THE TEXAS Legislature has many problems I facing it during the current session, not the least of which are the proposals to increase salaries of public school teachers. TSTA has proposed a bill calling for a \$45 per month increase beginning in September 1965, while Gov. John Connally has countered with one offering an average increase of \$90 per year over a 10-year period.

It should be noted first that the disagreement is one of principles, not personalities. In fact, much of the furor has been because differences of opinion over such large sums of money make headlines. The ultimate goal must be improvement of education for the children of Texas. In fact, the TSTA Legislative Committee commended the Governor for recognizing that teachers need a raise, although they disagreed with his solution.

The differences of opinion concern how much teachers should receive, when they should receive it, and the all-important matter of who should pay for it. The latter may well be the point on which the issue turns.

Some phases of the Governor's program require clarification, however. First, the idea of rewarding teachers with experience more than beginning teachers is a worthy one. In fact, TSTA has held to this principle for many years.

At the same time, some have contended that the Governor's plan would maintain the 80-20 statelocal sharing of the Minimum Foundation Program. This would be true if the textbook and retirement costs were not added. If this is done, however, local districts would have to pay 20 percent of these costs, something they have never done before. And they would have to pay 20 percent of the Governor's total salary program, which averages \$20 million annually for the first biennium. This combination, therefore, would shift the sharing of the new Connally program to 70 percent local and 30 percent state for the next biennium. This is a matter of simple arithmetic, traditional or modern.

The Governor also recommended "Abolition of the 35-cent ad valorem tax for public school purposes effective December 31, 1971." This was another recommendation of the Committee on State and Local Tax Policy.

The state ad valorem tax raises approximately \$45 million per year. Only about \$35 million of that goes to schools, through the Available School Fund. If the tax is abandoned by the state in 1971, however, the taxing authority would be shared by cities,

From 1943 to 1953 the minimum salary for Texas teachers was increased \$1,500 while the maximum (for more experience) went up \$3,000, averaging about \$2,200. And in the 1953-63 period the beginning salary was raised \$1,600 while the experienced teacher at the maximum was raised \$2,000. The average of this period was approximately \$1,800. This would compare with the average raise of \$900 proposed by the Governor for the next 10 years.

IN his message to the Legislature, Governor Connally made it clear he wants local districts to pay an increasingly larger share of school costs. He said, in part: "To provide equitable and realistic state-local sharing of public school costs, I endorse the suggestions of the Texas Committee on State and Local Tax Policy and recommend that the Free Textbook Program and the Teacher Retirement System be incorporated into the calculation of the cost of the Minimum Foundation Program."



And yet the same Committee on State and Local Tax Policy also recommended that local school districts in Texas should raise an additional \$200 million in local funds before the state puts any more money into public schools.

UN the one hand, schools are offered a possible share of \$35 million, six years from now, and on the other they are told to raise \$200 million more, immediately.

Moreover, if the ad valorem tax should eventually be abandoned by the state, it could not be levied locally unless the people voted to do so.

It is patently clear, therefore, that the ad valorem "return" gimmick holds little hope for local schools. And neither does the alternate 10-year plan for teacher salary increases. The Legislature no doubt will reach the same conclusions in its wisdom,

WHY LENT FOR ME? For hundreds of years the Christian Church has set aside the six weeks before Easter and has designated them "the Lenten season."




BRAIN CAN'T WORK WITHOUT OXYGEN BROUGHT BY THE BLOOD
