Notes Of Interest

Warning after warning in the form of burglaries, vandalism and other charges passed by the residents of Gruver and still we stood under the impression that nothing could happen in "Gruver". The climax came and in the form of ruthless murder to one of the most prominent businessmen of the town who was known and loved by all.

Will this catastrophe stop all the unlawful crimes which have happened in Gruver? It is very doubtful that it will, why should it? It may not happen again in the next week, month or even year, but unless something is done, it could easily be repeated. With the tremendous crime rate in America and with the strong police force that the large cities have, why should crime stop in Gruver with no law enforcement?

I remember Gruver when the population was 400-500 which wasn't too many years ago. We all would like to see Gruver remain the town it has always been, where everyone knows everyone, but let's face it, Gruver it growing and it can't remain the trust-worthy community that it once was. It is good that the town is growing, if it weren't it would be falling the other direction and would eventually become a ghost town.

As we said before let's realize that Gruver isn't the town it was in 1950 but the law enforcement is the same. Since I can remember Gruver it has tripled in size, businesses, residents and etc. The town is not all that is growing, the country is becoming populated, too. What three years ago, were vacant farm houses are now remodeled homes or now homes constructed where families have moved. More and more people are moving on the farms while at the same time Gruver is continuing to add to the population board. During three weeks in January there were some twelve new families who moved to the area. How can we as citizens of the town and area be protected in the same manner we were fourteen years ago when we still have the same amount of law protection?

I have been checking around a bit in various towns and have fuund that the crime rates of the small towns are increasing. One small town on the South Plains has had three stabbings since the first of the year. We are again prone to say that things of this nature couldn't happen in Gruver, but why couldn't they if a murder can be committed on our own main street.

Gruver is about the only town in the Panhandle with with no city law enforcement, yes, we have a county Deputy Sheriff, but he continuously works around the clock with his work in the entire county. Mr. Walker shouldn't be depended upon to act as our city policeman, too. Vega, a town of about 1,000, in population has a tremendous law enforcement set up for its size but it takes what they have, to maintain order

Vega has a sheriff, two deputies, along with a city policeman, a night watchman and two highway patrolmen.Sunray has a deputy sheriff and a city policeman while Stratford has a Sheriff, deputy and anight watchman.

Some of the citizens have objected to a City Marshall for the reason that they like their driving habits. What would it hurt for all of us to drive according to law; we have to everywhere else we go? Would changing our driving habits cause as much distress as the incident of the past week and the incidents of the past year? Some of the young people have also expressed opinions that a law enforcement man would put too many restrictonss on them. With the fine youth that Gruver has the City Marshall would have no problem with the young people, therefore there would be nothing he could do to disrupt the normal procedures of our youth.

The High School Students of Gruver are very seldom on the streets or roaming around at all hours of the night. If they want to drive around they aren't harming anything. Residents of Gruver, have you been on the streets of Gruver from mid-night until 3:00 or 4:00 a.m.? You would be surprised at the tremendous amount of strange cars bearing strange people just roaming the streets of Gruver and racing through the city. Such roaming as this could easily lead to burglaries and vandalism. With some law enfrrcement here that is established and seenthere would be a great deal less of the strange visitors who roam in cars as well as on foot.

Of course the law enforcement might not be able to solve everything but it would prevent many of the things that may come in the near future. One life saved or burglary prevented would well pay the salary for a man.

Paul Herman (Mickey) Westerfield was born January 4, 1903 in Harper County Kansas. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. U. T. Westerfield and was one of nine children, having four sisters and five brothers. Mr. Westerfield grew to adulthood in Glazier, Texas where he moved with his family at a young age. He attended the country schools near Canadian and the schools of Glazier.

On September 21, 1924 P. H. Westerfield and Rebecca Lynch were married in Perryton. Following their marriage the couple made their home in Plemons and

He established one of the first businesses of the town which was a market and dry goods store. The market was sold and Mr. Westerfield continued to increase his stock in the dry goods department. In recent years they remodeled the store and added many modern features.

The sons, Paul and Pat, have been associated with their parents. Paul is associated in the store and also in the farming interests. Pat has farmed with his father since a young boy.

Mr. and Mrs. Wester field have reared their family in Gruver where both sons have graduated from Gruver High School.

Active in the civic work of Gruver, Mr. Westerfield has served as mayor and city commissioner. He served in the commissioner position from October 28, 1944 when a special election was called until April of 1955. In April of 1955 he became mayor and served this position until April of 1959. He has also been an active member of the Gruver Lions Club.

P. H. Westerfield petitioned the Hansford Lodge December 9, 1929 and was raised to the degree of Master Mason March 10, 1930. On February 9, 1931 he demitted from Hansford Lodge and became a charter mem ber of Gruver Lodge No. 1266. He was Worshipful Master of the Gruver Lodge 1266, serving from 1935-36 and 1936-37. 

Walker were visiting with Earnest Grissam at the time who had supposedly come by their house to ask if it would be alright for him to stay with his brother at the Walker farm. When the call came Mr. Walker immediately sent his wife to the neighbors home to call for Earl Phillips, telehome man for Gruver. Mr. Walker continued his conversation with the operator

then turned the phone over to Grissam to take all messages while he went out to find Phillips.

Upon turning in at Phillips house, Mr. Walker found Earl just arriving home and told him that he would pick him up as soon as he told his wife Walker went to his house and sent Grissam to the neighbors to inform them that he had located Phillips.

Walker and Phillips went to the phone office to find where the call was from and located it in a short time. They then went to Westerfield's store and tried the front door but found it locked and went to the back door where they entered. They walked through the store to the front telephone in the middle of the store to find Mickey lying on the floor. They immediately called for the doctor and J.B. Cooke was summoned from Spearman.

It was decided that Mr. Westerfield died about 9:00 p.m. and was found about 9:45 p.m. Only one drawer in the store was opened everything else was in place and nothing was stolen.

Lilo Terrazas J. heard a commotion of his dogs barking sometime between 9:30 and 10:00 p.m. at his home to the west of town. and he stepped out to see a man walking west on the dirt road across the railroad tracks. Two men in a car parked at the Texaco Station said a car fitting the description of Earnest Grissams turned west and headed down the dirt road and supposedly picked up John Grissam.

Sheriff Cooke and Orville Walker assisted by their staff and Texas

Ranger Bill Baden of Pampa began the investigation with only a few meager clues available. The clue which led to the capture was the footprints found beneath the bathroom windown. A set of plaster casts and photos were made of the prints. From the footprints it was determined that the shoes had been made in a prison. This particular type of shoe is not sold in any store, officers said, and is given only to convicts. This narrowed the search to an ex-convict or someone associated with such a person. Checking where Lilo had seen the man the night before they found the footprints matched those of the one found at the store. They followed the tracks until they abruptly ended, where evidently a car had stopped to pick up the walking man.

The investigators talked to all the known criminals in the area including John Grissam. Grissam was taken into custody about 5:00 p.m. Saturday. Officers searched the home but were unable to find the weapon. Grissam first denied but enroute to Spearman with the officers he soon changed his story and confessed and showed the officers the tail water pond where he had thrown the 22 calibre pistol. The pond was on the Dilly place some six miles west and two north of Gruver. The pistol was recovered Sunday morning after the pond was.drained.

John Grissam is twentyseven years old and his brother is thirty-four. Both men are in the Hansford County Jail with their bond refused.





J. S. Racial Riots Shock To Africans

Mass murders in the African Congo set in motion a ve of shock which jolted the world, but the Congo's ighbor, Kenya, was much more deeply disburbed by use of dogs to quell racial riots in Alabama.

This was the observation expressed by 30-year-old uthern Baptist missionary, Will J. Roberts, who has ent the past three years working among the Kikuyus Kenya, East Africa.

Identification Strong

"Identification with the American Negro is very rong in Kenya," Roberts said.

"Nearly all people in Kenya have some avenue of ews, and they get very emotional about riots here in ne United States."

Roberts, a native of Sweetwater, and his wife, Marie, native of Rush Springs, arrived in the states with heir three daughters last month on a medical furlough.

It was feared earlier that Roberts would have to undergo surgery for an ulcer condition, but his physician in Oklahoma City has assured him that surgery will not be necessary.

The missionary family, which includes Esther, 5, Ruth, 3, and Rachel, 1, are now living at 3225 SW 62. They expect to return to Kenya in January, 1966.

In Kenya, the Roberts family live in Nyeri - just 100 miles from Naiorbi, where negotiations between Americans and Congolese rebels failed to save the lives of medical missionary Dr. Paul Carlson and 30 other white hostages who were massacred just weeks ago.

Safety No Concern

Although Kenya borders the Congo, Roberts feels that his own life is in no immediate danger. And even though his wife and children are often left alone at their home for periods of time, Roberts feels no undue concern for their safety.

"You can't really let yourself think about these things," he said. "You've got to be optimistic, Pessimism will defeat us in our Christian work."

He referred to the pessimism of Europeans who are reported to be leaving the country at the rate of about 600 a month because they fear for the future in Africa.

"I believe that in an emergency I would take the advice of the American embassy and get out," he said. "I am very glad to be an American citizen," he added. "The United States stands behind its citizens and

keeps in close touch whenever our lives are threatened. Terrorism Is Past

The rebel terrorists who killed Dr. Paul Carslon have had an influence upon Kenya, but this is all part of

the past, Roberts believes. "In the past about 90 percent of the Kukuyu tribal group - the largest in Kenya - was following the Mau Mau movement. Basically, it was an anti-white movement motivated partly by a hunger for land.

"This pretty much died out when Kenya gained its independence in December, 1963," Roberts explained.

The young missionary shrugged off as improbable a suggestion that what happened in the Congo could be repeated in Kenya. He added, "I don't believe that Kenya is going to revert to cannibalism like they did in the Congo because people in Kenya are better educated."

As for whether or not Christians have a sympathizer in the person of Kenya's first prime minister. Jomo Kenyatta, Roberts feels that the 74-year-old leader's past affiliations with Christians has given him a unique understanding.

Negro Missionaries Advocated

"I hope the day will come when Southern Baptists


will appoint Negro missionaries," Roberts said. "White faces have gone out of style in Africa." He added, "The feeling of nationalism is very strong. You don't go there as a father figure, but to help the people

Roberts, a graduate of Oklahoma Baptist University, shawnee, and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, described Africa as "the battleground for the East and West" and expressed his belief that it will remain so for the next few years.

"People in Africa play upon the conflict between East and West, especially where foreign aid is concerned," he said.


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

ranchers in Hansford County assisted by the Soil Conservation Service Work Unit in Spearman are reseeding deteriorated ranges and cropland to climax grasses in the very near future.

On the T. J. Bergin ranch south of Gruver, approximately 117 acres of loamly bottomland will be swept to kill the influx of undesirable vegetation and will be drilled to Switch grass, Indian grass, Western Wheatgrass and Mixed Bluestem grasses. On the slopes above the bottomland, the land will be seeded to Blue Grama and Sideoats Grama, Mr. Bergin will also plant Midland Eermuda grass and Switchgrass on irrigated land to supplement native rangeland.

On the H. H. Hudson Estate, in the south western part of Hansford County, about 30 acres of sidecats grama and blue grama will be planted. Mr. Orville Mathews the operator of the Hudson farm, has previously planted this combination of grass to 54 acres of the section, and is very enthusiastic about the stand and quality of fcrage produced. The 30 acres to be planted is now in cropland surrounding two lakes. The location of the site to be planted has been subjected to periodic inundation and severe washing due to heavy rains and uncontrolled tail water. Thus new grass will not on ly prevent soil erosion but will provide grazing where heretofore crops were frequently lost.

Mr. Mathews will plant a dead litter crop of sorghum. this spring. He then plans to mow or shred the maize and drill the grass seed on the cover this fall.

Mr. Bergin and Mr. Mathews have both planned a systematic program of seeding rangeland and cropland to produce more and better forage and to protect land from erosion.

The Great Plains Conservation Program Provides cost sharing and technical assistance to farmers and manchers interested in reseeding rangeland and/or seeding of cropland to range grasses.

Persons interested in seeding cropland to range grasses or reseeding rangeland should contact the Soil Conservation Service Work Unit in Spearman for technical assistance and cost sharing information.
