## Karen's Kozy Korner

> Polls show that most families, some extent about finances. But healthy families seem to be able to deal with it better - mostly
because they have some money management skills.
> In her book Stress and the Healthy Family, researcher Delopes Curran says that her studies of stress-effective families shows
they use four common money management techniques.
> First, they learn to control money stresses together. In twopaycheck families they may pay different bills out of each check and in other families there may expenses and discretionary money. But in general, money not considered to belong to one partner or the other, but Second.
> Second, these families budget,
although how tightly they budge varies widely. The families tend to plan for fixed monthly costs like home, car and medical and insure-
ance payments and then divide the rest into savings, food clothing, recreation and miscellaneous. Setting aside some savings for emergencies is an especially inportant feature of the budge
because it means that the family doesn't fall apart when something out of the ordinary happens. Curran also found that when tend to scale down more effective-
ly than others. They do this by revising their expectations. So, for
example, the family that has taken example, the family that has taken men may settle for a nearby weekend camping
Other families who refuse to lower their expectations often
depend more on credit, which can add to their financial stress in the long run.
Fourth, stress-effective families develop methods for making major purchases without the need
for painful arguments. Couples tend to respect each other's daily decisions on spending unless there's an unusual reason such as high monthly bills or loss of a job.
But for major purchases, such But for major purchases, such
as a new car, furniture or trips, as a new car, furniture or trips,
these couples share their own feelings, fears and attitudes and take into consideration the differont attitudes of their partner. This makes it possible for them to
strike a compromise. The skills of sharing
ing, revising expectations and compromising may not seem like much, but evidently they add up to a family that can handle
finances without it becoming a finances without it becoming

# The Cowboy Tradition The Modern Cowboy 

"The American cowboy is a mythical character who refuses to die," says the author of "The Modern Cowboy." "Although in a time when heroes walk on the moon he may have become something of an anachronism, the solitary man on horseback continues to fascinate people in all parts of the globe. Perhaps more than any other figure in American folklore, the cowboy embodies the force, spirit, and integrity of our nation. The source of this mythical figure is the working cowboy. On the one hand, he is a common man: a laborer, a hired hand who works for wages. Yet in his lonely struggle against nature and animal cunning, he becomes larger than life. The qualities found in him are qualities to be admired;
they are heroic."
Who is this cowboy? Where did he come from and where is he today? These are the questions John R. Erickson addresses in this book, which, unlike most books written about cowboys in the past twentyfive years, is based on firsthand observation and experience. Mr. Erickson has brought the cowboy out of the nineteenth century, where he was left to gather romantic cobwebs, and has placed him firmly in the present. And in the process of describing and defining the modern working cowboy his work, his tools and equipment, his horse, his roping technique, his style of dress, his relationships with his wife and his employer Erickson gives a thorough description of modern ran-
ching, the economic milieu in which the cowboy operates.
In many respects the cowboy's life has changed in the past fifty years, as he has adapted to innovations in the cattle business. In other respects, it has changed very little; there is still no machine, maintains the author, that can do pasture work better than a good man on a good horse.

When he wrote "It's A Dog's Life," he began composing songs for his characters to sing. On that tape, you'll hear "Your Momma Wears Old Tow Sack Drawers," "Cats Are Stupid," and "Kicking My Dog Around."
In "Murder In the Middle Pasture" you'll hear Hank and Junior the Buzzard doing a duet of "Beulah, Good Night," and Hank singing a soulful number called "The Cold Weather Cowdog Blues."
In "Faded Love" Hank and the coyote brothers belt out a raucous polka number called "Rotton Meat," and Hank, believe it or not, sings a tender love song called "Beulah's Song."
