



use of certain facts that help them increase their take of game. Strip-cropped farmland attracts pheasants, for instance. Grassy stream banks make fine nesting places for quail and pheasants; living fences and windbreaks provide excellent cover and food

for rabbits, grouse and squirrels.
Fine and dandy. But, in these days of rapidly diminishing open land in which to hunt, how many of us remember that plain old good sense in our personal conduct is just as important in the over-all picture? Most hunters do

rude, careless and even down-right dangerous. Since it takes only one such "hunter" to spoil things for dozens of others, the following rules are worth repeating: Always ask the landowners' permission before hunting. Offer him a card bearing your name, address and phone number. Never do any shooting close to or in the direction of farm buildings or livestock.
