STORAGE IS NEED OF THIS AREA Two events typical of a functioning Farm Bureau organization took place this week in this area.

GRAIN SORGHUM

Monday afternoon Bob Crocker, P.M.A. secretary, and Loys D. Barbour, county service agent and dis-Union services at Methodist lawn trict 3 director of Farm Bureau, represented Wichita county in a meeting called in Vernon to consider ways and means of securing more storage for grain sorghums in order

> the Commodity Credit corporation. Twenty counties were represented in the gathering. By oral reports, a survey of crop acreage was made, and evidence pointed to the fact that farmers must provide more storage space, though the general discussion did not reveal a solution.

Barbour, reporting for the Texas Farm Bureau, said that organization saw this emergency some time ago and two weeks ago began contacting the proper sources in Washington and got the U.S. department of agriculture to approve the use of surplus government buildings, such as barracks and hangars, for extra storage space for grain. The only step lacking now is to determine who will be responsible for the care

of the grain when stored. The Farm Bureau director lamented the failure of Congress to ratify the international wheat agreement, which has added to the prob-

Since the expansion of the organization is for the welfare of Farm Bureau, Wichita county members will appreciate the fact that Jack county is being reorganized. H. T. Cardwell presided at a meeting in Jacksboro, Monday evening, when Jacksboro, Monday evening, when Mr. Barbour was the speaker and lowa Park Man Dick Christian was elected temporary chairman for the county.

The speaker outlined the history of various farm organizations in contrast with the history of the deelopment of the Farm Bureau Federation, showing that the outstanding success of the latter stemmed from the fact that all its functioning originated first in the local and county grous, spreading later to the state and national organization. Mr. Barbour also delineated the conditions existing in the relationships between labor, industry and agriculture, emphasizing that there must be parity, or equality, among the

three groups. "Labo rand industry definitely are looking after their own interests and are not going to look out for the interests of the farmer. Only organized agriculture can do that," continued Barbour. "Because our leadership never goes radical, and because the American Farm Bureau has always been unselfish in its procedure through the years, it commands the respect of Congress. The American Farm Bureau has attained its status in national legislation, not through great numbers nor through money power, but through methods of fair dealing with all three groups above mentioned." concluded Barbour, as the group was dismissed to continue further the promotion of Farm Bureau in Jack county.

Using what are probably the first photosynthesis of a leaf, preacherscientist Dr. Irwin A. Moon reveals new secrets of nature in his sound film, "The God of Creation," to be shown at 8:00 p.m. next Thursday at the First Baptist church, according to the Rev. Mr. James N. Easterwood, pastor of the church.

The film has already been shown to more than two million people.

In the first sequence, space ond its galaxies of stars are explored Larough the telescopes of Mount Wilson observatory. Then, in sharp contrast to the immensities of the universe, the wonders of the everyday world are colorfully portrayed. In this part of the film, plants grow and buds blossom in a few seconds. Close - up shots of a caterpillar wiggling into a butterfly are also

shown. For the third part Dr. Moon permits the audience to examine the minute perfection of the microscopic world. Sunlight falls on leaves, manufacturing leaf-food in the process of photo-synthesis.
