It is rumored that the dead bodies of two white men have been found on the lower Miguel, killed by Indians. There is nothing improbable in the report.

The drug store of Hunt & McGraw is being fitted up with a new front, the Bank of Dolores is being treated in the same way, and many other improvements are going on.

A raffle for a \$50 saddle took place at the Log Cabin saloon Thursday evening. There were 25 chances at \$2 per chance. Frank Bard of Bard & McKay was the lucky man, throwing 42.

Pack trains are busy supplying goods, provisions, wet goods (whatever they are) etc., to the hungry and the thirsty Rico. As a natural result the voice of the burro resounds through the hills.

Jim Scott, of Lacombe & Scott, was attacked by a sudden illness, terminating in convulsions one day this week and suffered considerably for two or three days. We are glad to see him up and around again to-day.

We acknowledge the pleasure of a call to-day from Mrs. M. M. Hazard, Mrs. W. Higgin and Mrs. Elliott. It is a rare occurrence for the News to be so honored. Mrs. Hazard threatens to leave us in a day or two, although very agreeably impressed with Rico.

Postal business is increasing very rapidly in the Rico postoffice in every department, but particularly in the money order department. More money is now received and paid out weekly through the window than was handled monthly heretofore. The mail matter coming in and going out is also largely increased.

Beverly R. Keim is sinking 50 feet on the Ironclad lode for an interest. This property is situated on the west side of Telescope mountain and is owned by Edwards and Williamson. When at a depth of 18 feet a horizontal deposit of fine mineral was reached, running from 80 to 267 ounces as shown by six assays. The character of the ore is malachite and red oxide of copper.

The town has constructed a water ditch to the corner of Mantz and Glasgow avenues and private subscribers have raised enough money to continue it along the east side of Glasgow avenue to Campbell street. Large and deep boxes will be put in at short intervals, which will afford a protection against fire, and the water will be found useful for many purposes. The contract was let to Jim Hall.

The Dolores House has been leased to Voorhees and Co. for a term of 18 months and will be opened in a few days. Jno. C. Voorhees was one of the proprietors of the Delmonico Hotel at Durango and is an experienced hand at the business. He has gone to Durango for the purpose of bringing his family to Rico, and will probably return to-morrow. In the meantime E. S. Voorhees is here attending to the preparations for opening.

Geo. McGoldrick, the "Kid," who is remembered by every early citizen of Rico as the man who killed "Frenchy" here in the fall of 1879, attempted to make his escape from the penitentiary about three weeks ago and was shot in the thigh by one of the guards. His term does not expire for five years yet and the "Kid" was getting tired. He will now re-consider his conclusion. William Carr, one of the Silverton horse thieves, effected his escape at the time of McGoldrick's attempt.

On last Sunday afternoon a painful accident occurred, the sufferer being one of the dance-hall women known as the "Great Eastern." It seems that she was standing on a bench and either fell or jumped off, and being very heavy she broke her leg, just above the ankle, the bone sticking through the flesh. Physicians were called in and the limb was set, she suffering intensely during the operation. Under the care of Dr. McDonald, she is now doing well and will soon recover.

**ORDINANCE NO. 37.**

Ordinance concerning streets and alleys. Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico.

SECTION 1. Every person who shall deposit or cause to be deposited in the streets or alleys any dirt, debris or rubbish in any manner obstructing or tending to obstruct the free and perfect use by the public of the streets and alleys except upon a written permit from the Mayor of the Town shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and for every offence shall pay a fine of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$5.00.

**ORDINANCE NO. 38.**

Ordinance concerning Health. Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico.

SECTION 1. Any person who shall deposit or cause to be deposited upon the ground or in any place within the Corporate limits of the Town any dirt, filth or offal of a character and in a manner to deleteriously effect the health of any of the inhabitants of said town shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and for each offence shall pay a fine of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$5.00.  
SECTION 2. Every person who shall neglect or refuse to remove from any lot or premises occupied by him or her within forty-eight hours after being notified to remove the same by the Marshal of the town, any dirt, filth or offal in any manner effecting or tending to effect deleteriously the health of any of the inhabitants of the town shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and for each offence shall pay a fine of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$5.00.


