A Few Companies Operating in Rico Mining Properties. A number of mining companies have been organized to operate in Rico's mining properties. Following are some of the principal corporations:

All of the above companies are bound to perform a certain amount of labor each year, and to expend large amounts of money. Several of these companies are making arrangements for the immediate erection of machinery at Rico. Some of the managers of these companies have purchased and shipped machinery which is now en route to Rico. One smelter, organized by the Grand View company, erected in 1880, made a successful run last fall by its first competent management, and will be started up again in early spring. Lixivation works are being erected about one-half mile from Rico, up the Dolores river, which are to be completed by about the first of next June. At least three of the above companies will erect machinery here next spring and summer. And all of the companies mentioned will develop their mines to the extent of the requirements of the law, if not perform a greater amount of labor. A number of our companies have worked their properties during this winter, and will continue development. Many of the mines have paid a handsome profit for working, while others have only paid the expenses of working. As in all mining camps, many of the prospects have not paid any part of the expense of development.

Besides the large number of mines operated by companies, there are over 2,000 mines and prospects around Rico which will be developed during the coming season. Numerous contracts have been let for development which now gives employment to a great number of laborers. When the mining season has fairly begun, thousands of miners and laborers will be busily engaged in taking out and transporting mineral to the smelters and mills for reduction.

PAGOSA SPRINGS would become a great place if the lands and waters were in enterprising hands. These springs, 100 miles east of Rico, are no doubt, equal to any in the world for curative purposes. It should become a great point for tourists, and is a naturally and advantageously situated place for a medical institution and hospital. It is important that some good, enterprising person or persons get hold of the Pagosa springs.

The Trout Lake Mining District, sixteen miles north of Rico, will be a scene of live action next summer. We understand that some good companies have been organized to operate there.

MUNICIPAL. Rico's Coming City Election in April.

On April 4th, an election will be held in Rico, for the purpose of electing one mayor, one city clerk and four other trustees. When elected, this council has the power of choosing and appointing other officers or servants of the city government, viz: City marshal, police officers, city attorney, surveyor, fire warden and such other officers or agents as is deemed necessary. The council is also vested with the authority to make new city laws and to amend ordinance laws now in force; and to direct the use of the city funds; to decide whether or not city buildings or improvements shall be made, and how much the cost shall be, and where buildings are to be located, and improvements to be made. In fact, the duties of the council are too numerous for mention in our limited space. In a new mining town populated by all kinds and classes from all parts of the earth, an able council is needed to rule upon questions relative to city government.

During the coming season, there will be an increase of population, and the increase will be made up of good, bad and indifferent people. A council will be needed for the protection of the good and to take proper care of the remainder. Not one member of the council shall be elected to office by any particular crew, faction or element, to subvert any other interest than that of the general public. All legal and qualified voters who feel a personal interest in the welfare of Rico and Pioneer Mining District, will cast free, unprejudiced and uninfluenced votes for the best and most public spirited men, as their intelligence dictates.

Men who have personal interests to subservise are not popular candidates for members of the coming council. It is not what candidates promise to be, but rather what they have been.

WEST DOLORES, distant from seven to ten miles west of Rico, will be more thoroughly prospected next summer, and as some valuable discoveries have already been made there, it is probable that considerable attention will be given to that branch of the Dolores river.

COLORADO SPRINGS has the chicken pox. Small-pox is spreading away down in Mexico. A little danger is apprehended in the extreme portion of Southeastern Colorado, but there is no real danger if precautionary steps are taken.

SOUTHERN Colorado possesses a vast amount of coal and timber for all uses in which these possessions will ever be required—if thousands of smelters and mills are put in operation.

COACH fare is \$7 from Rico to the end of the railroad track, and \$1.70 from there to Durango. Our people do not feel so isolated as they did a year and over two years ago.

THE Wagon Wheel Gap hot springs are becoming very popular, and the Denver & Rio Grande railroad will soon reach that place, which is 35 miles west of Del Norte, Rio Grande county.

NEWSPAPERS should not allow escaped convicts, common crows and the lowest in rank of the common herd to work off their beastly effusions through their columns.

THE Cascade Mining District, twenty miles east of Rico, promises something in the way of development the coming summer. It is a camp of narrow veins.

Good hotels and eating houses are very handsome ornaments in mining camps. About the first thing looked for by the newcomer is the hotel or eating house. It is said that the hot springs in the Animas valley, 30 miles from Rico, have performed wonderful cures in rheumatism and other diseases. It is reported that M. B. Marshall, of Durango, intends building a theater in Rico. Somebody will. Marshall understands his business. Rico, this season will be the liveliest town in the West. With its mining, milling and smelting business, the town will boom in earnest. Goods will be much cheaper in Rico next summer than ever before. Freight will be greatly reduced, and the merchant will sell cheaper. The town of Rico is no longer hemmed in, but now has an excellent outlet to the railroad, thirty miles distant. The agricultural portion of Dolores county will receive more attention this spring than heretofore. The mining territory of Pioneer Mining District is large in area, and grand in mineral wealth. Ladies, women, and feminine gender are terms applicable to human females.

RICO'S SALARY QUESTION.

Shadows of Public Opinion Reflected. The town of Rico was incorporated in the earlier part of 1880, when the board of trustees began to frame the city government. The first general election held at Rico, was on the 6th day of April, 1880, when the "salary" question was voted upon, resulting 214 "for" to 14 "against" salary. It was expected at that time that the increase of Rico's population, etc., would so greatly increase the duties of the councilmen that it would not only be right and proper but an absolute necessity to compensate the members of the council to get them to serve at all. It has since been clearly shown that there are many who would serve as mayor or councilman without compensation. It is not reasonable to suppose that the city clerk would serve without salary, as the person who shall act in that capacity has to do nearly all the work incidental to the city government.

Under the two respective administrations of the past two years (80-'81) and up to the present time, Rico's affairs have been managed with credit to the managers. A few simple and not very effective errors have been made. So far as the financial condition of Rico is concerned we have never yet known of Rico's paper being worth less than 100 cents on the dollar. Up to this time the salaries and expenses paid for our city government has not exceeded the revenue.

During the year 1880 "an ordinance making appropriations for the fiscal year ending the 31st day of April, 1881," was passed and approved, as follows:

(No. 20)

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico:

Sec. 1. That the following sums be and are hereby appropriated for the purpose of paying all necessary expenses of the said Town for the fiscal year ending the last day of April, A. D. 1881, to-wit: For paying salaries of town treasurer, town clerk and recorder, town marshal, street supervisor, surveyor and town attorney, five thousand dollars.

For paying for public improvements (in addition to poll tax) of streets, alleys and bridges, six thousand dollars.

For fuel, lights, stationery, printing, rents and all other expenses, seven thousand dollars.

The board acting under the above ordinance, passed ordinance No. 35, which is in substance, as follows:

Salaries of town officers, \$5,000. Public improvements, in addition to poll taxes, of streets, alleys, bridges, etc., \$8,000.

Fuel, lights, stationery, printing, rents and all other expenses, \$7,500.

Passed and approved March 21, 1881. In the first clause the amount was unchanged. In the second clause, there is a reduction of \$3,000, and in the third clause the amount is reduced \$5,500. In the whole-sale reduction there is a difference of \$8,500.

All who will look ahead can see the future of Rico beaming with joyous prosperity—and they can see the necessity of an enormous expense for marshal and police officers; also the pressing necessity of improvements. Economy calls for the erection of a city building, which can be rented to the county for all purposes, except jail. While the support of Rico's government is substantially the support of Dolores county, economy should be exercised in conjunction with the two governments.

To sum it up, the popular sentiment of the citizens is that the mayor and four trustees should not receive compensation during the coming year.

Let it be understood that the News does not agitate this matter for the benefit of any individual, clique, faction or element. Nor do we wish to give matter heads an opportunity to declare their candidacy for office "because it is cheap."

We will have the best men if voters act without prejudice in their selection. The manner in which the question shall be disposed of we are not able to advise, but will suggest that the matter be presented to the present council for their consideration.

Journalistic.

The new Denver weekly, the World, is a success. It is a model paper, neatly printed and well edited. The first two numbers amply show that the World Publishing Co. has an appreciation of the great mineral wealth of Rico. We hope that it may meet with success in the already crowded ranks of Denver journalism and may be longer lived than its predecessors of the same name. It is intended more for the reader of general news than for those interested in Denver's local happenings.

The West Denver Paragraph has given up the ghost, so says the Denver World.

An article in the Durango Southeast one day this week stated that a rumor was current that two of the party of Navajo mountain explorers had hidden ahead of the main party to find water and were killed by Indians, and that when the main party came up they had a fight with the savages and had several men wounded in the affray. The Southeast places no dependence in the rumor—neither do we. Although a long way from Durango, word would have been received there ere this confirming it had the report been true.

The following from the Silver World appears to contain a huge gun or two, which may be appreciated by those of our readers who are acquainted in Lake:

On Thursday telegraph wires for a private line were strung between the Western Union office on Silver street and a residence on Bluff street. It is only for students' practice. No Maclain sentimentality will be transmitted over the line. The first regular message over the line was the first line of the well known hymn: "Simply to thy cross I cling."

MANY owners of mining properties in this district are taking steps to secure patents. It is a most sensible thing to do, as by no other means can a person really own a mineral property. Prior to the time of patenting the lode is merely claimed and held by dint of yearly expenditure—nothing more. Trouble is sure to arise concerning unpatented mines in the course of time, and when a patent is procured all opportunity for controversy is at an end.

The Pueblo Chieftain says that the conductors lately discharged from the employ of the D. & R. G. were removed without cause, and they were old employees of the railroad company. It assigns as the reason of their removal the probability that the officers of the railroad company wish to put their friends in the position of conducting the trains.

According to information which presents an appearance of reliability, Pat Desmond, Marshal of Pueblo, shot officer Connors without cause or provocation a few days ago. Desmond, during the past few years, has been into a number of like scrapes. If the truth is presented to the Pueblo council, he will no doubt lose his position as marshal.

The rather startling report is current that the A. T. & S. F. company intend immediately building up the Purgatoire valley, through Costilla pass to Conejos and into the San Juan country. It is further stated that surveyors are to be placed in the field this week. Let the Tribune's News keep its eyes open.—Pueblo News.

ARTHUR SHEPHERD, a Rico correspondent, replies to the indirect aspersions of a "late arrival from Rico" in a very sensible and convincing letter to the Denver Tribune, in which the first mentioned innuendo made its appearance.

The Durango Record says: The roof of the new jail was put on yesterday. The office of the Pioneer Stage company will hereafter be at the Grand Central. Mr. Jake Summa has been appointed local agent.

Most of the American newspapers do not care to mingle in the private affairs of families, yet some papers do. When a newspaper is forced to do this, it is frequently the cause of unpleasantness for the aggressor.

The San Juan bids fair to enjoy a boom this spring never before heard of. It is now said that the Leavenworth, Topeka & Southwestern railroad will build into that region via Alamosa.—Pueblo News.

LAKE CITY was recently treated to a small-sized earthquake, which aroused the sleepers, but did no further damage.

MINING MENTION.

The force at work on the Wabash was amended, enlarged or otherwise increased this week.

A. H. Steele has been busily at work on the Telegraph, adjoining the Newman group, for the past month or more.

L. J. Lewis and George Herndon have secured a contract to run a tunnel 100 feet on the Robert E. Lee mine on Dolores mountain, owned by Waggoner, DeMasters, Krille and Rische. At 75 feet in, the tunnel will intersect the shaft, which is 53 feet deep.

"Baldy Sauer" is working on the D. & R. G. for an interest. It might be well to state that this is a claim named after the railroad, and the narrow gauge itself is not referred to—persons do not generally get a very large interest for working on the D. & R. G. railroad.

Messrs. Taliant & Scott are making things lively at the Nora Lilley mine and have driven the tunnel in about 100 feet since they started up work. They have about 70 or 75 tons of high-grade mineral on the dump and the opinion is freely expressed by mining men that the Lilley will be one of the steadiest and most last ing producers in the district.

A couple of weeks ago in speaking of the new strike in the Belzoria we unintentionally made a misstatement regarding the figures of a certain assay. The actual result was 1001 ounces silver and 39 ounces gold. The discovery of this mine we predict will greatly enhance the value of the Puzzler, which is the property of the Rico Silver Mining Company.

The diagonal lode on the Puzzler has every appearance of being an extension of the lead in which the recent strike was made and the surface mineral of the two claims is very similar. If the Belzoria vein is again encountered in the Puzzler claim, the company spoken of is to be congratulated.

A New Mining Company. The preliminary steps towards organizing the Paymaster Gold and Silver Mining Company were taken to-day. The company owns the Paymaster, Birt, Carbonate King and Sheep Mountain lodes, all but the last named being in Iron Springs Mining District. The Sheep Mountain is in Trout Lake District.

The incorporators are: David Beidler, C. L. Webb, H. H. Cronse, J. McKenzie, C. R. Webb, David Beidler.

The articles of incorporation will be forwarded to the Secretary of State by next mail, and a crew of men put to work on the properties at once.

QUEEN VICTORIA ORATES.

Her Speech in Formally Re-Opening Parliament. LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Parliament re-assembled today. The Queen's speech is as follows: My Lords and Gentlemen: It is with much satisfaction that I again invoke your advice and assistance in the conduct of public affairs—I have given my approval to the marriage between Prince Leopold and the Princess Helena of Waldeck. I have reasons to believe this will be a happy union. I continue in good relations and cordial harmony with all foreign powers. The treaty for the cession of Thessalia to Greece has been executed in the main. The transfer of the sovereignty and occupation was affected in a manner honorable to all concerned. In concert with the president of the French republic, I have given careful attention to the affairs of Egypt where existing arrangements imposed on me special obligations. I will use my influence to maintain rights already established, whether by firmans of the Sultan, or by various internal engagements in spirit favorable to good government of the country and prudent development of its institutions. I have pleasure in informing you that the restoration of peace beyond the northwestern frontier, together with the continued internal tranquility, plentiful seasons and increase of revenue has enabled my government in India to resume works of public utility which had been suspended and devote its attention to measures for the further improvement of the condition of the people. The condition of Ireland at this time as compared with that which I described at the beginning of last year shows signs of improvement and encourages the hope that perseverance in the course you have pursued will be awarded with the happy results which are so much to be desired. Justice has been administered with greater efficiency, and the intimidation which had been employed to deter occupiers of the land from fulfilling their obligations and from availing themselves of the act of the last session, shows upon the whole, diminished force. My efforts through the bounty of providence have been favored by an abundant harvest in that portion of the kingdom. In addition to a vigorous execution of the provisions of the ordinary law I have not hesitated under the necessity of the case to employ largely the exceptional powers entrusted to me for protection of life and property by the two acts of the last session. You will be invited to deal with proposals for the establishment in the English and Welsh countries of local self-government, which has so long been enjoyed by the towns, together with enlarged powers of administration and with financial changes, which will give you an opportunity of considering both as to town and country what may be the proper extent and most equitable and provident form of contribution from the imperial taxes, in relief of local charges. These proposals, in so far as they are financial, will apply to the whole of Great Britain. It will be necessary to reserve the case of Ireland for separate consideration. The Queen says she will present again the Bankruptcy and election bribery bills, and other measures.

George B. Warner's Chapter on Mail Matters Between Rico and Durango. Rockwood, Colo., Feb. 11, 1882. Messrs. Jones & Hartman: Gentlemen—I have been greatly entertained by reading your articles in regard to mail discrepancies, and would say that when Sewall changed mode of carrying mail from buckboard to train and changed his base from my place to Carson's I thought it was not worth my while to operate my office longer. I therefore notified P. M. at Hermosa to that effect thinking that he could do the distributing necessary there, until there was a P. M. appointed here and the office moved to Carson's, but the P. M. at Hermosa could not do this as the train does not wait for the mail distributed. Finding that these irregularities were becoming a serious matter, I concluded to resume the duties of my office, which I did to-day and shall endeavor to keep mail matters straight here until there is a new P. M. appointed, which I hope will be soon. There was a petition sent in some time ago for that purpose. I perform the duties of the office at the station to accommodate Sewall, and I do not think we ought to complain about the mail being carried on the train as the mail will be delivered earlier than by wagon; but of course the evils complained of were caused by the change made by Sewall. I admit that if I had insisted in keeping the office here those irregularities might not have occurred, and you must admit that it is a thankless task to keep a cross-road postoffice, but for the sake of my Rico friends I will accept the breach for the present.
