

OUTLOOK IS WHICH LETTER

Reasonable Assurance That Legations Survived Mob Attacks.

CHING IS THEIR CHAMPION

British Admiral Reports that Head of the Tsung Li Yamen Has Furnished a Guard.

London, July 10.—3:25 a. m.—With the engineers in Peking probably safe amid civil war, with Prince Ching on their side, with the powers united and their forces constantly increasing, the outlook in China is now rather more hopeful than it has been for a month past.

It appears from the cautious statement given out by Tsoai Shan in Shanghai, that the reason legations at Peking were not used is that Prince Ching, who is served by 10,000 troops, seized all the arsenal arms, and Sheng likewise intimates that Yung Lu, commander-in-chief of the northern army, is associated with Prince Ching in opposing Prince Tuan's pernicious designs and dictatorial ambition.

It is obvious that, though there are many thousands of Chinese camped behind the guns, nothing can be done at present except to wait the arrival of reinforcements.

The rainy season has set in and this makes going into the interior difficult. The country between Peking and Tien Tsin is other years has been frequently flooded. River transport is practically non-existent and must be entirely rebuilt.

From a foreign point of view, the capture of Peking is the key to the situation, as there is a fear, according to the Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent, that delay now means 100 recruits for the Boxers for every soldier of the allied army.

Two couriers arrived at Tien Tsin on July 10 from Peking. One brought a letter from Sir Claude MacDonald, British minister, to the same effect as that previously received from Sir Robert Hart.

The couriers confirm the report that the native feeling against the Boxers is strong. Two high officials opposed to the Boxers are reported by the couriers to have been assassinated.

Prince Tuan is quite willing that the dougong empire be partitioned. Prince Tuan has decided that he will take full responsibility. He proposes to re-take Tien Tsin and Taku.

However all this may be the allies at Tien Tsin are having an exceedingly unpleasant time. The last engagement of the Chinese was on July 6, through, occurred on July 6. The Chinese artillery opened at dawn. Their fire was more accurate than their ammunition better, the shells exploding with precision and setting fire to several buildings.

Legations still stand and ministers are safe. Washington, July 9.—The following telegram was received last night by Minister Wu from Sheng, director general of imperial telegraph at Shanghai, dated yesterday.

July 2, two legations in Peking still preserved. All ministers safe. Rebellious troops and rioters make attacks, but suffer many losses. Imperial troops are protecting, but meet with difficulty in doing so.

Though fearful of giving false encouragement, the state department officials are bound to admit today that there is reason to hope now respecting the welfare of the legations at Peking.

Minister Wu's cablegram from Sheng taken in connection with the report of Admiral Bruce from Tien Tsin, has done much to encourage this hopeful feeling.

It is understood, however, that the British admiral Kempf's communication is the necessity of speedy reinforcements, if quick action is desired, and on the latter point there is not a dissenting voice among the cabinet officers.

schedule already in execution, only one steamer with two battalions of one regiment, has started from San Francisco, and the next steamer is not to sail until the 15th of the present month.

This state of affairs caused a revival today of the rumor that General MacArthur is to be again called upon to relieve the situation by dispatching from the Philippines at least two regiments, in addition to the Ninth infantry already ready sent to Taku.

Unless Japan is left to do all of the fighting, the immediate future Gen. MacArthur must respond to this demand. By drawing upon the Philippine force, at least a month could be saved in sending troops to China.

Secretary Long this afternoon showed how the navy was responding to the call for reinforcements by ordering 500 marines to be assembled from the general navy yards and hurried to China.

It is significant that these are the first military forces to be sent directly from the United States to China without instructions to stop at Nagasaki for orders.

St. Louis, July 9.—The strike against the St. Louis Transit company by its former employees, which was declared off July 2, was ordered renewed today at a meeting of the street railway men's union at the West End Coliseum.

When the strike was settled on July 2 there were some mutterings of discontent among the men over the terms of settlement and since that time the dissatisfaction has grown daily.

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THE STRIKE ON AGAIN

St. Louis Transit Employees Say Company Has Violated Agreement.

CHARGE POSITIVELY DENIED

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BOERS ARE VERY ACTIVE

Both In the Orange Colony and the "Pacified" Western Transvaal.

SEVERE FIGHTING REPORTED

Boers Are Said to Have Been Defeated and Demoralized Between Middeburg and Machadoodorp.

London, July 10.—As Lord Roberts' dispatches reveal, the Boers are unusually active, both in the Orange colony and the so-called pacified western Transvaal but without producing any serious impression upon the British arms.

The bond leaders at the Cape are extending their boycott of British firms, and Dutch companies with \$1,000,000 capital, have been formed.

Passengers arriving at Lourenco Marques on July 9 from Middleburg say there has been severe fighting between the latter place and Machadoodorp, in which the Boers were defeated and demoralized.

The Lourenco Marques correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says, under date of July 9: "I understand that Mr. Hollis, the American consul here, has been recalled. He is a well known pro-Boer."

Roberts Reports. London, July 10.—Lord Roberts telegrams to the war office from Pretoria as follows: "The officer commanding at Heilbron reports that the Secretary, Blantyre, State Attorney Dickson and Members of Council Van Taidler and Kupper, came in yesterday and surrounded."

It is reported here that President Kruger's retention of large amounts of gold at Machadoodorp has created the utmost discontent among the mercantile officials and men. They expected substantial rewards for championing the Boer interests, but have received nothing.

It is added that visiting foreigners who have subsequently advocated intervention are believed to have received substantial sums. Proofs of this fact, however, have been discovered in Pretoria, which promise startling developments.

What the "Boxers" Are. "Boxers" is a rough and ready translation of the three Chinese characters, Romanized as Ho Chuan, meaning, in broad literalness, righteousness, harmony and peace.

Washington, July 9.—Developments in the Chinese situation were considered by members of the cabinet at the consultation held today.

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PRINCE CHING

Head of the Tsung Li Yamen Is Defending the Legations at Peking.

London, July 9.—Admiral Bruce has sent a telegram to the admiralty department from Taku under date of July 7 to the effect that the British legations at Peking are being protected by the army.

A dispatch from Shanghai says: A message sent from Wei Hai Wei last Sunday and received here today states that his majesty's ship Alceity has returned direct to Wei Hai Wei with twenty wounded.

The situation is still grave, for the Boxer movement has degenerated into rioting and looting, all principle having been lost, and so it was reasonable to expect that the strongest and best and most influential of the Chinese mandarins would be necessary to combat them.

AN ANTI SILVER PARTY.

NO MAN who understands what took place at the Kansas City convention can fairly or honestly claim that the Democratic party is in favor of silver or that if the party should be successful in the coming campaign it would or could do anything towards the restoration of free coinage at 16 to 1.

When the silver plank was under consideration in the committee on resolutions a vote was taken, each state and territory being entitled to one vote.

The result stood 26 to 24 in favor of a definite silver plank.

Twenty-three states, representing 287 votes in the electoral college, declared against a specific reference to silver, and voted to put it on the same level with the Chicago riots and other obsolete planks of the Chicago platform.

Twenty-one states, representing 157 electoral votes, declared in favor of a specific reference to silver.

The resolution for silver was carried by a vote of the territories that cast no electoral votes.

The state of Montana, a western Democratic state, refused to vote either way.

The twenty-three states that voted against silver have 241 representatives in congress.

The twenty-one states that voted for silver have 115 representatives in congress.

If every congressional district in the United States should elect a Democrat to the house of representatives, a free silver bill would be beaten in the house of representatives by a two to one vote.

But the real strength of the silver Democrats in the convention was even less than represented by the figures given above. Three states at least are said to have voted in accordance with the expressed wishes of Mr. Bryan and contrary to the sentiments of their committees, and at the very moment, almost, that the vote was being taken, Governor Thomas of the silver state of Colorado, a man elected to his official position by a fusion of silver votes, and owing his selection to temporary chairman to his supposed friendliness for silver, was sounding the "key-note" of the campaign in a speech from which all direct reference to free silver at the traditional ratio had been carefully excluded.

If the matter had been left to the convention, there is no reasonable doubt that silver would have been left out of the platform.

Why then, it may be asked, was Bryan, a radical silver leader, to whose personal influence it was undoubtedly due that the 16 to 1 plank was put in at all, nominated by this anti-silver convention?

The answer is easy. Bryan was nominated because the necessary number of delegates were instructed to vote for him, and with Bryan as their chief candidate they could not help putting a special reference to silver in the platform, after his public expressions on the subject.

To suit Mr. Bryan, the inevitable candidate, and to catch western Republican and Populist votes, silver was left in the platform, and was then made as inconspicuous as possible by a plank declaring that the paramount issue of the campaign was anti-imperialism.

The vote in the committee proved the anti-silver sentiment of the Democratic party beyond doubt or question.

It removed the silver issue from the campaign absolutely, except as it may be used in the east by Republicans to frighten business men and to expose the utter insincerity and demagoguery of the Democracy, and in the west by Democrats in an attempt to delude Republicans into voting against their own party and for the party of calamity and contraction.

LATE CHINESE NEWS.

THE latest developments in the Chinese situation are encouraging for the general conditions and especially for the safety of the ministers at Peking, with the exception of Baron von Ketteler.

If there is a force of Chinese in Peking sufficiently strong to hold its own against the Boxers and prevent the massacre of the legations it is quite probable that these will be able to hold out until the arrival of a relief army. The possibility of this comes as a great relief to the nations of Europe and America and affords additional proof of the unreliability of the news dispatches from China, however circumstantial these may be.

In the mean time the great powers seem to be settling themselves at work diligently to meet the necessities of the occasion, and to provide a force strong enough to bring relief to the besieged at Peking—if they are still there—and to take the offensive if necessary against the Chinese rebels, to maintain order, enforce punishment against the responsible authors of the recent massacres, whoever they may be and to prevent the repetition of similar events in the future. The exact details of the agreement between the powers is properly kept secret, but it seems to involve the sending of a large Japanese army without delay, and the forwarding of troops by other nations as rapidly as possible.

That the United States has a proper part in these military movements is unquestionable. It is not a question of securing a share of territory but of maintaining our standing as a nation among nations, and to do what can be done to preserve our commercial interests in China. Nothing else would be so conducive to the dismemberment of the Chinese empire, to the extension of European sovereignty over large territories in Asia and to an inevitable conflict between the Christian nations of the world and the millions of China, as would the withdrawal of the United States from a share in solving the problem now presented there. Both the Europeans and the Chinese appreciate and respect our disinterestedness and our strength. We hold a position that no other nation can fill and we have our duty to perform as a part of the world of modern civilization in protecting that world from the gravest danger it has known since the invading Asiatics were defeated and rolled back from Europe. This duty the United States cannot neglect without a disregard of its own interests as well as of what it owes to the other Christian nations of the world.

A more strict observance of the rule of the road would be agreeable to many bicyclists and some pedestrians. There is an ordinance against riding on the wrong side of the street, and it should be strictly enforced. Especially at night the rider who gets on the wrong side of the street imperils his own safety and that of all whom he may meet.

It may have been overlooked, but we have failed to notice the acceptance by the Democratic convention of that million Prohibitionist votes in exchange for a prohibition plank.

And the Democracy needs them so much.

Since they dug up Stevenson the Democrats are not saying as much as they did about the vice presidency being a political graveyard.

Mr. Bryan wouldn't object to Stevenson so much if only he wasn't second-hand.

COLORADO SPRINGS REPUBLICAN CLUB.

THE big thing in Colorado Springs local politics this year will undoubtedly be the Republican club, for the organization of which a meeting is to be held this evening at the county court house.

In recent years a number of Republican organizations have been formed in this city, and each one has been somewhat better than its predecessor. Now the time has come, in the presidential year, for something on a larger scale, and the experience gained in former organizations and the nucleus of membership already existing will be a great help this year.

Every Republican in the city should be enrolled on the list of membership, and plenty of opportunity will be given to those who desire to take a more active part in the popular ratification of the nomination of McKinley and Roosevelt. Several plans have been suggested along this line, and later there may be other organizations in the way of marching or flambaux clubs formed as auxiliaries to the main organization. A series of public meetings with speakers of state and national prominence will also be arranged for, and it is believed that one of these will be a grand demonstration in honor of the Republican candidate for the vice presidency.

At the meeting to be held this evening it is also proposed to elect delegates to the national convention of the League of Republican clubs which is held this year at St. Paul. It is desirable that Colorado Springs and vicinity should be well represented there, and we hope that the delegates will be able to make a favorable report of local enthusiasm at the beginning of the campaign.

DEMOCRAT OR POPULIST.

MR. BRYAN'S political legs are not as elastic as are those of some of his party associates.

"It is difficult," said Senator Teller on one occasion, "to ride two horses going in opposite directions at the same time."

But it can be done providing that one has the necessary skill, that the ring is not too large, and that one has a sufficient amount of flexibility and extensibility in his nether limbs.

But unless Mr. Bryan is differently constructed from the popular notion of him, he will find it somewhat difficult to accept the Populist nomination, while remaining as the candidate of the Democratic party on the Democratic platform.

For, according to the belief of Populists, as set forth in the platform adopted at Sioux Falls, the main issue of the campaign is silver restoration and the repeal of the currency bill, while according to the Democratic platform the paramount issue is anti-imperialism and silver is given a subordinate position.

Moreover, in order to be consistent, Mr. Bryan should reject Populist support as positively as the Democratic convention rejected the Populist candidate for vice president. The only thing against Towne was that he was not a Democrat. He had all the other qualifications. Stevenson was a western man, and Stevenson had a sort of a record on silver, and Stevenson was objectionable to the east, just as Towne was. But Towne was not a Democrat, in name, and Towne had been nominated by a Populist convention, and that settled him.

How then can Mr. Bryan accept the Populist nomination? Here follows another point.

The Populist platform "condemns the wholesale system of disfranchisement by coercion and intimidation adopted in some states, as un-Democratic and un-Republican," and declares "it to be the duty of several state legislatures to take such action as will secure a full, free and fair ballot and an honest count."

From the Democratic standpoint this is running the "consent of the governed" into the ground.

"They believe that the Filipinos have constitutional rights which should be respected at all hazards, but the negroes of the south are a different matter altogether."

If Mr. Bryan should make his campaign in the south on the Populist platform, he would not carry half a dozen states altogether.

And that is another reason why consistency and political tenacity require that Mr. Bryan should decline the Populist nomination of the Sioux Falls convention.

AN IMPORTANT ENTERPRISE.

THE double enterprise spoken of in the Gazette a day or so ago, involving irrigation works and an electric railway in the vicinity of Grand Junction is one of the most important that has been begun in Colorado for a long time past.

The reclamation of 80,000 acres of highly fertile land, to be accomplished by massive pumps operated by cheap coal, will mean an addition to the population of Mesa county of not less than a thousand families. This land will not be laid off into big fields of wheat or alfalfa, but will be divided up into small tracts for orchards or sugar beets.

These large enterprises, together with others that have recently been inaugurated, seem to indicate that the era of prosperity for Grand Junction, so often prophesied, has been fairly begun at last. If so, there is no question that its wealth of natural resources and peculiarly fortunate geographical situation will shortly push it to the front as one of the most rapidly growing and prosperous sections of the state.

THE COLORADO SPRINGS LIBRARY.

FEW institutions in this city are doing more good in a quiet way, or are more deserving of popular interest and support than the Colorado Springs public library. At the present time the library includes about 5,500 books, which may be used in or out of the rooms, including between 200 and 300 very valuable government books and pamphlets. Among recent additions about 400 books were purchased at the Bradford sale, the list including all classes, the largest number of any one kind being juvenile.

In the past week an old friend and long time member of the Public Library association sent in 167 books and a fine portrait of William H. Seward. Gifts of books, magazines and other periodicals are frequently received. Most of the popular novels are purchased, as far as funds will permit, and the library would be helped if several copies were available as the demand is increasing, especially now that the summer visitors are numerous. Last summer upwards of 300 cards were issued to transients and the call for this season has already begun. The circulation at the library increases every year. For the six months just ended 19,840 books were issued, an increase of 3,427 as compared with the same months of 1899 and 5,092 over 1898.

A card catalogue according to the Dewey system of classification is being made which will greatly increase the usefulness of the library.

The expense of this work, so necessary to the interests of the city, is being met in part from the funds of the Public Library association and the balance will have to be collected from the friends of the library. About \$30 have been received as association dues at one dollar a year, also donations towards the completion of the catalogue and \$25 from Mr. L. R. Ehrlich, the president of the association.

The library is certainly in a flourishing condition, and like all popular, growing and beneficial institutions, needs money to keep up with the increasing demands made upon it. It is a worthy object and one that commends itself to the interest of public spirited and generous citizens.
