

GRUVER CLOSES SEASON: WIN OVER PANHAN change of fumbles followed Gruver ended their 1964 through the Panhanded line

Football season victorious as they jolted Panhandle with a 46-0 victory. This gave the Greyhounds their seventh win of the season of ten games, and a district record of 3-1. The Hounds took second place in Dispict 1-A.

In the Friday night game Gruver rampaged over the Panthers with 335 yards gained rushing as compared to, the 41 yards gained by the Panhandle team. Gruver passed for 96 yards while Panhandle's aerial attempts brought them 68 yards. The first half was a completely different picture as compared to the final score for until the last seven seconds of the half the game was scoreless. Frank Silva bounded over from the 6 yard line of Panhandle to make the half time score of 6-0. As the Greyhounds came back in the second half they began a scoring attack and in the third quarter Danny Riley carried for six yards to make the score 12-0. Frank Silva recovered a fumble from the Panthers on their first play after the Gruver kick. The recovery led to the next touchdown within a minute of the previous one. Sam Tipton passed to Mack Hoel from the Panhandle 41 yardline and Hoel raced for the goal. Danny Riley followed with the run to give the Greyhounds a 20-0 lead at the end of the third quarter. The third quarter ended with Gruver pressing on the Panhandle goal and in the first play of the fourth quarter Frank Silva carried for the touchdown and Mack Hoel followed with a good kick for a score of 27-0. Gruver took over three downs later on the Panhandle 31 after Rex Shapley recovered a Panhandle fumble. Gruver made their next touchdown in three plays as Etter raced for the final 14 yards needed.Mack Hoel's kick was good and the score stood 34-0. Another fumble was recovered by the Greyhounds on the Panhandle 6 yardline and Danny Riley was over in three plays again from the one yard line to make the score 40-0. A pass to Silva -gained eleven yards followed by runs by Mathews and Silva along with a 21 yard pass put the Greyhounds on the Panhandle 21. Riley and Silva added 16 to the slate and Riley proceeded for five yards for the score. As Gruver led 12-0. Mack Hoel kicked to the Panhandle 40 where the Panthers fumbled on their first play and Frank Silva recovered. Tipton passed to Mack Hoel for 41 yards and Gruver tallied another score. Danny Riley followed for the extra two points and Gruver raised their lead to 20-0. Hoel kicked to the Pahhandle Panthers and the Gruver defense held the Panthers for no gain. Silva took the Panhandle kick on the Gruver 18 and proce eded back to the 44 yard line. Mathews and Silva carried for 16 yards and Gruver was in the Panhandle 33 heading for another touchdown. HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

Highlights from the Past to the Present visits this week in the home of the Bob Baley family of Spearman as we again veer back into the past and bring to life the history of our county which has been hidden in the pioneers.

Searching back into the past we find that Thomas A. Baley of Savannah, Georgia and Mary Kralicek of Nebraska (who came to America with her parents at the age of four from Vienna, Austria), were married at Anadarko, Oklahoma in 1878. In 1884 the couple moved to Texas and settled on a ranch which included some eight sections of land in Wheeler County. The ranch is now known as the Britt Ranch. The couple settled in a two room house of rock. The floor was dirt and the roof of sod. The home was located some twenty-one miles east of the town of Mobeetie which at that time was the only town.

Mr. Thomas Baley made a three week trip to Dodge City, Kansas to fetch lumber to make a floor for their home as well as a roof. Mrs. Baley remained at home by herself throughout the time. Managing the household along with the chores, Mrs. Baley did the family washing in the Sweetwater Creek. Their home had no doors and she and her neighbor and very dear friend, Mrs. Joseph W. Jones made doors for both of their houses from gunny sacks which were sewed together. Mr. and MrsJ.W.Jones began working for the Baleys shortly after their marriage and the two couples became very dear friends.

The Baleys remained on this ranch for some thirty--years, with the exception of only two years which were spent in Mobeetie so their four children, of whom Robert (Bob) was the youngest at the time, could attend school there. Mr. Thomas Baley gave the land for a school building on his ranch and a rock school structure was erected and still remains standing. The Thomas Baley family had nine children. In 1914 the family moved to Childress, Texas to make their home until the death of Mr. and Mrs. Baley.

Robert L. (Bob) Baley was the fourth child of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Baley and was born at the Baley Ranch in Wheeler County on July 24, 1886. Attending the little rock school on the Baley home place, Bob Baley decided at the





town and too because his children were sick with the meas les. He barbered throughout the summer and returned to Mobeetie where he began keeping books for a lumber company while comtemplating the move. As the spring of 1924 came the family decided to move to Spearman and purchased wheat farm some fifteen miles southwest of the town. They had the land farmed for them and Mr. Baley barbered in the Floyd Hays Barber Shop.

The couple had two daughters, Sibyl and Estelle, who were born in Mobeetie at the time of their move. The family moved to a small two room house with a basement in Spearman. From their home they could see the entire business section of Spearman and not a house was between their home and the town. There was no electricity, no was ter or no gas; the fuel used was coal. Mr. Baley served on the Spearman School Board and was a member at the time the first brick school for the town was constructed. He was active in civic work for he was a member of the City Commission and was serving at the time the electricity and water lines were established in Spearman.

age of sixteen that he would see the country and begin a life on his own. He began by working for three years on cattle drives throughout the western states, particularlyin Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, Montana, North and South Dakota and Idaho. Mr. Baley has often recalled experiences on the cattle drives but one which is remembered was when they were driving the cattle into Wyoming. The Yellowstone River was raging and the men had to wait for three or four days and still the cattle and horses had to swim the river inorder to cross. Mr. Baley was a rover on the cattle drives.

For a short while Mr. Baley worked in a silver mine in Deming, New Mexico. Returning to his home in Childress, Mr. Bob Baley decided to attend a barber school and a business school in Kansas City.

Upon completion of his schooling, he returned to Texas and married Ethel Mae Arendell. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Arendell and was born in Stephensville Texas. Miss Ethel Mar Arendell's father died when she was only two years of age and she and her mother moved into the home of the Smallwoods, the grandparents of Miss Aren dell. Mr. and Mrs. Smallwood and Mrs. William Arendell and her little daughter moved to Oklahoma which was then Indian Territory to make their home.

Mrs. Arendell later married and the family moved to the Panhandle of Texas and to Wheeler County in 1908 where they purchased a farm north of the town of Mobeetie. The daughter, Ethel Mae, attended school in Mobeetie. It was here in Wheeler County that Miss Arendell and Mr. Baley be came acquainted at church one Sunday afternoon. Mr. Baley invited her to attend church with him that night for their--first date. The couple were married on February 22, 1911 in Stephenville, Erath County Texas, in the courthouse there. Miss Arendell had moved back to the county where she was born after the death of her grandfather. She was recipient of the Arendell estate.

Upon settling her business in Erath Couhty, she and her husband moved to Hammond, Oklahoma where Mr. Baley operated a barber shop. They later moved back to Mobeetie, Texas where he also owned and operated a barber shop for several years. He also served as postmaster in Mobeetie. Mr. Floyd Hays heard of Bob Baley's barbering and went to Mobeetie to see if he would join him in his barber shop in the newly organized town of Spearman. Mr. Baley moved to Spearman by himself in 1923 to see if he would like the

Mr. Baley worked in the Floyd Hays Barber Shop from 1923 until 1956 when he reitred. He was known by young and old alike as "Bob''.

Both daughters, Sibyl and Estelle, completed their schooling in Spearman. Sibyl went to Hardin Simmons University and attended North Texas State Teachers College at Denton. She returned to spearman for four years where she taught in the Spearman School System. She married Mr. W.R. Undersood whose father was a Baptist minister. The couple make their home in Albuquerque where he is an engineer as well as a retired captian from the navy.

Estelle attended Businees College and continued her education at the University of Maryland. She served for twelve years in the Womens Corp. of the Army and served for four years over seas in Munic Germany. She married --C.L. Morse and the couple make their home in Yuma, Arizona and have two daughters, Robbie and Marie.

Mr. and Mrs. Baley have been active members of the Baptist Church and Mrs. Baley has been a member of the Baptist Church for sixty years and a member of the Spearman Baptist Church for forty-one years.

Retiring in 1953 from barbering, Mr. and Mrs. Baley spent a great deal of their time with their children. Until his death on September 11, 1963, Mr. Baley was available for a few days or a few week at a time when an extra barber was needed. He barbered in Gruver several times while the bar ber was on vacation.

Mrs. Baley makes her home in Spearman but spends her winters in Yuma, Arizona with her daughter and family.

We climb up the ladder a bit in time but still find that our early business men play an important part in the history of our county. Again we say how fortunate we are to have had people such as the Bob Baleys to begin our stride in life 🖛

buffaloberry. SCREWWORM THREAT TO HIGH PLAINS

Screwworms detected in the High Plains Saturday, November 7 could pose a threat not only to other Texas Panhandle counties,

but also to Oklahoma. This is the warning from screwworm eradication program sent some spill-over of authorities.

The screwworm infestation was reported 5 miles southwest of Clarendon in Donley county. This was

the furtherest north screwworms have been found this year, and the closest to Oklahoma, where the livestock pest has been absent during 1964. An infestation discovered in neighboring Briscoe County in late September broke a 53-day screwworm-free period for Texas. While eradication workers are confident cold weather will diminish any serious threat from further screwworm activity in the Panhandle, they are treating the infestation area through release of sterile flies. The first air drop of flies was to take place Tuesday. However the danger may

not be past. A continuabe present. tion of the unseasonably



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warm weather experienced in the Southwest could prescrewworms into nearby areas. Therefore livestock producers in the Texas Panhandle and in Oklahoma counties adjoining the border are asked to stay alert

for screwworms. Animal wounds should be treated with preventive smears and livestock should be examined regularly for infestations, says Dixon Hubbard, Area Extension Livestock Specialist. When infestations are found, larvae should be collected from deep within the wound and placed in water or alcohol. This specimen should be taken to the county age nt or mailed directly to Box 969, Mission, Texas There, at screwworm eradication headquarters, the sample is positively diagnosed and arrangemens for sterile fly drops are made if screwworms are found to
