# Busy season for food bank

For many the holidays are a time for giving. For some, such as Don Beals, the time for giving is year around.

Beals spends hours weekly taking care of the Iowa Park Food Bank and doing other errands that result in many residents who need assistance receiving food. He has been looking after the food bank about two years.

It all began with Beals assisting others with distributing commodities that the county delivered to a distribution site (First Christian Church) once a month. Then some changes took place that would require more effort, so for almost three years Beals has been making that effort.

The county would no longer be distributing commodities to the distribution site. An individual would need to pick the commodities up in Wichita Falls and take them to Iowa Park. Beals volunteered for this task.

The commodities are now distributed from the First United Methodist Church.

In addition to transporting the commodities (in his personal vehicle) he makes about seven trips a week to the Wichita Falls Area Food Bank to see what they have in stock that will help some citizens of Iowa Park.

Beals says he makes the trips often so he can stay on top of what they have and get the best quality and

quantity for citizens who need the people to work with." Beals said. assistance. There are at least 110 citizens who receive the commodities monthly.

The food bank receives bakery products daily and Beals brings three pick-up loads monthly over to dis-tribute with the commodities. He takes a load twice monthly to Friendly Door to be distributed to seniors at the center. Although Iowa Park has its own food bank there are items that can't be stored for longer periods of time and those are the type of items Beals gets from the Wichita Falls bank.

He says the Wichita Area Food Bank works with him and is generous in their contributions to Iowa Park. "Without the Wichita Falls Area Food Bank assistance we would not have many of the items available for citizens of Iowa Park. They are great

# Study clubs hold joint meeting

Twenty Three Study Club and Amity Study Club held their Federation Day Program and 38th annual combined meeting recently at Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Hostesses were members of Twenty Three Study Club, and the program, a panel discussion of Outstanding Texas Women, was presented by Amity Study Club.

Lila Hoober, President of Amity Club, welcomed members and guests and intoduced Mrs. Beth Duke of Burkburnett, President of Santa Rosa District of TFWC.

Mrs. Duke spoke on "Hands," stating that they are among the most precious tools we possess. She outlined the many ways hands are used and especially their importance in helping others by volunteerism, which forms a Bridge of Faith, Friendship and Federation, and is one of the most important goals of GFWC.

Carolyn Caplinger presented the meditation entitled "The Thankful Book." The story was based on the life of a woman who had, as a child, at the urging of her grandmother, promised to keep a journal of reasons to be thankful for every event which happened in her life.

She had dutifully kept the journal from childhood through young womanhood, marriage, birth of her children, loss of her husband, and the last years of her life. As her children gathered together following her death, the entries in the book were read aloud and the book became one of the most treasured items that she left to her family.

Mrs. Caplinger quoted First Thessalonians: 5-18 "In every thing give thanks," and said if we do this, we can find peace in our lives. She closed by suggesting that members might follow this example and keep their own "Thankful Book."

Linda Merrick narrated the program about outstanding women in Texas History.

Each woman was portrayed by a member of Amity Study Club, dressed in the manner of the time in which she

The story began with the native Indian women who were very important in the family life of the early Indian inhabitants of Texas.

A notable example was Cynthia Ann Parker, the white child who was abducted by the Comanche Indians and raised as an Indian. She married Chief Pete Nocona and had two sons, one of whom was Quanah Parker. She was recaptured by the military, along with her infant daughter, Prairie Flower, and following the death of the baby, she died of grief.

Next was Mary Ann Dyer, pioneer teacher of Black Springs. In order to win her hand in marriage, Charles Goodnight worked to become an independent cattleman, and they were married in 1870. The story of the Goodnight family, and especially the life of Mary Ann is well chronicled as an important part of the New West.

In 1925, in Sweetwater, the book "The Wind" was written anonymously by Dorothy Scarbrough. It described the effects of the Texas wind and sand on the skin of delicate young ladies of the time. MGM later produced a movie about "The Wind."

Ms. Scarbrough was a well educated lady among whose accomplishments was the beginning of the first journalism class at Baylor University. She attended Oxford University but could not graduate, as they did not issue degrees to women. Though famous for her work in education and black folklore, her most famous work, "The Wind," was the most popular novel in Southwestern fiction.

Next portrayed was Miriam Amanda "Ma" Ferguson, wife of farmer Jim Ferguson, and governor of Texas.

He had been barred from running for governor, but insisted that Miriam run for the office on a platform which he had created. Although she won, "Ma" was governor in name only. Among her accomplishments was fighting for education and against the Ku Klux Klan. Her "Pay as you go" platform got her re-elected, although she was delegated very little credit in politics, due to "too much husband!"

Edna Pennybacker was president of TFWC from 1901 to 1903, and under her guidance many reforms took place and much progress was made in establishing public libraries. She was instrumental in publishing the first history of Texas. It is noted that women's clubs established 85 percent of the libraries in Texas and today 230 of 250 counties have at least one public library.

Following the program, members and guests were served refreshments by the hostesses.

Those present also brought donations of food items for the local food pantry.

the ministerial alliance. However, it is kept separate from the alliance account. Beals says the alliance does the paper work.

Beals says Barbara Mitchell, First United Methodist Church secretary, does the hard work. She takes care of all the paper work.

Beals is quick to say he does not work alone. There are at least 10 volunteers who help handout the commodities, and around six, in addition to the fourth grade GT students, who bag the commodities.

There are also volunteers that help deliver commodities to those who have no way to pick the food up.

When commodities are distributed or food is given out at the Iowa Park Food Bank, and a child comes in with parents are grandparents, they don't go away empty handed. Beals says they always have something extra for them. He says at times he has to scrounge but he always comes up with something.

Ask Beals why he does what he does and without a pause he will answer,"I do what I do because I think it is helping somebody. If everyone would help someone we would all be better off. And, this is the way I can do it best."


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
