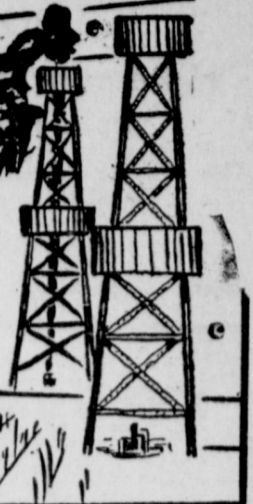

## Courage, Faith and Good Care Restore Strength to Crippled Legs

When school opened this month there was one 11-year-old boy in Iowa Park happy to be able to return to classes. He is Mark Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Lee, 303 E. Alameda.

In October 1961, when Mark was in the third grade, he began to limp. At first it was thought he had injured his leg playing ball. As months passed he had to start wearing corrective shoes.

On April 3, 1963, Mark was taken to Scottish Rite hospital in Dallas. The doctors determined he had a disease known as Legg-perthes. Mr. and Mrs. Lee, better known as Johnny and Pat, and Mark met another young boy with the same disease at the hospital, who had been cured.

Mark was put in a special cast and stayed in the hospital a week. He returned home and stayed six weeks before returning to have his legs put into splints. He remained another week and came home.

Aug. 23, Mark and his parents returned to Scottish Rite hospital and the splints were removed. At first his legs were a bit stiff, but Mark was determined, and walked without the aid of crutches. Now the doctors have told him he can do what he loves—play football and baseball! He walks without a limp and is able to run.

Mark is getting to wear cowboy boots and tennis shoes — something he had dreamed of.

When Mark had to go to the hospital he had missed only one day of school in the four years he had attended. On his return in April he began studying at home and when school started this year Mark was able to go with his classmates into the fifth grade.

Mark praises his teacher Mrs. Ann Bates for the extra help she gives him during recess. There were some things he missed while studying at home last year.

Mark also had a good attendance record at Sunday School, so Mrs. Bobby Fox, his teacher, quite often brought the class to his home to have the lessons.

Johnny and Pat say Mark enjoyed being in the Scottish Rite hospital. Personnel there have entertainment for the children and help them avoid homesickness.

While Mark was in the cast and solint, many friends and organizations here made his days brighter with cards, gifts and visits. All this time the brave youngster has kept a smile on his face and has been a friend to everyone.

Mark has a brother Johnny in the 4th grade and a sister Donna in the second.

Burial was in Crestview Memorial Park.

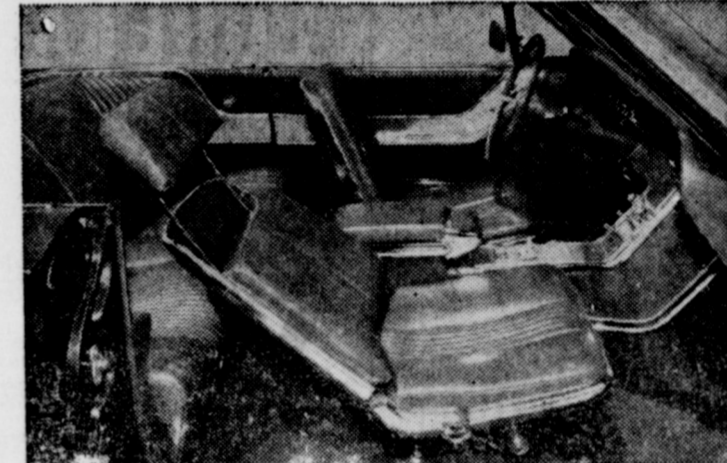
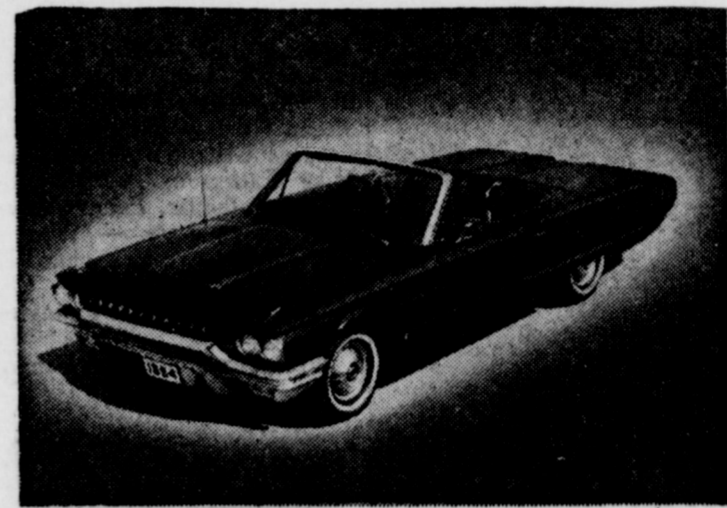
Mr. Hightower, resident of this area for several years, died in Wichita Falls Monday night.

Rocky French did a nice job of quarterbacking and contributed a 35-yard punt return for a score. Barry Jackson, Kenneth Merriman and Amos Ross contributed nice gains and fine blocking.

The Hawks go to Jacksboro this Thursday. Kickoff for the junior high game is 5:30, with the freshman teams playing immediately afterwards.

Coaches David West and Tom Shelton are high on their squad and praise their team spirit.

Valley View put together a 73-yard scoring drive last Friday night on Warrior field to win over the Holliday Eagles 12-6. Jimmy Moore raced 28 yards

There will be no meeting of WSCS next Tuesday.

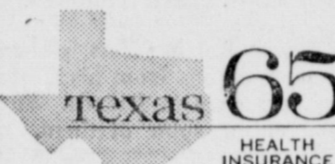

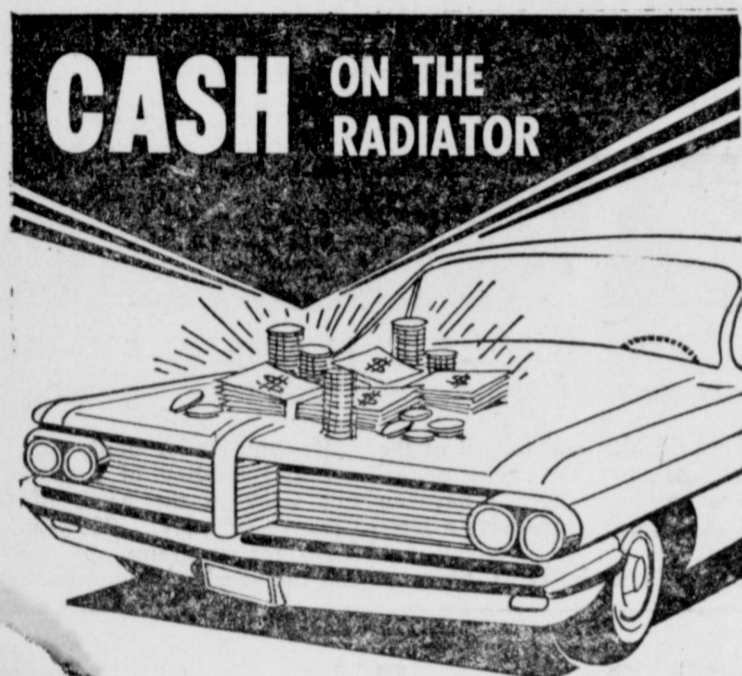

## HOW TO MAKE LIGHT WORK IN THE KITCHEN

Properly planned lighting in the kitchen makes meal preparation easier, more pleasant and more efficient. It helps eliminate little annoyances like misread recipes . . . dishes (or vegetables) that have to be washed twice. For a well-lighted kitchen you need two kinds of lighting:

### GENERAL LIGHTING

. . . to provide a pleasant level of over-all room illumination without glare or shadowy areas. As a suggestion for the average rectangular kitchen, a 12-inch enclosed ceiling fixture with a 150-watt bulb, or a shielded fluorescent fixture with two 40-watt tubes usually will provide adequate light.



### LOCAL LIGHTING

. . . to eliminate working in your own shadow at the sink, range or work counters. Use over the sink either incandescent or fluorescent lamps, shielded behind a facing board or recessed into ceiling. A shielded fluorescent wall bracket is recommended over the range. Shielded fluorescent tubes under cabinets will provide ample light on counter tops.
