

One hundred and eighty nine years ago... July 4, 1776...representatives of thirteen British Colonies in North America, as members of the Continental Congress adopted an eloquent manifesto, conceived in anger and phrased with bold determination ... The Declaration of Independence!

The draft was largely the work of Thomas Jefferson. John Hancock, as president of the First Continental Congress, affixed his big, bold, signature to the document "by order and in behalf of Corpress" and Charles Thomason, secretary of ress, attested Hancock's signature. Fifty memocas of Congress signed the engrossed copy of the Declaration on August 2, 1776, with six more members affixing their signatures at later dates.

The public did not learn the actual words of the Declaration untri July 8th for the final version was called a "unanimous" declaration and that word could not be properly used until July 19th when the New York delegation declared that it favored the Declaration.

Vitally important to our way of living even now in this, the Atomic Age, are the stirring words "When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Natire's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinion of mankind requires that they should declare the cases which impel them to the separation....

"We hold thes truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equi, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain valienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." The founders of the w Nation considered Inde-
