# PCB dump to be near Gruver area

Word of a toxic waste dump site proposed for Hansford County has several officials and residents upset, with some already aligned to fight it.

"This doesn't need to be in our county," said Sheriff R.L. McFarlin of Spearman, the county seat.

ANR Pipeline Co., a subsidiary of American Natural Resources Co. of Detroit, Mich., has filed an application with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to build a 2.5-acre dump site for polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) wastes near Gruver in the northern Texas Panhandle.

The above-ground facility would be licensed to hold 20,000 cubic yards of PCB-contaminated soil

and other solids, which would have a PCB concentration of less than 500 parts per million, according to the ANR application.

"I intend to fight it all the way," McFarlin said Monday. "I think it's nonsense to take some prime farmland and put a waste dump on it."

Hansford County is the No. 1 wheat-producing county in Texas, he said.

McFarlin said he doesn't understand how anyone could approve putting a toxic waste dump on top of the Ogallala aquifer, a fresh water source that stretches across nine states from Texas to South Dakota.

If the facility is approved, it could begin to take wastes sometime next spring, an ANR spokes-

man said. Wastes would be transported to the Panhandle by trucks.

PCB is a toxic chemical believed to be linked to cancer, liver disease, skin lesions, reproductive failures and gastric disorders, the EPA says.

According to the EPA, the manufacture of PCBs has been prohibited for six years, but it is still prevalent because it was widely used in lubricants and insulating fluids prior to 1979.

Mike Brogan, ANR spokesman in Detroit, said that until 1973, the company used a fire-retardant lubricant that contained PCBs at its compressor stations along the ANR natural gas pipeline. Some of the compressor lubricant leaked into retention ponds at the compressor stations, contaminating the soil, Brogan said.

ANR owns a 40-acre tract in Hansford County where the proposed dump would be located. It also operates a compressor plant on the property, near State Highway 136 about 10 miles north of Gruver and five miles south of the Texas-Oklahoma border.

The *Amarillo Globe-News* learned Monday that waste which may have contained PCBs has been disposed of in a 15-acre evaporation pool in Hansford County, just west of the ANR compressor.

Lloyd Bryant, manager at ANR's plant north of Gruver, said the contaminants were disposed of in the pool in Hansford County, but that the company quit after the EPA ruled it may contain potentially toxic materials.

"We are very opposed to a dump site," said Gruver Mayor

J.C. Harris. "This is over the best water in the United States, the Ogallala. I think there are a lot better places to put it."

The county commissioners are expected to address the dump site proposal at a special meeting at 8:30 a.m. Friday in the county courthouse in Spearman.

Kenneth Irwin, president of Gruver State Bank and former town mayor, said he was concerned about news of the dump site, which he said caught many residents by surprise after reading the report in Sunday's *Amarillo News-Globe*.

"I think it's something to be concerned about, something we'd want to know a whole lot more about."

Hansford County was listed as a good site for dumping the waste by a consulting firm, according to Brogan, because the water table there

is close to 300 feet below the surface.

## PCB dump is proposed near Gruver

If approved, the facility could begin to take wastes sometime next spring. Wastes would be transported to the Panhandle by trucks.

PCB is a toxic chemical known to cause cancer, liver disease, skin lesions, reproductive failures and gastric disorders.

According to Karen L. Brown of the EPA's regional office in Dallas, the manufacture of PCB has been prohibited since 1979, but it is still prevalent since it was widely used in lubricants and insulating fluids until then.

Mike Brogan, ANR spokesman, said until 1973 the company used a fire-retardant lubricant that contained PCBs at its compressor stations along the ANR natural gas pipeline.

Some of the compressor lubricant leaked into retention ponds at the compressor stations, contaminating the soil beneath, Brogan said.

There has been no evidence of PCBs migrating from the ponds, Brogan said, but ANR began removing the contaminated soil and disposing of it at a commercial facility in the Midwest. The disposal facility shut down, however, so ANR had to find another place to put the soil.

Brogan said the company hired a consulting firm that finally recommended ANR build its own permanent disposal facility in the Panhandle.

The consulting firm identified Hansford County as a good site because the water table there is close to 300 feet deep, Brogan said. Also, the soil lacks moisture and has low permeability.

The proposed facility would have diked walls 11 feet high and 23 feet thick, Brogan said. The inside would be lined with clay and an plastic.

Another ANR spokesman, Joe Martucci, said the project would cost about \$300,000 and that ANR likely would hire a local contractor

for the construction. The waste would come from 10 to 16 sites in Ohio, Indiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Kansas and Texas.

Martucci could not say how many of the 10 to 16 sites would be cleaned up. ANR may elect to leave some of the PCB-contaminated soil in place, he said.

Ken Kramer, a Texas lobbyist for the Sierra Club, said he was surprised to hear that a company was proposing a PCB landfill because most discussions on PCB disposal have focused on incineration.

"I have not heard recently of any attempt to build either below-grade or above-grade PCB landfills in Texas, so this would be rather unusual at the present time," he said.

Brown said that the EPA requires PCBs to be incinerated only if they are in concentrations of more than 500 parts per million.

"It's always optimum to destroy hazardous materials rather than long term storage but the economics of it come into play," she said.

Incineration, Brown explained, is far more expensive than landfill burial.

"If this waste was of a higher concentration level, then the EPA wouldn't accept storage of it," she said. "The way they're proposing to do it, it shouldn't present any environmental hazard."

Hansford County Judge R.L. McClellan said he had heard no comments from local residents about the proposed dump site. He said he had spoken with ANR officials about the proposal and didn't think it was going to be a problem.

Kramer said ANR may have difficulty obtaining insurance for the facility to provide funds in the event of a disaster.

"It's increasingly difficult to insure any kind of hazardous waste facility," he said. "A number of companies that heretofore have been involved in insuring hazardous waste facilities are beginning to either pull out of the field or raise their premiums."

Kramer said insurance companies are pulling out of the hazardous waste business because there is virtually no end to their liability in the event of a disaster.

Kramer said ANR, as an alternative to insurance, could either establish bonds or provide a statement of financial security sufficient to cover potential liabilities.

Martucci said ANR had no comment about how the facility would be insured.

According to the Citizen's Clearinghouse for Hazardous Waste, a national information center in Arlington, Va., only nine sites in the

nation are licensed to accept PCB wastes.

Will Collette, program director for the clearinghouse, said the ANR facility, if licensed, could become a regional or national dumping ground for PCBs in the future.

The wastes placed there will be toxic for at least 100 years, he said, and in that time ANR could sell the facility to a waste management company.

"It happens all the time," Collette said. "Mergers and acquisitions in the waste business are just so rapid and so extensive that they're almost impossible to follow."

Brogan could not say what ANR would do with the facility in the future. But he said ANR would be filling the site to its capacity so, even if a waste management company were to consider the site, it still would have to get EPA approval for expansion.

Kramer agreed it would be difficult for a waste management company to buy ANR's site and convert it into a commercial dumping ground, but he said it could be a possibility in the future.

Steve Lester, science adviser for the clearinghouse, said every toxic waste landfill in the nation so far has leaked. He said the ground water in Hansford County, although it is 300 feet down, could be in danger of contamination if the proposed site goes into operation.

"A landfill is going to leak and it is going to create problems in the future," Lester said. "Monitoring it is only going to tell you that it's leaking, but you can't just patch up a landfill."

Lester said the biggest hazards involved in a PCB landfill may result from transportation accidents.

In a windy climate like in the Panhandle, contaminated soil could be scattered quickly in the event of an accident, he said.

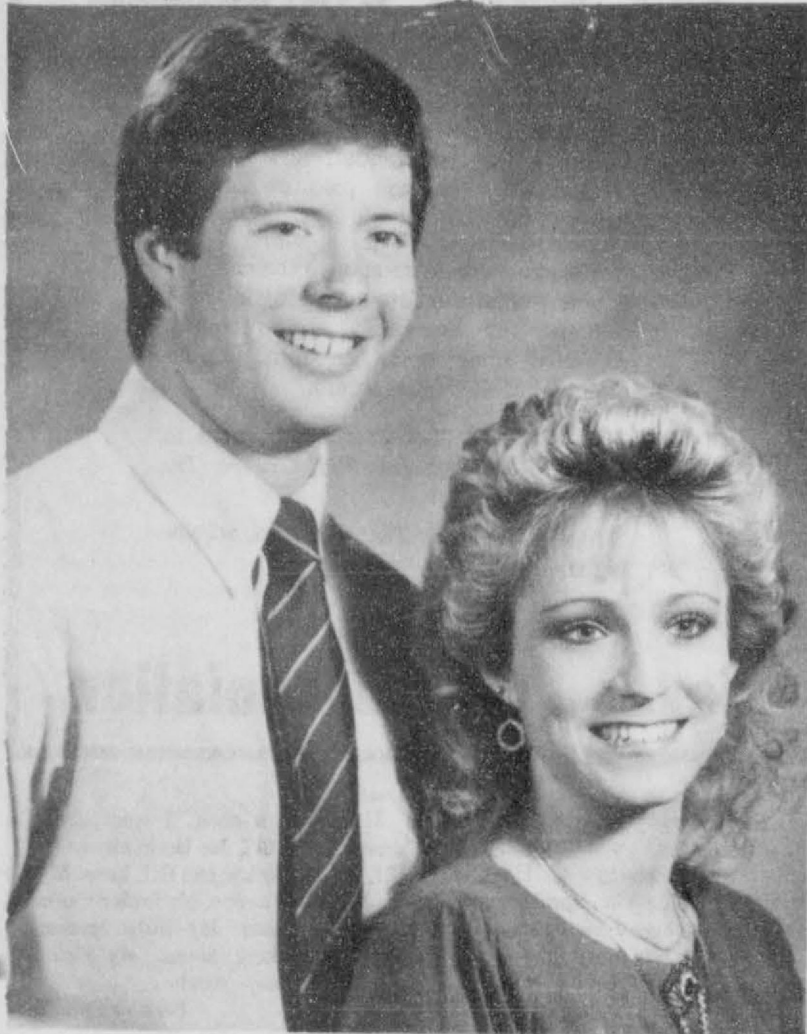

If you're agonizing over selecting gifts for those hard-to-buy-for people on your holiday shopping list, the Texas Medical Association suggests think safe and healthy. Here is a list of gifts that can make someone's life safer, healthier, and happier for years to come.

--Health gifts: exercise equipment; exercise floor mat; health club membership; whirlpool bath; bathroom scales; tennis, racquetball, or aerobic dance lessons; low-salt, low-fat cookbook; calorie counter; basket of fruit and cheese.

--Gifts for the home: smoke detector; light timers; fire extinguishers; home first aid kits; general self-help medical book; fire-place screen; deadbolt lock; peephole for door; dehumidifier; humidifier; burglar alarm; sturdy ladder or stool; fire-escape ladder; lock for sliding doors.

--Gifts for the car: first aid kit; care emergency kit; window scraper and brush; fire extinguisher; child safety seat.

--Gifts for the elderly: bathtub strips; bathtub bars; digital thermometer; electric blanket; luggage cart; bathtub safety bench; warm clothing and boots.

--Gifts for the sports enthusiast: reflective jogging suit; thermal underwear; stop watch with pulse meter; racquet sports eye protector with shatterproof lenses and frame; heavy protective outdoor gear.

--Stocking stuffers: Bike reflectors; jumper cables; flashlight; thermal socks; warm gloves, scarf, and mittens; ear muffs; wall socket cover.

Don't forget that a promise between friends or among family members to never drink and drive is always a great gift. Add a promise to always wear seat belts in vehicles and helmets on motorbikes. An offer to assist elderly friends or relatives with chores or transportation throughout the year will be especially appreciated.

## Choose toys wisely

At the Texas Department of Health's Product Safety Branch, this time of year always means sad news. In the midst of the holiday season, when children are expected to have fun, more injuries and deaths are recorded because of faulty or inappropriate toys.

The Product Safety Branch is responsible for monitoring the numbers and types of injuries, and trying to identify which products were involved. The office works in conjunction with federal agencies in trying to eliminate harmful products from the market.

In the last fiscal year, 33 children died in Texas, and some 126,000 others were injured in the U.S. because the toys they played with were dangerous. Dan Sowards, chief of the Product Safety Branch, said that last year 78 different toys were recalled because they were unsafe for small children.

"A lot of people simply don't think to inspect toys they buy at the store, or to make sure a toy is suited to a child's age. The majority of deaths and injuries are from choking on small parts to toys that are either defective or meant for older children," Sowards said. "Also, some adults

don't give young children the credit they deserve for being able to take things apart. Any small, detachable piece of a toy is a potential hazard to a young child who might put the thing in its mouth," he said.

Sowards explained that reporting systems in recent years have improved. "We now know sooner which hazards are on the shelves, because the medical community and consumers let us know, but at the same time there are always new products on the market."

Among the toys which now should be off store shelves are 17 different brands of baby rattles, which either have small parts that could cause choking or have dangerous handles, four brands of pacifiers, some stuffed animals with easily detachable eyes or noses, two crib toys with long strings, and a number of imported toys which contained lead paint.

"Every year, we try to warn people of the products we find to be unsafe," Sowards said. "But the ultimate responsibility will always lie with the adult who gives a child a toy. By the time we know for sure a product is dangerous, the same toy might be under the Christmas tree, because a relative didn't really think seriously about its potential."

## New Plant for Gruver

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) and Valley View Energy Corporation have negotiated an agreement that will allow electricity generated by Valley View at its planned cattle manure-fueled power plants to be transmitted on SPS lines.

Valley View plans to construct two 50,000-kilowatt manure-fueled power plants -- one at Hereford, Texas, by late-1987, and the other at Gruver, Texas, by mid-1988. Valley View will wholesale the power generated at the "biomass" plants to the City of Austin utility system. The Austin utility will retail the energy to its Austin-area customers.

The SPS-Valley View agreement to interconnect and "wheel" power is the first agreement by SPS to transmit

on its lines power owned by another generator. The agreement was hailed by SPS President Bill Esler and "another milestone in Southwestern's on going support of alternative energy generation projects."

The agreement also is the first wheeling contract Valley View has signed. To transmit power to Austin, the corporation will need to secure wheeling contracts with a number of electric utility companies.

SPS will transfer the Valley View power to facilities owned by Public Service of Oklahoma near Vernon Texas. Then the energy will be transmitted to Austin through a direct-current interconnection and a string of other utility company lines.

SPS President Esler said Southwestern Public Service and Valley

View spent months reaching the agreement, which he says, "will pay SPS a fair wheeling rate for the use of our transmission equipment."

Esler said Southwestern also plans to offer Valley View the generation-plant-design services of SPS' proposed subsidiary, Utility Engineering Corporation, for construction of future power plants. Another contractor has begun design of the first two Valley View plants.

The biomass plants Valley View plans to construct in Hereford and Gruver will use fluidized-bed boilers, but otherwise are similar to solid-fueled steam-generation plants such as Southwestern's coal-fueled plants.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, and southwestern Oklahoma, and southwestern Kansas.

## Gruver Library News

A new book in the Gruver City Library is a FIELD GUIDE TO AMERICAN WINDMILLS, by T. Lindsay Baker. Before the development of the first self-governing windmill, settlement of the upland areas of the American West was almost impossible. Windmills were needed to pump underground water to the surface. As soon as their design and manufacture had been perfected, the mills became the most prominent feature of the American landscape, not only in the western two-thirds of the nation but also in the East and particularly in the Middle East. Besides supplying the needs of farmers and ranchers, windmills performed such tasks as pumping water to the roofs of New York tenements, cleaning out mine shafts and ships' bilges, and providing water for the boilers of locomotives.

This guide to America's windmills is both a complete general history of turbine-wheel mills and an identification guide to the 112 most common models, which still dot the landscape today. With this guide a traveler or enthusiast crossing the plains and prairies of North America can identify virtually every farm-style windmill that he or she can see with a good pair of binoculars. The guide also serves as a handbook for the restoration of antique mills.

In his lively narrative T. Lindsay Baker clearly explains the technical evolution of the mills and shares a wealth of windmill folklore. Among the 376 illustrations are unpublished historical photographs, long-lost engravings, field photographs by the author, and detailed India-ink drawings of the 112 most popular designs. Appendices identify all the known windmill models from the 1850s to the present day. The comprehensive bibliography is the first published list of source materials on the history of windpower utilization.

T. Lindsay Baker holds degrees in history and geography from Texas Tech University. He is the author of several books on Texas history and immigration. During his 15 years of research for A FIELD GUIDE TO AMERICAN WINDMILLS he traveled to most of the United States and to Canada, Mexico, Great Britain, and Germany, as well as spending a year on a Fulbright Fellowship in Poland. He has also been actively engaged in the conservation and restoration of antique windmills, as well as being the publisher of the quarterly WINDMILLERS GAZETTE.

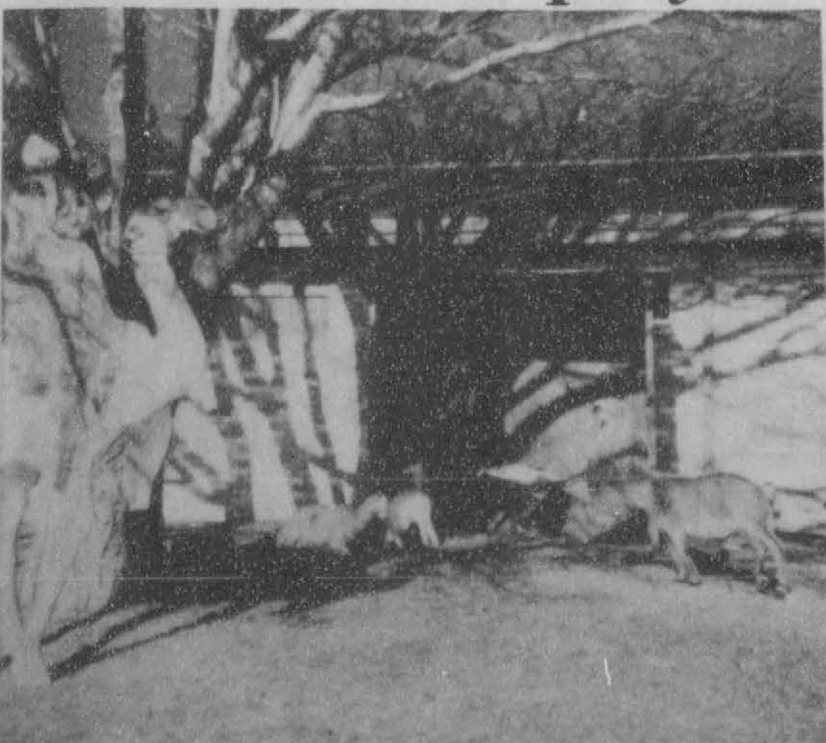

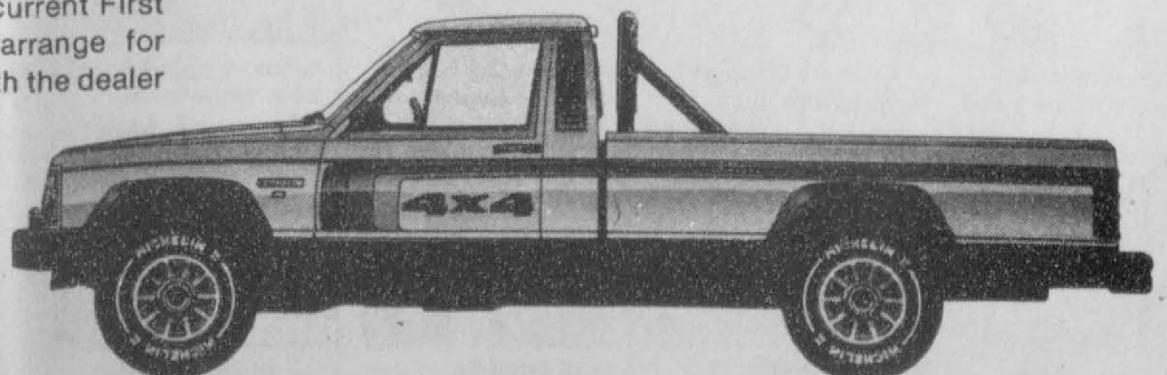

## Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.
