## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

Highlights from the Past to the present visits this week with the N.S. Jasper family, another of the early pioneers to Hansford County who have made their home in the area south of Spearman, near Texhoma and in the town of Spearman, as well as southwest of the town, of Spearman.

Born in the rural district of Comanche County Texas, Mr. Nat Jasper was one in a family of eight boys and seven girls. During his youthful days he attended the Idella school in the county of Haskell. His parents were stock farmers in that area.

At a young age Mr. Jasper set out to find work in the year of 1903. He traveled from Silvertown to Stinnett and on to Hansford County by horseback. Upon arrival his plans were to work on a water well rig, but he could not find work. He spent one of his first nights in the Woodring home where the town of Gruver now stands. He moved on the next day south by horseback and traveled down the Palo Duro Creek stopping at the various ranches along the creek in search for a job. The Fiddler Lackey home was one stop and he found work here which paid \$20 per month with his room and board and washing furnished. He later worked on the Dressen and Douglas places.

Miss Etta Frizzell was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Frizzell and she was born in Collin County near Farmersville, Texas. She was one of a family of five children, three girls and two boys. At the age of six along with her family, she moved to Greer county Oklahoma where she began her schooling. In 1901 the family moved to Hansford County Texas. Etta Frizzell's father came ahead of the family to find the land which they settled upon. Upon her father's return to Oklahoma for his family he became quite ill with small pox and died.

The land had been purchased and Mrs. Frizzell and her family continued with the plans to move. They came along with an uncle Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Douglas and traveled by covered wagon. The Canadian River was treacherous as usual, they followed a herd of cattle across the river and the water ran into the wagon while they were crossing.

Upon their arrival in the county the Frizzell family moved into a one room dugout of which had to be entered through a hole of which they stepped on a barrel and boxes in order to reach the floor. The well had been dug and was the only water well in sight. The well served as a source of water for many people of Ochiltree County. When the Frizzell well was dug the water for drilling purposes was hauled from Old Hansford. Another incident recalled by the family is the time when the J.A. Ranch was driving cattle by the Frizzell home and offered to give the family a half beef in order to water their cattle at the Frizzell well.

Miss Etta Frizzell along with her brothers and sisters attended the Micou school where Mrs. Trixie Wilbanks was one of the teachers. Other children attending the school were the Hart, Sanders, Douglas, Micou and Frizzell. Later Miss Frizzell continued her schooling in Old Hansford in the Court House where Mr. Richardson was the teacher.

Miss Etta Frizzell and Mr. N.S. Jasper met in the M.H. Lackey home. It was on December 28, 1906 when the couple were married in Old Hansford by E.C. Hayes.

For a week after their marriage Mr. Jasper worked for Mr. Hart until he was able to buy a team for them to move to their new homestead some six miles south of Texhoma where they had eighty acres. They first lived with the M.C. Head couple who had moved just before they had. When the Jasper dugout was completed and the well was dug the couple moved in.

They received their supplies from Texhoma. Mr. Jasper worked with his farm and improved it with a walking plow as well as working as a commercial hand. The couple would return to the Frizzell home for a visit about three or four times a year. Two daughters were born to the couple while they made their home south of Texhoma, they were Hazel and Nayoma.

The family moved to near Spearman where their next son Ermal was born. The next move was to a leased place from Sid Lackey where they lived for a year, and their last son, Sidney was born.

The family then moved to where Buster Schott now lives where they purchased a place from Mr. Wilcox in 1918. In 1924 the family moved to Spearman where they operated a laundry and then to Stinnett in 1927 where they continued the same occupation. They moved on to Panhandle where their daughter, DeEtta was born. The family then made the move to Borger in 1940 and on to California in 1942 where they now make their home.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Jasper recall the prairie fires of

the early day. Mrs. Jasper recalls the one of 1902 when the prairies were covered with tall grass and how the family rushed to drive their cattle ahead of the fire to their plowed field to save them from burning.

Mr. Jasper recalls the large fire of 1904 which began in Hutchison County and continued north with the strong winds. This fire burned for three days and nights. During one of the nights the fire changed direction and began burning south, threatening several of the farms--destroying others. Mr. Jasper recalls fighting the fire with a torn wagon sheet. The fire finally burned out in Roberts County. Another fire he recalled was one that came from the north accompanying a dirt storm.

The couple also remember their activities as being Church and Sunday school, singings and dances. The families would sloa go to town on Saturday afternoon where the parents would visit while the children would play together with their friends until their parents were ready to go home.

Mrs. Jasper remembers a horse they had which was called Button. When the rider would be on the prairie and uncertain as to how to get home, he would just run Button free and he would guide them home.

Mr. and Mrs. N.S. Jasper make their home in National City California a suburb of San Diego. The couple celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary December 28, 1956 in the Tom Dozier home.

Hazel Dozier passed away in 1959 after a prolonged illness. She was the wife of Tom Dozier and the couple made their home in the Gruver area.

Nayoma is the wife of Tom Dozier and this couple make their home on the Dozier farm some ten miles southwest of Gruver.

Ermal makes his home in National City, California while Sidney lives in Beaver Oklahoma. DeEtta Sharp makes her home in San Diego, California.

This is another of the features from the past which brings Hansford County's pioneer families into the spotlight. This well known family has struggled and has become one of the well known Hansford County families.

Attending Gruver High

School, Eva was active in all activities. She married Frank Pittman September 2nd, 1962. The couple made their home after their marriage in Stillwater, Oklahoma where Frank attended school. The couple moved back to Morse near the Erlis Pittman home where they resided until moving to Goodwell in September where Frank continued his schooling.

At the time of the mishap, Mrs. Pittman was enroute from Goodwell to Perryton where she was taking her son for a check-up. She passed away October

12 at 9:30 a.m. in the Perryton Hospital.

Reverend Bob Lamson pastor of the First Christian Church of Gruver and Reverend Harold Fleming, pastor of the Community Church of Morse officiated with the services which were held at 2:30 p.m. on October 14th.

Cooksey continued his outstanding play throughout the game. He led the Gruver attack with 112 yards rushing and made several key tackles on defense.

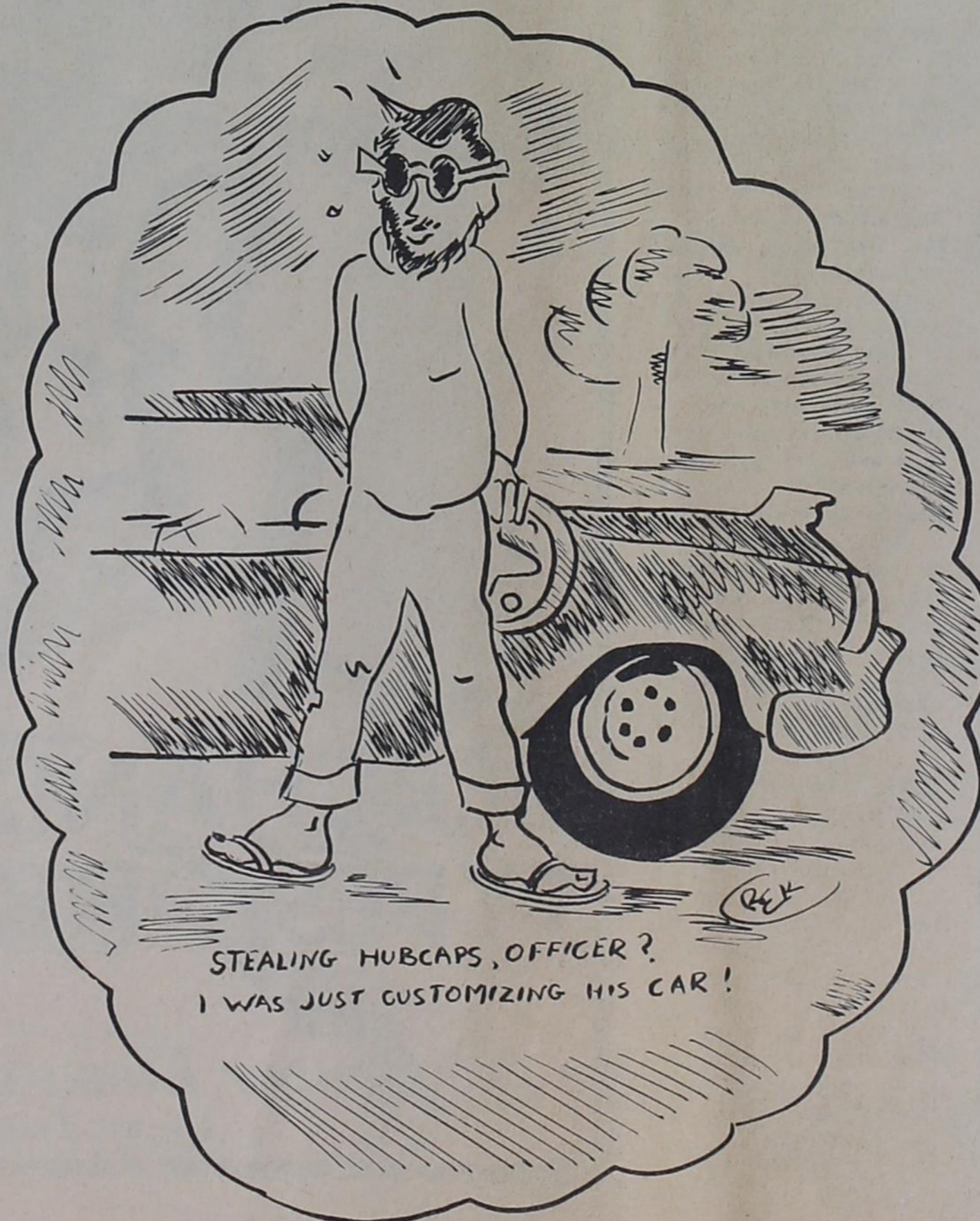
Friday night the Hounds open District 1-A play against the Sunray Bobcats. The game will be here.

Three plays later Cooksey recovered a Lefors fumble and the Hounds were threatening again at the pirate 23. The hounds received a 15 yard penalty on the first play to move the ball back to the 38. Leatherman and Riley were stopped for no gain on two straight plays and another penalty moved the ball back to the 43. On third down Riley was dropped 15 yards behind the line and Gruver faced a fourth and 35 from their own forty-two.

The punt went only to the Pirate 30 but Lefors was forced to punt from the 35. The kick died on the Gruver 19.

Riley picked up six and Cooksey made it a first--down with a seven yard plunge out to the 32. Gillispie got 3 and Cooksey 4 to move on out to the 39.

Riley then rolled out to the left and was caught behind the line. He tried to pitchout but Woodring of Lefors took the ball from his hands and the pirates had possession at the Gruver thirty-four.

Lefors moved to a first down at the 14 but the hound defense stopped the drive at the five.

Two plunges into the line by Cooksey moved the pigskin out to the 10 where Gruver punted on third down. Brumlow took the ball at the thirty-five and raced to the end zone for the first score of the night. The conversion kick made the score 7-0 in favor of Lefors.

Cooksey ran the following kickoff back to the 42 and Gruver moved easily down the field but time ran out with the hounds on the Lefors five yard line.

From the 42 Gillispie picked up nine yards and Cooksey got the first down on the pirate 45. A 15 yard penalty moved the ball down to the 30. A pass fell incomplete before Gruver received a 15 yard penalty to move the ball back to the forty-five.

A 24 yard pass from Riley to Gillispie put Gruver on the Lefors 21 and pass interference gave Gruver a first down on the 15. A penalty, however, moved the ball back to the 20.

With a second left on the clock Cooksey broke through and almost scored before being brought down at the five as time ran out.

Brumlow took the second half kickoff on his own 18 and weaved up the left sideline to score and give Lefors a 13-0 lead. The conversion kick failed.

After receiving the Lefors kick Gruver punted after three plays and Lefors set up at its own 41. Coleman dove over 14 plays later and the pirates led 19-0. The kick for point was blocked.

Again Gruver was forced to punt after three plays and Lefors ran the punt back to the Gruver 35. Nine plays later Brumlow went over from the four. The kick made the score 26-0.

Three plays later Gruver fumbled on its own 27 and Lefors recovered. It took the pirates only four plays to make the score 33-0.

Gruver marched 77 yards for its only score as time ran out in the game. From the 23 Gillispie picked up seven and a five yard penalty on the next play moved the ball out to the 35. However Gruver fumbled while trying to get off a pass on the next play and recovered back on the 24.

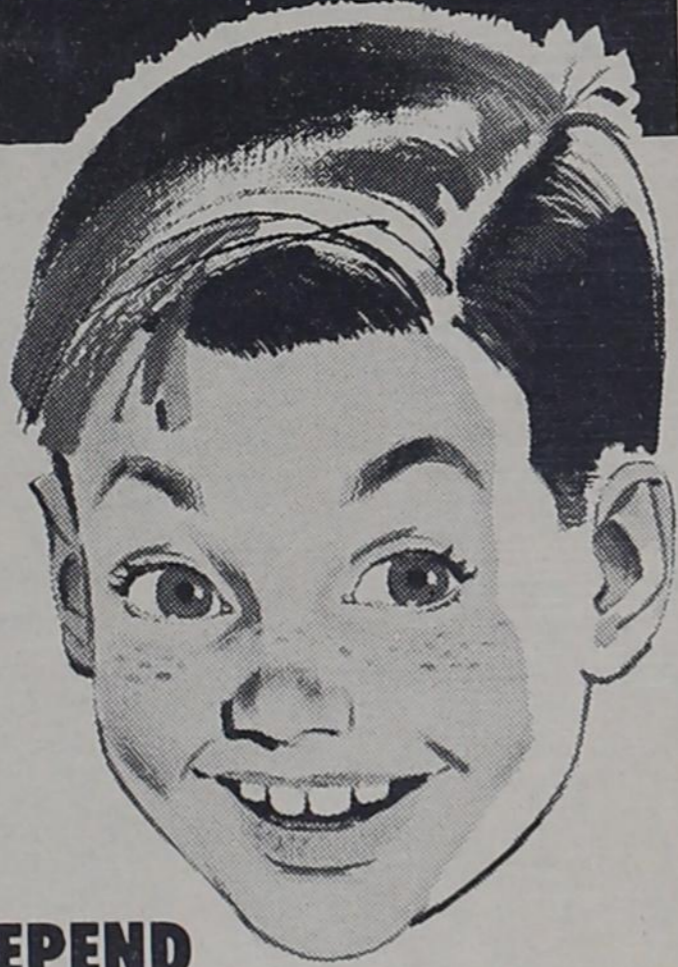

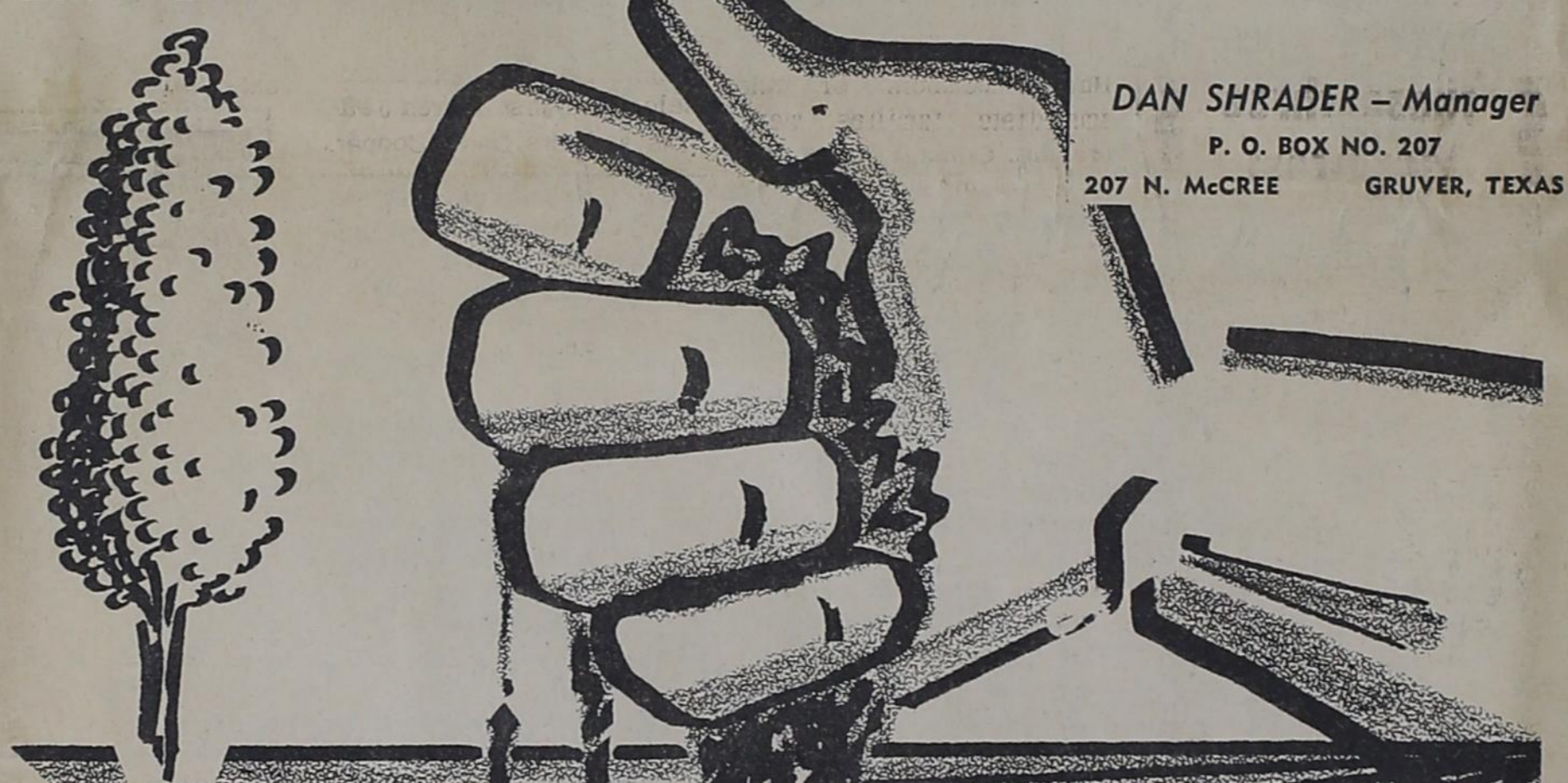

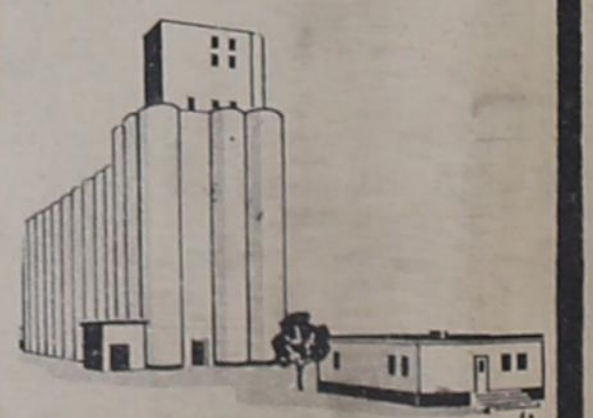
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# Music Clubs Meet In Gruver And Spearman

# A THOUGHT

Why does it have to happen? This question is usually foremost in the minds of folks when a tragic death occurs—or at the death of a small child—To this question, no one can give a satisfactory answer; only God knows the intense depth of the riddle of death.

Death is often given its course of action through some aspect of human weakness or carelessness. Some angry person unable to meet his frustrations face to face may slay another individual. An automobile—with a mechanical defect—may go

away and leave its operator beyond medical help and, to a limited degree these are the causes of death. But not the real cause.

The awful fact is that death is the result of sin. But please gentle reader do not read into this article what the author has not really written. He did not say that every person dies because of some sin or sins which he or she has committed. Most deaths are not because of personal sin; but every time an individual dies, the basic cause of death itself is the sin principle which operates in the human family. Old age deaths are caused not only by the deterioration of the body only, but because

“It is appointed unto men once to die” Heb. 9:27. and no man is exempt from this part of human experience. The Lord Jesus, because He was sinless was not subject to death; but for us, that he might save us from the penalty of sin, he laid down His life and became obedient to death, even the death of the cross. Phil. 2:8 And there will be men living when the Lord Jesus returns for His own who will not have to taste of death, but these exceptions are the only ones so far as I can tell—maybe with the exception of Enoch and Elijah.

When one sees death in this light, he can get a bit of an understanding of it, and one can even see a benefit, in the death of a saved person. When an individual, who has trusted the Lord Jesus as His personal Savior, is torn by some tragic event beyond any hope of recovery or who, if he recovered, would never have useful possession of his mind or body, death is the release which allows his soul and spirit to ascend immediately into the presence of the Lord who has redeemed him and forever frees him of pain or sorrow. His body, which is the house of his real being, is then laid into a grave where it awaits the sound of the voice of the Son of

God at which sound it too shall rise and be carried into the physical presence of the Lord Himself sharing the glory, honor, and immortality of the Lord's own boyd. 1 Thess. 4:14-17; 1 Cor. 15:20-58, Phil. 3: 20-21. Death, therefore, as viewed from the standpoint of the sacred scriptures takes on meaning which no human wisdom can bestow upon it. Death to the Christian has no sting and the grave has no victory. However, to the man who has trodden underfoot the precious blood of Christ and had done despite unto the spirit of grace (Heb. 10: 26-29), death offers not release but plunges an individual a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation. Since death is inevitable for every man great or small, it is not wise indeed for each of us to carefully weigh the claims of Jesus Christ the Lord of life and the conqueror of death? He said “I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth on me though he were dead (in a state of spiritual death) yet shall he live (receive spiritual life) and whosoever (cowboy, doctor, rancher, newspaperman, agnostic, preacher, etc) liveth and believeth on me shall never die.” This claim is fantastic and fantastically true. Our Blessed Lord then said to His auditor “Believeth Thou this,” and to you dear reader that question is still being asked —Do you believe the claims of Jesus Christ who said “Except ye believe that I am He, ye shall die in your sins and whither I am ye cannot come.” Trust Christ and be able to face death with real courage.
