Death Takes IPHS Athlete

Iowa Park community was saddened and shocked Sunday morning when word came that Weldon Lee Bradberry, 17, had died unexpectedly in a Wichita Falls hospital. He had surgery for an injury suffered during the football season.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Bradberry, 125 James Drive, Weldon was born July 8, 1951, in Wichita Falls. The family moved to Iowa Park from Vernon eight years ago. He was member of the junior class, high school a capella choir and the Faith Baptist church.

Weldon played offensive guard and defensive end on the Hawk football team and was named to the All-District team. He also lettered in track in 1968.

When Coach Tommy Watkins learned of Weldon's death, he said "This is a big blow. Weldon was an outstanding player, student, and individual. He was liked by everyone; in fact, I can think of no one who did not appreciate Weldon because he gave 100% of himself whether on or off the field."

Funeral service was conducted Tuesday afternoon at Faith Baptist church by Rev. Gerald Tidwell, pastor. Rev. John Klappenbach of Calvary Baptist church in Vernon and former pastor of the Faith church, assisted.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were coaches of Iowa Park school: Watkins, Gerald Combs, Jerry McWilliams, Jimmy Alsop, Larry Dorch, Tom Shelton, Otho Woods and Donald Lucv. All football players were honorary pallbearers.

In addition to his parents, Weldon is survived by a brother Jimmy; two sisters: Shirley and Evelyn; his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Leslie Bradford, all of Iowa Park; the maternal grandparents, Mrs. George Wood of Wichita Falls and George Wood of Alford.

All new folk who enjoy square dancing are invited to come and get acquainted. Admission will be \$2 a couple. Refreshments will be served and door prizes will be given.



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
