### Donors are generous

Thanks to the generosity of Iowa Park residents, the Iowa Park Firemen have collected \$1410 for Toys for Tots.

Saturday during their "Fill the Boot Toys for Tots Drive," they collected \$1,217 and have collected \$193 as of Saturday from the jars located at various businesses.

These funds and more will be needed to supply toys for 42 families, which include 98 children, whose names have been turned in for the Toys for Tot program. A few more are expected.

Jars are still in various locations for anyone wishing to make a monetary donation.

Donations of new or good used toys can be dropped off at First Baptist Church, State National Bank or the Iowa Park Fire Station. The toys should not be wrapped unless they are for a designated family.

Anyone wishing to adopt a family may do so at the First Baptist Church. There are families of several sizes, from one child to six children.

Toys will be distributed Dec. 18, at the First Family Center.

# Money city's common topic

Monday night's city council meeting.

The subject was involved in almost every portion of the meeting, including donation, delinquent taxes, and cost of purchases.

Steven Raby presented the proceeds of his haunted house project, as he has the past three years.

Raby, who has been using the city-owned old RAC building, turned over a check for \$500, to be used on the Lake Gordon walking track project.

The donation was \$100 less than last year, and Raby explained bad weather was the likely explanation for the lower turnout. Last year's donation was \$600.

Allen Shewmake, tax collector for the city and school district, explained his updated version of the delinquent tax roll, which included a listing of 337 taxpayers in the city.

He told the council that litigation would be filed against the offenders who do not take care of that

obligation before the end of 2000. City Administrator Mike Price

Money was the common topic of requested, and received, permission to have a pump purchased and installed at the ground storage facility. Total price was said to be \$5,333.

> In order to comply with state regulations, as well as saving money when purchasing fuel for city equipment, Price discussed purchasing fuel tanks for the public works complex.

> Two smaller tanks, rather than one larger tank, were proposed by Price, as well as development of a federally-mandated spill prevention control bunker around the tanks.

No vote was taken, but Price was directed to proceed with procuring the two tanks and spill control method.

The council decided to proceed with the purchase of a new pumperstyle fire truck for the fire department, and make the aquisition through the Houston-Galveston Area Council of Governments Cooperative Purchasing Program.

The \$234,410 purchase will be financed over a seven-year period, following council action on a resolution which will be included on the next meeting's agenda, it was de-

This year's budget included a downpayment on the purchase, of

Action was delayed until the next council meeting concerning a lease agreement for Choice Wireless L.C., which is proposing to lease antenna space on the Johnson Road water

Spokesman Jim Horman was asking for a 25-year lease, but conceded to revise the agreement so it would not cover the full length of the proposed period.


That issue is to be brought back at the next meeting.

Final action was taken on the annexation of land into the city, on which a housing development is to be built by David White.

Another annexation, of property adjoining White's property, will be the subject of public hearings to be held in January.





Our cook this week, Crystal Wills, enjoys spending time prepar- 1 lb. Velvetta cheese ing meals with her family.

She says her husband, Richard, and two daughters, Sara and Christine 12 to 16 oz. bag of tater tots. all like to cook. They make preparing meals family time and don't allow anything to interupt.

The family prepares everything from pizza to fancy meals that is quick, easy and nutritious. Crystal says she makes up a lot of her recipes.

The family moved to Iowa Park in June, from Stamford. She says Richard was in the Air Force and spent time at Sheppard Air Force Base in training. They traveled to a lot of areas, even driving from Florida to Alaska, a three week trip, but did not find an area they liked as well as the Iowa Park area. She says they really love it here.

Crystal is employed at State National Bank, and Richard is works for Victory Dental in Wichita Falls. He is also a volunteer fireman.

Crystal says when the firemen are out on a large fire she sometimes helps the other ladies provide drinks and food for the firemen. She also dressed for the occasion and helped hand out candy at the fire department on Halloween.

She is a room mother and helps with activities at Bradford and Kidwell. Sara is a fifth grader at Bradford and Christine is in kindergarten at Kidwell.

They are members of the Loop 11 Church of Christ.

The recipes she is sharing are all family favorites.

### Quick and Easy Chicken Pot Pie

1 pkg. Pillsbury pie crust

3 boneless-skinless chicken breast 2 28oz. cans of Veg-All stew veg-

2 8 oz. cans or 1 jar of homestyle chicken gravy Salt and pepper

Cut chicken breasts into bite size pieces and brown until done. Mix stew vegetables and gravy mix in medium bowl. Mix chicken in with vegetables and gravy. Salt and pep-

Spray deep-dish pie plate or iron deep dish skillet with non-stick spray and place pie crust as directed.

Pour in ingredients and place top crust on.

Tuck the edges and pinch the edges with fingers until closed. Bake 400 degrees for 30 to 45

minutes. **Tater Tot Casserole** 

1 lb. ground meat 1 small to medium chopped onion 1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cream of celery soup (Optional for a spicy casserole add 1 can of ro-tel tomatoes.)

Cook ground meat and onion

until meat is brown, drain off fat. In 8X8 square dish, spray well with non-stick spray and layer ingredients alternating tater tots, meat, soup, then cheese.

Make three layers according to layer directions, leaving enough tater tots to cover the top.

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until tater tots are toasted and crisp

Serve with your favorite vegetable.

This is Richard's favorite. It came from his mother, Ada Wills. Its a lot of fun to make.

#### **Granny Smith's** Chicken Dumplins

1 whole chicken 2 cans chicken broth 4-6 cups all purpose flour 1 cup vegetable oil Warm water Salt and pepper

Place chicken in 4 quart dutch oven with water. Stew chicken for 2-3 hours. Remove chicken from pan and allow chicken to cool for deboning.

Mix flour, oil, salt and pepper(to taste) with enough water to make into dough.

Sift flour onto cabinet or large cutting board. Divide dough and roll it out, making a large circle about 1/ 2 inch thick, using a pizza cutter, cut dough into 1" X 1" squares.

Add broth to water chicken stewed in and bring to a boil. Place squares of dough into boiling broth. You might need to add some water to increase broth.

Decrease heat and simmer for about 30 min. or until dough is cooked throughly. (Not doughy or floury in the center.) Place de-boned chicken into dumplings and stir. Serve with fresh onions.

My favorite, it has been handed down from my great-grandmother and now my girls make them too.

Sara's Mexican Salsa 1 28 oz. can of whole tomatoes

1 small onion 1 tsp. chopped fresh garlic 2 medium fresh jalapenos 1 bell pepper (green) Salt and pepper (to taste) 1 tsp. chili powder Dash of lime or lemon juice to add a

little tanginess and to preserve salsa. Place ingredients in a blender. Using chopping speed, mix all together. Pour into jar and refrigerate

If you prefer a hotter salsa, add 2-3 dashes of tobasco. Add to Velveeta for a wonder-

ful dip or serve as is with warm fresh made tortilla chips. Keeps in refrigerator for seven

The longer it sits the hotter and

better it gets. Sara's favorite. This does not stay in the house long at all. We love to make-up recipes and she loves to see how hot she can make it.

### Classic Chocolate Cake

3 cups all purpose flour 2 cups granulated sugar 6 Tbs. unsweetened cocoa powder 1 tsp. salt
