Chocolate Coconut Crust 1 qt. Vanilla Ice Cream  
Cherry Sundae Sauce

**Chocolate Coconut Crust.** Melt 2 squares unsweetened chocolate and 2 tablespoons butter in top of double boiler, stirring until blended. Combine 2 tablespoons hot milk or water and 3/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar. Add to chocolate mixture, stirring well. Add 1 1/2 cups tender-thin flaked coconut and mix well. Spread on bottom and sides of greased 9-inch pie pan. Chill until firm. (Do not freeze).

Let chilled crust stand at room temperature 5 to 10 minutes before serving; then fill with vanilla ice cream, and top with Cherry Sundae Sauce. Serve immediately.

**Cherry Sundae Sauce.** Drain 1 No. 2 can red sour pitted cherries, packed in syrup, and measure juice, adding water to make 1 cup, if necessary. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch and dash of salt in saucepan. Add cherry juice and water gradually, stirring constantly. Cook over low heat until mixture is thickened and clear, stirring constantly. Add 1 teaspoon lemon juice and cherries. (A few drops of red coloring may be added, if desired.) Chill. Makes about 2 cups sauce. (ANS)

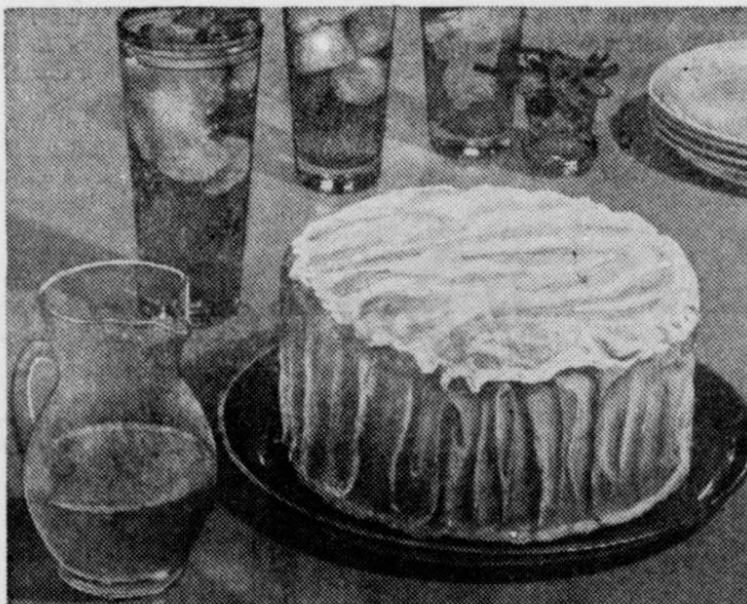

**LEMONADE FROSTING**

1 3-oz. pkge. cream cheese 6 tablespoons Minute Maid  
4 cups sifted confectioners' Fresh-Frozen Lemonade  
sugar (thawed and undiluted)

5-6 drops yellow food coloring

Cream the cheese until soft. Add sifted confectioners' sugar slowly, alternating with lemonade concentrate. Blend in yellow food coloring. Fill and frosts 8-inch layer cake.

\*Remainder of concentrate can be used for flavoring iced tea in place of lemon wedge and sugar. Or blend it with two cans water to make two good glasses of refreshing lemonade.

**NOTES FROM THE COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT . . .**

Question often asked is "Can chicken go from freezer to frying pan or broiler rack without thawing—and cook successfully?"

Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, says it's best to thaw first if you are going to fry or broil the chicken. Otherwise it's difficult to get a brown crust on the pieces.

For stewing, the cut-up pieces

can go into the water while still hard-frozen.

For roasting, it's best to thaw completely before cooking. Otherwise the outside may be overdone and dry by the time the inside meat is done.

It pays to get the chicken out of the freezer and into the refrigerator a day ahead to be sure it's completely thawed for cooking. This reminder — Allow poultry to thaw in the original package. The skin of an uncovered bird becomes tough and dry when exposed to the air during the thawing.

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## On July Ballot

Next month for the first time in 24 years Texans will vote not only on candidates but directly on issues.

State Democratic machinery has approved placing three questions on the July 28 primary ballot:

1. Legislation exempting a child from compulsory attendance at integrated schools.
2. Legislation "perfecting" laws against intermarriage of Negroes and white.
3. Use of interposition to halt federal encroachment on states' rights.

Majority approval presumably would constitute a mandate for action by the state legislature.

This procedure was set up in 1907 and has been used three times before this year. In 1908 a prohibition proposal was voted down two to one. In 1919 the people rejected three to one a proposal to call a constitutional convention.

In 1932 Texans voted overwhelmingly in favor of repealing federal prohibition. A year later the legislature ratified the repeal amendment.

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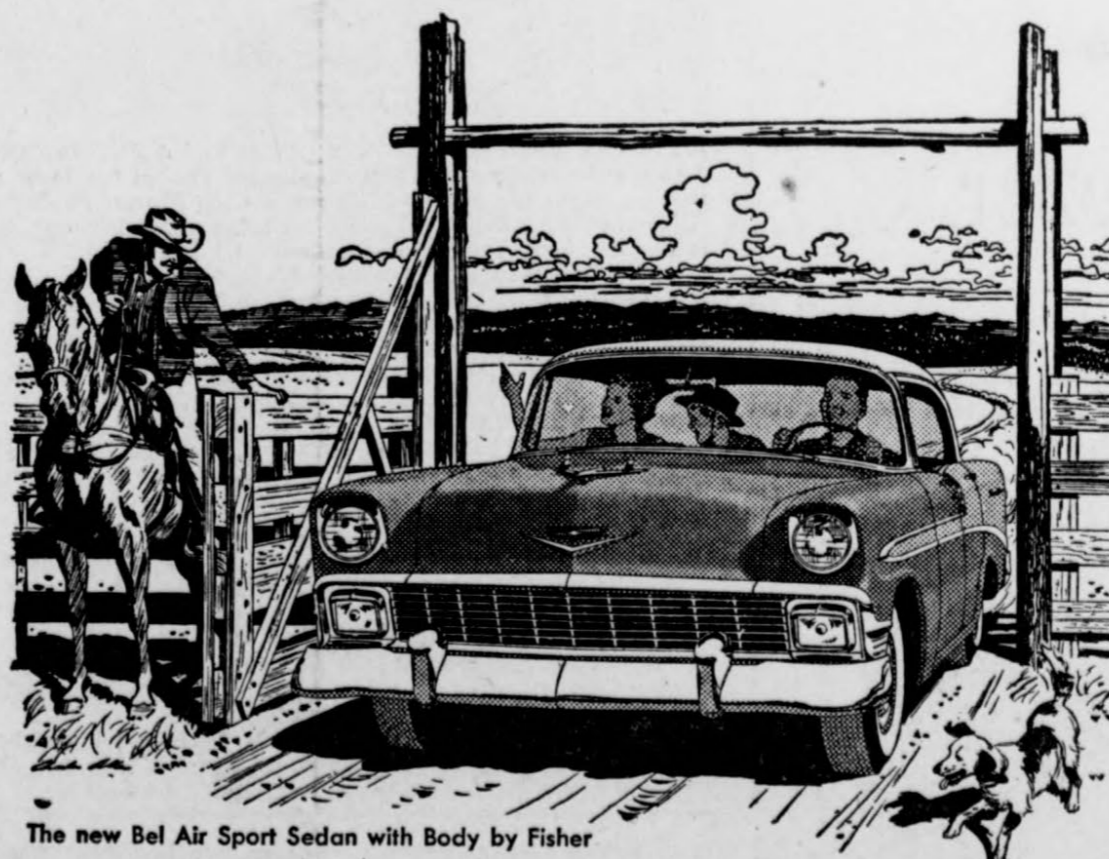
