Pat Sewell and Jim and John Bradford went to Denton, Friday and returned Saturday. They were getting a location for school this fall. Pat and Jim plan to room together.

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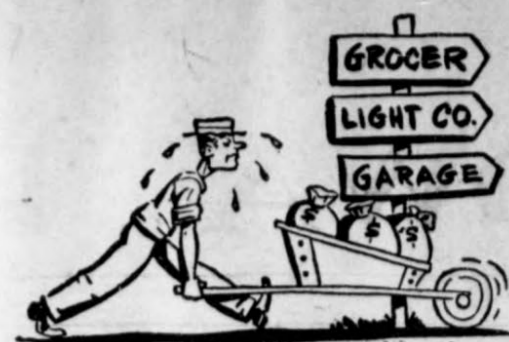

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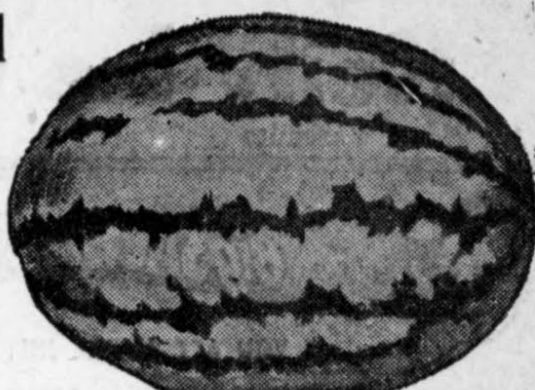

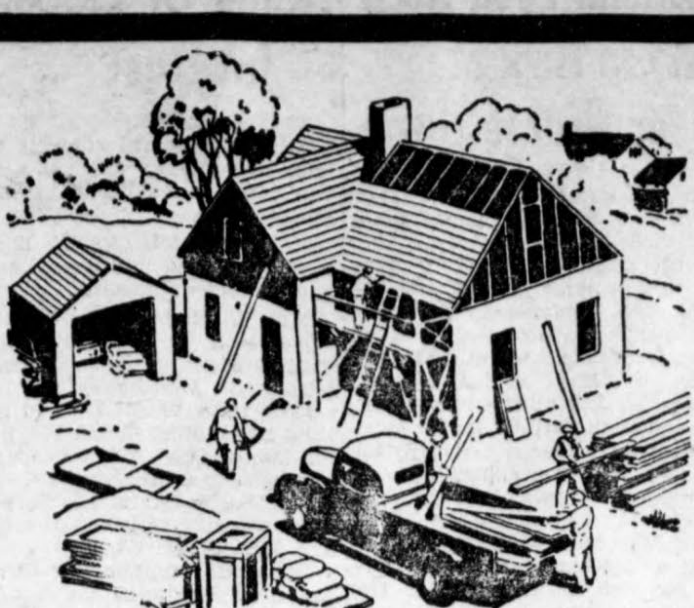
