CITY HEALTH MAN **ASKS FOR CLEAN UP** TO PREVNT DISEASE

Dr. Gordon G. Clark, city health officer, urges every citizen to perform his civic duty in helping to clean up Iowa Park in order to rid the town of disease bearing insects such as flies and mosquitos. During summer months the danger of polio and other diseases can be reduced greatly if attention is paid to effective clean-up campaigns.

Fogging machine and hand sprays which are now in use in Wichita Falls will be made available to Iowa Park for one day, soon. The date will be announced. At that time, volunteers will be needed to man the hand sprays which are used to get to places inaccessible to the larger fogging machine. A finance committee is being set up to receive and solicit funds to defray the expense

Every citizen should, says Dr. Clark, feel an individual responsibility as well as civic pride in cleaning up the town, and making it a safer place, free from danger of polio and other diseases.
