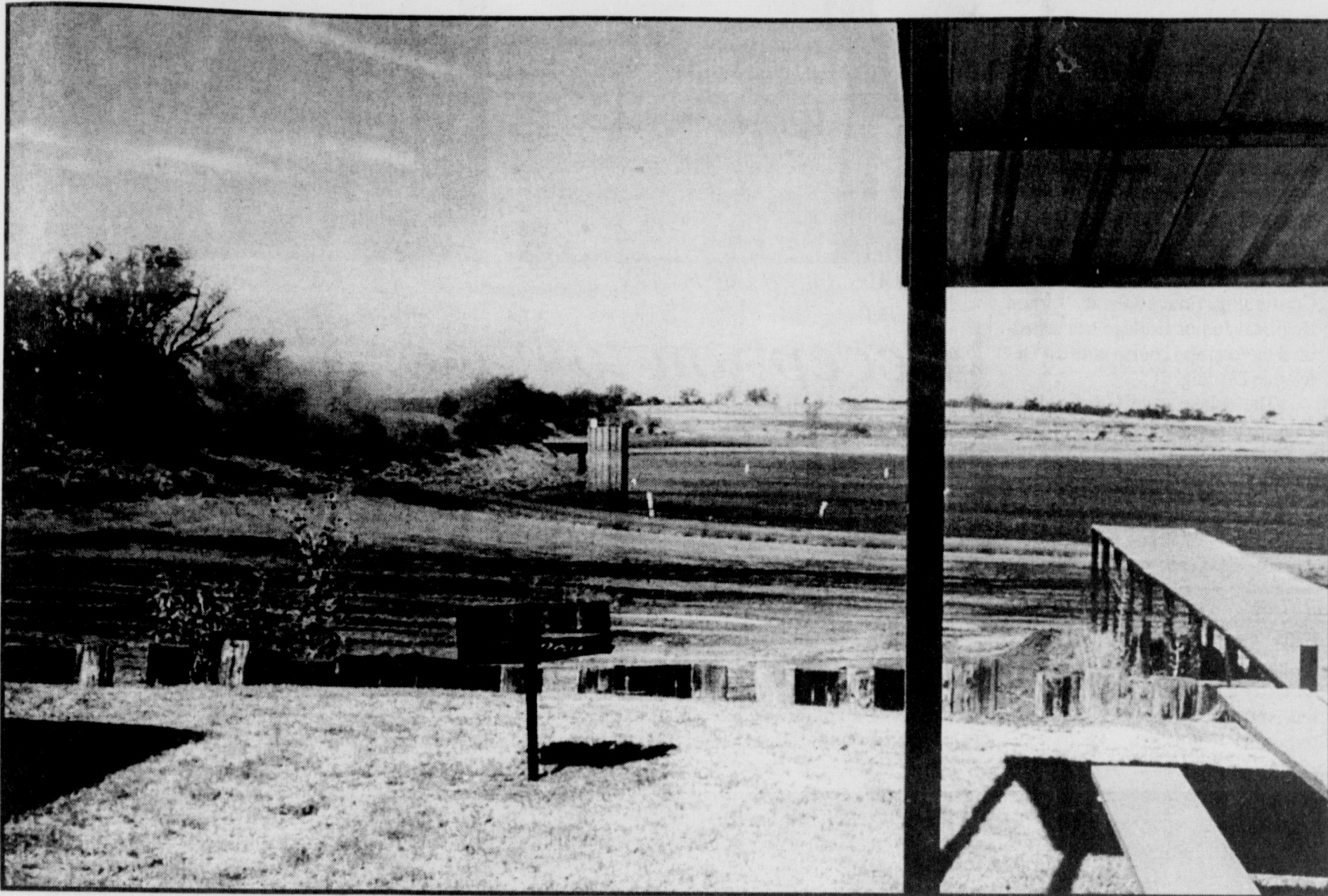

No change in water restrictions . . . yet

Iowa Park residents received a slight reprieve from even tighter outdoor watering restrictions during Monday night's meeting of the city council.

The council was considering adopting Stage Five of the drought contingency plan, which includes a total ban on all outdoor watering, as well as other restrictions.

However, that action was put off for another week or two, depending on how the city's two lakes maintain their levels.

Should Lake Buffalo's level fall below 1029 msl before Sept. 11, which is the council's next regularly-scheduled meeting, a called session will be held to adopt Stage Five, Mayor Tim Hunter said.

Water levels at Iowa Park's two lakes continue to fall rapidly, due to excessive evaporation caused by heat and winds, it was pointed out.

The city is expected to not be able to take water from Lake Iowa Park much beyond this weekend, due to the continued dropping of its level, Price said. That will leave Lake Buffalo and Wichita Falls as Iowa Park's only sources of water.

Hunter told the overcrowded audience that he, Price, Mayor Pro tem Joe Singer and engineer Kerry Maroney had flown Friday to Austin

to meet with officials of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission, concerning options the city might take for an additional source of water.

Though specific needs for making use of the sewer treatment plant's affluent were discussed, which direction the city will take is yet to be determined, Hunter said.

"It was a very productive meeting," Hunter told the audience.

Trustees to adopt tax rate

Public hearings on the Iowa Park CISD budget for the 2000-2001 school year and the proposed tax rate for 2000 will begin at 5:30 p.m. today in the W.F. George Middle School cafeteria, 412 East Cash.

The hearings will be followed at 6 p.m. by adoption of the budget and tax rate, as well as the amended budget for 1999-2000.

School trustees met in a called meeting last Thursday night to hold a workshop on the proposed \$10,238,211 budget. This is down \$2,401 from last year, but still allows for possibly higher insurance and electricity rates.

If the tax rate remains the same at \$1.40 per \$100 evaluation, the new budget would have a deficit of

Concerning the city's ability to take water from the irrigation ditch, Hunter said Iowa Park is "way down the line" when priorities are considered, because of the various number of intities sharing ownership.

Responding to a request for a variance from water restrictions in the city, which has been made by a local businessman, Hunter instructed Price to draft a variance which would

be utilized during Stages Four and Five.

The issue was brought up at an earlier meeting by Jeff Nolen, owner of X-pert Weed Control, who explained his business would be hurt if his customers were not permitted to water following his yard treatments.

Nolen said he has 180 customers in the city, and those treatments could be completed within five working days.

The mayor also pointed out that city staff would have to notify all the businesses in Wichita Falls that have customers here, like Nolen, of the waiver being in place.

Since Stage Four is still in place, outdoor watering restrictions continue. The schedule includes homes with odd number addresses being allowed to water on Saturdays, and even numbers on Sundays. Watering is not permitted between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.

An ordinance was adopted by the council establishing fees for the verification of water meter recordings and the testing for accuracy of water meters.

Hawks begin season today against Eagles

When the Iowa Park Hawks come down the ramp at Memorial Stadium at 7:30 tonight against the Holliday Eagles in the Times and Record News Kickoff Classic, it will be the third straight year that the two teams have met to open the season.

But it will be a first for Iowa Park head coach and Athletic Director Chris Ellis.

Even though Ellis walked down the same ramp the three previous years, this year things will be different. For the first time, he will be the main man. Ellis served as the offensive coordinator for former head coach Welson Nelms for several years and now takes over as the Head Hawk with tonight's game being his first as a head coach.

Don't look for anything to change. It should be business as usual tonight when the two teams tangle for the third straight season. Holliday won the first contest 41-38 in a double-overtime thriller. Iowa Park rebounded to win last year's game 27-8.

This year's meeting should be another good one, with both teams entering the season with high expectations.

Iowa Park enters tonight's game on a positive note after beating Childress 2-1 in its lone scrimmage game last week. Holliday is also coming into the game off a win over Bowie in its only scrimmage earlier in the season.

The Hawks will likely start an offensive lineup with Chris Simmons at quarterback, Chase Wright and Bryan Swenson at the running backs and Michael Leal and Jamie Eaton splitting time at the fullback spot.

The offensive line will consist of Heath Hodges at center, Kyle Young and Matt Ohm at the guards, Russell Duggins and Tommy Taylor at the tackles and Mitch Singleton and Brandon Lane at the tight end positions.

Defensively the Hawks will rotate several players in and out to keep fresh bodies on the field. Look for Duggins, Charlie Horton, Lane, Heath Gholson, Jordan Ray, Tim Denny, John Horton, Michael Abby, Andy Simpson, and Aaron Clubb all to see time along the defensive line.

The inside linebackers will be Singleton, Young, and Ohm, with the

outside linebackers including Simmons, Leal and Matt Kelly. Defensive backs will include, Wright, Nathan Creekmore, Chase Simpson Eaton, and Swenson.

"We're expecting the same ol' Holliday," Ellis said. "Offensively they'll probably be about the same. They like to run the sweep, the trap and they do a good job of both. They're not going to get real fancy with the football, they just line up and say here we come, stop us."

"Their quarterback, Cody Leggett is a real good athlete," Ellis added. "He is dangerous. He has a good arm, but we think he's even more of a threat running the ball. They've got a good set of backs and their offensive line is decent size."

Defensively the Eagles are led by their two inside linebackers Jeff Ledford and Trey Ingram. Both are team leaders with Ledford being the starting tailback and Ingram the starting fullback on offense.

"They're real aggressive on defense," said Ellis. "They run a lot of five and eight man fronts and really like to get up the field. They get fired up and come after you."

When asked what he thought the keys to the game were, Ellis was quick to say the kicking game, turnovers and penalties.

"The kicking game always seems to be a big part in early season games," Ellis said. "You don't get the opportunity to work on it in a game situation. You get to work on your offense and defense in the scrimmage, but not the kicking game. Field position always plays a big factor in any game, especially in an early season game. Penalties and turnovers are also a big factor. We have got to hold onto the ball and we need to force some turnovers as well. We did a good job of that against Childress. We forced three and didn't commit any. Penalties can kill you especially when you're in the red zone. We have got to maintain our focus and not get the motion penalties or the off sides. Those happen when we don't concentrate."

It doesn't bother Ellis that his team is having to play a game a week earlier than most teams.

"I think it's a good thing for both



Hearty Casseroles for a Hungry Family

Beef in Casserole

- 3 lbs. ground chuck
- 2 Tbsps. salt
- 2 Tbsps. sugar
- Seasoned pepper
- 2 Tbsps. garlic powder
- 2 - 16 oz. cans tomatoes
- 2 - 8 oz. cans tomato sauce
- 2 - 10 oz. pkg. noodles (medium width)
- 2 - 8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese
- 2 pts. sour cream
- 2 bunches green onion tops, chopped
- 1/4 stick butter
- Cheddar cheese

Brown meat and seasonings; add tomato mixture and simmer 15 minutes. Cook noodles in salted water.

Mix cream cheese, sour cream and onion tops. Add noodles and butter; stir. Add meat sauce; stir. Pour into casserole and cover with grated cheese. Cover casserole and bake 35 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 12. This can be frozen before cooking.

Good Casserole

- 1 onion, diced
- 2 Tbsps. margarine
- 1 1/2 lbs. ground round
- Chili powder
- Garlic powder
- Salt
- Pepper
- 1 pkg. spaghetti, cooked
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 can tomato soup
- Grated cheese

Saute onion in margarine. Add meat and cook until brown. Season to taste. Combine cooked spaghetti, soups and meat mixture. Put in baking dish and cover top with grated cheese. Cover and cook 45 minutes in a 350 degree oven. Remove lid and

cook 10 minutes more or until top browns. This dish freezes or can be made a day or so ahead. Serves 8.

Corn and Tamale Casserole

- 2 cans cream style corn
- 2 or 3 cans Wolf brand tamales
- Margarine
- Salt
- Parmesan cheese

Put a layer of corn into a square pyrex baking dish. Next slice tamales 1/4 inch thick in a solid layer; slice 1/8 lb. margarine over this and salt. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese over this; then repeat same procedure and bake for an hour at 300 to 350 degrees. May be frozen.

Cornbread-Chicken Casserole

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 1 can chicken and rice soup
- 1 qt. corn bread crumbs
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 1 boiled chicken (or whole canned chicken)

Melt butter and saute onion and celery. Heat broth and soups and pour over cornbread crumbs and mix well. Add onions and celery to soup-corn bread mixture. Season with salt and pepper. If needed, add boiling water to moisten.

In greased casserole, alternate layers of chicken, which has been cut into bite-size pieces, and dressing. (Start and end with dressing. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves 6. Freezes well

Pork Chop Casserole

- 1 cup long grain rice
- 1 envelope onion soup mix
- 1 can mushrooms, sliced
- 1 small jar pimentos
- 3 cups boiling water
- 6 - 8 pork chops

Place rice in bottom of rectangular dish. Add pimentos and mushrooms. Sprinkle onion soup mix over this, saving a tablespoon or so to put over pork chops. Pour boiling water over the preceding. Brown pork chops and place on top of rice; sprinkle remaining onion soup mix over pork chops. Cover with foil and bake 45 minutes to 1 hour (depending on thickness of pork chops). Uncover and let sit before serving.

Sausage and Rice Casserole

- 1 lb. hot sausage
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 small can mushrooms, drained
- 1 cup uncooked rice
- 1 1/2 envelopes chicken noodle soup mix
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 small pkg. slivered almonds

Grease long pyrex pan. Brown sausage thoroughly; drain and set aside. Reserve 2 tablespoons grease to saute celery, onion and mushrooms. Add remaining ingredients to sausage. (Freeze at this point, if desired) Bake, tightly covered with foil, at 325 degrees for 1 hour (Check after 45 minutes). Serves 6-8 or may easily be doubled or tripled.

Biscuit Casserole

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1/4 cup onions
- 1 - 15 oz. can tomato sauce
- 10 canned biscuits
- 1 cup grated Colby cheese
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Brown beef and onions; drain. Add tomato sauce and seasonings. Simmer 15 minutes. Place biscuits in greased dish. Add beef mixture and bake at 400 degrees 15 minutes. Add cheese on top and bake 10 minutes more at 350 degrees.

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



The current shortage of water is nothing new for Iowa Park.

No, I'm not referring to our lakes having gone dry back in the early 1970s, this time.

A friend brought by a copy of the Iowa Park Herald published June 25, 1953 that brought some light to the situation here at that time.

In it were two related articles, one under the headline of "Mayor Praises Citizens For Co-operating Easing Acute Water Problem", and right next to it was the heading of "High Winds Cause Two Injuries in Area; Good Rain Falls in County".

I found both so interesting that I'd like you to read them.

The statement by Mayor R.E. Van Horn was:

"After further consideration of our water problem, the City Officials have decided to relax some of the restrictions on our water use.

"The present restrictions will no longer apply to the watering of shrubs.

"The support of the people of Iowa Park in the water conservation program has been gratifying indeed. The Citizens can feel proud of their attitude. All we ask of you is to use some discretion and judgement in the amount of water used.

"Further restrictions will not be necessary unless our water situation becomes more critical; at such time

you will be notified through your Local Newspaper."

I couldn't find any reference to what those restrictions were, other than that phrase about watering of shrubs.

The relief on watering apparently came the previous Friday, according to the accompanying article.

A storm produced 2.88 inches that was recorded at the experiment station south of town.

That same storm was accompanied by extremely high winds that blew down trees and moved some houses and oil tanks off their foundations out in the Kamay and Valley View area.

Naturally, the Iowa Park area isn't alone with its problem of water and lack of rainfall.

I receive newspapers from almost every part of the state, and I'm finding articles that tell me we're not alone.

Here is a sample of the headlines published on the front pages just during the past week.

"This may be the dry spell you won't forget" - Wise County Messenger, Decatur.

"It's Stage 4 Monday, once a week watering" - Nocona News.

"Preliminary designs for park, water plant okayed by council" - Burkburnett Informer Star.

"Commission Agenda Draws Public Comments On Water" - Electra Star-News.

"Drought and Doubt, Hamlin's Dynamic Duo" - Hamlin Herald.

"Water restraint still sought" - Springtown Epigraph.

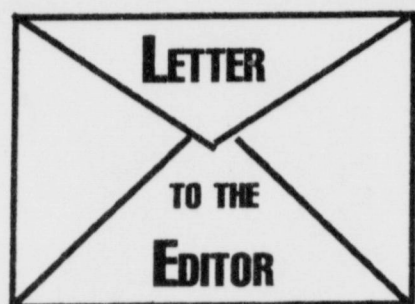
"Residents attend meeting addressing water problems" - Hamilton Herald.

"Willow Park's rationing raises questions at meeting" - Community News, Aledo.

"Gilmer starts water rationing" - Gilmer Mirror.

"Water Emergency Declared" - Citizens' Advocate, Coppell.

Obviously, these articles do not represent the only water situations in the state, but I was impressed to see so many as I looked them over during the past week.

The action was described as necessary, because of the number of such requests having been made since the higher water rates were enacted this month.

Every customer will be allowed one free "re-read" per six month period, and any time a gross discrepancy is found the customer's fee of \$5 would be waived.

If a customer requests a meter check and the meter is found to be within two percent of accuracy, a fee of \$15 will be charged, under the ordinance.

Two other issues were included during Monday's meeting, and neither had anything to do with water.

Following the final public hearing on the proposed tax rate for the new budget, the council approved adopting a rate of \$0.672 per \$100 valuation, which was the same rate as charged this year.

The other business was the mayor's presentation of honorary citizenship of the city to seven foreign exchange students enrolled this year at Iowa Park High School.

They included: Rouven Knabe, Benjamin Kovacs and Charlotte Maessen, all of Germany; Hoang Duc from Viet Nam; Gustavo Pacheco from Brazil, and Alejandro Sandoval from Venezuela.

Soil testing recommended

Drought! Low prices! Profit... Only if you can decrease your input and expenses.

One possible tool that can be used to reduce costs is the use of current soil test. Soil testing can help achieve maximum yields without over applying fertilizer.

Using the correct amount and

type of fertilizer will reduce your costs and prevent leaching of nutrients into the groundwater.

Nitrates are very water-soluble, and if applied in amounts above plant needs, they can move into ground and surface water. This over use of fertilizer is also very expensive and cuts into the net returns of the crop.

A yearly soil test will determine the amount of nutrients left in the soil

from the previous crop. Actual fertilizer recommendations are based on the requirements of realistic crop yields in relation to the available nutrients in the soil.

To take an accurate soil test, obtain one composite soil sample from each uniform area of the field (10 to 40 acres). The composite sample from each area should be taken in 10 to 15 different places. Place these in a clean plastic bucket, mix thoroughly, and take out one pint of the composite sample.

When taking soil samples use a spade or soil sampling tube. Scrape away crop residue from the soil surface and take the sample to the depth of six to eight inches.

Be sure to fill out an information sheet to send in along with the sample. The information sheet asks about the type of crop to be grown and the yield goal of the crop, if land is irrigated and amounts of previous fertilizer.

It takes at least two weeks to get soil sample results back so be sure to send in samples well ahead of when you need to fertilize.

For more information on soil testing contact your local Natural Resources Conservation Service or County Extension Service.



Trojan Manufacturing Co. relocates in Iowa Park

The story behind Trojan Manufacturing

Trojan Manufacturing, a company that builds horse walkers for clients in all 50 of the United States and seven foreign countries, now calls Iowa Park home.

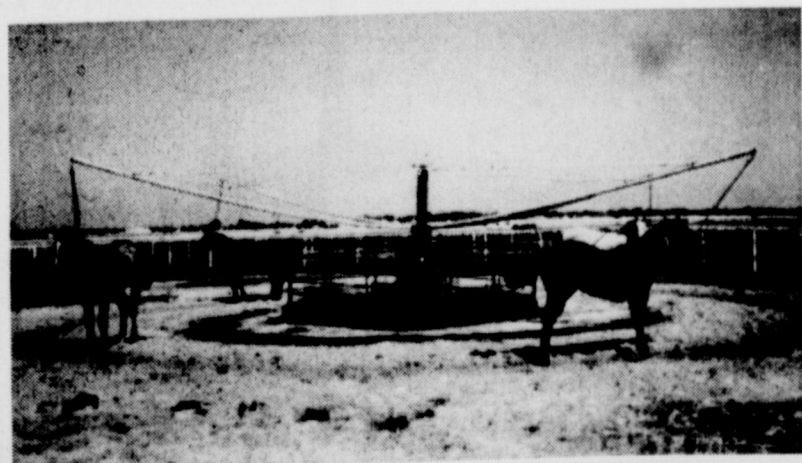
The company, which also maintains a location in Windthorst, moved to Iowa Park in June to accommodate the growing demand for its product. Their new location at 474 Rifle Range Road, just across from the Wichita Valley Airport, will allow them to do just that.

Family has always, and it appears - will always, play an integral part in the success of owner Dan Kingcade.

The Kamay native attended a family reunion in 1990, when his third cousin told him of a business opportunity that was right up Kingcade's alley - one that builds horse walkers.

The company was established in 1961. Employee Odel Rodgers began building horse walkers for the owner, Mr. Hamner of Hamner Oil Co., for personal use. Soon, he began building the walkers for friends and business associates in the oil business. Before long, word of mouth made the company and its walkers known throughout the nation.

An accounting CPA partnership from Duncan, Ok., purchased the business in the 1970's from Hamner. Kingcade purchased the business in 1991 and hasn't looked back yet. He relocated the business to Windthorst, and added a location in Wichita Falls because of expansion. This year, Kingcade found that he was again running out of space to meet the growing demand for his horse walkers. So he closed his Wichita Falls location and came to Iowa Park.

The horse walkers built by Kingcade's company are

among the largest built, spanning 60 feet with the ability to walk six or more horses at a time. Kingcade's walkers, he says, are the "biggest, strongest horse walkers available." Case in point - Trojan Manufacturing horse walkers are used by trainers of Draft horses, a large and strong breed, (the type horses used by Budweiser) in New York.



The business is owned and operated by Dan and his wife of 25 years, Lane, who takes care of the office. Their son, Matthew, a sixth grader at Ben Franklin Elementary, also helps around the shop, and runs a fork lift.

The products are built by Kingcade's family, including Kingcade's brother, Mike, and several brothers-in-law, sisters, nephews and cousins.

Hawks dominate Bobcats in warm-up scrimmage

Even though no one is supposed to keep score in a scrimmage, everyone does. And if you weren't supposed to keep score, why would there be an end zone?

So when the dust had cleared Thursday night at Hawk Stadium, Iowa Park walked away with an unofficial 2-1 victory over their long time rival, the Childress Bobcats.

The two teams used to battle it out with a share of the district title usually at stake, but with Childress moving into another district, Thursday night's meeting was not for all the marbles like it used to be. But that didn't mean the two teams didn't get after each other.

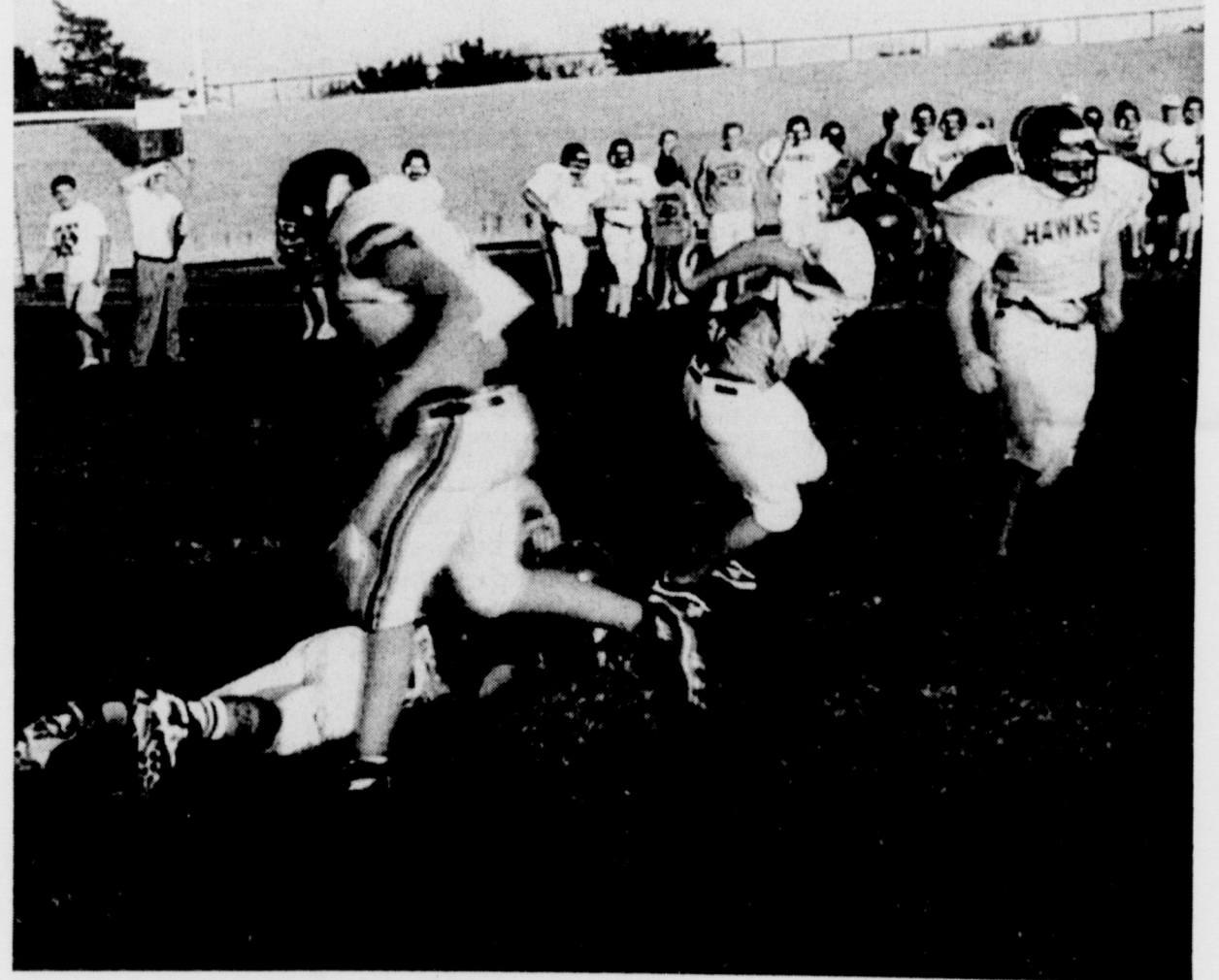
Childress got the ball to start the scrimmage, running 20 offensive plays starting at the 30 yard line. Just seven plays into the scrimmage, the Bobcats' Michael Briscoe broke loose around his left end and was off to the races, going 72 yards for a touchdown, giving Childress a 1-0 lead. From that point on the Iowa Park defense was in charge. The next 13 plays netted the Bobcats only four total yards. Childress finished with four first downs and the one touchdown in its 20 plays, with 94 total yards.

"Overall I was real pleased with the scrimmage," said head coach Chris Ellis. "Defensively I thought we played well with the exception of that one big play. Other than that they didn't do much against us the rest of the night. We forced three turnovers and we held onto the ball, so I was real happy with our defensive effort."

Defensive standouts for the Hawks included Russell Duggins, Mitch Singleton, Aaron Clubb, Chase Simpson, Chase Wright and Matt Kelly.

When the Hawks got the ball for the first time, they drove 70 yards in eight plays to find the end zone to tie the game at 1-1. Wright scored the touchdown from one yard out, going over the left side of his offensive line. The big play of the drive was a 44-yard run by Jamie Eaton. Iowa Park finished its 20 plays with 156 total yards and seven first downs.

Offensive standouts included Eaton, Brandon Lane, Kyle Young, Matt Ohm, Duggins and Chris Simmons.

"Offensively I was pleased with our consistency," Ellis stated. "We pieced together seven or eight real good plays and marched down the field and scored. We kept it real basic and worked on some of our bread and butter plays."

On Childress' second set of plays, the Iowa Park defense held its ground once again preventing the Bobcats from scoring. The Hawk defense allowed only six first downs and 96 total yards.

Iowa Park scored the winning touchdown on a one-yard run by Kelly. The touchdown was set up by a pair of nice runs by Robert McCann.

"The first 65-70 plays we looked real solid," Ellis added. "The last 10-15 we kind of lost our focus when we got tired, but we got in some good hitting and got a chance to play against a good athlete like the Briscoe kid. He's got a lot of speed. On the big play,

we played it right and we were in good position, he just out ran us. After that we held him in check."

One of the worries coaches have about scrimmages is getting someone hurt or injured before the actual season starts. Iowa Park lost Ashton Jones, a senior defensive end, for 6-8 weeks with a fractured ankle. Jones had made a nice play stopping a run and got tangled up in the pile and someone rolled over on his ankle.

Michael Leal, a senior fullback and outside linebacker, suffered a cut over his eye on the first defensive series and was held out for the rest of the scrimmage.

Clubb also suffered a sprained ankle and missed the final few plays.

Both Leal and Clubb are scheduled to return to action this week and should be ready to play against Holliday in the opener.
