





But if you intend to hunt big game this fall . . . grizzly, moose, sheep, goat, elk, caribou or enteloge it makes sense or antelope . . . it makes sense. Why? to check on them. In Nevada, for instance, only residents may hunt antelope. In Idaho residents and non-residents must apply for antelope permits by mid-July. In Alaska, caribou season lasts from August 10th through

March 31st. In Saskatchewan it's from November 4th to 30th.
In Alaska, a non-resident hunting license costs \$10. In Alberta it's \$150. In Montana, it's \$150 plus a \$25 permit to hunt grizzly.

fore applying for another permit, while Arizona will let you take only one in a lifetime. In certain places, you can't hunt on Sundays. Some places allow you to hunt only male animals, while others allow both
