PAYING HER DEBT

County Commissioner Pat Norris, a resident and former mayor of Burkburnett, had to pay off her wager to Commissioner Gordon Griffith of Iowa Park during Monday's meeting of the commissioners' court, by wearing a Hawk football jersey after Iowa Park defeated Burkburnett in Friday night's game.

City restricts use of water

Faced with the continuing loss of water in Iowa Park's two lakes, caused by the ongoing drought, the city council Monday night adopted Stage Five of its drought contingency

As of Tuesday morning, all outdoor watering and other nonessential use of water is forbidden until further notice.

Actually, the action concerning water was only one of a number of major issues covered by the council during it's regularly-scheduled ses-

Among the other issues were the adoption of the tax rate, contracting with a private firm to get money back from the federal government, joining another municipality in a suit against utility companies seeking delinquent franchise fees, adopting an ordinance concerning unauthorized use of trash containers, seeking financing for a storm drainage project, and contracting for engineering on an affluent transmission line.

The council adopted the same tax rate of \$0.672 per \$100 valuation as was assessed last year for the general fund, which is \$2,254,850. The utility budget for the next year was set at \$1,411,200.

In an effort to see refunds for gasoline taxes used during 1999 by city equipment, the council approved contracting a private firm, Municipal Tax Consulting and Management

City Administrator Mike Price estimated the city should receive approximately \$3,800, of which the firm would be paid one third of the

Price added that time to file for the 2000 refund is approaching, the first of October.

A resolution approved Monday authorizes the city's participation with Denton and other municipalities in a joint cause of action against Texas Utilities Company and Lone Star Gas.

The municipalities are seeking franchise fees that have not been paid by the utilities. Estimated cost of the suit to Iowa Park is \$3,036, Price told the council.

Because numerous business owners have complained to the city that people are dumping their trash in the large metal containers, without authorization, an ordinance had been requested governing such use.

The activity, aldermen were told, has increased since the metal containers were removed from alleys and residents issued 95-gallon rollout

The administrator was granted permission to advertise for proposals from banks to finance the storm drainage project on Texowa Street. The financing of \$640,000 would be paid for in 10 years.

Aldermen authorized the city's engineer to design plans and specifications for a water reuse transmission line from the wastewater treatment plant to Lake Iowa Park.

The affluent would be distributed to three intended users, including I.E.S.I., Cryovac, and the proposed golf course at Lake Iowa Park.

Three other proposals also were approved during the council's meet-

The administrator was granted permission to advertise for bids to rent uniforms for Public Works employees for another year.

A resolution was approved which allows the city to encourage the Cowboys to return to Wichita Falls again next year for their training camp.

STAGE FIVE WATER USE RESTRICTIONS

(Effective Tuesday, Sept. 12)

- * All outside watering and irrigation of landscaped areas is prohibited.
- * Filling, refilling and adding of potable water to privately orpublicly-owned swimming, wading or jaccuzi-type pools is prohibited.
- * Use of potable water for washing sidewalks, driveways, parking areas, streets, tennis courts, patios, architectural or other paved areas except to alleviate immediate health or fire hazards is prohibited.
- * Use of potable water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle is prohibited at all times except for commercial car washes or service stations.
- * Sale of bulk water at the city's treatment plant is restricted to domestic and commercial use only.
- * Flushing of fire hydrants and city water mains is prohibited except for leak repairs.

Steven Raby was once again granted permission to use the old Recreational Activities Center on East Texas as a community haunted house this Halloween.

As usual, Raby pledged all profits to be used in financing improvements around Lake Gordon.

In addition to the regular business, items on the agenda calling for action include:

* campus committees and district committee selections

* bids for office/instructional supplies, furniture and equipment.

Discussion items include an up date on construction projects, report on condition of roofs at Kidwell Elementary and Iowa Park High School, progress report on the Texas Primary Reading Inventory, and a report on the high school.

In his report, Superintendent Mike Caplinger will talk about the Technology Leadership Academy, Legislatiave chairperson for Region IXESC, and his goals for 2000-2001.

A portion of the meeting will be closed for the board members to consider resignations and employment of personnel.

The new employee reception will be held from 6:30 - 7:00 p.m., and the regular meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the W.F. George Middle School Library, 412 Eash Cash.

Hawks hosting Huskies in home opener

Well for Iowa Park and their firt year head coach Chris Elis, that first step is now behind them after a 30-22 win over Burkburnett in week two.

Now the Hawks, 1-1, look it make it two in a row Friday night when they play host to Hirschi in the season's home opener at 7:30 p.m. at Hawk Stadium.

When asked about getting his first win ever as a head coach, Ellis seemed more happy for the kids than for himself.

"The kids all signed and presented me with a game ball Saturday morning at our film session," said Elis. "I guess it's a milestone of sorts, but I think I feel better for the kids than for myself. They put a lot of pressure on themselves this week because they knew that we didn't play as well as we should have against Holliday that first week."

Friday night's game between the Hawks and the Huskies will be the

Some say that the first step in 18th in the series, with Hirschi holding a 10-6-1 record over the Hawks. But Iowa Park has won the last two meetings, which have been very close. In '98, Iowa Park defeated the Huskies 21-17 and last year the Hawks

> Last week's win over 4A Burkburnett might have been exactly what the doctor ordered for the Hawks who looked less than impressive in week one against Holliday.

> "I felt overall that our kids played harder and executed a lot better against Burk," Ellis stated. "The difference was like night and day. Our backs ran harder. Our linemen blocked better and we did a better job on defense. We just did everything better.

"I think the extra week of practice did us a world of good," Ellis added. "Our kids without varsity experience did a better job and it showed. We didn't play with that emotional pitch that you needed to have when we played Holliday. We played with a lot more emotion against

Burk. Our kids played hard and it the past. In one word, fast. looked like they were having fun out there.

Looking back at the Burk game compared to the Holldiay game it's easy to see the difference in the two games. The offense and the defense both stepped it up to another level of

"I felt a lot better about the way our offense looked last week," said Ellis. "We got some things going and continued to move the ball. In our offense, one play sets up another and when you are able to put seven or eight plays together, it gives you a chance to let your offense work like it should. I thought our offensive line did a much better job and we came up with some big plays. Those one-play drives are five. It's good to be consistent and have the home run threat at the same time.

Defensively I thought we played well with the exception of the three big plays," Ellis added. "The reverse on the first play of the game, the long touchdown in the fourth quarter and the long run by the quarterback late in the game. Other than that we only gave up three first downs the rest of the game."

This week's opponent is going to be much like the Hirschi teams in

"Hirschi is going to be quick to say the least," said Ellis. They always have a ton of speed. They lost Estus, Franklin, Robinson and Smith from last year's team and it looks like they just re-loaded. The kids back there this year may not be that calibur yet, but they are dangerous. If they get around you they're going to be hard to catch.

"We can't let this game turn into a track meet," Elis added. "Their offensive line is the best we've seen so far. They're pretty good size and they stay with their blocks well and they getafter you. Their quarterback Dustin Graham has a good arm and they will throw the ball at us. Their best running back Chauncy Lanier didn't play last week against Dennison. He missed the game with a thigh bruise, but I'm sure we'll see him this week. He can flat out move and can score from anywhere."

"Defensively they are quick as well," said Ellis. "They don't play a lot of people both ways so they always have fresh bodies on the field. They read and react to the ball well. They are so fast that you can have them blocked and they can run around

After several consecutive weeks of handling heavy caseloads, Iowa Park police expressed relief of an unutually-light week.

"We have had the time to do a lot of paperwork that had been developed," said Officer Donnie Cavender.

The week's police blotter reflected only two arrests, two thefts, an assault and one case of criminal mischief.

Nathan Wayne Evans, 20, was taken into custody late Saturday evening on a warrant issued by the Department of Public Safety, for speeding and failure to appear in court. He was transported to the county jail.

Monday evening, in the 200 block of West Highway, Kenneth Ray Branch Jr., 49, was arrested on a charge of public intoxication. He was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.

Police received the first theft report Thursday evening, concerning a go cart having been taken from a

residence in the 700 block of West Magnolia.

Then, on Saturday, police were notified that a bicycle had been taken some time Friday night from a residence in the 200 block of West Smith.

Monday, police received a complaint from a female stating she had been assaulted at a residence in the 900 block of East Washington. The suspect had not been taken into custody at press time.

A resident in the 200 block of West Pecan reported to police Monday morning that some time during the previous evening two tires on a truck had been slashed.

Rachel Fields, 18, turned herself in to the county sheriff's department Tuesday, on warrants issued by the Iowa Park police.

The warrants were for theft, \$15,000-\$20,000, relating to a series of local vehicle burglaries here during June, and also possession of marijuana, two to four ounces, a Class A misdemeanor.

It rained in Iowa Park Monday, but not "officially". A storm, accompanied by thun-

der, lightening and high winds, struck the city Monday afternoon and evening. Residents in the northwestern

portion of the city reported receiving their first rain since July 25.

However, there was no "official" measurement for the city, because Virgil Woodfin, the city's "unofficial" moisture reporter, said he got only a darkened sidewalk.

That's similar to the situation at Dallas Tuesday, where parts of that city received as much as three inches of precipitation, but because no rain

fell at DFW Airport, the city "failed to receive any moisture" because the airport is the "official" location for

While the northwestern part of Iowa Park relished Monday's moisture, residents said they could have done without the electrical problems they experienced.

Some areas were without electric service until 11 p.m. TU Electric repairmen were called to repair at least three broken power lines.

Iowa Park's volunteer firemen were also pressed into service, answering numerous grassfires in the outlying areas that apparently had been caused by lightening.

Eke is retired from the Air Force and Zerox.




The weekend after next being homecoming for Iowa Park High, I'm going to continue a program on Saturday that seems to have become a favorite for a lot of folks.

Tax cut would have helped

With reference to your article concerning the school board trustees approving the new school budget, I would like to give my thanks to the three members who voted to give a little tax relief to the suffering agricultural community, who are one of the major contributors to the property tax base. We keep hearing about the booming economy, while agriculture is in bad shape.

With a four-year drought, ponds are dry, fertilizer, diesel and repairs are at an all-time high, and farm commodity prices are at an all-time

A tax cut of .02c, though small, would have made those who are hurting feel a little better.

The argument for not decreasing the rate was because of increasing costs of insurance, gas, electricity, and the need for new furniture. landscaping, etc., and also to increase the surplus. Agricultural people have needs also but they are not likely to get any surpluses any time soon.

For millions of Texas children, the first day of school began the second or third week of August-for some kids, even earlier. For the past ten years school bells have rung earlier and earlier in school districts across the state. Most of us remember the days when schools started late in August or even after Labor

Texas law currently does not set a specific start date for public schools, but the vast majority of districts began the 2000-2001 school year between August and his cousin, David Ausborn Hiles, 7 and August 18, despite continued debate on whether starting school this early is beneficial to students. According to a poll of 1,000 Texans, 60 percent preferred starting school anywhere from a week before to two weeks after problems. He also told deputies that Labor Day. Sixty-four percent favored requiring all public schools to start on the same day across the state. Most states leave the start date up to local school boards, although Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri and Virginia require all schools to access to other powerful weapons in

Bills were filed during the 1997 and 1999 Legislative Sessions that would have prevented Texas public schools from starting the fall semester before to confirm that Hiles' spouse and five September 1, but the House Public Education Committee took no action and the children, who were home at the time, bill died in committee.

Another argument posed for a later start date are the utility costs for cooling schools during the August heat and possible health effects on

Opponents say that imposing a uniform start date would usurp the control of local school districts. Also, a traditional Labor Day beginning would result in the school year ending in middle or late June, or eliminate many days off during the year. Opponents also say that starting school around Labor Day ignores the needs of local school districts and the best interests of school children. Teacher groups have supported early starts with breaks during the school year to facilitate continuing education requirements.

The school start up date debate will most likely be heard again next session. Are you for starting school on a uniform date, possibly after September 1st or do you prefer this decision to be left to local school districts? I am interested in hearing your opinion on this or any other state issue. Please feel free to contact my office at any time.



Area man is arrested

Wichita County Sheriff's Deputies spent a few tense hours Monday night searching for a man with guns, after responding to a disturbance call on River View Road.

A further search of the property, including outbuildings and a workshop proved futile, and it was believed that Hiles had left through brush at the back of the property after dark.

However, three rifles and a shotgun were found on the ground behind a workshop.

The following morning, Hiles turned himself in at the courthouse, where he was arrested and charged with aggravated assault-family vio-

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
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
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


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
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
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Hawks overcome Burk, 30-22

What a difference a week makes.

After looking less than impressive against Holliday in the season opener, Iowa Park traveled to Burkburnett Friday night and looked like a different team, beating the Bulldogs 30-22 in front of a packed house.

It was Burkburnett's season opener and the first game for new head coach Bill Dalke.

It was also the first win as a head coach for Iowa Park's Chris Ellis. It didn't take long for things to get going.

Iowa Park received the opening kickoff and after making one first down was forced to punt. Burk took over at it's own 37-yard line with just over eight and a half minutes left in the period.

On the Bulldogs' first play of the new season, Tyrone Peoples took a handoff on a reverse and was off to the races, going 63 yards for the touchdown, giving Burk a 6-0 advantage. Trent Doyle added the point after to push the lead to 7-0.

Iowa Park got on the board on it's next possession. The Hawks took the ensuing kickoff at their own 23 and moved to the Burk 12 on the final play of the first period following an incomplete pass. On fourth and eight, Chase Wright booted a 30-yard field goal to cut the lead to 7-3.

After a three-and-out by the Bulldogs on their next possession, Iowa Park took over at it's own 40 with 10:18 left in the half. Ellis dipped into his bag of tricks on a fourth-andseven from the 43 and faked a punt, with Chris Simmons finding a wide open Mitch Singleton who took the ball all the way to the Burk six. On the next play Wright gave the Hawks their first lead of the season when he scored over the left side of his offensive line. His point after gave Iowa Park a 10-7 lead with 7:48 left in the half.

Then things got a bit crazy.

Matt Kelly recovered a Bulldog fumble by Ryan Matthews and was off to the races before being dragged down from behind at the Burk 10.

Two plays later, Iowa Park returned the favor when Wright was stripped of the ball. Michael Seymour picked up the loose ball and went 86 yards for the touchdown, pushing the Bulldogs back in front by the score of 14-10.

The Iowa Park defense allowed only two first downs to the Bulldogs in the first half, and with the exception of Peoples' long run, held Burk to only 28 total yards.

That Hawk defense set the tone early in the second half, forcing the Bulldogs to punt

on their opening possession of the third quarter. Iowa Park took over at it's own 19 with 9:31 left in the third period. Simmons and Wright hooked up on a big play that gained 19 yards on a third and 13 to keep the drive alive. Two plays later Bryan Swenson one-upped Peoples run for a touchdown, going 64 yards on a reverse to put Iowa Park back on top 17-14 with 7:20 left to play in the

After the two teams traded fumbles, Iowa Park regained possession at it's own 34 yard line. Three plays later, Simmons found a streaking Swenson for a 66-yard touchdown bobm to push the lead to 23-14. Wright's point after attempt was no good.

On Burkburnett's first posession of the fourth quarter, the Bulldogs once again showed their quick-strike potential when Matthews hooked up, with Peoples on a 69yard bomb to pull the Bulldogs to within three at 23-20. Russell Duggins broke through and blocked the point after attempt by Doyle.

Burk got the ball back after the Hawks were unable to make a first down, taking over at their own 38. Tailback Chip Richmond coughed up the football which was recovered by Singleton, giving the Hawks the ball at the 31 with 7:31 left to play in the game.

Five plays later, Simmons scored on a quarterback keeper around his left end to push the lead back up to 10 at 30-20 with 4:51 left to play.

Burk then quickly moved to the Iowa Park 11 with 1:48 still showing on the clock, thanks largely to a 47-yard scramble by Matthews. On first and 10 from the 11, Seymour fumbled the ball which was again recovered by Singleton to prevent the Bulldogs from getting back into the game.

Iowa Park gave the Bulldogs one last opportunity to tie the game when Jereme Wilson, who had earlier booted a 69-yard punt, had his punt blocked out of the endzone for a safety making the score 30-22.

The Hawks were then forced to free kick the ball back to the Bulldogs with 20 seconds left in the game. Three incompletions later the game was over, with the Hawks winning 30-22.

Swenson led all rushers and receivers with 75 yards on six carries and 69 yards receiving on two catches. Singleton had two receptions for 61 yards.


Family services were held Monday with funeral services held Tuesday, both at St. Stephens Church in Larimore, ND. Burial was in Bellevue Cemetery.

While many were enjoying the rain Monday evening, members of the Iowa Park Fire Department were busy taking care of calls generated because of the electrical storm.

Shortly after 5 p.m., nine members of the fire department began responding to calls. The first being a grass fire followed by another just minutes later. Those two calls were followed by six calls in two and a half hours.

Those calls consisted of another grass fire, a transformer fire, and downed electrical lines down in three areas of town, and a structure fire.

Shortly after fire department members arrived at 510 W. Aldine firemen discovered the clothes dryer had been struck by lighting. The damage was contained to the dryer, however the firemen checked the attic while on location.

While the nine members were busy in Iowa Park, three firemen and a truck went to Burkburnett and was there about three hours assisting their fire department.
