are

not permitted. Shirts, blouses and dresses should cover the top of the shoulders. Sundresses and spaghetti strap dresses will not be allowed.

2. Leggings are considered to be an undergarment and are unacceptable as an outer garment. Leggings are permitted as long as the outer garments meet dress code policy.

3. Umbro type or wind shorts will not be allowed. Baggy pants and gang related type clothing will not be permitted.

4. No headbands.
5. No jackets to be worn below the knee.

6. Shirts designed to be worn in will be tucked in at all times.

7. No belt chains or wallet chains will be allowed.

8. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures shall not be permitted. Underwear-type and tank-type shirts are not acceptable as outside clothing. Shirts are to be worn in, unless designed otherwise. Shirts that advertise alcoholic beverages or tobacco products are not acceptable.

9. Hair shall be clean and well groomed.

10. Footwear shall be part of regular attire.

11. Sunglasses are not to be worn inside the campus building.

12. Earrings are allowed only in the ears. No nose rings, belly button rings, or tongue rings.

13. Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except on approved occasions.

Dress Policy for Boys

1. Length of attire shall not be more than 4" (four inches) above the top of the knee when the student is standing.

2. Clothing with obscene slogans or pictures shall not be permitted. The neck opening on any type of shirt may not exceed the equivalent of the first button below the collar button of a dress shirt. Underwear-type and tank type shirts are not acceptable as outside clothing. Shirts are to be worn in, unless designed otherwise. Clothing that advertises alcoholic beverages or tobacco products is not acceptable.

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9. Footwear shall be part of regular attire.

10. Hats, caps, or any distracting or unusual ornaments will not be allowed on campus except approved occasions.

Immunization requirements are changing

A revision in the immunization requirements for children and students will require two additional immunizations than what has been required in the past.

Because of numerous cases of hepatitis B having been reported across the country in the last few years the Texas Board of Health is now requiring students and children to have a series of three hepatitis vaccinations.

Children born between September 2, 1988 and September 2, 1992 must show proof of three doses of hepatitis B vaccine or be in a program receiving the vaccination before they can start school.

Children born between September 2, 1988 and September 2, 1994 must show proof of one dose of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine received or history of previous illness.

Children with a reliable history of chickenpox can be assumed to be immune to chickenpox. According to a release from the Wichita County Public Health District a parental history is acceptable, and physician documentation is not necessary. Children without a reliable history, or with an uncertain history of chickenpox should receive the varicella (chickenpox) vaccine.

Parents should contact their private physician or the health department as soon as possible to avoid lengthy waiting times.

The immunization is available at Park Clinic in Iowa Park or the Wichita County Public Health District.

Immunizations will be given daily from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., including the lunch hour at the Public Health District. To accommodate working parents, special immunization clinics will be held August 8, and 10, from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Health Department, 1700 3rd St. in Wichita Falls.

The immunizations are available at Park Clinic during regular hours. No appointment is necessary if the child has been seen at the clinic in the past. Children who have not been seen at the clinic before must make an appointment.

Saturday last chance to buy supply kits

Saturday will be the last day to purchase full school supply kits offered by the Kidwell and Bradford PTA's.

Pick up will be from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, while supplies last. The kits will include everything a student will need to begin the year with the exception of a backpack and lunchbox.

Cost of the kits will be: Kidwell - Pre-K, \$9; kindergarten, \$26; first grade, \$28; and second grade, \$21. Kits for each grade at Bradford will cost \$28.

Nurses are needed

"A registered nursing shortage exists both in Texas and nationwide," said Cathy Bolton, Vernon Regional Junior College's Director of Health Sciences. Pointing to recently released estimates from the Texas Nurses Foundation, Bolton notes that the state needs about 40,000 more registered nurses with rural Texas accounting for 25 percent of this shortage. Nationwide, the U.S. Labor Department predicts that an additional 450,000 nurses will be needed by 2008.

"VRJC is trying to do its part in addressing the need for nurses. The college has increased the enrollment limit in the nursing program, also called Associate Degree in Nursing (ADN), includes a generic track (for those students who have no previous nursing experience) and a licensed vocational nursing track (for those students who are a licensed voca-

tional nurses). Students interested in the ADN program may begin enrolling in nursing prerequisite courses this fall.

The college also has a vocational nursing program. The application deadline for the Vernon campus program is August 1. Individuals interested in the program should call 940-552-6291, ext 2268, for more information.

Physical Therapist Assistant is another health related program available on the Vernon campus. The lectures come through the interactive television from Amarillo College to a VRJC classroom, and the labs are also held on the VRJC campus. The PTA program may be completed in two years. Upon graduation, students are eligible to take the state licensing examination.

Block scheduling introduced

Amid the building of new classrooms and renovations, students at Iowa Park High School will also be introduced to something else new - block scheduling.

Block scheduling is a schedule where classes meet every other day, Monday through Thursday, and each class meets on Friday - similar to schedules used in colleges.

The difference is instead of 50 minute class periods in a subject each day, a class period will be 1 1/2 hours long, two days a week, and 40 minutes long on Fridays.

Another difference is that instead of a seven class schedule, students will be able to take eight courses.

For example, a student could have four subjects, in 1 1/2 hour class periods each, on Monday and Wednesday, and four different subjects in 1 1/2 hour classes on Tuesday and Thursday. All classes would meet for 40 minutes on Friday.

Band and athletics will observe

the same schedule.

"I feel like the quality of learning will be at a higher level with the longer instructional time," said high school principal Alan Seay.

The teachers are being prepared for the change through instruction on staff development days and workshops at Region IX Education Center, where they learn strategies and how to make class plans for the extended class periods.

On Fridays, high school students will be dismissed at 2:50 p.m., and during football season, pep rallies will be held at that time.

Know your local firemen

Jason Kiser joined the Iowa Park Fire Department Dec. 28, 1999.

His brother, Jeff is a fireman in Williamsburg, Ohio, and had encouraged him to join the department here.

He says when he saw a fire truck responding to a call he would get excited and want to be a part of the team on the truck.

Kiser moved to Iowa Park with his parents, Sue and Henry Kiser, from Ohio after his dad retired from the military in 1980.

He is a 1993 graduate of Iowa Park High School, and is employed at Wal-Mart as a meat cutter.

His wife, Bobbi is also employed at Wal-Mart. They have a son, Nicholas, one and a half years old, and are expecting a second child.

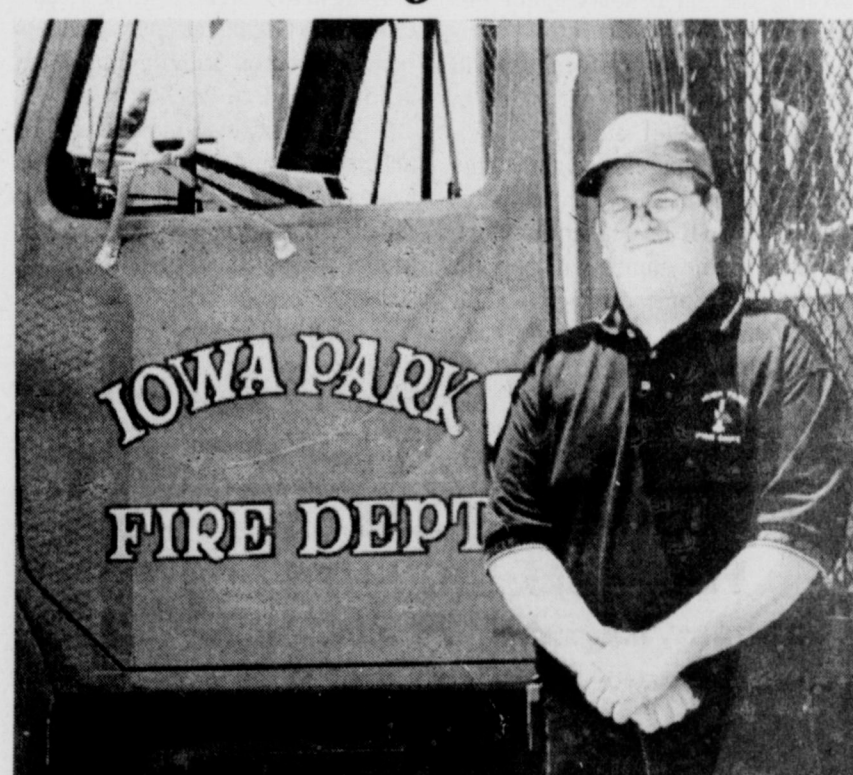
Jason says he would like to become an EMT some day, but until then he will learn as much as he can from the veteran EMT's by helping them on calls. He says the first EMT call he went on was a serious call and could have been fatal. The patient was having difficulty breathing and the next was a heart attack. The victims lived and this is why he decided he would like to become an EMT.

Jason says firemen also have a lot of responsibility. They don't just spray water on a fire and forget it. There is more to it than that. Even after the fire is out they have to check for hot spots and make sure everything is secure.

He says each fire is a learning experience and no two or alike. Each fire is handled differently depending on weather, how many fire fighters and size of the fire. One of the biggest fires Jason has been on was a large barn of hay north of town. It took sometime to get the fire out and the firemen had to go back four hours after leaving to put out more hot spots.

Jason explained that when a firemen is accepted on the fire department are placed on probation until they have responded to 10 fires.

During probation they are not allowed to speed to the fire station,

use wig wags or flashing lights, just their emergency flashers. If a veteran fireman is behind them they must yield to them and they are not allowed to drive the fire trucks. A lot of the time they will stay at the station and do paper work and after the firemen return they will help clean-up.

If a fireman violates a rule they can be placed back on probation.

They get credit for answering a call even if they don't go out on the truck, but they must respond to and stay at the station during the call.

After a structure fire the firemen must wash the water hoses. Even with the drought conditions the soot

must be washed off. They use a power washer to clean the hoses. The firemen can then check for burned places in the hose and by keeping the hose clean they last much longer.

Jason says his wife didn't care for the time he spent away from home with the fire department but she is getting to be more understanding. But she worries so much when he is on a fire call that she doesn't sleep while he's out if it's a night call.

He says at times she begs him not to respond to a fire call because of her fear. But despite her fears she does plan to join the Ladies Auxiliary.

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Season kicks off Monday

There will be no Midnight Madness and there will be no Coach Weldon Nelms when the 2000 football season officially gets underway at 7:01 a.m. Monday.

But those will probably be the only differences you'll see.

New head coach and athletic director Chris Ellis is taking a business as usual approach to his first season as the Head Hawk and plans to keep things pretty much the way they were. So you can rest easy, Iowa Park is not going to the wishbone or the run and shoot just because it got a new coach.

"I've been with coach Nelms for 10 years and I've got a pretty good grip on how things should work and what should be done," Ellis said. "So we're going to approach this year as business as usual. The UIL backed up the date we could start from Wednesday to Monday at 7:01 a.m. and I didn't feel like Sunday night was a good time to start practice, so we'll get started bright and early on Monday."

Officially you can't even start handing out equipment to players before 7 a.m., so it will be somewhere around 10-10:30 when the Hawks hit the practice field.

Ellis expects around 120 athletes to show up Monday morning when the pads are passed out, with 27 of those being seniors. He said the numbers in each classification are in the high 20's with the exception of the freshmen, which will have 40-plus kids.

Season tickets on sale Aug. 21

Season tickets for the five Hawk varsity football games to be played here this year will go on sale Aug. 21.

Those tickets will be available at the high school office, between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Season reserved seats will be \$5 per game, and be available until after the first home game, which will be Sept. 15 against Wichita Falls Hirschi.

Fans who held reserved seats last year will have the option of reserving the same seats again this season.

General admission for adults will be \$4 per game when purchased in advance and \$2 for students.

All tickets purchased at the gate will be priced at \$5.

Following the Hirschi contest, the other home games will be with Gainesville (homecoming on Sept. 22), Graham, Oct. 13; Vernon, Oct. 27; and Bowie (parent's night), Nov. 3.

As soon as all the equipment is handed out the Hawks will hold their first practice of the season, then will come back that afternoon for a second workout. On Tuesday through Thursday workouts will start at 7:30 a.m. and run through 12:30 with a 45 minute break in between practices. Friday the teachers have to get started so the workout will be in the afternoon.

Parents night will be Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the High School Cafeteria, where Ellis will introduce his staff and go over the upcoming year in sports for Iowa Park.

New coaches this year include Scott Davenport, who coached at Petrolia last year and will coach the inside linebackers this year. Greg Darden, who coached at Haskell last season will coach football and basketball in the Junior High and will assist coach Fuhrman in baseball.

Other new coaches include Ronnie Benson who coached at Harold and will be the new tennis coach, and Erin Christie who will help with the girls athletics.

Returning starters for Iowa Park include seven seniors, Russell Duggins, Brandon Lane, Michael Leal, Chase Simpson, Chase Wright, Chris Simmons and Tommy Taylor. Two junior starters return for the Hawks as well, in Kyle Young and Bryan Swenson.

When asked what he thought the team's strengths and weaknesses would be, Ellis had the following to offer.

"I think the playoff tradition we've built over the last five years will be a big plus for us," Ellis said. "The last two years we've gone three rounds in the playoffs and that will help a lot this year. Defensively we have six starters back and several others that played a lot last year so that should be another area where we

are in good shape and we should be pretty good at the running back spots. Our backs have been battle tested and have done a good job for us in the past.

"One of the weak areas I see could be our offensive line," Ellis added. "We lost James Williams, Shane Dunn and Damon Fox and all three of those were pretty good. We've got two starters back in Duggins and Young so we're needing some people to step in and play well for us up front. Tight end is another spot that we are going to have to have someone step up and play well for us, and we need to see which quarterback is going to win the battle and come out on top.

"Our overall depth should be another plus for us," said Ellis. "We feel we have several kids that can step in and play for us and not miss a beat and that's always a good thing."

Overall team speed is one of the areas Ellis is going to try to improve this year. One of the things you see different might be the smaller, faster groups of kids in certain situations this year.

Iowa Park will hold it's Intra-Squad scrimmage on Friday the 18th starting at 4 p.m., with a Meet the Hawks night to follow with the Booster Club on hand to feed the players.

The following Thursday, the 24th, Iowa Park will host former district rival Childress in it's final scrimmage of the season before the opener against Holliday on the 31st.

As it is with every high school football team in the state, expectations are high at this time of the year and every team can dream about winning that State Championship. But it's what you do in August, September and October that determine whether you're going to have success in November and December. And for the past two seasons Iowa Park has had a lot of success in the later months, and if Ellis and his staff have anything to do with it, this year will be no different.

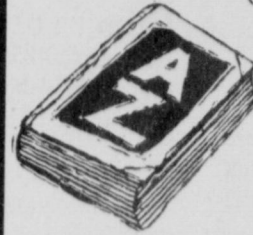
The "Business as usual" approach has worked before and it should work again this year for the Hawks.
